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
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

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Thanks, But No Thanks

In one of his recent Newsweek columns, Henry Hazlitt reviewed several new and authoritative pamphlets on the subject of government price fixing. These pamphlets, he wrote, "show how price ceilings curtail and distort production; encourage wasteful consumption, create shortages, and necessitate priorities, rationing, and subsidies to make them work at all over a long period. They point out that price control inevitably mea s profit control and gives a government bureaucrat power of life or death over an industry."

That is a strong indictment, but the record fully justifies it. We saw it under OPA. We are seeing it again under OPS. OPS actually attempted to force a form of profit control on retailing which undoubtedly would have forced many stores out of business, and made others drastically curtail their services. This effort was blocked by Congress, fortunately for the workers, consumers and enterprises of America.

In the realm of theory, no less than in the hard world of fact, the case for price control is a weak one. It rests on the premise that an economic system can be run by fiat—and that the arbitrary, often-capricious orders of a group of political appointees are better than natural laws and experience which have governed human undertakings since civilization began. Price control has been tried time and time again over the centuries--in the Rome of the Caesars no less than the America of today. In every case it has been a flat failure, and; when long enough continued, it has brought on national disaster. To attempt to graft it onto a free economy is to attempt to mix oil and water.

Recipe For Disaster

America, the oil industry spends \$500. That amount is invested in the facilities for producing, refining and distributing the gas and the lubricants the new car needs

The total thus spent is staggering. Last year alone the number of cars in service jumped by about 2.4

fact that there is still a certain amount of criticism of the profits the oil industry makes. What the critics lose sight of is that those profits make possible all the costly exploring, developing and expanding the industry must carry on if it is to keep pace with an insatiable civilian and military demand for its products. And those profits also make possible the tremendous sums in taxes the industry pays to government each year.

The oil industry is an almost perfect illustration of the importance of the profit motive. As an example, finding new wells to replace those which are exhausted is an exceedingly risky undertaking. Only about one wildcat well out of five turns into a producer. The other four are dry and worthless—a case of money down a rathole. No sane man would risk his capital and time and energy on undertakings such as this unless he saw a chance to make a profit if success smiled on him.

Oil, in all its ramifications, is among the most keenly competitive of industries. That alone makes it certain that profits will be held to reasonable levels. But without the profit, we'd all be thirsting for oil today and there'd be no relief possible.

Profit Motive Points

A little item in a national magazine a while back attracted our attention. At first, we were amused, and probably so were most other readers. But now that we think about it, we don't think it's

The article concerned a growing trend among American businesses to "educate" the wives of promising young executives, so that they could "adjust" to the way of life supposedly led by people at the executive level.

As we check the article closely, we find that the "executive way of life" cannot tolerate very much nonconformity. For example, the young exec's wife is supposed to learn the proper conduct at cocktail parties. The idea being conformity to the morals of the group, we take it that the wife, altho she may not drink, is ex-

pected to take cocktail in hand and empty the glass. The Boss is watching—and little Mrs. Junior Exec politely refuses a cocktail, The Boss thinks,

"Hmm. She doesn't seem very sociable. That's bad. Our young executives, and their wives, must be able to stand up socially. Can't have wet blankets, bad for business "

This is just an example. The whole "educational" process is designed to make the young ladies "sophisticated."

We all have seen examples of "sophistication." It's in the movies, in books and other fiction, and in real life. We view this situation with alarm. Because we believe in individual freedom. That includes the freedom to be non-drinkers if we want to be, or to be moderate drinkers if it pleases us. We don't even deny a man his "privilege" to lie drunk in the gutter, altho we may personally disapprove.

Actually, this New Morality is just another form of prudery. Not too long ago, people forced their own peculiar morality on others. Today, the new kind of prudery seems to be doing the same.

It has become popular to be "sophisticated," and a deep mis-understanding and popular misapplication of the science of psychology has resulted in an unprecedent-

ed desire to follow the crowd, to conform. It seems strange to us that any American business, which is supposed to rest solidly on the principle of individual liberty and private rights, should begin taking part in a conformist movement. It smacks of the most insidious kind of socialism.

Is there a deare moment in the entire year than that one morning when suddenly and without heason you wake at 6 o'clock in the morning and feel the currents of spring shyly present in the still sharp, insistent winds of March that come hrough the window? But, although hold and imaginative in dealing with any misrepresentations of commercial competitors, business men still too often appear cowardly and remain silent in public when confronted with union and other economic and political doctrines that misrepresent the business men's intentions, functions, and contributions to the public good.

Too many business men are unthinkingly continuing to devote themselves to the program that has historically failed them: that of concentrating on marketing, engineering, manufacturing, and finance while leaving to economic and political explanation of the free system of incentives and competition within which business produces its gains for the

Else there will be no free businesses where the managements want to-and are permitted towork in the balanced best interests of free employes, free customers free vendors, and free savers with an opportunity and incentive to risk their savings on pleasing the public better.

