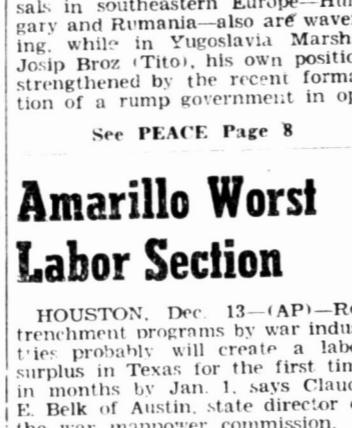

FDR Praises Troops in Iran For Their Work

TEHERAN, Iran, Dec. 2. (Delayed) President Roosevelt made two informal speeches today to United States soldiers based at Camp Amirabad here, telling them of his meetings with Stalin and Churchill, praising their work here, and wishing them an early return home.

He said he had Stalin and Churchill had made progress in their efforts to plan for a world for us and our children when war would cease to be a necessity.

"All of you who are here today and farther south in Iran can always remember you have taken a very necessary and very useful part in winning the war."

"Officers and men: It seems at this moment to be thoroughly equipped with the weapons of war (two microphones). 'If you had said to me or I had said to you three years ago that we would meet in Iran today, we would have probably said that we were completely crazy.'

"I got here four days ago to meet with the marshal of Soviet Russia and the prime minister of England to try to do two things."

"The first was to lay military plans for cooperation between the three nations looking toward the winning of the war just as fast as we possibly can, and I think we have made progress toward that end. The other purpose was to talk over world conditions after the war, to try to plan for a world for us and for our children when war would cease to be a necessity."

"We have made great progress in that, also, but of course the first thing is to win the war and I want to tell you that you, all of you individually and collectively, are part of that purpose."

"All of you who are here today and all of you who are farther south in Iran can always remember that you have taken a very necessary and a very useful part in winning the war."

"When I woke up this morning in this camp and looked out I said to myself: 'I am back in Arizona or New Mexico.' And then I suddenly realized how far away from home we are."

"America is proud of you and proud of what you are doing in this distant place. I wish that great numbers of our people could see this work of getting necessary equipment and supplies through to our ally who had very heavy losses but who is licking the Nazi hordes. And so I am on my way home and I wish I could take all of you with me."

"The people back home know what you are doing and how well you are doing it. They, too, are proud of you. 'All I can say is, may you get back home to our good America just as soon as you can.'

"Goodbye and good luck." In a speech to ambulatory cases at a camp hospital, he said: "This place is a good deal like home. I landed about 10 days ago over in Morocco and this is the nearest thing to the United States that I have seen yet."

"I wish the people back home could all see what we are doing here and how well we are doing it. I want you boys, all of you, to remember that back at home we are thinking of you. I know you wish to get out of the hospital as soon as possible and come back to the United States just as fast as we can lick the Nazis."

"I have had conference with Marshal Stalin and I wish you could have seen them. They were very successful in laying plans as far as we can to make it unnecessary for us again to have Americans in Iran just as long as we and our children live."

"I think that is worth fighting for, and even being sick for in Iran. It is good to see you and I wish I could stay longer today. It is good to see a lot of fellow Americans, even in Persia."

"Get well as soon as you can and come back home."

Italians Suffer Tragic Feat in First Battle

ITALIAN BRIGADE HEADQUARTERS, Fifth Army, Dec. 9 (Delayed)—The entrance of Italian troops into World War II ended a tragic defeat today and Italy paid another installment in blood for the sins of Fascism. On the barren, rocky slopes of Mount Lungo near Mignano the Italian unit failed in an attack on German positions. There was no criticism of their bravery. The advanced headlong into withering enemy fire to suffer more casualties than the small force could absorb and continue the assault.

One American officer said "they fought too damn bravely because they were foolishly in advancing across open fields of fire." The general reaction among the Americans was one of regret that the Italians had been unable to make a better showing. Military observers said the burden of failure should be attributed to tactical planning by the staff and unexpectedly bitter German resistance rather than any lack of courage on the part of the troops.

Texans' Battles With Washington Enliven Year

AUSTIN, Dec. 13. (AP)—Recurring state-federal conflict—interlarded with laughs—enlivened the Texas government news front this year. Showdowns were few, but many a word battle emerged from debate keyed on states' rights vs. federal control.

Opposing ideas arayed Governor Coke R. Stevenson, Lieut.-Gov. John Lee Smith and other state officers against top federal officials including tart-tongued Harold L. Ickes, interior secretary and petroleum administrator for war.

