Individual Participation Is Needed In Party Precincts

Editor's note: The West Texas Chamber of Commerce has prepared a series of two articles that emphasize importance of individual participation in party precinct conventions in a presidential election year. This is the first article.

In the past a very small portion of Texas voters have had any direct influence—with their individual votes—upon the election of the President and vice-president of the United States. They have voted in primary elections, and a few of them in general elections, but they voted for presidential electors—not the candidates themselves.

Those candidates—the party nominees—had been selected three or four months before the general election itself.

And, even then, they had not been selected by ballots of individual voters, cast in an election.

Their nominations originated way back there in May at party precinct conventions.

Here is how it works: The precinct convention names delegates to the party's county convention.

The county convention selects delegates to the state convention.

The state convention selects delegates to the national convention.

The national convention nominates the presidential and vice-presidential candidates of the party.

It is, therefore, necessary that the individual voter take part in the precinct convention to most effectively make his own vote count in election of the President and vice-president.

Because such a relatively few voters usually attend precinct conventions, the vast majority have had little moral right to complain about any administration's policies.

Here are some questions and answers to point up fundamental facts about the presidential precinct convention:

Q. When will it be held?
A. On Saturday, May 3.

Q. At what hour?
A. The law requires that it be held between 10 a.m. and 8 p.m., Outside the largest cities, it usually is opened at 2 p.m.

The county chairman of the party is required by law to file a list of times and places with the county clerk at least 10 days before convention day. This list

Denver - Julesburg wildcatting picked up with the coming of spring. Seven new wildcats have been started recently. Four of them are in Nebraska.

Daily Average Shows Gain Of 50 Barrels

TULSA, Okla. — (AP) — The nation's daily average crude oil and condensate production gained barely 50 barrels during the week ending April 15, the Oil and Gas Journal reported.

The tiny increase made the total daily average 6,364,525 barrels, bringing the year's total to 696,618,150 barrels compared to 624,704,500 barrels at this time a year ago.

Sizable gains in Oklahoma and Indiana were more than offset by Kansas' loss of 300 barrels to 315,000 barrels for the week. Oklahoma's increase was 2,600 barrels to 531,200, Indiana's 1,600 to 30,900.

Advances were reported also for California, up 600 barrels to 980,200 barrels; Wyoming, up 350 barrels to 192,500; Mississippi, 300 to 98,800; Alabama, 100 to 2,800; and Florida and Utah each up 50 barrels to 1,825 and 3,950 respectively.

Other losses included Michigan, down 900 barrels to 36,300; and Arkansas, off 300 to 80,400. The eastern fields dropped 109 barrels to 58,700, and Nebraska and New Mexico each fell by the same margin to 6,500 and 162,375 respectively.

Production was unchanged in Illinois, 167,200 barrels; Kentucky, 35,600; Montana, 24,875; and Texas, 2,885.

Iraq's Big New Oil Field Has Double Significance

By Bill Sansing

TULSA, Okla. — (AP) — Basrah Petroleum Co.'s new Zubair oil field in southwestern Iraq has double significance.

Oil men are interested primarily in production while Western world statesmen wonder who is going to get it.

Basrah, an affiliate of the Iraq Petroleum Co. which is controlled in turn by American and English investors, opened commercial production from the field last December.

The Oil and Gas Journal reported the initial output at near 27,000 barrels daily with a potential of 165,000 barrels by 1953.

Carrying the new fields' output is a 74-mile 12-inch pipeline with a terminus at FAO on the Persian Gulf.

Dakota's daily average was listed at 800 barrels.

Despite the trend of small range lines such as this being constructed with bends to absorb desert heat expansion the Zubair-Fao artery is laid in a straight line with concrete supports which allow for temperature changes.

The Journal points out that corrosion due to heavy oil and winter rains has been overcome by building six-foot embankments around the pipeline and its pump stations for protection.

Zubair's production is described as the deepest and hole pressures the highest of the Persian Gulf producing area. Pressures, operators point out, increase the hazard of blowout.

The Zubair pipeline is an important link in future Iraq crude production. Along with the 566-mile line from the Kirkuk field to Basrah, Syria, on the Mediterranean coast, scheduled for completion this month, total Iraq output by next year is due to hit 500,000 barrels a day.

February production, by way of contrast, was limited to 225,800 barrels daily.

The Oil World, another authoritative industry publication, adds that nationalization of neighboring Iran's oil industry and its effect on the West makes Iraq's production all the more vital.

Fully aware of this, Iraq has capitalized on her advantageous position.

She recently ratified an agreement with her oil-consumers similar to that granted King Ibn Saud of Saudi Arabia a year ago last December.

Iraq petroleum and Iraq agreed on a 50-50 profit split. The government is represented on the firm's board of directors, is permitted to buy crude for its refinery at cost and is protected by guaranteed production and income levels.

