Patricia's Release Expected

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) - The time and place of Patricia Hearst's release is to be announced within 72 hours, her kidnapers said

In a message -concealed in a dozen roses -to an underground newspaper, the Symbionese Liberation Army (SLA) said there would be another communication within 72 hours which will give "the state, city and time of release" of the newspaper heiress who was dragged from her Berkeley apartment Feb: 4.

A florist's delivery man walked into the office of the paper, The Phoenix, and delivered a communique that was concealed within the flowers, along with half of Patricia's driving license. Randolph A. Hearst, Patricia's father, said Tuesday night at his suburban Hillsborough home that he

is his daughter's. "And we believe the communique is genuine," he

Asked how he interpreted the 72-hour provision. Hearst said, "I have no interpretation; I don't know when it begins.

Hearst said he was convinced the portion of driver's license was his daughter's. "The date. is right, the area is right, and we believe it to be true."

One of the committee's first orders of business was to decide when the report might be made public.

Sen. Russell Long, D-La., chairman of the Joint Committee on Internal Revenue Taxation, wanted to release the report immediately, but the four Republicans on the committee and Rep. Wilbur Mills D-Ark., were reported to favor delaying making it public until the White House has had time to study it.

Long, who had said earlier the report would cause Nixon to resign, entered the crowded committee room and said to Mills: "I heard you and I have a disagreement over some-

"All I said was I didn't want to get rushed into anything," responded Mills. A source close to the

committee told UPI "if everything goes according to the scenario, it will all work out (the report will be released today) but you never know until they get in there.



Texas Tornado Season Nearing

HOUSTON (UPI) -Meteorologists hope weather conditions this summer will not produce the near record 147 tornadoes which killed 14 Texans last year.

Ervin A. Volbrecht, meteorologist in charge of the National Weather Service's Houston office. said a total of 87 persons were killed in 1,107 lowa Senators tornadoes across the nation last year.

Volbrecht said that if the "fairly substantial number" of tornadoes that occurred in Texas last year had touched the ground 10 or 20 years ago, the death toll would have been much

New techniques for identifying a tornado and alerting the public that it is in danger have been developed and research is continuing on even better

"I don't think you have a completely adequate system until you can individually contact each person of the danger," Volbrecht said. "However, I can say with absolute certainty that the warning system has been improved over the years.

This can be reflected in the number of deaths declining each year," he said. "It has not reached the ideal situation though.'

One of the new devices the Weather Service is testing is an instrument which can detect electrical impulses unique to a tornado as far away as 40 miles. One of the devices has been installed at the Houston Intercontinental Airport.

The instrument differentiates between thunderstorms and a tornado," Volbrecht said. The more severe the storm, the more pronounced are the traces of electrical impulses. We don't know how well it will work yet. It is categorized as experimental.

Pass Changes In Rape Cases

United Press International The Iowa Senate has passed with only one dissenting vote legislation deleting a requirement that a rape victim's testimony be corroborated.

The Iowa action came Tuesday while Connecticut's Senate Judiciary Committee was considering similar legislation to combat rape, the fastest growing crime in the nation. lowa and Connecticut are among only five states requiring other evidence to support a rape victim's testimony.

The lowa bill was passed 43-1 by the Senate and sent to the House.

Its chief sponsor, Sen. Minnette Doderer, expressed 'great disappointment' that senators refused to consider an amendment which would have prohibited the victim's past sexual conduct from being admitted during a

"Rape is rape, and if we, don't discuss this amendment the foul practice of discussing a victim's sex dife will be dragged all over the courts," Mrs. Doderer said. Connecticut Sen.

Winthrop S. Smith told the judiciary committee that the corroborative evidence rule in rape cases is patently unfair and morally wrong.

"It seems strange that in almost any other crime corroboration is not required, but if a woman is raped, she

Superior Court Judge Robert I. Berdon, in adecision last month in a rape case, criticized the corroboration requirement on grounds it tends to discount a woman's testimony. What this law says in

effect is that a woman's word is not good, that she is a liar," he said.

