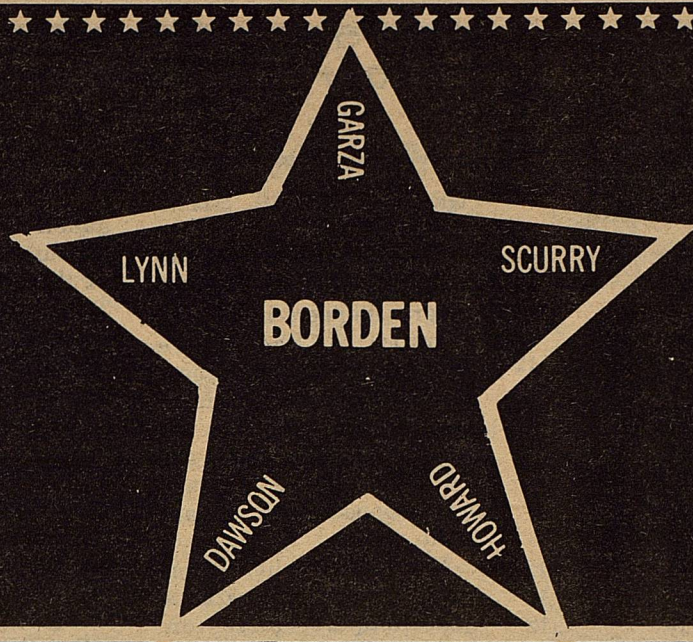

This will be a members only roping with a "Draw Roping" beginning at 4:00

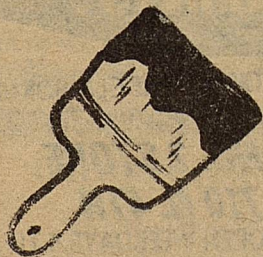

Your County Agent Says by Alan Day

GRASSHOPPERS STILL A PROBLEM

We are continuing to see an ever increasing number of grasshoppers in Borden County. These are primarily jumbos with some differentials mixed in. Chemical control is warranted when there are 10 or more adult grasshoppers per square yard.

Many of you have seen the devastating effects grasshoppers have on cotton. They will readily move into cotton when rangelands begin to dry up.

Toxaphene 6E bait, Sevin SLR and Sevin 4 oil are giving the best control at this time. If you are still having problems after using these, your next alternative is methyl parathion. This should be used as a last resort as it will sterilize your fields by killing grasshoppers, and beneficial insects leaving you susceptible to infestations of fleahoppers and bollworms. Sevin XLR is giving excellent control on rangelands. Let me know if you have any questions.

CONTROLLING BLUE WEEDS & LAKEWEEDS

Several county producers are currently having a problem with blueweeds and lakeweeds in cotton fields. These can and should be controlled as they are bad about spreading over an entire field.

After talking with Dr. John Abernathy, agronomist and weed specialist at Lubbock, we have come up with a mixture that should help you in your fight against these hard to control weeds.

Blueweeds can be controlled with a mixture of

50 gallons of water to 1 gallon of Roundup. This mixture should be sprayed as the weeds are heading. These weeds will need a through soaking with this chemical mixture.

Lakeweeds can be controlled with the use of MSMA. Follow label instructions and use up to 1 gallon per acre for adequate control. If mint weeds are giving you a problem, Sancap, Karmex or Caparol will give good control.

Rhizomous Johnsongrass can be controlled with Roundup but not at this time of year. You should wait until late summer or early fall to get an effective kill back. Chemicals will give you a top burn at this time but will not rid you of the rhizomes. This allows the weed to come right back on you.

MAJOR SHOW STEER TAGGING

All 4-H and FFA youth in Borden County that plan to exhibit a steer at the county show or at any major stock show in Texas must bring their steer to the County Show Barn Saturday, June 27th for tagging. All tagging will be done between 9 a.m. and 12 noon.

The Rev. Charles Reece of First Christian Church officiated.

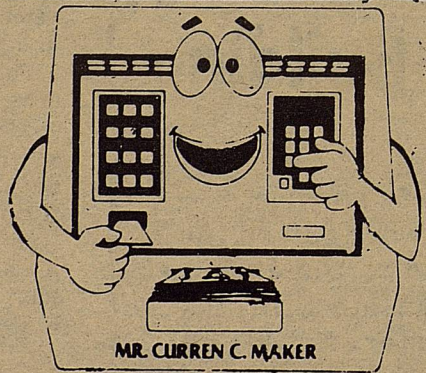

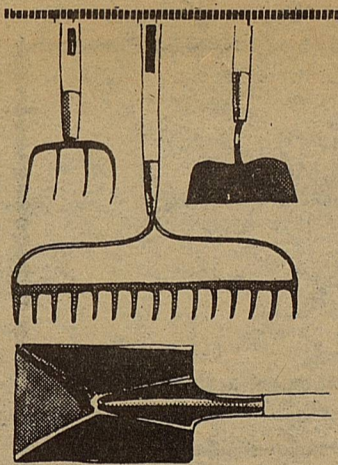

DISASTER PROVISIONS

Listed below are some of the things you are required to do in order to be eligible for disaster protection;

1. If you are unable to get a crop planted, you must file an application for prevented planting no later than June 30 for cotton and July 6 for grain sorghum.

2. If you should lose a part or all of a crop, you must contact this office before plowing or making other use of the affected acreage.

We are required to make a farm visit on all disaster claims.

FARM CHANGES

In order for ASCS to provide the service to which you are entitled, it is extremely important that all county office records with respect to your farm be kept current. If there has been a change in ownership, operator, tenancy, size of farm, or other factors which may affect your operation, please visit your county ASCS Office at your earliest convenience for the purpose of updating records for your farm.

WHEAT PRODUCTION

As soon as harvest is complete, you are requested to bring production evidence in. Farm stored production must be measured.