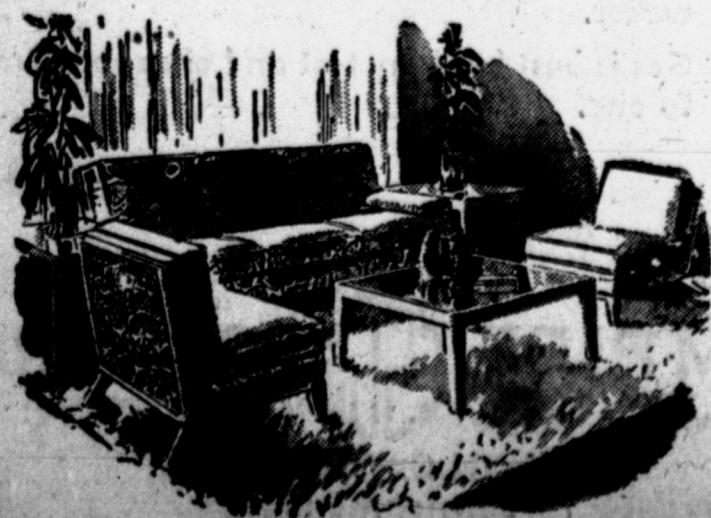

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WHAT IT TAKES FOR HOME WORK

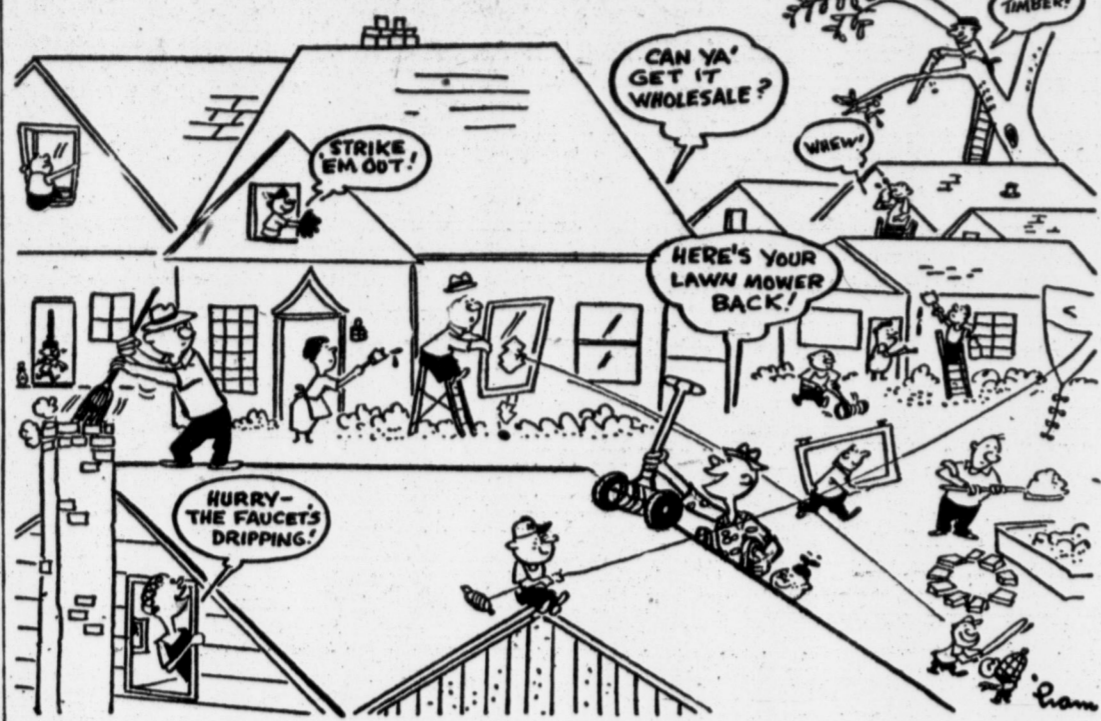

What this country needs is a good-five cent formula for owning a house and enjoying it. Anybody with some money and optimism can buy a home. But few people have the ability to stop working around the house and start relaxing in it. Puttering, hell! It's more like working on a chain gang. The inmates pay for the privilege of serving out

the sentence of their mortgage at hard labor. Sure, you can enjoy your house. But you've got to be stubborn, you've got to be brave and unconventional. You've got to have the kind of courage that will permit you to lie in the hammock while everybody else on the block is working. You've got

to be able to ignore the cold, reproving stare you married. Sure, every man likes to do a little work around the house for the creative satisfaction. But my trouble is that little jobs turn out to be big jobs every time. My wife decides I ought to paint the basement windows. I clean them first. Then I notice