Smith said: "I submit that if a woman is determined to 'get even' with someone she will find a way, and if she will lie about rape she will lie about other crimes.



Segretti Admits To Dirty Tricks

Segretti Tuesday was the first witness in the trial of Dwight L. Chapin, President Nixon's former appointments secretary. He said Chapin hired him for "the pulling of pranks" on Democratic presidential contenders, arranged for him to be paid and kept in touch with him thereafter.

Chapin's perjury trial -he is charged with lying to the Watergate grand jury when he said he didn't know about Segretti's activities -was to resume today with the testimony of John W. Dean III, Nixon's former special counsel.

The trial was to begin at 9:30 a.m. EDT.

Tuesday's session, the second day of the trial, began with the swearing of the seven-man-five-woman jury which will judge Chapin, 33. If found guilty, he could to to jail for a fiveyear term and be fined

Segretti testified most of the day. He was followed by Nixon's former private attorney, who said he paid Segretti \$16,000 a year plus expenses after Chapin recommended Segretti for a

Kidnaping Suspect Put On Most Wanted Status

WASHINGTON (UPI) -The FBI Tuesday added accused kidnaper Larry Gene Cole, to its 10 most wanted list for the abduction of Mrs. Betty Ann Van Balen, wife of a Virginia businessman, for ransom.

Mrs. Van Balen was released unharmed March 7 after her husband paid the alleged kidnapers \$25,000.

Federal warrants were issued in Roanoke, Va., March 7 for Cole and his wife Bonnie Ann, who allegedly also participated in the kidnaping.

Cole's criminal, record, according to the FBI, dates back to early 1968 and includes interstate transportation of a stolen vehicle, burglary, possession of stolen property and parole violation.

The FBI said Cole was believed to be accompanied by his wife, who is also known as Annie Brown, Mary Bryant and Bonnie

Cole, described by the FBI as a white American with a "notably protruding stomach," was considered armed and dangerous.

The abduction of Mrs. Van Balen, who is a partner in a Roanoke real estate business, occurred on March 6.

She was at a coffee shop near Roanoke when she received a call from a woman advising her she was interested in purchasing some property. The FBI said Mrs. Van Balen met the woman and they drove to the location of the property.

A short time later the husband of Mrs. Van Balen received a telephone call demanding \$25,000 in small bills for the release of his wife.

She was released at an abandoned railroad station at Cotton Hill, W. Va., on the morning of March 7 after the money was paid.

Within the past few years, many students have begun to do more than just talk about the need for change and improvement of the environment. Instead of just studying about the effects of

man's life and activities upon the environment, many students have desired to become part of the solution in attempting to better the surroundings.

Locally, many students have participated in various short-term clean-up campaigns or a one-day field activity to pick up litter or perhaps help paint an area in need of repair.

But recently a group of students at Pampa Junior High School got together on their own initiative to form an organization to work year-round at cleaning up areas of town or formulating programs for the beautification of the local environment.

Meeting after school every Thursday, the Youth Improving Pampa members are working on tentative plans for implementing their concepts.

Currently the club only has about 20 members from the sixth through 10th grades, but they are conducting a membership drive to interest other youth in the aim of improving the appearance of

To date the organization has made jaunts to several of the local parks to clean up litter and pick up the accumulation of twigs, weeds and

other material that had been despoiling the beauty of the parks. Parks which have seen the action of club members to date include Almeda, Aspen and Highland, with plans for all parks to eventually receive at least one once-over clean

Other proposals the members have been considering include painting trash cans and flower boxes, cleaning up areas in which trash and junk have accumulated and any other projects which, by just a little extra effort, could improve the appearance of an area.

The group hopes to be able to raise its own funds for the furtherance of their projects through such fund - raising activities as slave sales (involving using students for the performance of rather limited activities), car washes, bottle sales, baby sitting, yard work and so on. So far the recently - organized club has conducted a bake sale and a "sock hop" dance to seek funds.

In addition, the YIP members pay an initial fee for entering the club and then weekly dues (10 cents) to keep up the treasury.