Perhaps the climax was a Smith-Ickes correspondence debate over a reduction in gasoline coupon values. Wrote Ickes in a reply to a Smith protest: "As you go vociferously forth, draped in the outer garments of patriotism and the underwear of self interest, please remember that our tanks and trucks and jeeps cannot burn as fuel the crocodile tears that you shed."

Replied Smith: "We'll never win this war with anybody's crocodile tears—mine or yours. And most assuredly our planes, tanks and jeeps will not run on the type of gas which you so frequently generate, apparently under a wartime production schedule."

Less contentious but no less persistent was Governor Stevenson's opposition to federal directives, especially those on rationing. Born and reared in the vastness of West Texas, he doesn't like the gasoline and meat restrictions, contending blanket regulations for the nation are not suited to Texas' essential needs.

He stood pat on a maximum speed proclamation for 45-mile an hour driving, giving no official recognition to a 35-mile national directive of a federal bureau. The statutory speed limit in Texas remains at 60 miles at day and 55 at night for private cars.

Stevenson campaigned against meat slaughter quotas, a limitation that was lifted, even if only temporarily, late this year. The governor contends that a retail price ceiling is the only regulation needed for meat and that the natural law of supply and demand will provide meat for all.

When gasoline rationing extended to the southwest the governor fought successfully for allowances that would consider the distance necessarily traveled by farm and ranch people as compared with city dwellers. He hammered away at the rationing, asserting it did not release enough of the stockpiles frozen when rationing began.

Up in Washington Senator W. Lee O'Daniel, still plugging for less Johnson grass and more smoketacks in Texas, joined the governor's opposition. In Washington and in some of his home visits he lambasted the entire setup of federal bureaus as democratic and dictatorial.

Stevenson, Smith, O'Daniel and even Ickes jointly favored an increase in the price of oil. Smith gave Ickes credit too but added: "Your efforts were nullified, however, by the frown of your sister bureaucracy, the OPA."

Seven States Produce Too Much Feed Grains

CHICAGO, Dec. 13.—States which have produced surplus feed for livestock and poultry feed in larger amounts than required by the animal population within their own borders last year are Michigan, Indiana and Ohio were also in the surplus producing list.