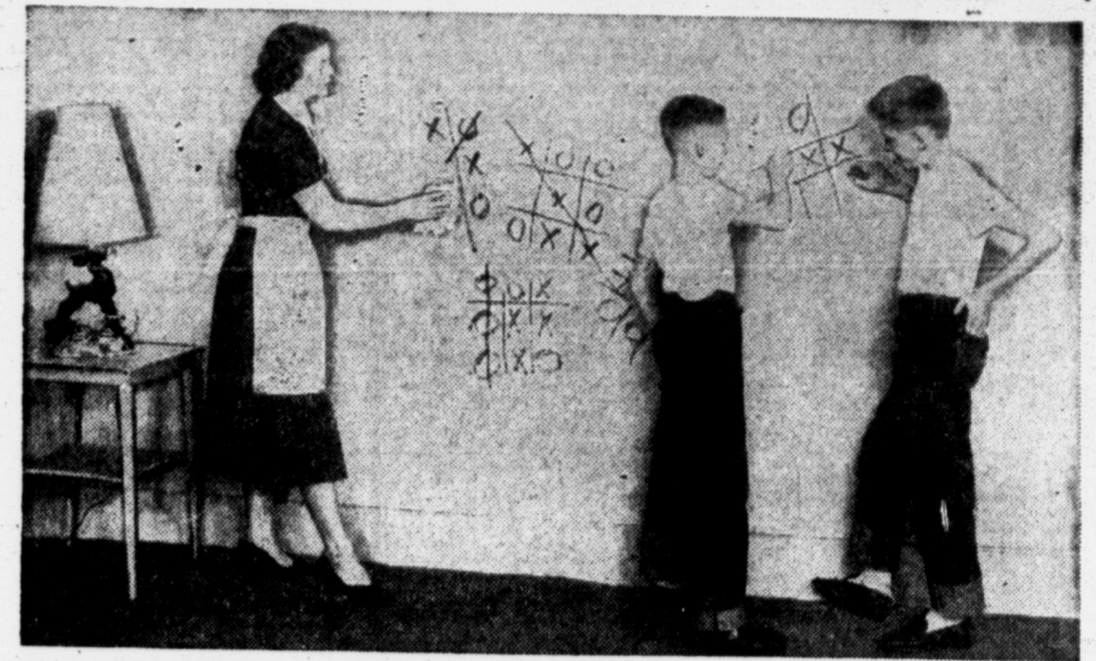

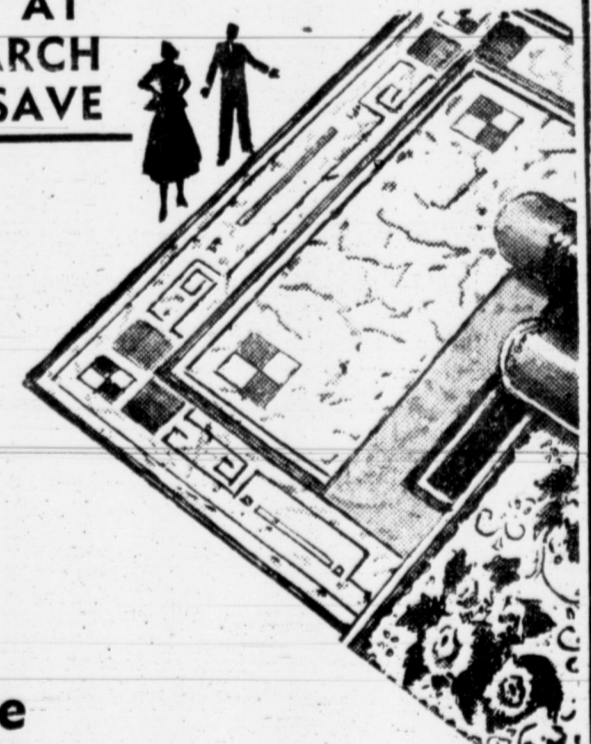

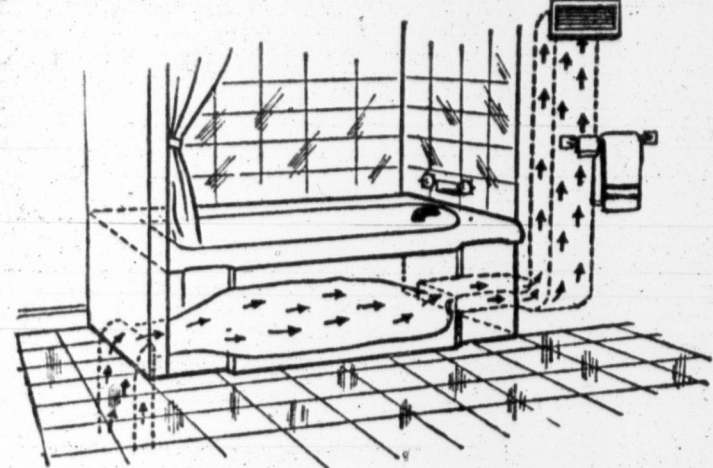
Heating Engineers Take Chill From the Bathtub

The heating engineer, who came back from France and had a small radiator installed in the bathroom wall behind the towel rack to keep his bath towel warm and dry the way he found it in a Paris hotel, thought he had something until he leaned back to relax in his bathtub one cold winter night.

Try that bathtub trick without draping a towel over your shoulders and you won't be likely to do it again.

Still, bathtubs are made with sloping backs, so the heating engineers have come up with a way to make them comfortable. In fact, the National Warm Air Heating and Air Conditioning Association has developed several ways to make bathrooms more comfortable.

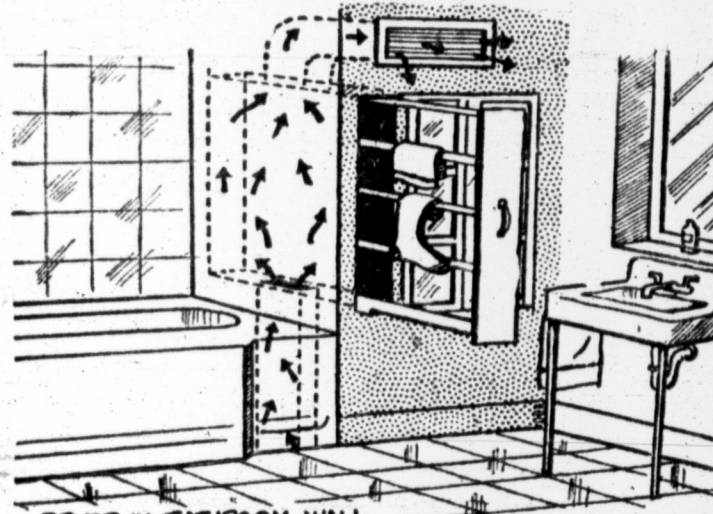
The hollow space between the lining and outer shell of a bathtub can be used as part of the warm air duct that heats the

bathroom. One heating duct is brought up under the tub. Another duct leads out from the opposite end of the tub to the room's heating outlet. The warm air circulating in the shell of the tub keeps it warm at all times. The colder the weather, the warmer the tub.

