### Marshall Flares Up Under Persistent Questioning; Nip Submarine Commander Testifies at McVay Trial

### Captain of Indianapolis **Being Tried**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13-(AP)-Iko Hashimoto, a Japanese submarine commander, told a navy court martial today his ship fired three torpedoes into a "dark object" which it sighted 290 miles from Paula on the night of July 29-30.

His submarine had been trailing its target for 27 minutes, the witness related.

He said he fired torpedoes in salves of three at three second intervals and saw three hits through his periscope. ADMITTED AS WITNESS

Less Than Government Thought WASHINGTON, Dec. 13—(P)—The impact of peace on joblessness is 30 to 40 percent lighter than reconversion officials anticipated.

Fewer lay-offs in industry and an unexpectedly high and sustained rate of buying are among factors that have prompeted key federal economists to offer this improved employment outlook. By year's end, the total of actual and potential job-seekers will

be 4,000,000 at the most, one-third less than had been predicted for that date when hostilities ceased. By next March the jobless will number not more than 5,000,000 This may be the peak for 1946.

After hovering around that mark until about June the total may begin to decline as civilian manufacturing hits full stride. The totals fall far short of Reconversion Director John W. Snyder's estimate, on Oct. 1, that unemployment would hit 8,000,000 by

# Joblessness Is 30 to 40 Percent 'Definite' Alert

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13-(AP)-Gen. George C. Marshall, flushing with anger, asserted today the army commander in Hawaii was given a "definite" alert order before the Japanese attacked Dec. 7, and that he felt he could expect it would be carried out.

Marshall testified before the senate-house committee investigating the attack. Previously the investigators had learned that Lt. Gen. Walter C. Short, the Hawaiian commander, established only an anti-sabotage alert in response to a warning message Nov. 27 from Washinaton.

(Serves 6) 3-ounce packages cream cheese, 1/2 cup top milk, 3 tablespoons brown sugar, 1 cup chopped figs, ½ cup chopped nuts (wanuts or pecans). 1 cup crushed ready-to-eat cereal (corn or wheat flakes), 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Soften cheese and blend with milk; add sugar and mix. Add remaining ingredients and mix well. Form into a roll about 6 inches long and roll in extra crushed cereal. Wrap roll in waxed paper and chill several hours. Slice in one-

Steamed Fruit Pudding Two tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 well-beaten egg, ½ cup molasses, 1 1/4 cups sifted flour, 1 teaspoon soda, 1/4 teaspoon salt, ½ cup bran, ½ cup bailing water, 1/2 cup seedless raisins, 1/2 cup currants.

Blend butter and sugar thoroughly; add egg and beat well. Stir in molasses. Sift flour with soda and salt; mix with bran. Add to first mixture alternately with boiling water. Stir in raising and currants. Pour batter into greased 1-quart mold, cover tightly and steam about 11/2 hours. Serve with hard sauce or other pudding sauce.



# WILL THERE BE A STEEL STRIKE?

# Not if the CIO abides by its pledged word, given last spring.

Question: What would be the general effect on the country of a steel strike?

Answer: Over 40 per cent of all the factory workers in the country earn their living by making steel into useful products for American life. A shut-down of the steel industry would be a disastrous blow to reconversion and would cause a serious loss in both wages and industrial production at a time when they were most needed.

Question: Is it true that the Steelworkers Union has pledged itself not to strike?

**Answer:** Yes. Every contract which the Union has signed this year with the various steel companies has a clause wherein the Union agrees not to strike during the life of the contract.

Question: Are those contracts still in effect?

Answer: Yes. They were signed in the spring of 1945 to run until October, 1946.

Question: Who signed for the Union?

**Answer:** Its international officials—Philip Murray, Van Bittner, Clinton Golden and others—and the local Union heads at the various plants.

Question: Is there no "escape clause" by which either side could end the agreements?

**Answer:** No. The Union demanded a fixed, long-term contract and got it.

Question: Why did they want a long-term contract?

