AAF Cuts Hun Plane Output 40 Per Cent

Recent Raids Destroy Even More Plants

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—(AP)—American heavy bombers pinpointing German aircraft factories have cut the heart out of fighter plane production in the Reich, it was reported today.

Charles E. Wilson, executive vice chairman of the war production board, announced that the war department had informed him that United States army air forces raids had reduced Germany's capacity to produce fighter planes by 40 per cent.

Previous official announcements had suggested that German aircraft plants had suffered heavily under combined Allied bombings, but today's announcement was the first that fixed the extent of damage done exclusively by USAAF raids.

Wilson's announcement indicated that the USAAF in the European theater has grown tremendously in recent weeks and no longer has "little brother" status in relation to the Royal Air Force, judged by damage inflicted on the enemy.

Wilson said that the most recent raids, which were not included in the army report, had cut down Nazi fighter plane output even further than the 40 per cent reduction officially disclosed.

Wilson's unusual disclosure of the success of USAAF operations against German plane factories came in a statement declaring that as axis production was knocked out, U. S. aircraft production was just getting into full stride.

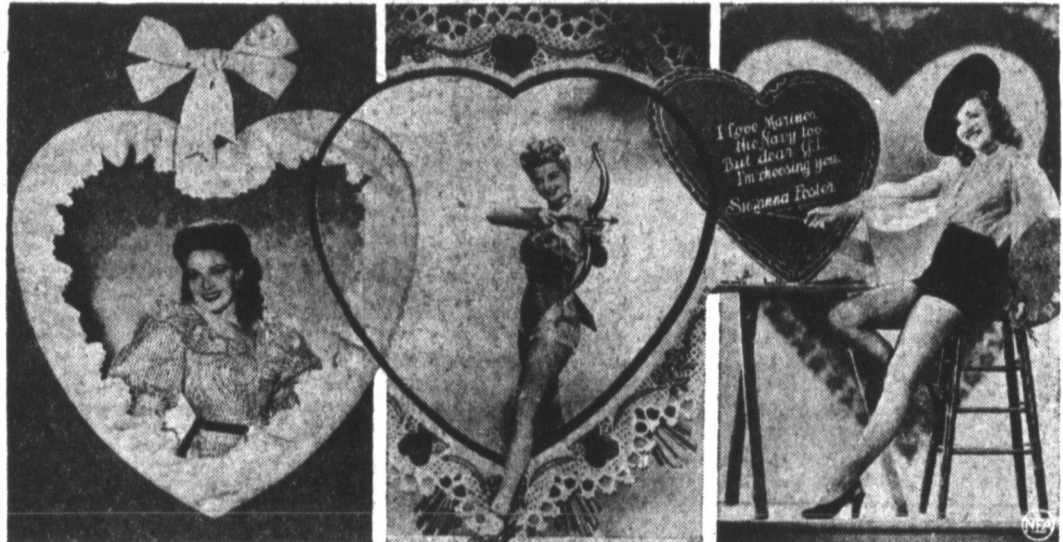
"As the German ability to produce combat planes declines, the ability of the American aircraft industry to produce more efficient combat types in greater numbers is gaining momentum," Wilson said.

"That mass production of military aircraft in American plants has resulted in reduction of construction time by 50 per cent."

Drastic Canned Food Reduction Ordered

CHICAGO, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Draft boards must cancel farm deferments unless the registrant "is in fact irreplaceable," the war food administration is planning an emergency labor force, and civilians are in for a drastic cut in canned fruits and vegetables, the food conference was told today by government officials.

Col. Francis V. Keesling, chief liaison and legislative officer of selective service, in a speech prepared for delivery to the conference

said, "local boards must reappraise the situation and comb over these occupational deferments.

This must be done, of course, not only to insure justice being done to activities other than farming, but also so that we can obtain the best material for the armed forces while at the same time cutting down to that extent the number of pre-war Pearl Harbor fathers that would otherwise have to be inducted."

GOP Considers Cabinet Post For MacArthur

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur may figure in this year's presidential campaign as a potential cabinet member or military advisor if his friends fail to convince the Republican convention it ought to draft him as a candidate.

One influential Republican, who is not supporting any candidate at this time, said a recent transcontinental trip convinced him there is a great deal of MacArthur sentiment among voters.

Connally Expects Senate to Pass Relief Measure

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Chairman Connally (D-Tex.) predicts the senate will quickly endorse a bill, previously voted 338 to 54 by the house, authorizing American expenditures up to \$1,350,000,000 to support the United Nations relief and rehabilitation administration.