Another trick apparently was devised by a heating engineer, who, in groping for a towel, grabbed some of his wife's underwear that had been hung in the bathroom to dry. He devised

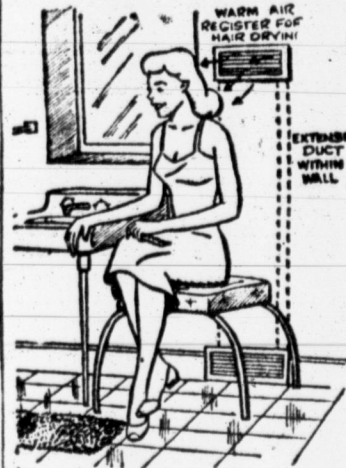


DRYING RACK slides into enlarged warm air duct.

a lingerie dryer, fitted into the bathroom wall and heated by a warm air duct on its way into the room. It keeps drying stockings out of sight and dries them quickly for free.

A built-in hair dryer is one of the easiest installed bathroom accessories. A small warm air register is placed in the bathroom wall about 40 inches above the floor. The exact location is best determined by measuring the height of the woman intending to use it, while she is seated on a bathroom chair or stool.

The duct to a hair dryer register often is an extension of the duct opening in the baseboard. The woman drying her hair closes the damper in the baseboard register, forcing all of the heat up through the higher outlet.

PAINT ROLLER CARE

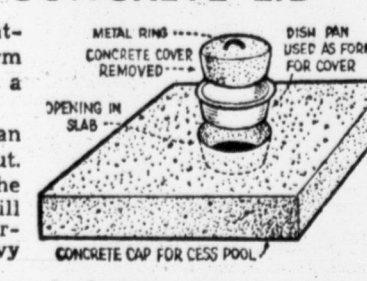

The West German Supreme Court this week threw out her contention she had been convicted twice of the same crime. Hans Richter, president of the court, said the convictions were for different offenses.

