It seems to us the legislators in Washington and in the state capitols should know by now that the people don't like to be told what they can and cannot do. If the people wanted potato in their bread, there would be a demand for it. Consequently, somebody with an ear to popular demand would make potato bread.

But legislation to "suggest" that bakers use potatoes would probably not use that word: it would, in time, use "request" and finally "demand."

I know of no phrase that needs defining more than the phrase "Collective Bargaining". When eople use this phrase it is doubtful if they could so explain it so

that some one else could under stand what they mean. Not Exclusive Right to Bargain Some people think that collecbargaining means that

group of workers have a right to join together to establish minimum wages, seniority, determine hours and select representatives of their own choosing for those who voluntarily want to join the group and to agree that any other who do not want to join the group can make any other bargain with the same employer they desire to make. That they will not attempt threat of simultaneously stopping work.

No fair minded man could object to this kind of collective bargaining. There would be no coercion about it. It would be all voluntary if the collective bargaining group made errors they and they alone would directly suffer.

Exclusive Bargaining Rights But the above is not what is usually meant by "collective bargaining." 

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

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