Else also, there will be no free publishers. The publisher is a business man like the others. But he has one additional hazard in the propensity or necessity of collectivist governments to kill a free beginning with the allocation of newsprint on a political basis. The writer was for a time, responsible for the distribution of the newsprint supply in this country and still shivers at the thought of how such power could be prostituted by a man or a movement reaching for dictatorial power with the aid of a gradual silencing of any press opposition.

TWO WAYS TO DO THEIR DUTY How are business men to do their duty-their duty to themselves as well as their fellow citizens? By doing two things: First, get-

ting the intentions of business known. Then, second, getting the facts of business known. As to our intentions, we must be sure it is a fact-and then that employes, customers, vendors, share owners, and the public know

that we put the human considerations first ... and that we do so because of valid promptings from both head and heart. We are going to be telling them a lot of things to clear up present misinformation and misunderstand-

beliefs and statements by their leaders outside of business. They have got to believe that we are on side-are giving them unpleasant or controversial information in their interests- if we are to do any good in what we are trying to accomplish. To do this we have got to get

into actual two-way communication on a genuine man-to-man basis with our employes, customers, vendors, share owners, neighbors, and general public. The mainstay of this is personal contact, of course. But we need to pave the way for the personal contact, we need to put down on paper what is going to be said and done during the individual contact, and we need to confirm and remind as to what was said and done.

In no other field of selling do we depend on the salesman alone. We supplement and multiply the salesman's work by advertising. This selling of the economic, mor-al and social consequences of business- and the good intentions of business is a mass marketing job. Publishers, advertising agenrelations counsellors should be out orging their clients to use the same methods in "management" selling as they do in product sell-

HAS HIGHER EDUCATION LOST ITS MOORINGS? Fort Worth Star-Telegram

March 16, 1952 An incisive diagnosis of higher education in America was presented by Dr. M. E. Sadler, president of Texas Christian University, at the 65th annual convention of the Christian Churches last week in Houston. This educational system in a drift to state control could go the way of systems in Europe that became the primary tools of dicta-

In sounding that warning, however, the TCU president foresaw other pitfalls for the cause of sound learning. One is the increasing trend to a secularized, materialistic society largely through a collegiate system that has generally become divorced from religion,

its original founder. In that connection Dr. Sadler recalled that 180 of the 207 colleges established in America before the war between the states were definitely church-related and only 21 were state-controlled. But today about half of all college students enrolled in tax-supported

schools. Along with this easy way of financing there inevitably goes state control of education, which basi-cally must be free of all arbitrary restraints in the pursuit of sound learning. The private colleges that continue largely under religious auspices are being confronted with unequal competition from the gov-ernment-financed institutions. Yet, as Dr. Sadler argued, these private colleges and universities originally gave birth to the American way of life and its free system, and still nurture them today. Duke University and its predecessor, Trinity College, in North Carolina, are probative of Dr. Sadler's conten-

But beyond the problem of state control, Dr. Sadler emphasized the fact that we are living in the midst of a secularized, materialistic society, which neither understands nor appreciates the significance of Christian education. Therefore, he held, "it is extremely difficult to create or to maintain a basically Christian institution of higher learning today." The problem cannot be solved


merely by adding a course here, or a department there, nor by having any prescribed chapel or so-called religious services," Dr. Sadler explained. "As I see it, the full solution of this problem involves a complete conversion, a new direction, a return to vital religion as the focal center of all sound education. being treated fairly by a given

The TCU president has laid down an extremely important proposition. As he argues, religion must have an influential place in education, because morality or ethics is the major concern in this age of materialism with its impoverishment of the spirit, America's children must have the same indoctrination in orinciples, integrity, honor, and courage that the small colleges of the past gave their predecessors decades ago.



THE AMOUNT TO FEED A DOG

Do you ever wonder what the proper amount of food is to give your dog? If you are ever faced with this problem here are a couple of good rules to remem-

Feed a pup an amount of food equal to one third the size of his head at least three times per day Feed a grown dog daily one-half ounce of food for each pound he weighs. For example, a dog weighing 64 pounds should receive 2 pounds of food daily.

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

And why doesn't Easter come on the same day every year like the Fourth of July and Christmas? Early in the Fourth Century, A. D., the Roman Emperor Constantine, the first ruler to accept Christianity, declared that Easter should always fall on the Sunday tollowing the first full moon after March 21.

2. ARDIS BARNARD, 8, 202 E. Browning, still thinks Easter egg hunts are as much fun as opening a Christmas stocking. The hunts started centuries ago when after Eostre, the Anglo-Saxon goddess of Spring, who was especially fond of children, supposedly transformed a beautiful pet bird into Mr. Hippety Hop - our funloving Easter bunny — who scatters his eggs over the face of the earth to delight all children.

3. DEWAYNE RENNER, 2, 1712 W. Montagu, and Dan Painter, 3, 710 N. Banks, are more fascinated each year as they find out more about these eggs, chicks, bunnies and ducklings that have become a part of Easter. They hunt for the brightest eggs — the candy and the hardboiled ones — not knowing that throughout the Christian ero painted eggs have been frequently used to denote the Resurrection. Colored aggs inscribed with good wishes were once traditional Easter greeting in Europe but now eggs are used chiefly for children's Easter egg hunts — and people remember friends and loved ones with cards.