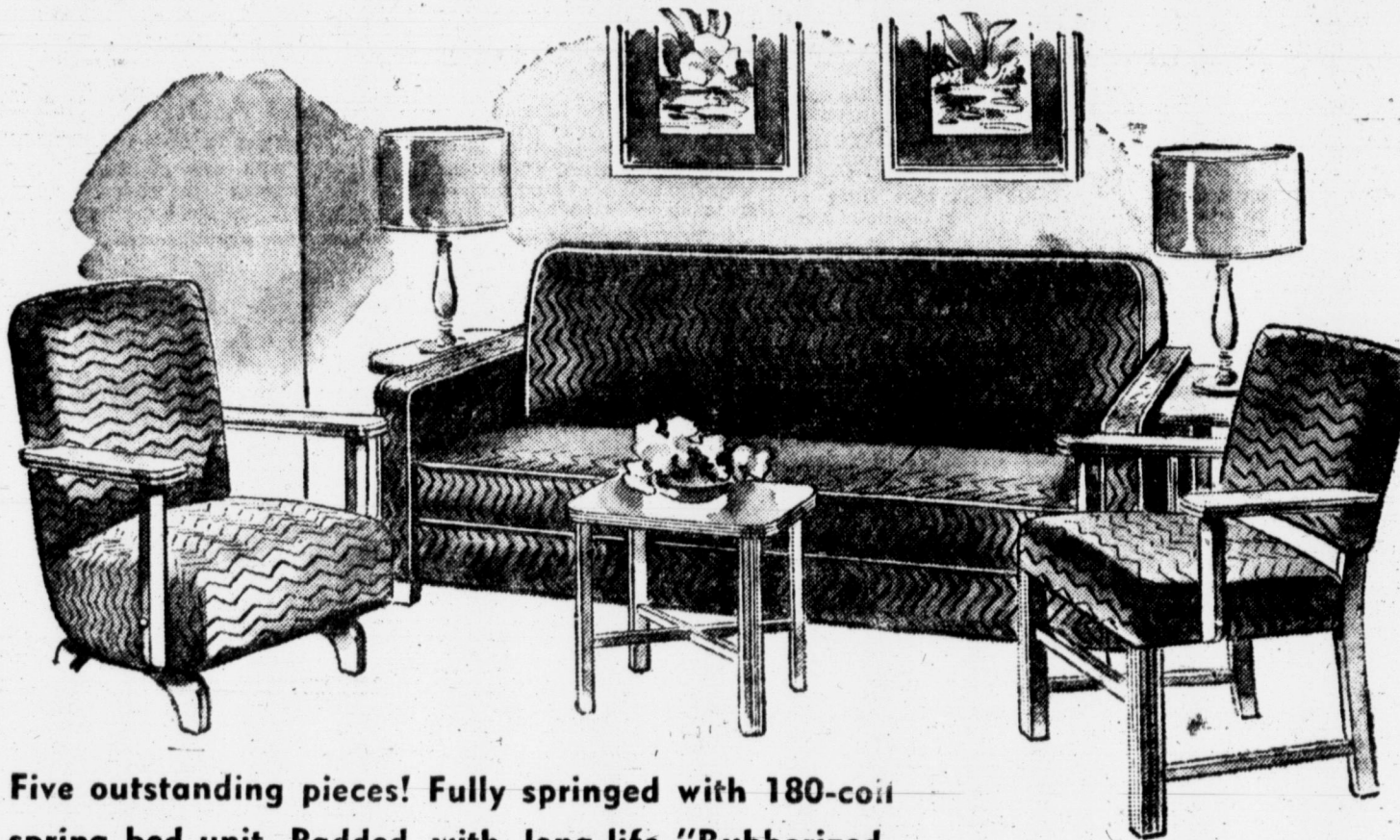

Oven Built in a Wall Revises Kitchen Plan



THE KITCHEN RANGE is coming apart in modern planning with the oven separated from top burners and each unit placed where it will be most convenient. Manufacturers of gas ranges (Chambers) have developed in-a-wall ovens and in-a-counter burners which can be built into the kitchen the same as sinks and dishwashers are enclosed. This makes it possible to place an oven at convenient height and adjacent to a built-in baking board, while top burners can be located nearer to the sink. A second oven for broiling likewise can be built into the wall at another location determined by convenience. Insulation and adequate venting eliminate fire hazards.

How FHA Made Buying And Remodeling Easier

The Federal Housing Administration (FHA) is one of the most misunderstood agencies of the government. You'll hear people talk about getting a loan from the FHA. This can't be done and never was done. The FHA lends no money. Its business is to insure mortgage loans made by banks and other lending institutions. This doesn't mean that the government will step in and make your payments for you if you can't meet them. It means that if you are having a house built, or buying one from a builder, the FHA says in effect: "If that house is built to our standards, we will insure the bank against loss on its loan in case the house must be taken in foreclosure and resold at a loss." If you are planning to remodel your house, a similar arrangement is made. In both cases you sign the usual bond or note for which you are personally liable. And in both cases you pay the insurance premium on the loan. This amounts to one-fourth of one per cent. You'll hear people ask: "Why should I pay for insurance to protect the bank?" There are several reasons. Before the FHA was established, you couldn't get such liberal loans, nor monthly payments extending over 20 years or more. For modernizing a house, it would be difficult today to get as much as \$2,500 spread out in monthly payments over 30 months, without FHA insurance. But most important is the assurance established by FHA standards, which in many cases have been stricter than building codes. One out of every three new homes in the United States is financed with an FHA-insured mortgage, which indicates the popularity of the system. By seeing to it that the entire transaction is economically sound, the FHA has kept foreclosures at a minimum. Although more than two million homes were financed under Section 203 of the National Housing Act with insured mortgages, only three out of a thousand had to be foreclosed. This stability resulted in an accumulation of premiums so far exceeding needed reserves that many millions in rebates have been made in certain classes of paid-up mortgages.

Bathrooms Are Being Made Bigger

The bathroom is one of the most expensive rooms in a house. Its fixtures, fittings and finishing—usually tile or other easily cleaned surfaces—are all relatively costly. Heavier framing is called for, because of the weight of a tile floor and heavy bathroom fixtures. And then when the room is completed it is one of the most wasteful rooms.

So big changes are being made in bathrooms. They are becoming larger, accommodating built-in vanity counters around washstands, storage places for towels, soap and accessories, and they are being subdivided in compartments so that two or three persons can use the room in comparative privacy.

Sliding doors, mechanical ventilation and modern lighting make the compartmented bathroom entirely practicable. Families most in need of an extra bathroom often can least afford one. So the divided bath solves a big problem.

More Space Is Needed
Few existing bathrooms are large enough to be subdivided. They were planned as small and compact as possible because of their high cost. But very often there is an adjoining closet or part of a room that can be merged with the bathroom by remodeling.

This additional space is essential. Crowded bathrooms have been hazardous for both mother and child in the bathing and dressing of children. Space for two persons to move around avoids accidents. This is one of the reasons for the popularity of built-in vanities, providing adequate counter space for bathing a baby as well as secure tabling space for toilet articles and bottles.

One large compartmented bathroom calls for much less plumbing than two bathrooms, especially if they are widely separated or at some distance from the kitchen.

Various Money Savers
Efforts toward economy in bathroom finishing and fitting began many years ago and have achieved considerable progress. The introduction of rubber tile and asphalt tile in place of mosaic tile floors was one step. Waterproof wall papers and laminated plastic wall panels appeared. Stamped, enameled steel fixtures, produced like automobile fenders, made colored bathtubs about the same price as heavier cast-iron white tubs. A big advantage of stamped steel fixtures, especially in connection with remodeling, is their lightness. One man can handle a bathtub.

If you need more floor space in your present quarters, or if you want extra room in the dream home you're planning, take a tip from boats and ships, which must make every inch of space count. Many of them achieve valuable extra inches of space in the type and placement of their heating units.

