Truman Sits Tight In Steel Fight

Ike Picks Up **More Support** In. N. Y., Pa.

Eixnhower - for - Presi-

dent leaders staked a claim today to the lion's share of Republican presidential-nominating votes in New York and Pennsylvania, where the General scored lopsided election victories vesterday.

In the Pennsylvania popularity Dwight Eisenhower drew 728,476 votes in 7.194 of precincts. This compared with 128,149 write-ins for Sen. Robert Taft of Ohto and 100,389 ballot votes for former Gov. Harold Stassen of Minnesota.

In the race for 60 Pennsylvania district delegates. Taft and Eisenhower slates collided over eight posts from the Pittsburgh area. Not on Ballot

Taft's name was not on the ballot - he kept it off and urged his supporters not to write the results "meaningless." But Eisenhower leaders hoped this showing, plus 10,186 votes the General drew among Democrats. might bring the state's 70 votes his way at the GOP nominting

convention in July. In New York, friends of Eisenhower won seven of 11 primary contests, indicating he will receive at least 85 of the state's 96 convention votes. Taft backers won three and one was undecided. The results seemed to strengthen the hand of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, who wants Eisenhower as Republican presidential nominee.

Entries in the 1952 derby will not be accepted after April 30, Stowers added. He said 64 boys have already registered to enter this year's race.



Ike's Resignation Lacks Finality

Most Republican voters will be pleased that Gen. Dwight Eisenhower will be giving up his military command June 1 but probably puzzled by that report that he has asked to be returned to "inactive" status.

There has been to this date sufficient confusion concerning Gen. Eisenhower and his policies, particularly his domestic policies, that it would have seemed that he should have resigned his commission in order to be able to campaign as "Mr. Eisenhower."

As anyone who has been connected with the military knows, there are often multitudes of sins covered by the clock of "inactive status." Under a theoretical approach, a man in this position is a civilian who does not know from one minute to the next when he may be recalled to "active" status and be given his military orders.

In the instance of Gen. Eisenhower, there is not much likelihood that he will be recalled to active duty unless he wants to be recalled. Moreover, he is in a different status than the ordinary "inactive" officer in that he will be much freer to express opinion and criticism of the military and the government than would be the average reservist. Most reservists and others on an 'inactive" status are inclined to be a little chary of what they say in the way of criticism of the military and the administration. We hope that General Eisenhower will not feel this same restriction when he returns to "inactive" status and starts his campaigning.

As the Associated Press pointed out in its report of the general's resignation, the inactive status:

'Could place limitations on campaign discussion of past military matters of high policy which still remained classified as secret, even though the reasons for actual military secrecy no longer exist."

It is hardly a military secret that in the main there has been little excuse for much of the "top secret" material that has been handed back and forth among the high ranking "brass" and civil officials. Over and over it has been established (at a later date of course) that one of the prime considerations involved in deciding whether something was "secret" or not was first of all, whether it was politically expedient to have it so classi-

Thus, so long as General Eisenhower remains a military man even though he is on "inactive" status, there is the chance that he may not be forthright as he could be as a total civilian divorced from the restrictions of