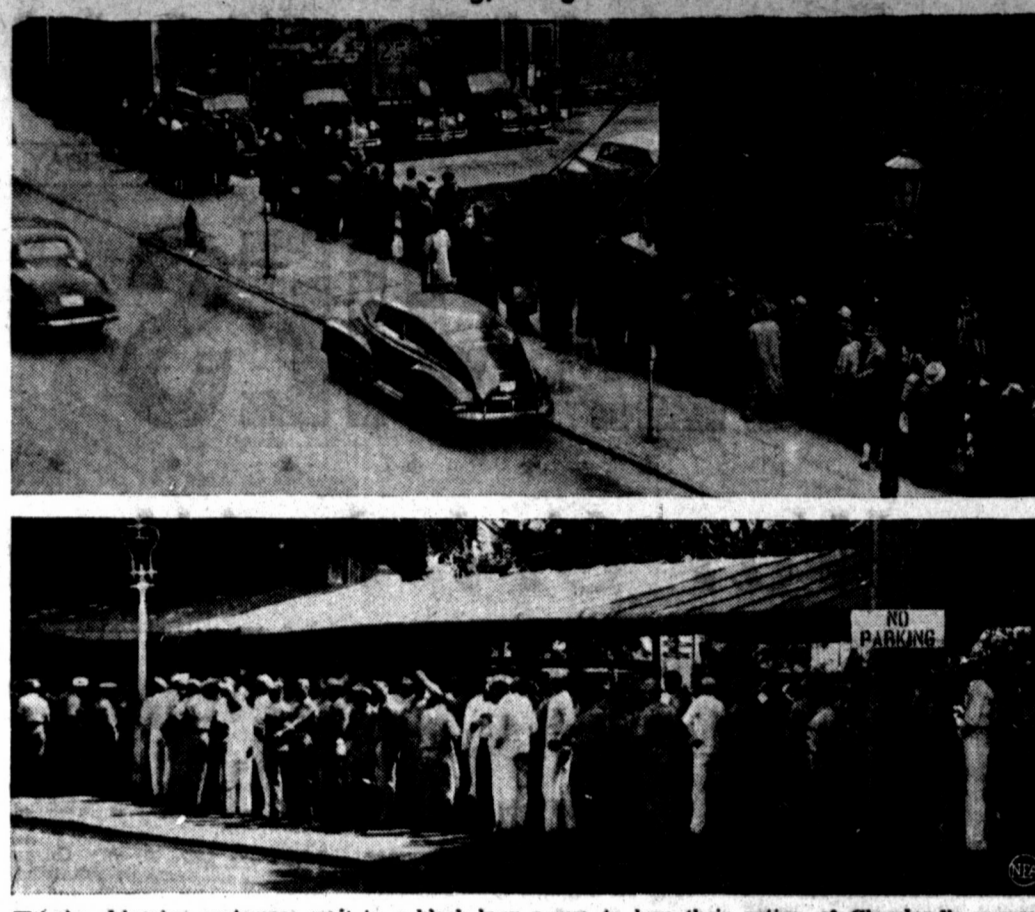

Laboratories Of Enemy Dangerous

CHICAGO, Dec. 13.—If the United Nations want to make sure

that German and Japanese scientific ingenuity does not work toward their future destruction in yet another war, they must close the scientific laboratories of their enemies, Dr. Otto Eisenschiml, Chicago chemist, said today.

"These scientists are our post-war enemies No. 1," he said in an interview. "What weapons could they develop within the walls of a laboratory if we left them to their

own devices? No one can be sure. If they, for instance, could beat us to a successful disruption of the atom, thus releasing unredeemed quantities of energy, we might become as helpless as if they discovered the much talked about death ray."

Col. Blucher Sharp Is in Jap Prison

AMARILLO, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Colonel Blucher Sharp, commander of the 131st field artillery's famed "Lost Battalion," is a Japanese prisoner of war in a Burma prison camp, and his fellow prisoners are, like him, well and "O. K."

His wife received a card from the famed officer saying he was well. It was her first word from him since January, 1942, and came from war prisoners camp 5, Moulmein, Burma.

The printed card said: "I am interned in a war prison camp; my health is good; I have not had any illness; and I am with friends."

In the colonel's handwriting was a postscript: "All officers and men are O. K. Love to you and family."

FREE RED POINTS for Used Cooking Fats

"Behind this plan, effective December 13th, is one of our country's most urgent wartime needs," says Mr. Bowles. "Every patriotic American wife and mother is asked to read this statement."

"WARS are fought with gunpowder. Gunpowder is made from glycerine. Glycerine can only be made from fats."

"Behind those few words lies one of your country's most serious needs. Fats used to be imported in huge quantities from islands of the Far East. Those islands are now in enemy hands. And the government wants the used fats you can save in your kitchen to make mountains of ammunition, medicines, and other battlefield needs."

A special kind of can—any kind will do. And you don't need to have any specified amount of fat; take it to your butcher whenever the can is full. He will estimate the weight of the tin and give you, cash in hand, 4c and two red points for every pound of used fat you deliver.

The government does not ask for these fats until you've got the cooking good out of them. But when that is done, every spoonful is wanted.

Would it surprise you to learn that just one single tablespoon of fat—just the little bit that is usually washed out of your broilers and roasting pans and skillets—will make five machine gun bullets? Or enough smallpox vaccines for seventy-three men?

"Not a Premium on Patriotism"

"These are the facts as they have been pointed out to OPA by the War Food Administration. And they have led to this new plan: 'Two red ration points free when you turn in a pound of used fat to your butcher.'

"This is not a premium on patriotism. It is a way of bringing home to all women the urgent need of kitchen fats to make gunpowder. Moreover, it seems only just to return points for this service, because fats cost ration stamps. Your butcher has been informed of this ruling which went into effect on December 13th."

## Gay wrappings make Christmas gifts twice as welcome, so why not try your hand at concocting your own original packages and novelty trimmings this year.

NEW YORK.—Because of the paper shortage this year, many stores have discontinued gift-wrapping purchases, so it will be entirely up to you to put the gay novelty touches to them. And if you take as much care in wrapping your Christmas gifts as you do in selecting them, they'll give double the pleasure.

Should it, for instance, be impossible to find a box to fit some odd-size gift, make your own. Not necessarily a square or oblong one, but shaped like a collar box, sachet, snapper or stocking. They're ever so much more effective, and really quite simple to make.