You can imagine how important heating is to the men who must sail in all types of weather, so you know they aren't sacrificing heating efficiency for extra space. But many achieve an ideal balance of comfort and efficiency by using convector-radiators in their ships.

For instance, the soon to be launched superliner, the United States, uses both convector-radiators and convector heating elements alone to heat the largest, fastest ship ever built in this country. While this is proof of the comfort, style and safety of convectors, their wide use in smaller vessels demonstrates their space-saving qualities.

In the ocean-going tug, the Titan, sleeping quarters for eleven men are on the main deck, with space for four to eight men below. Main deck quarters are equipped with convectors to keep the crew comfortable on trips from Gulf cities to ports along the Atlantic coast. Fighting ships, troop ships, ore carriers and fireboats also use convectors in quantity.

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Remodeling Can Be Your Best Housing Investment

Remodeling can very well be the best housing investment you can make today. It can give your family better living facilities for a fraction of what a new house costs.

You may feel that you have lived in your house long enough to know its shortcomings—maybe long enough to think the one small bathroom and old-fashioned kitchen are hopeless. But to duplicate the size of that house under present building costs might amount to two or three times what you paid for the place.

For a fraction of that outlay you can accomplish a lot of remodeling, increasing livability and resale value.

What to remodel depends on the individual house, on your needs and your budget.

Check With Architect
If you plan exterior changes, or want to remove a wall, it's a good idea to see an architect. If you are handy with tools and want to do some, or all of the work yourself, check with your local building inspector.

List the changes you want to make and get an estimate from a contractor. He usually can help you arrange for a loan at the bank to finance the work in easy payments.

Building material and equipment manufacturers are aware of the demand for remodeling. They are making it as easy as possible for home owners to do the job. They publish complete instructions to show how to install kitchen cabinets, pre-fitted windows and doors, flooring, folding attic stairs, overhead garage doors, and so on.

Bathroom Space Needed
Older houses often need additional bathroom facilities. Sometimes a powder room-lavatory can be installed in space under stairs, or by enlarging a seldom

used closet. Frequently the space occupied by an old-fashioned pantry becomes available through the installation of new cabinets in the kitchen. With plumbing supply lines already in a house, the addition of new bathroom and kitchen plumbing fixtures is relatively simple.

The possibility of enlarging a bathroom and compartmenting the fixtures so that more than one person can use the room at a time should not be overlooked. Divided bathrooms are one of the economy tricks in the newest houses.

Modern folding doors of the accordion type make it easy to divide overly large living rooms to create a den for television at one end.

Attics Offer Economy
Attics and basements contain much wasted space that can be utilized with minimum expenditures. Expanding a house into the attic is much more economical than destroying existing walls to provide a new wing. Wallboard is easy to install and can be decorated attractively. Shed dormers—the type without gables—can accommodate several windows and thus are cheaper to build and provide more headroom than separate single dormers.

Beware of Rats; Cover Garbage

Don't be squeamish about the subject of rats. They are one of the householder's biggest enemies and you can do much to fight them.

The common rat, called the domestic rat in spite of its being a wild animal and often attacking man, is far more numerous throughout all of North America than people. The food eaten by rats totals close to a half billion dollars worth per year. Furthermore rats are dangerous disease carriers.

Garbage is one of the richest food sources for rats. You can do a lot in curbing the rat menace by keeping all garbage in a metal container with a tight fitting lid.

Red squill is a safe and efficient poison for both rats and mice. Most other animals can vomit and thus rid themselves of this poison. Rats cannot vomit.

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How to Install Cabinets To Carry Load of Dishes

You can't trust to makeshifts when it comes to installing kitchen cabinets. The job calls for competent carpentry throughout. Fill a wall cabinet with dishes, canned goods and everything a woman packs into it, and you have a weight that is going to strain all but the strongest supports.

Since cabinets don't extend all the way to the ceiling, you have to build a soffit, or false wall above them. This space is so high that a woman can't reach it without a ladder, so it is usually killed off and decorated along with the other walls.

If you are building a new house this soffit can be built before the cabinets are installed. Frequently it offers a convenient passage for a flue from a hooded ventilating fan over your kitchen range. But that is about all it is good for.

The soffit is built of the same material as the wall—plaster or wallboard. In a remodeling job, plywood or gypsum board are among convenient materials.

Building a Soffit
The simplest soffit is made by screwing a 1 by 3 inch board to the top front edge of the cabinet and screwing another board directly above this along the ceiling. Wallboard is then tacked to the front edges of these strips; molding or trim is applied and the soffit is ready for decoration.

However, it's easy to plan a soffit to accommodate concealed lighting with fluorescent tubes. You can plan the soffit back a few inches to allow the cabinet top to protrude, affording space for indirect cove lighting that will reflect up to the ceiling. Or the soffit can be built out farther than the top edge of the cabinet, providing space for a strip of frosted glass panels that will give direct downward lighting from the concealed fluorescent tubes.

Purpose of Hanging Strips
Wall cabinets are usually hung from horizontal wooden strips securely nailed into the studs. It isn't usually practical to attempt to fasten cabinets into studs. The studs are customarily placed at 16-inch intervals in a house wall and your cabinets may not conform to those measurements.

