U.S. Senate Approves \$18.5 Billion Social Security-Welfare Bill

momentous \$18.5-billion Social Security-welfare bill has emerged from the Senate carrying dozens of new benefits and higher taxes. But it stalls reform of the welfare-families program indefinitely.

Capping a 17-hour session in which 40 separate amendments were considered, the Senate passed the bill 68 to 5 early

The 989-page bill would: -Provide or increase Social Security benefits for widows: chronically ill old persons who

need maintenance drugs; persons who want to retire at age 60: others who want to work beyond age 65; all male retirees who now get lower benefits than women with the same earnings records; disabled persons; elderly men and women who need glasses, hearing aids and dentures, and other groups.

-Substantially increase benefits and set a national income standard for aged, blind or disabled persons receiving

-Continue the program of Aid to Families with Dependent Children while three reform plans are-tested.

-Aim to hold down the steadily rising costs of the two big government health programs: Medicare for the elderly and Medicaid for the poor.

On the other hand, the 90 million persons whose paychecks are tapped to finance Social Security would pay more into the program, as would their em-

A worker now pays a maximum of \$486 a year into the fund; the figure would go to \$648

A large portion of the tax increase is due to a 20-per-cent hike in Social Security benefits approved by Congress last June. The fatter checks became effective this week.

Senate passage sent the bill. with its landmark changes in Social Security and welfare laws, to conference with the House, which last year passed a smaller, \$8.2-billion version.

A conference on the measure is expected to be held next week, and sponsors say they are sure a compromise version can be worked out and sent to

President-Nixon before the 1972 session ends. That probably will be Oct. 14.

However, Sen. Russell B. Long, D-La., floor manager for the bill, noting that the Senate added more than \$5 billion in benefits in the floor debate, cautioned that the conferees would have to make many cuts in the Senate bill.

Auditorium's Heritage Room Several area meat producers appeared to testify on the various federal and state meat inspection programs and to offer suggestions for revisions.

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Rep. Tom Christian of Claude served as chairman for the committee hearing. Other committee members present included Rep. Gib Lewis of Fort Worth: Dr. A.B. Rich, director of the Division of Veterinary Public Health; counsel Bob Hight and clerk John Carter.

Most of the testimony given this morning centered around the problems encountered by small meat producers and packers in meeting the federal inspection requirements.

Lynn Jenkins of Wellington said he appreciated the meat inspection program and the quality standards required under the regulations for meat products.

But he felt the specifications and implementation of the program should be different for the small producer than for the larger packing houses. Jenkins during his testimony

said the federal government, since it enacted the program.

the funds required for the operations of the program.

providi funds.

A bill is currently before the federal legislature to require the federal government to provide 80 per cent of the funds. But passage appears unlikely, Jenkins said, from the talks he had with U.S. representatives.

Jenkins, who represented a small custom meat producer, said he felt the regulations should be extended to affect all involved in the producing and sale of meat. Currently grocery stores and restaurants and similar establishments are not under the federal program.

Several members of the audience spoke up in favor of Jenkins' proposal to extend the authority of the program to the other establishments.

Fred D. Maple of Dumas said the federal program immplementations were discriminatory to the small producer, causing many to either find means to meet the increased financing required for the federal regulations or to close operations.

He spoke out against the 'dictatorial methods" of the inspectors, who can inspect and make decisions without having

of their decisions

Maple said his small plant in Dumas had met the standards half of the operating spring of this year. At that time, an inspector said the plant would have to cease operation until it came into complete compliance with federal regulations.

Maple said it would create too great a financial strain to come into immediate compliance and that the firm would be losing money then.

Dr. Rich added that since the implementation of the federal Wholesome Meat Act, some 250 to 300 small meat producers have ceased operating in the

Maple also said he felt advertising of 'USDA approved' meat was discriminatory against local and state inspected meat, as it implied the latter were always of inferior quality. This is not always so. Maple said, as the state inspection program hassome high standards.

Two U.S. Armed Guards Slain By AWOL Soldier In Germany

Select your pattern according to your hip measurement. If your waist measurement doesn't correspond, alterations can be made in that area. Measure the crotch length, taken while sitting, by measuring from the side waistline to the seat of the chair. Also measure the length of the pants from waist to ankle. The proper length this season covers the instep in front and almost all of a low-heeled shoe in the back.

Crotch Length Alteration. Draw a line across the pattern back at right angles to grainline from widest part of crotch to side seam. The

Trouser Length Alteration. in this area, pin in tuck below the knee. To lengthen. cut pattern below the knee.

distance from this line to waistline should equal the length of the crotch measure taken in a sitting position plus 34 inch ease. To shorten pants in this area, pin tucks at the hipline between the drawn line and waistline Take the same tuck in the front pants pattern. Apple Wine Industry Is Thriving in New Zealand

NELSON, New Zealand (AP) - Here in this northern province of the South Island apple wine is the drink, and it's a big industry too.

Every year apples from the district are crushed to yield a million liters of juice for wine The drink comes sweet, medium, or dry, fortified or unfortified.