The giant size snapper, which looks exactly like the kind used as party favors, is the answer to how to wrap a bottle or other awkwardly shaped gift. To make it, take a sheet of gift paper, line all but the outer three inches with a piece of thin cardboard. Then stitch or glue the edges together to give it a cylindrical shape, and pleat the edges. Tie either end with bright ribbon bows. To prevent the gift from rattling around inside, stuff it with excelsior cut up from colored comic strip pages.

If you are planning to give several little gifts to one family, why not put them all in one big stocking? Fold a piece of Christmas paper—it must be about the same heavy quality as wallpaper—and cut out the shape of a stocking bulging with gifts. Perforate the edges and bind together with red and white cording.

Incidentally, wallpaper printed in bright plaids, green ivy on a white background, stripes and nursery rhyme characters make most unusual gift wrappings. And while you're buying a roll of it, you might also ask for a roll of border paper to use instead of ribbon or cord.

eight as director, was appointed agricultural relations adviser to National OPA Administrator Chester Bowles two weeks ago.

Law said the board unanimously selected Eudaly, extension dairy specialist since 1931, and Prewitt, in a special meeting Saturday in San Antonio "after four months of careful consideration of the background and qualifications of various men."

He said the board felt that Eudaly had "all the qualifications necessary to carry the A. & M. college agriculture extension work to new heights, successful operation and service to the farmers, ranchers and livestock interests of the state."

Born in Hamilton county, Eudaly graduated from Texas A. & M. in 1910 and studied at the Alabama Polytechnic institute. After serving with the bureau of animal industry in Washington, D. C., he was livestock specialist for a railroad, then farmed in Hamilton county until 1922 when he became McLennan county agricultural agent.

In his four years at that post his greatest achievement in livestock work came from supervising the feeding of the world's record ton-litter of hogs in competition with most of the other states. For three years then he served as swine specialist on the extension service staff, but retired until May, 1931, when he returned as special agent.

He became extension dairy specialist in November of that year and has held the position since except for two leaves of absence during which he managed the cotton plow-up campaign and was chairman of the Bankhead board (now the AAA).

Eudaly developed a short way of balancing rations for dairy cows which now is used by county agents, agriculture teachers, farmers and herdsmen over the state.

Prewitt, native of Pecos, graduated from A. & M. in 1923 and joined the extension service in 1928 as McCullough county agent.

sorties into the air during the day, but relapsed into its usual inactivity yesterday.

Bad weather likewise curtailed Allied air operations although fighters and fighter-bombers on offensive patrols destroyed a number of motor vehicles near Ghetti in the Adriatic coastal sector and attacked the Apollon way just above Gaeta in the western sector.

Medium bombers also ranged up the Apollon way and attacked the railway yards and an airfield at Terracina, 20 miles northwest of Gaeta. All aircraft returned from the day's activities.

Meanwhile an official announcement disclosed that the Italian air force, as well as Italian troops, have begun active operations with the Allies.

A formation of Italian Savoia Marchetti transport planes, escorted by American Lightnings, recently went to the aid of a beleaguered Italian garrison in the mountains in the interior of Yugoslavia, dropping tons of supplies. One of the transports landed and evacuated eight wounded Italian soldiers and the crew of a plane destroyed on the ground during an earlier supply mission.

By American troops fighting for possession of Bougainville in the northern Solomons.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur's bombers struck deep into enemy-occupied territory with a 2600-mile roundtrip to smash at Balikpapan, on the southeast coast of Borneo, and a 2400-mile flight to attack Makassar on the southeast peninsula of Celebes island. Other planes rocked the Borgen Bay-Cape Gloucester area of New Britain for the 12th successive day.

Battleships pointed their big guns at tiny Nauru island last Wednesday in a raid in which American naval units ventured close enough so that one destroyer suffered minor damage from shore batteries.

The attackers lost two aircraft, but nine Japanese planes were destroyed on the ground and one in the air, and the plane-ship bombardment started large fires. Nauru is 800 miles south of the Marshall islands which again came under American aerial attack.

The weather continued to hold down air operations in the Solomons.

The Berlin radio asserted today that German troops have driven Russian forces back across the Dnieper river north of Zaporozhche in the Dnieper bend, wiping out the Soviet bridgehead in this sector.

Fall rains were received in the northwest and cool nights and frosts prevented adequate growth. The South and East had fair to excellent feed, some of which is still green as a result of adequate to abundant rains.

Cattle averaged 78 per cent, down three points from Nov. 1 and eight points from a year ago.