2,000 Germans Taken Prisoner; Foe Bombs Beach Hospital Again

Britons made "successful local attacks" in the beach battle below Rome where the reinforced Fifth Army has regained the initiative, and Americans advanced 200 yards in the house-by-house reduction of Cassino, Allied headquarters announced today.

Air power struck at German installations around the Anzio battlefield and about Cassino as lifting weather permitted 800 sorties Sunday. For the moment at least, the impact of the massive German counterattack had been blunted but the Germans probably were reforming for an even more violent attempt to push the Allies into the sea.

The Germans bombed another hospital on the beach, causing casualties. More than 2,000 Nazis filled prison cages below Rome. Headquarters declared the over-all situation "generally satisfactory." The British are at the western end of the beachhead. Nothing was said officially of the Americans around Cassino.

The extent to which the tide of battle has swung in Allied favor was implicit in German utterances. Via Stockholm, the Nazis said a heavy Allied offensive is expected shortly in the intensifying battle. The report said the British had regained the initiative around Carroceto and that the Allies have a great advantage in materiel. Radio Rome said meekly that "the Germans are holding their own" although Vichy said the Allies had made gains.

China-Based Campaign Is Promised

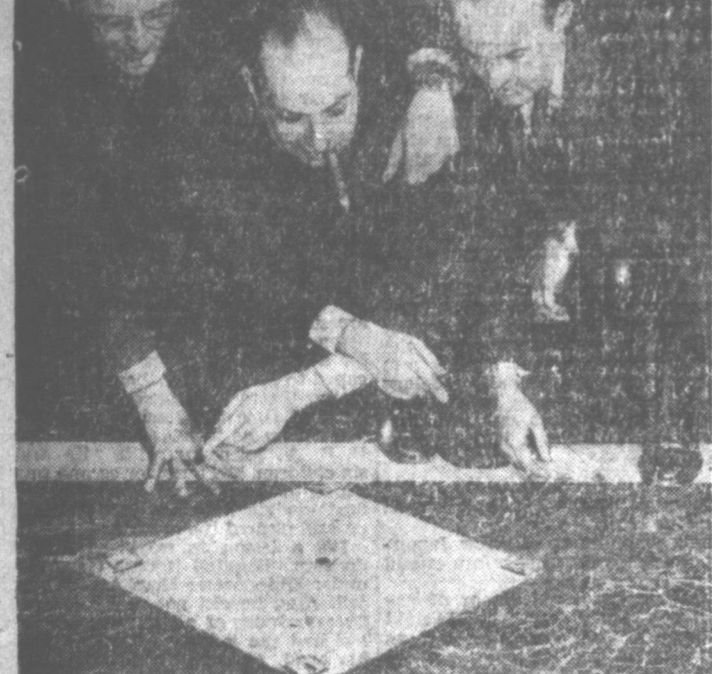

Mack Scoffs At Idea of Former Players Return

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Connie Mack says it's all the bunk—this talk about the major leagues dragging the great old-timers back into baseball to save the game from the war-time rocks. "We don't need them; we don't want them; I doubt if any one of them wants to come back, and they can't play any more anyway," affirms the Athletics' 81-year-old manager. "I'd much rather keep the game going with 14- and 15-year-olds. "In the first place we are going to have enough 4-P's to carry us through, besides the men who aren't called and youngsters who haven't gone into the service. "It's a joke to talk about such men as Ty Cobb, Tris Speaker, Eddie Collins, Babe Ruth, Walter Johnson and Al Simmons making comebacks. "We appreciate the fine spirit they have shown and their desire to help baseball, but they can't play now. One a man has passed 35 or 40 and then gives up the game for a year or so, he can't come back. "Mack said he saw some old timers play in a bond selling game in New York last year—and I pitied them. "Great outfielders like Speaker—one of the finest fly catchers of all time—looked pitiable. I was afraid he would get hit on the head. "If the clubs should have to get along with 18-man squads, Mack comments, "maybe a small group would be better: what good is a staff of 11 or 12 pitchers if you can't work them regularly? "I don't worry about baseball and don't worry about the caliber of ball," he adds. "The teams will be about as good as they were last year—and after all it's the event competition that the fans want. They don't look for super excellence these days."

Last week found Rice beating A. and M. by 34 points and Texas Christian by 29 while Arkansas downed Texas twice, taking the first game 59-48 and the final 54-46. Southern Methodist trimmed Baylor twice and T.C.U. downed the Aggies in the other game. Henry boasts a lead of 33 points in the individual scoring race over Dennis Haden of Southern Methodist, while the third-place man—Deno Nichols of Arkansas—is 42 behind Haden's 181.
