# Press Agent Rule

Michael Wolf Straus, U.S. commissioner of reclamation, is a former Chicago newspaperman and ex-New Deal press agent who now rules a Western water empire embracing 17 states, according to the current issue of the Saturday Evening Post.

Paul F. Healy, in an article entitled "Our Most Arrogant Bureaucrat," writes that one might reasonably wonder what Straus is doing in a job which is largely an engineering operation.

The answer, he says, is that Straus runs the Bureau of Reclamation for its maximum publicity and propaganda effect, applying to dam building and power production some of the same drum-beating showmanship that P. T. Barnum once gave to gaudier but somewhat less colossal enterprise.

Under his leadership, the Reclamation Bureau has grown to the point where its annual budget is nearly half the total appropriation for the Department of the Interior and is said to think of itself as the tail which wags the department dog.

This golden jubilee of the reclamation law passed in the Theodore Roosevelt administration finds the Bureau supplying 9,000,000 people with water and power by means of 96 dams, 16,000 miles of canals and over 3000 miles of electric transmission lines. It is called the world's largest single producer of electric power.

Since the Straus operation is literally the arbiter of life and death over individual communities, making surveys, picking the sites for projects, recommending appropriations, allocating water and fixing water rates, its political implications are tremendous.

It has resulted in Straus being a frequent target of Capitol Hill and accused of virtually everything but beating his wife. Among other things, he has been charged with deceiving, embarrassing and insulting Congress; with "overorganizing" his bureau; with promoting "socialistic" theories; with violating the law by lobbying with public funds; with wasting public money; and with being generally undependable.


Straus is reported to relish a bare-knuckle fight and today takes gleeful pleasure in the fact that some of his erstwhile Congressional enemies "don't work here any

They did succeed in getting him off the payroll for five months, but he came right back and has been going strong ever since. Last year he bloomed globally with a 26.000 mile round-the-world tour of foreign reclamation sites. His principal stop was at New Delhi, India, for an international conference on dams, an assignment which ought to have gone to a technical man.

Straus is one up on other bureaucrats in that for twelve years he has lived in a Government house on Government property in Washington, something which has resulted in three separate investigations.

"As one of the very few original New Dealers left in a top Government post, Straus is widely admired by other bureaucrats in Washington for being able to survive nineteen years," Healy concludes.

His enemies have given up on getting rid of him under Truman. However, if there is a GOP victory at the polls next November, one of the first orders of business will be separating the Interior Department from its toudest mouth—and a dangerous menace to the na-





### SPOTLIGHT FOR THE NATION

WHY COMMUNISTS IN GOVERNMENT?

By V. Orval Watts, Ph.D. Many persons find it hard to understand how pairiotic Americans, like President Roosevelt or Dean Acheson, could be taken in by an Alger Hiss, not to mention Stalin

and other known Communists. Why didn't General Marshall, for example, see the menace of the Chinese Communists when he visited them and talked with them? Why did Mrs. Roosevelt give her support to various Communist front organizations? Why is it that the Truman Far Dealers have been so loath to let go of Communists and fellow travellers found in their midst?

Is it because the Communists and fellow travellers are so skillful hiding their real views and aims? This is what some friends of the New Deal and Fair Deal have concluded now that the evidence of Communist infiltration is too plain to be denied.

Actually, however, Stalin and his crew, including the Chinese Com-munists, made little or no effort to hide their beliefs and aims. Hiss and his ilk worked consistently for Communist objectives. The Communist front organizations were venomous in denouncing various American institutions, and I be-lieve that no convinced Communist or fellow traveller can long conceal his "line" from one who knows Communism and understands its evils. Hostility towards private enterprise and freedom give a man's speech a pink tinge which any informed anti-Communist soon de-

THE NEW DEAL WAS SOCIALISTIC

No. I think the true reason for the Communist infestation of the Government of the United States since 1933 is not to be found in skillful dissembling by the Communists and fellow travellers. Instead, it is to be found in the obvious fact that the Government of the United States has so largely been con-trolled by exponents of the Wel-fare State, which had its origin in ideas and aims that are essentially Socialist, or Communist.

Here are a few quotations from a 1950 pamphlet by Earl Browder, former head of the Communist Party of the United States and still a loyal Communist. After listing 22 items in the New Deal program, he says of them: They have the single feature

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



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
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
