


## **Beaver appointed postmaster**

Sectional Center Manger Post master D. E. Holster of Midland today announced the appointment of Lynda J. Beaver, as the new Postmaster at Fluvanna effective Saturday, July 11, 1981.

Beaver, 43, is a native of the area, is married and has worked for the Postal Service since July 14, 1979. She began her employment as Clerk in the Gail Post Office and served in that position until January 16, 1980, when she was appointed Clerk In Charge of the Fluvanna Post Office. Beaver returned to the Gail Post Office as Clerk on September 20, 1980, and then again returned to the Fluvanna Post Office as Clerk In Charge in April 8, 1981. She has served in that position until her appointment as Post master of the Fluvanna Office effective July 11.

Postmaster selections for offices of this size are made on the basis of merit from a list of qualified condidates submitted to the Sectional Center Manager at Midland. He selects and recommends to the Postmaster General the best qualified person for appointment to each vacancy

## **Cattle raisers praise conservative Democrats**

The nine Texas Democrats who "put country ahead of party" in the recent budget battle in Washington got a personal thanks in the form of a resolution passed by members of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association board of directors at their meeting in San Angelo, Texas, June 26-27. TSCRA telegraphed its members' thanks only hours after the lawmakers helped Republicans defeat an attempt by the Democratic leadership to derail President Reagan's budget and tax proposals. TSCRA is a non-profit livestock producer group with more than 14,000 members in Texas, Oklahoma and surrounding states.

John S. Cargile, TSCRA president from San Angelo, said, "TSCRA feels that President Reagan's budget and tax proposals will result in lower inflation, lower interest rates, lower deficits and in accelerated economic growth. The defeat of his budget proposal would have been a blow to the working people and ranchers of this country who have been forgotten in the rush to big government and higher taxes."

The nine Texas Democrats recognized were Congressmen Jack Hightower of Vernon, Charles Wilson of Lufkin, Marvin Leath of Waco, Charles Stenholm of Stamford, Phil Gramm of Bryan, Sam Hall of Marshall, Ralph Hall of rockwall, Kent Hance of Lubbock and Richard White of El Paso.

Look like a million, for little or no money. It's a very "pressing" issue these days, especially when it comes to real pressing, an important wardrobe key.

Pressing is a major factor in clothing construction, and later in clothing care.

It can "Make or break" the "million dollar look" that fashion conscious consumers strive for.


Two first steps are necessary for successful pressing: have the right pressing equipment and use it properly. And remember, you can make your own equipment for little or no money.

Some items include a seam roll, a tailor's ham, press cloths and point pressers

SEAM ROLL

A seam roll is used to press seams open without making an impression of the seam allowance on the right side of the garment.

You can make your own by rolling up magazines tightly and covering them with felt.

Or use a heavy cardboard tube from wrapping paper, cut it to the desired length.

You may want to cover the tube with a terry towel or felt, but you don't have to. Other variations can be

made from a towel rolled one inch in diameter, an old broom handle or a rolling pin with one side smoothed off flat.

Another way to prevent the imprint of seam allowances on the right side of a garment is to use two strips of plain brown paper and insert them between each seam allowance and the garment before pressing.

To use the seam roll, simply let it serve as your "ironing board" and press the stitching line only. The curve of the seam roll underneath will keep most of the iron's flat surface from touching your fabric, so only the stitching itself will be pressed.TAILOR'S

HAM A tailor's ham is used for pressing curved seams, darts, sleeve caps or any other rounded areas.

As a substitute for a purchased tailor's ham, use a small hard pillow or a tightly balled terry towel or terry cloth pinned securely to hold its shape.

Again, let this be you "ironing board" for the special curved item.

the fabric's "right side" to prevent shine and protect the fabric from the iron's heat.

You can use a piece of lightweight muslin, cheese cloth, batiste, or a disposable paper towel.

Here's how press cloths work:

In pressing silk, for example, put the silk item on the ironing board right side up. Put the press cloth to the right side of the item. Then press.


In pressing napped fabrics, such as velvet or corduroy, use a piece of the same fabric as a press cloth. Place the press cloth on the ironing board right side up and the garment on the press cloth right side down. Then press. This keeps the nap from crushing.

POINT PRESSERS

Point pressers are used to press seams open in the hard to reach areas, such as collars and lapel points.

Use a pencil rolled in several layers of fabric, or use a wooden cooking spoon, a wooden dowel with a point or several layers of cardborad cut in the shape of the pattern.

Insert the point presser down into the hard to reach area, and press.





CROP CERTIFICATION Monday, August 3, is the final day to certify cotton, grain sorghum and corn acreage. Certify planted acreaUC Irrigated acreage for corn and grain sorghum must be reported as individual fields.

If you have grasshopper damage or some wet spots that drowned out or did not come up, let's worry about them later; get your total seeded acres certified now.

LOW YIELD ACREAGE <sup>1</sup>/<sub>8</sub>. Report failed acres prior to destroying or putting it to another use. Don't plow or graze the acreage before reporting!

2. Disaster affected acreage that is harvested must be reported within 15 days after harvesting.







There are not many days left to complete your certification the longer you wait, the bigger the crowd will be. Eligibility for loan, disaster & deficiency payments depend on an accurate and tivegy certification. REMEMBER! July is the last month to certify!

The tolerance for 1981 is the larger of 2.0 acres or 10 percent of the reported acres not to exceed 50.0 acres.
