STEEL STRIKE PLANS BEING MADE

Marshall Testifies He Knew Pacific War Was Inevitable

Prediction by Navy Officer Is Studied

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12—(AP)—Gen. George C. Marshall testified today that he was convinced as early as August, 1941, that a Pacific war was inevitable and knew the United States was not ready for it.

Condition of Gen. Patton 'Remains Good'

HEIDELBERG, Germany, Dec. 12—(AP)—The condition of Gen. George S. Patton, Jr., "remains good," an official bulletin said tonight.

World Today

By THURMAN SENSING Director of Research Southern States Industrial Council Nashville, Tennessee. There was a time in the history of this nation of ours when our leaders believed a debt was something to be avoided, if possible, but paid if once incurred.

HOW MANY PEACETIME PLANES?

Since the end of the war American aircraft manufacturers, and presumably military authorities as well, have been awaiting a rift in the cloud of secrecy which surrounded the peacetime plane production of our major allies, Britain and Russia.

The information it contains is not particularly cheering, in view of our own present schedule of plane production. But it may prod congress to some further serious thoughts on our future, in the air.

The news release reveals that the British aircraft industry is now employing 900,000 persons, and that the government has 10,000 military planes on order.

It is not made clear when the British order for 10,000 planes is to be filled. But it might be assumed that with 900,000 workers turning them out, they could be finished in less than two and a half years, even though the current orders for 200 civil-type aircraft should be substantially increased.

Even if this British 10,000-plane order should not be completed until June, 1948, we should still behold the curious spectacle of Britain, which turned out only about one-third as many planes as we did during the war, producing in peacetime twice as many military aircraft as the United States.

Our present combined army and navy schedules call for production of 2,200 aircraft in 1946. This is less than 3 percent of our wartime production peak of 96,000 planes in 1944.

And in the light of the British program, two conclusions are obvious: Either the British have vastly overestimated their peacetime air power requirements, or we have as vastly underestimated ours.

A report by the Air Co-ordinating Committee, headed by the assistant secretaries for air in the war, navy and commerce departments and the chairman of the Civil Aeronautics Board, would indicate that the latter might be true.

Committee members conceive the lower level as a "minimum which could be reached only after maintenance of world peace is well assured and a substantial degree of disarmament has taken place," and also as "the absolute minimum . . . from which it would be possible to plan for mobilization in a future emergency."

As for the present schedule of 2,200 planes, they state that "this reduced level of procurement is eroding the base for any future expansion to a point from which it will be impossible to achieve the required volume of production."

Perhaps congress should re-examine this schedule and ask itself again whether it is really based on the air power needs for our future defense, or merely on the recommendations of an economy-minded Bureau of the Budget.

Chandler Will Cast Deciding Ballot On Night Baseball as Meeting Ends

Several Schools Needing Coaches

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Albert B. "Happy" Chandler today will make his first major decision as commissioner of baseball since his election last April as the successor to the late Kenesaw Mountain Landis.

Chandler, in presiding over his first joint session with the American and National league club owners, will cast the deciding ballot on the number of night games the clubs will be allowed to play next season. The leagues will vote as separate units, with Chandler casting the third ballot.

The joint session will wind up the annual winter meeting of the leagues.

The night baseball question stalled the major leaguers yesterday. Larry MacPhail, president of the New York Yankees, believes night baseball has gone out of bounds and should be put back in its place.

However, the two St. Louis clubs—the Cardinals and Browns—and the Washington Senators will oppose a seven game restriction because of their success with night baseball last season.

Reports indicated that the majority of sentiment in each league is for seven games and no more.

The refusal yesterday of the American and National leagues to accept the Pacific coast league as a third major circuit was no rebuff to Clarence Rowland, Pacific coast league president.

"We will be back, and not with our hat in our hand," Rowland commented today.

CHICAGO, Dec. 12.—(AP)—With college football due to boom next year as numerous schools resume their war-interrupted schedules, the scramble is on for a dozen or more coaching jobs, some of them paying in the neighborhood of \$15,000 a year.

Outstanding among vacancies are those at the Universities of California, Mississippi, Kentucky, Arkansas, and Oklahoma. And at such other gridiron citadels as Syracuse, Carnegie Tech, Fordham and Navy.

The plum of the lot, a national survey shows, probably is at California, where L. T. "Buck" Shaw is resigning to coach the San Francisco club in the all-America conference.

An \$8,500-a-year number was reported "wide open" at Mississippi, with no particular applicant yet having the inside track.