At present the club has members from the sixth to 10th grades, but membership is open to all youth interested in improving the appearance of their city. Sponsors are Miss Sharon Fisk, Mrs. Marcia Symonds and Mr. and Mrs. D.D.

On West's opening lead of a low spade, declarer, evidently hoping that West's spade suit was headed by the ace, promptly put up dummy's queen. As is evident, the queen won the trick. But, as will become equally evident, "the operation was successful. but the patient died." &

The South hand was then entered via the club queen, after which the diamond jack was laid down and the finesse taken. East won this. trick with his king, and returned his remaining spade. South's king was now trapped - and West made five spade tricks. Thus declarer incurred a two trick set.

From declarer's point of view, if West had the diamond king, then declarer would bring home five diamond tricks by repeated finesses. If this set-up existed, then it didn't matter how he played the spade suit. But if East had the diamond king - and declarer should have assumed, pessimistically that he did - then it was imperative that, if possible, East should be prevented from playing back a spade.

At trick one, dummy's six of spades should have been played - and East's nine should have been permitted to win the trick. East would return the spade then, and once again South would play low. West would win this trick with his ace. No matter



Press Conference May Provide Vital Ingredient

WATCH ON WASHINGTON

By C. MOLLENHOFF WASHINGTON - With all of its admitted inadequacies, the Presidential press conference may provide the House Judiciary Committee with a vital ingredient for the impeachment of President Nixon on grounds of obstruction of justice.

Despite Mr. Nixon's vague and inconsistent answers, the transcript of the Presidential press conference at least pins the President down to a general line on his Watergate defense.

Of particular importance to House Judiciary Committee members and staff lawyers as the case against the President emerges is that they have some concept of what the President's likely defense will be.

With delivery of the so-called "Jaworski documents" to Special Counsel John Doar, the Judiciary Committee has the evidence in hand to establish a prima facie cașe that President Nixon was a knowing party to obstruction of justice in the watergate matter.

The broad charge of conspiracy to obstruct payments would be a justice against seven of Mr. Nixon's top aides was the subject of the indictment on March 1, 1974. The only additional evidence needed was proof of at least one overt act by Mr. Nixon indicating guilty knowledge of any one of the illegal acts

in the Watergate cover-up. The 'Jaworski documents" are 19 White House tapes and about 700 other documents delivered to Special Prosecutor Leon Jaworski under a court order from the U.S. District Judge John J. Sirica. They formed the basis for the federal grand jury indictment of the seven Nixon associates.

The documents also were the basis for a special federal grand jury report to \$400,000 of Nixon political Judge Sirica involving Mr. Nixon's role in the Watergate cover-up. Jaworski believed this report couldn't be made a part of the criminal indictment because a president can't be charged with crime until after he has been impeached.

Since Mr. Nixon rejected a request that he come before the grand jury to explain his role, he is not locked into a sworn defense. posture.

Although comments the President has made in various press conferences weren't under oath, they were made with affirmation to the American people and to the Congress that they represented a true and correct version of what transpired in the Watergate situation.

Members of the House Judiciary Committee, the full House of Representatives and the Senate can give their own weight to any false or inaccurate statements the President made to the American people.

For certainly, any knowing misrepresentation of material facts on the Watergate cover-up could be considered grounds for impeachment along with the evidence of substantive federal crimes of perjury. misprison and obstruction of justice.

The Senate Select Watergate Committee, in pleadings in federal court approved by all seven members, contended even without the White House tapes, they had made a prima facie case of presidential involvement in criminal acts. This was based on the well . corroborated testimony of former White House Counsel John W. Dean, III. In asking for nine White

House tapes and related documents, the Watergate Committee said: "If Dean be believed, the

President may be guilty of several crimes, including obstruction of a criminal investigation, misprison of a felony, conspiracy to commit an offense or to defraud the United States and unlawfully influencing a witness."

While the Senate Watergate Committee hasn't yet obtained the White House tapes, those same tapes have been delivered to Jaworski and now to the House Judiciary

It was after reviewing those tapes, including the key Nixon - Dean conversation on March 21, 1973, that Jaworski went into open court and said he had no reason for disbelieving anything John Dean had said in any forum.

