of integrity From a voir dire panel of 58 persons, U.S. District Court Judge Gerhard A Gesell dismissed three persons who indicated they had-formed an opinion from what they had read in newspapers, seen on television, or heard on radio about Chapin and the Watergate scandal

Gesell dismissed 22 others because they-objected to being sequestered during what he said would be a week or 10 day trial After a second panel of potential jurors was questioned. Gesell said 61 veniremen had survived the preliminary screening and a 12 member jury and four alternates would be selected

The court was adjourned for lunch at noon Gesell said that upon return at 12 15 pm CDT. "detailed questioning" would begin for jury selection He said he hoped the jury could be

The first of two elections in Pampa this week is scheduled for tomorrow City voters will go to the

polls Tuesday to elect city commissioners in Wards 2 and 4

Joe Curtis is seeking re-election in Ward 2 and Arthur Rohde is up for re election in Ward 4 Neither candidate has any opposition on the ballot

Pampa does not elect a mayor or commissioners in Wards 1 and 3 tomorrow Terms of Mayor R D Wilkerson and commissioners Ray Thompson in Ward 1 and Lee Braswell in Ward 3 do not expire until April of 1975. There will be four voting places in tomorrow's balloting. They are at City Hall. North fire station at 321 E 17th, South fire station at 1010 S Barnes. and the Optimist Boys Club at 601 E Craven

The polling places will be open from 8 a m to 7 p m Because there are no contests for the two city commission seats, the vote is expected to be unusually light Only 9 absentee ballots were cast in the city election

In direct contrast, an unusually heavy vote is expected in next Saturday's school election. Five candidates are on the ballot for two places to be filled on the school board

Also to be decided at the school election will be whether the school board should be changed from five to seven members.

# **Briscoe Studies Special** School Finance Session

AUSTIN, Tex (UPI) -Gov Dolph Briscoe says he will meet this spring with teachers and administrators to decide whether to call a special session of the Texas Legislature to deal with public school financing. He said it will be at least

six weeks before he makes up his mind.

But Briscoe said he definitely will have long range recommendations for revamping the school aid formulas ready for submission to the Legislature ir January

Briscoe's opponent for the Democratic nomination, Frances Farenthold. pointed out the six weeks would put the decision after the May 4 primary

She repeated her contention that Briscoe promised the Fort Worth superintendent of schools he would call a special session on school financing Briscoe has denied that.

"Briscoe's lack of a public position on the need for a special session to deal with school financing is another example of private agreements and then public disclaimers by that man. she said.

"That's the old story in Texas politics 1 think he'll probably be forced into calling a special session of the Legislature on the school emergency, and I hope he does

Appearing on the television interview program "Capitol Eye" Sunday, Briscoe said he is being asked to submit a \$100 million emergency aid



(UPI) - The ransom note found after thedisapparance of U.S. Vice Consul John Patterson 10 days ago threatened that the kidnapers would kill one American a week if the money was not paid, it was reported today. The newspaper 'El

Imparcial" published what it said were portions of the ransom note, written in Patterson's own hand. It threatened to kill one person a week chosen from families of consular officials.

The note -which was found in the consulate on March 22 barely two hours after Patterson's disappearance -- was one and one half pages long. It was written in English and signed (in English) by "The Peoples' Liberation Army of Mexico.

U.S. spokesmen have confirmed the note was in Patterson's own hand. They have not, however, officially revealed its contents. El Imparcial said the ransom note called for a

## **IN BOYLE TRIAL Prosecutor Begins Hired Killer Story** deaths. A UMW district

MEDIA, Pa. (UPI) president also has pleaded Special prosecutor Richard A. Sprague today began trying to trace the coldblooded, hired killing of a reform candidate for the United Mine Workers presidency to W.A. "Tony" Boyle, the former UMW president charged with the 1969 Yablonski murders.

A jury of nine men and three women was to hear Sprague argue for the first time today that Boyle, 72. and ailing, conceived the idea which resulted in the New Year's Eve. 1969. deaths of UMW archrival Josepha. 'Jock' Yablonski, his wife and daughter.

The UMW dissident, his wife, Margaret, and their daughter, Charlotte, 25. were shot to death by three hired killers as they slept in their Clarksville home in the southwestern Pennsylvania

coal fields. The killings occurred three weeks after Yablonski lost to incumbent Boyle in a bitter election for the union's presidency.

In his opening statement, Sprague portrayed Boyle as the 'arranger' who authorized the payment of \$20,000 in union funds to-Yablonski's actual assassins through an elaborate scheme involving a ... non-existent UMW

organizing fund. Seven persons, including the three assassins, have

guilty to federal charges that he violated Yablonski's civil rights by conspiring to kill him. Early prosecution witnesses were to include Claude E. Vealey, 30, of Cleveland, who admitted

three years ago that he and two other Ohioans actually killed the Yablonskis; and William J. Turnblazer, 52, of Middlesboro, Ky., president of UMW District 19.



For example, in Gloucester, for the second consecutive year the value of fresh fish landings has increased by 25 per cent (to \$12.1 million in 1973). And volume was up 15 per cent to 129 million pounds of fish. (Thirty percent of all fish catches by Americans are made off New England.)

Why the increase? (2) Gloucester's net 1973 catch of whiting soared to 23 million pounds, up 21/2 times

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI) -Engineers at Purdue University and members of the Orthopaedic Surgery Department at Indiana University Medical Center. have united to develop a new approach to replacement of arthritic knees.

Researchers say they are at least a year away from testing the artifical knee on humans, but add that their concepts of using a pure rolling-contact type of joint shows great promise for leading to a long-wearing. highly-usable implant.

What you have to keep in mind is that this is designed for people who have arthritis so bad that they are immobile, or nearly so, so anything that you do for them is a great help." said Prof. Ben M. Hillberry of Purdue's school of mechanical engineering.

He and Prof. A.S. Hall Jr. headed the Purdue research team that developed the new type of total knee prosthesis joint for which the Purdue Research Foundation has

applied for a patent. One of the difficulties we

injured playing football, and put any sort of artificial knee in him and expect him to perform as well as before he was hurt, but for the elderly crippled by arthritis, any improvement in the knee would be a lot better than the one being replaced." he added. corrected early enough. Hearing loss is an equally serious problem which too. often receives little or no attention. One authority calls hearing loss a "hidden handicap." Children with poor hearing get little sympathy from others. Instead, they are treated with impatience for their failure to respond to instructions.

These children often are regarded as slow. inattentive, and even retarded. Children who shout to hear themselves may be regarded as serious discipline problems by teachers - and even by parents - who fail to recognize the real nature of the problem. The State Health