Twenty applicants were said to be seeking the Oklahoma job, which paid Dewey Luster about \$6,000 per annum.

At Arkansas, the authorities considered the applications of more than 50 coaches for two days and one night and then put off the selection until Dec. 21. Glen Rose resigned after the Razorbacks dropped seven of their ten games this season.

The situation at Navy, where Commander Oscar Hagberg was tabbed for return to sea duty after two seasons of coaching the Tars, still was highly uncertain.

The North Side Steers of Fort Worth are in the quarter-finals of the Texas schoolboy football race to the amazement of everybody.

The Steers are an amazing crew. By all the technicalities of law school football they should have stayed away the moleskins three weeks ago.

"The team has no speed on which to build a running attack. It has neither passers nor receivers for an aerial game. It is not very heavy. The kids are too young to be unusually smart or experienced."

Yes, that's what a veteran observer said about them when they were not even supposed to win their district championship.

But today they are getting ready to meet mighty Highland Park of Dallas in the state quarter-finals.

One ardent football fan stayed home last Friday night rather than see the slaughter that would, he figured, be administered to Crozier Tech of Dallas. In the morning paper he read that North Side not only had beaten Crozier Tech 16-0 but limited the offense-minded Dallas team to a single first down.

But that guy doesn't stay home next Saturday afternoon when the Steers play Highland Park. By all the yardsticks they ought to lose to Highland Park by four or five touchdowns. But who's going to say they will?

North Side has the state's best record on defense. It has allowed only 21 points in 10 games. But it's the lowest scoring team left in the race. The Steers, it seems, have followed this line of reasoning: A good defense is a good offense; let the other boys lick themselves.

If North Side wins this week football fans will decide there's no such thing as form in football. Also they'll decide that North Side is going to be state champion.

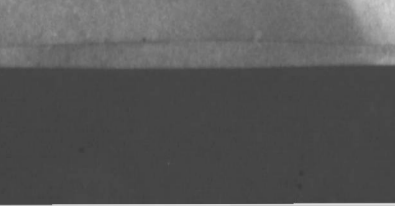

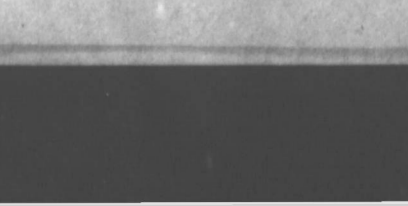

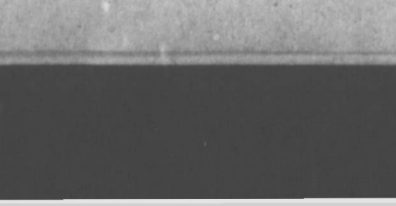

(Continued from page 1) considering Mr. Truman's 9-day-old request for legislation calling for fact-finding boards to handle major labor disputes and forbidding strikes while the boards were functioning.

"The action of the house yesterday removes a blackjack which labor's foes have been holding over the labor committee's head in an effort to get it to act quickly," reported Marcantonio (Amn-Lab-NY) rep.

The legislative "blackjack" to which Marcantonio referred was a bill written by the house military committee to penalize unions striking in violation of contracts and to curb political activity by labor organizations.

The first of 300 Japanese war crimes suspects are scheduled to go on trial at Yokohama next Tuesday. They are accused mainly of atrocities against prisoners of war.

(Continued from page 1) "You were convinced as early as August that if the current events continued we would inevitably be drawn into a war with Japan.

POINTS OF REPORT

Other points in the previously secret report received by the committee included:

1. A conclusion by Maj. Gen. Myron C. Cramer, army judge advocate general, on Sept. 14, 1945, that the war department never had received any notice that the Japanese had broadcast a "Winds" message warning their consuls of a break in American relations.

2. General Cramer's further notation that navy witnesses appearing before Rear Admiral H. Kent Hewitt "denied the receipt of any authentic 'Winds' message."

3. A declaration by Lt. Gen. Walter C. Short that he probably would have ordered a full alert in Hawaii had he received before the attack the message Marshall sent to him Dec. 7. Short was the army commander at Pearl Harbor in 1941.

The purported note of Captain Kramer to the late Secretary Knox was mentioned in a portion of the army board's report which had been withheld previously because it discussed information obtained by the interception of Japanese messages.

Until the congressional committee began its investigation there was no official statement that this country had broken the Japanese code long before the Pearl Harbor attack.