These mounting strips are usually plastered over in a new house, but in remodeling they are merely put outside the plaster. This will make the cabinet stick out from the wall the thickness of the strip—roughly about 3/4 of an inch—but the empty space behind the cabinet is easily concealed with a filler strip.

Cabinets are then hung with screws and cup washers. It's important to have the cabinets straight and level. If the wall isn't straight and one end of the cabinet protrudes farther away from the wall than the other end, shims or wedges are inserted to true it up. Wooden roof shingles make good shims.

Base cabinets are easier to install. Screws can be used at almost any place. If a stud is

used to replace them in many home remodeling projects. Another important factor is that in times of materials shortages, convectors actually save on vital metals. Convectors use only one pound of steel as compared to five pounds of cast iron in the older-style radiators. Because transference of heat is speedier in convectors than it is in cast iron radiators—about seven times as fast—additional savings are effected through decreased fuel cost. Convectors can be used on either hot water or steam systems.



Larger Cupboards Most Economical

Three factors enter into the purchase of kitchen cabinets—economy, appearance and utility.

Supposing you want to fill a wall space that measures 72 inches. Since factory-made cabinets usually come in sizes from 15 to 36 inches wide, you could choose from three combinations.

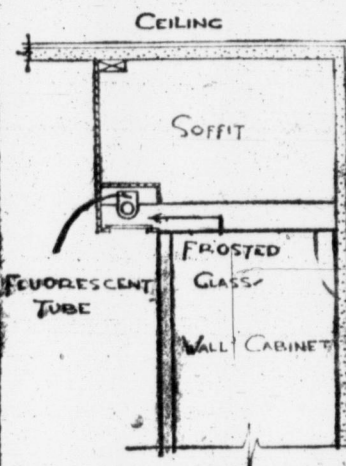
If you chose two 36-inch cabinets to fill that space, one manufacturer's price would be \$94. Three 24-inch cabinets also would fill the space. They would come to \$107. Or you could use two 21-inch and one 30-inch. This would cost \$112 from the same manufacturer.

The large cabinets are the most economical, but the use of a decorator's eye would make of the storage space may call for several smaller cabinets.

not convenient, the cabinet can be nailed to the floor, or the various units can be bolted together to prevent shifting.

The only difficulty likely here is a sloping floor. If this is slight, it may be ignored, or the cabinets may be shimmed up. If there's a decided slope and you want a perfect job, it would be worthwhile to rebuild such a floor.

Floor covering usually is laid first, but if you want an extra special job the cabinet is installed first and the linoleum is bent to fit the space left.

Modern convector - radiators have many built - in safety features to reduce the hazards of home accidents. The heating element is safely concealed from the prying fingers of children, and all outside edges and corners of convectors are rounded to prevent injury in case of accidental falls against the units.

Home Decoration
Convector - radiators are popular with many women and men because of the ease with which they can be decorated. Delivered in a prime neutral color, they can be painted easily to match the adjacent walls, thus making the wall seem larger. For color accent within a room, if one is needed, you can paint the convector to contrast with the color of the adjacent walls.

Easy Replacement
Slim, attractive convector-radiators are considered the ideal replacements for old-fashioned cast iron radiators when homes are remodeled and modernized. Light in weight and easy to install, convectors can be handled easily by one man, thus reducing labor costs. When installed as free-standing units, convectors stand

flat against walls, thus taking up less floor space than older bulkier units. This makes the problem of furniture placement much easier.

Picture Window Heat
Convector - radiators now are made to fit under picture windows. The new models usually are of a height of only 12 inches, and are in a variety of lengths to extend the full width of the average picture window. They are supplied with or without dampers, as desired, for manual control of the heat supply. When installed under picture windows, the convectors blanket the window with warm air to combat heat loss.

Kitchen Hint
When you're cooking in the kitchen, close the damper on your convector - radiator. Usually the heat from the range and oven is sufficient for comfort purposes, and you can open the damper on the convector as soon as you are through cooking. You use less heat this way, and you increase your comfort.

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FISHING BY REMORA

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Science Writer Describes After Effects Of A-Bomb

ATOM BOMB SITE, Nev.—(AP)—For the first time men have lived, unhurt, who stood under and looked up into the flaming, hollow heart of the cloud that rushes upward from an A-bomb. This happened to soldiers and officers close to the giant explosion Tuesday at Yucca Flat. It also happened to five Congressmen who went into trenches with the troops. They are W. S. Cole (R-NY), Olen Teague (D-Tex), Melvin Price (D-Ill), Chet Hinshaw (R-Calif.).

What they saw and learned is the first chapter in a new atomic chart for survival:

This bomb was greater than anything in Japan or Bikini, and just over or under the most powerful we have fired in the United States. The particular bomb's identity is secret.

The fire - cloud followed the fireball, and swelled to miles in diameter, with red flames and yellow gases swirling in whirrs bigger than Niagara Falls.

Look Inside
The cloud drifted over the heads of some officers. "We looked right up inside," said one. "It was hollow, but you could not see daylight through the hole. It was like an umbrella and whirling crosswise like a smoke ring. The inner dome was ribbed with dark and light colors, the dark ones probably nitrogen dioxide."

NLRB Rules Against Magnolia

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The National Labor Relations Board ruled this week that the Magnolia Petroleum Company had discriminated against certain of its Texas employees because of union membership.