Answer: In the Union's own words before the War Labor Board,

"The Union's request for a termination date of October, 1946, is not made capriciously or pressed here for bargaining purposes. It represents the considered view of the Union that only such a term will adequately serve the needs of stability.

Question: Did the recent strike vote violate the contracts?

Answer: No. Only an actual strike would violate them.

Question: Haven't there been strikes already during the life of the contracts?

Answer: Yes. There were 998 strikes in steel plants during the past year alone. They were mostly local strikes which the Union characterizes as "wildcat," but they meant a big loss in production.

Question: Does the end of the war justify changing the contracts?

Answer: No. The bond was sealed on both sides and should be kept whether times be good or bad. The steel companies are continuing to live up to these agreements. If a strike is called, it will be in clear violation of the existing contracts.

A strike in the face of existing contracts would shatter any con-

fidence in the validity of union agreements in the steel industry.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13-(AP)-The agriculture department said toing the first quarter of 1946.

These supplies will be sufficient an average annual rate of 150 pounds. The department said civilians have been consuming meat in recent weeks at a rate of 165 pounds.

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OUR PREDICAMENT IN CHINA

Some Pampans have inquired of us: "What is all the trouble about in China? What are the problems?"

Those are appropriate questions, and the answer to them are rather detailed—if we can give the answers.

As we have said before, it has been the objective of the American state department, for reasons of securing ourselves in the future , to establish a strong and unified China. That is being thwarted today by the dissension between the nationalist government of Chiang Kai-shek and the communist forces, whom Russia has declared she will not support.

Russia is in Manchuria, and in North China-between Manchuria and Chiang's troops—the communists forces hold around. The Japanese armies in Manchuria—numbering about 325,000 armed men at this time—are willing to surrender their arms and themselves to the Chiang or to the United

That poses a problem. If the U.S. marines are withdrawn from China, they will leave the nationalist government with the large communist forces to cope with—and the country, consequently, will-be torn by civil war. If the U. S. marines help fight a way through North China to Manchuria for the nationalists, they will be intervening in a very serious civil war. The repercussions might be serious.

There is one other possibility, the one on which our government has sought—according to state department statements in the past to solve the problem. That is to bring together, by diplomacy, the dissidents—the Chiang government and the tommunists. That was Gen. Pat Hurley's task, and he declares that it was subverted by "underlings" in the state department. Now that assignment has now been given to Gen. George C.

Marshall, retired army chief of staff It is our hope, which we do not hold too optimistically, that Gen. Marshall will be able to negotiate understanding between the factions. Otherwise, we will have to get out and leave China to weaken further by internal strife; or we must become involved militarily. If we do the latter, that will mean that the United States will have to send in reinforcements to back up those men whose lives are already in peril.

UNREMITTING PRESSURE

T had always been the concept. of the United Chiefs of Staff that Japan could best be defeated by a series of amphibious attacks across the far reaches of the Pacific. Oceans are formidable barriers, but for the nation enjoying naval superiority they become highroads of invasion.

Japan's attack on our fleet at Pearl Harbor gave her a tre-mendous but, nevertheless, temporary advantage. The Japanese had reckoned without the shipthe Japanese fleet had been regained, the Navy successfully maintained communications with Australia and had undertaken limited offensives in the Solomons to halt the enemy advance. A desperate courage stopped the Japanese before Australia in the now historic battle of the Coral and then shortly afterward utterly smashed the Japanese advance toward the United States itself in the decisive action at

Midway. The broad strategic allocation of resources among the theaters, was controlled by the Combined Chiefs of Staff, but the actual control of operations in the Pacific had been retained by the U.S. Chiefs of Staff. At the Casablanca Conference, the Combined Chiefs agreed that Japan must be prohibited from further expansion and from consolidating and ex-ploiting her current holdings. This resolution was agreed upon even though we were at the very moment having great difficulty in concentrating sufficient resources to defeat the European Axis,