He indicated Dean may have mistakenly indicated that certain conversations with Mr. Nixon took place on -March 13, 1973, instead of on March 21, 1973. But Jaworski said the mistakes were not important to the key issue of whether Dean was telling the truth.

Under questioning by the press. Mr. Nixon has commented generally on these conversations on a number of occasions even as he has fought in the federal courts to bar the Senate and special prosecutor from hearing the tapes he says will prove he is innocent.

Recently, the President has taken the lead in selling the legal thesis that it would have been both legal and proper for his reelection committee officials to pay legal fees and support money for the Watergate burglars.

Mr. Nixon has declared on several occasions that the criminal obstruction of justice only if it was known to have been for the purpose of silencing the seven men who were initially indicted in connection with the Watergate burglary and bugging.

Mr. Nixon's comments are in line with the defense posture of his former top aides. H.R. (Bob) Haldeman, and John D. Ehrlichman. The two have admitted a role in approving the payments but contended they believed it was a "humanitarian" act of creating a defense fund to support their families with no thought of "silencing"

them Both have likened the contribution of more than money to the Watergate burglars to the contributions to defense funds by the supporters of such radicals as Angela Davis and the Berrigan brothers.

Mr. Nixon's avoidance of a serious admission against his own interest is on the same fine line as his claim that on March 21, 1973, he heard only "an allegation that "hush money" was paid to keep the Watergate burglars silent rather than that he "learned" of such

illegal acts from John Dean. If the President is not directly involved in the crimes of his subordinates. he is displaying an incredible naivety or an amazing lack of sensitivity on relatively simple questions of legal ethics.

By what stretch of imagination are we to believe that Richard Nixon. lawyer and experienced congressional investigator. doesn't know the difference between an unsubstantiated allegation and the admissions against interest by one of the co-conspirators in the Watergate cover-up?

Even though the Presidential press conference is a poor forum for getting the full truth, it does present the President with some of the crucial questions involving his responsibility and exposes his explanations to scrutiny on questions of fact, law and

Sen. Buckley's Nice Silliness

Robert F. Kennelly once called George McGovern the Senate's most decent man. He was wrong, even when he said it - as McGovern proved, after Kennedy's assassination, by helping to knock off Senator McCarthy's 1968 bid for the presidency.

There were many candidates for most decent man in the Senate, back then - Messrs. Goldwater and Hatfield prominent among them. But James Buckley now, leads the pack. He is that weirdest thing in our politics, a man who cannot be disliked. Many people have tried it: but even with outside help, they could not bring it off. Even those who could manage the difficult task of disliking Goldwater seemed winded and incompetent when they were led up to the higher hurdle of hating Jimmy Buckley.

How to explain this mystery? It may be partly genetic - Mr. Buckley's sister. Priscilla, a managing editor of National is just as undislikable. But many people find it the easiest thing in the world to dislike Senator Buckley's brother. him personally - within a range of, say, two to twenty instrument. But an feet, he is undislikable, too. Still the fact remains that the Senator's undislikability range runs from inches to infinity without a break of recognizing their error in This is an all-time political record of some importance. For sheer head-on no - holds/ barred free-from decency. no man comes near him.

Now, of course, after the Senator's call for President Nixon's resignation. I am sure that Mr. Nixon dislikes him. So, to be redundant. does the Ziegler or the Haig. But they are outside the pander to the lowest

Q. I understand that the 1972 social security amendments changed the application requirement for disability benefits to provide that an effective application may be filed after the wage earner's death. My husband died in January, 1972, never having filed for disability. Can I file and receive any retroactive benefits on his record?

A. No. The amendments provide than an application must have been filed within three months following the month of enactment of the amendments (September, 1972) or within three months following the month of the wage earner's death.

Q. My husband died in 1968 at age 55. He had been disabled at least one year before his death, but had never filed a disability claim. Someone told me that under the 1972 social security amendments I could now file a claim and receive his disability

benefits. Is this correct? A. No. The provisions applies in cases of death occurring AFTER 1969. In deaths after 1969, the application must be filed within three months following the month of the wage earner's death.