The NLRB ordered that the big oil company "cease and desist from" (1) discouraging membership in Oil Workers International Union (CIO) or any other labor organization; (2) inquiring of its employees whether they belong to a union or their feeling about union, and (3) in any way interfering with employees right to bargain collectively.

Magnolia also was ordered to offer reinstatement to Nolan W. Duncan, truck driver allegedly fired discriminatorily, and post notice at distributing stations at Fort Worth, Sweetwater, Abilene and Electra that union organization would not be interfered with or employees discriminatorily against.

The NLRB upheld the union's contention that Duncan was discharged discriminatorily after an exchange of words with a foreman while loading gasoline at Sweetwater for a trip to Snyder.

and Sunday. The flash of heat lasted three seconds — baked this area white, with alkali giving the color.

For more than two miles in all directions the bomb started fires in Joshua trees — a cactus about 10 feet high. There was the smell of scorched brush all around. One temporary first aid shack burned to the ground. The blast that followed the heat flash blew out most of the fires.

The troops — closer than anyone has approached except in Japan — knelt in trenches, two to several in each. They faced the bomb, with heads bowed just below the top of the dirt.

They joked, and they jumped up and laughed after the terrific flash of light and heat had passed. But their trenches felt hot for those three seconds.

Then they learned the first lesson — keep your mouth shut. Nearly all were standing still in trenches, looking up, mouths open, when the blast drove a wave of dust into their faces.

Every man would have been a burn casualty except for the shadow of the trenches.

A tank was placed almost at the edge of "Ground Zero," directly under the bomb. The hatch was left open to see what would have happened to men inside. They would have been killed by heat.

Planes on the ground far away had twisted tails or spot burns. Most weapons were not seriously damaged.

Signboards Ripped
Signboards more than two miles away were ripped from their posts, but troops not much farther were standing still because they knew how to take cover. They wore no goggles and no extra protective clothing.

The radioactivity in the ground directly under the blast was so low that attacking troops could have marched in immediately and stayed for 30 hours. One reason was the great altitude of this explosion, 3,500 feet. At that height A-bombs do not make the earth very radioactive.

The bomb plane missed its target by 200 feet, from 30,000 feet altitude. For atomic weapons that is pickle-barrel accuracy.

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Annual Awards Ring Down Curtain On Stage Season

 NEW YORK — (AP) — This is the spring curtain on the theatrical season on Broadway.
 With the exception of the premiere next month of the revival of the musical "Of Thee I Sing" and the closing on May 3 of the Ethel Merman starring musical, "Call Me Madam" after 644 performances there are few stage events of note scheduled between now and autumn.

Several drama prizes have been awarded, and there will be several more, including the Pulitzer prize. The drama critics circle picked John Van Druten's "I Am A Camera," a lively dish which has Julia Harris playing a refined British strumpet in an adaptation of Christopher Isherwood's "The Berlin Stories," awarded early in May. The betting odds on Broadway are that this trophy will not go to the drama critics' choice of "I Am A Camera," or to the American Theater Wing's accolade to "The Fourposter" or to the several other shows which have received various prizes and awards.

The odds for the Pulitzer winner seem to be according to the bets by Broadway ticket brokers buying up seats in advance, in favor either of "Point Of No Return," the J. P. Marquand story which dramatizes a hero who doesn't want success when he catches it, or Mary McChesney's comedy, "Mrs. McThing," which stars Helen Hayes.

About the only thing all the award groups so far have agreed on is that Don Juan In Hell, a farcical, should get recognition during the prize-giving season, even though Shaw won it 20 years ago.

This has been a rough season on Broadway producers. The cost of producing shows and rising labor scales have more than doubled the expenses of raising a curtain on opening night.

As an example, take the drama called "Flight Into Egypt." A play with a sympathetic theme for three people, George Tabori's story about a group of refugees was a moving, touching play, but despite the sympathetic tone of its story, and movie stars Paul Lukas and other splendid players in the cast, it lasted only a few performances.

It cost 150,000 to open on Broadway, and you can count off that 150,000 as total loss since the office receipts during its brief Broadway run would hardly ac-

Labor Cost Rushes Push Button Era

 NEW YORK — (AP) — The push-button era — so long talked about — is being pushed along faster these days by a couple of things: One is the rush to develop complicated machines that need few if any operators, thus cutting down the labor bill.

The other is the steadily extending life length plus the big baby crops, which make more output per worker necessary.

Scientific advances put industry in sight of the day when many factories will run almost automatically, industrial planners tell us — and with mechanical brains in the front office doing all the figuring and even making some of the decisions.

The simultaneous pressure from the changing population scene is this: The U. S. population is growing fast with a constantly increasing demand for goods. But as the country gets more older people and babies, the percentage of persons of working age grows less, and so the greater the need that each man use machinery to help provide all the products that a nation, with so many not working, will need to consume.

The automatic factory is all but here already. Business Week magazine says, for some chemical processing, bottling and some phases of auto making. As the trend toward it grows, more complicated machinery will be needed, meaning bigger investments, and operating decisions so fast that present system of management command will be too slow.

Here the electronic era is taking over. In the few years since industrial business machines first showed its giant mechanical brain, smaller machines are being developed which scientists believe will soon be able to fix production schedules, chart corporate expansion and keep running inventories.
