

PAMPA DAILY NEWS Pampa, Texas 67th Year Congressman **Relates Beef Industry** Plight WASHINGTON Congressman Bob Price told a house subcommittee of the plight-of beef producers and

cattle feeders. He said he was "grateful for the token gesture" of the U.S. Department of Agriculture in recently announcing an additional \$45 million purchase of ground beef for school lunch programs, which he said amounted to about one day's slaughter.

Price told the Domestic Marketing and Consumer **Relations Subcommittee of** the House Agriculture Committee that a far broader program to encourage beef consumption 'is needed to keep a large segment of the cattle feeding industry from going broke.

Price, a member of the full committee himself, has been seeking Congressional hearings to probe the reason for high beef prices to consumers "at a time.when feeders are going broke."

'My real concern today is that unless something is done immediately, the cattle feeders will be bankrupt and will not be able to continue feeding cattle," Price testified.

"Not only will the present low prices of fat cattle break those who are feeding cattle, but it will also shake the banks and other financial loan companies that have been loaning large amounts of money to develop and keep the cattle industry in business. Not only is thecattle feeding industry in jeopardy, but so is the future meat and food supply of the nation." Price said.

A fourth generation cattle rancher and feeder himself. Price called the \$20 billion beef industry "one of the great examples of a pioneer free enterprise industry Amarillo. which produces the number one nutritious food for the American family

He catalogued the factors of the beef issue including last year's freeze on beef prices: recent increases in beef imports; high costs of grain, seed and fertilizer;

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI) --Constitutional Convention delegates cautiously moved into debate today on a legislative pay proposal that would assure lawmakers of at least a \$3,950 a year raise if voters approve the proposed new constitution. The legislative pay issue

is considered to be one of the most controversial of the entire constitutional revision process, at least in the eyes of the voters. **Recommendations** of the

convention's Legislative Committee would give House members and senators a double barreled shot at getting their salaries increased.

The committee proposed including in the body of the new charter a provision to raise pay from the present \$4,800 a year to \$8,750. A separate issue, to be submitted to voters independently, would set up a special issue, salary

CONSERVATIVE ADVOCATE Ever Thought Who Is **Being Raided By Nader?**

By WILLIAM RUSHER It isn't hard to understand the extraordinary vogue Ralph Nader has achieved. We are going through a phase of cynical disillusionment with our principal national institutions - government. business, 'the establishment" in general. Nader, emerging more or less out of nowhere, has presented himself as a sort of latter-day Robin Hood. championing the cause of us little guys against Them. He thus appeals to the powerful romantic strain in our natures - the source of all

those wonderful myths. from Cinderella and the Ugly Duckling to Tom & Jerry, in which the early and seemingly inevitable winner is bested at last by the mini-hero (or heroine) he has oppressed.

It is remarkable that Nader has thus far managed to escape the very scepticism which provides the basis for his success. Why do we never think to ask, "What's in it for Nader?" Probably we are victims of a powerful impulse to believe that Robin Hood is mystically free from base motives and devoted exclusively to

furthering the public weal. If so, a modest commitment to realism will be a valuable corrective.

Ralph Nader isn't Robin Hood, nor is he the avatar of Truth' in some gigantic battle with Falsehood. He is simply a smart publicist who has effectively identified himself with out current mood of generaldisillusionment, and with the hate · business attitude which is a durable aspect of the American psyche. That is not to say that Nader cannot, in certain

situations, serve a useful purpose. Even a blind hog will find an occasional acorn, if he stays under an oak tree and keeps his nose to the ground. Nader isn't blind, and there are plenty







The show will be presented at 8 p.m. in the Tascosa High School auditorium and tickets will be priced at \$1.50.




Abby, this isn't possible because my position in the company depends upon my entertaining clients, so in a sense I must play golf for business reasons.

rabies tag. A pet goes wild, frothing at the mouth.

Or, maybe your child is bitten by a stray dog, or wild animal, which runs away.

Then, rabies becomes very personal. You may have to pay a fine, have your pet put to sleep and a rabies examination 'performed, or - worse - have your child submit to a series of painful rabies shots.

During 1973, reports the Veterinary Public Health Division of the State Health Department, there were 271 laboratory confirmed animal rabies cases in Texas. This is a decreasefrom the 343 cases reported in 1972 but still a sizable figure. The State Health Department furnished 721 antirabies treatment series to people of the state in 1973. Only a small fraction of the cases of confirmed rabies appeared in pets. But, during 1973, seven dogs and 18 cats had confirmed rabies cases. Most pet owners are extremely lax about having their cats. vaccinated

Forty cases of rabies were confirmed in livestock during 1973, five more cases than were reported the previous year. Cattle accounted for 23 cases. horses 16 cases and sheep one case.

Rabies in livestock can be a rather dangerous situation for both farmers and ranchers and for veterinarians. Often in attempting to diagnose an animal's illness, a person will expose himself to rabies

Wildlife produced the largest number of rabies

Rabies is a subject that cases last year. Two hundred six rabies cases were confirmed in wildlife. and skunks headed the list with more than half the total. Skunks accounted for 140 cases, foxes 31 cases and bats 26 cases. Rabies also was found in raccoons, bobcats, coyotes and

> ringtails. Which brings up another good point. If you observe any wild animal acting strangely, with no fear of man, keep away from it. Also train your children to avoid animals in the wild. These friendly animals could be rabid. It's a sure bet that something is wrong if they don't flee from man. Rabies appeared in 97 Texas counties last year, and suspected rabies specimen were sent into State Department of Health Laboratories from all sections of the state. In fact, 6,757 specimens were received by Health Department laboratories for rabies examinations. " Rabies may be of little