It's only 20 years since the apple wine-making industry really got under way, but today it's the popular drink in the district, and mucn is sent to other areas.

"It is a plain straightforward drink with none of the mumbo-

jumbo often associated with wines," says Tom Robinson, one of Nelson's principal winemakers. "Most of our customers today are housewives who have on the grocery list a flagon or two of apple wine as a mat-

The juice is a mixture of whatever apples are available at the time of crushing: Gravenstein, Jonathan, Golden Delicious, Cox's Orange, Sturmer, and Granny Smith.

One company crushes apples on behalf of all commercial winemakers, but the art of the individual winemakers makes the wines different.

Western Oil Firms Announce Accords With 5 Arab Nations

NEW YORK (AP) -- Western oil companies announced Thursday a tentative agreement with five Persian Gulf nations which would give the Arab states a 51 per cent interest in oil operations in their countries after a period of

The agreement, which calls for each gulf state to negotiate separate agreements with the companies operating within its territory, culminates nine

Sheik Ahmed Yamani, Saudi Arabia's minister of oil and minerals and chief Arab ne-

gotiator, said he would leave for the Mideast Thursday night to submit the agreement to his principals.

The five Arab states - Abu Dhabi, Quatar, Kuwait, Iraq and Saudi Arabia — account for approximately 28 per cent of free oil production, an oil company spokesman said.

The agreement, which is expected to set a pattern which may be followed by other oil producing nations, calls for the states to increase their equity in oil operations gradually to a maximum level of 51 per cent after an undetermined amount of time

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

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

The increase just voted by the Senate Finance Committee in the Social Security tax will be cheered by most persons of conventiona! !iberal persuasion: They will be looking not so much at what the government takes out of the workingman's. pay, but at what they expect the government to give to present recipients of Social Security benefits. The enlarged benefits include prescription drugs at a lower cost, extension of medical aid to disabled persons and a boost in pensions for widows and low-earners.

All of that sounds remarkably generous. But one would be a little less than honest with himself if, out of fear of disfurbing himself with the facts, he refused to look at the full picture. The news media did an ample job of describing the 'get" end of the Social Security ax hike. The media also faithfully reported that you will pay up-to-\$252 a year out of your take-home check when the proposed increase finally clears Congress. But you have to dig a little deeper to know what that tax really means

in the first place, the Social Security tax is known among neutral experts on .Social Security as a "regressive tax. That means it taxes lower incomes more than it taxes higher incomes. This was pointed out in a newstory which stated that "in 1974, the tax would go to \$720 for those earning \$12,000 or more. That's \$60 in taxes each month." Translated, this means that the person earning \$12.000 or less is taxed on 100 per cent of his income to support Social Security: however, if a man earns \$24,000 he is taxed on just 50 per cent of his income.



BRUCE BIOSSAT With Agnew, It's A Noncampaign

By BRUCE BIOSSAT

WITH AGNEW CAMPAIGN (NEA)-Going around with Vice President Agnew is what you might call Phase 2 of the noncampaign of 1972. Sen. George McGovern has a lock on Phase 1. But the quietness of it all seems to be working more for Nixon-Agnew than for their rivals.

In three days, the vice-president traveled nearly 5,000 miles. He "covered" just two crucial states, Texas and Illinois, and no lesser ones. He made exactly four speeches and held one airborne press conference with a limited group of reporters. That works out to one event for each 1,000 miles of travel.

The logistics of the trip suggested the urgency of earthshaking events. Sometimes there were more typewriters and plane-side telephones than there were reporters to file stories. Highly efficient aides barked orders and shouted "Let's go! in fact our next objective was a three-hour waiting period in

deliberate effort to keep him under wraps after he'd committed a series of gaffes which were interpreted widely as racial or nationalistic slurs. But in 1972 he is President Nixon's chief campaign surrogate with major responsibilities in the assault on McGovern.

It is probably inescapable, therefore, that many of the reporters following the vice-president regard all the surface sound and fury as faintly ludicrous. It's a little like a hurricane. At the center, all is calm and nothing is going on.

Agnew's speeches tend to be long, statistical recitals of claimed administration accomplishment in such fields as agriculture and care for the elderly (now being billed as 'experienced Americans'').

He told us in his plane that he can't understand why we should dismiss these recitals as boring. They are, he says, the "meat" of the campaign

Maybe this "meat" is indeed better fare than the thin gruel of empty generalizations Agnew says he is trying to avoid. But it is tough to chew. Most of his statistics never make print.

Nevertheless, all this grousing about boring speeches and swirling logistics may be missing the real point.

If Agnew is right in saying, as he does, that the "tone of the country is quieter," then a noncampaign may be an inevitable consequence. Real political combat develops when the country is either torn apart or deeply stirred. That does not seem to be true today, for all the reported discontents and the talk about the Vietnam war, the flawed economy, and the decay of the cities.

So, again, this campaign may not be about much of anything. The voters, all samplings indicate, have plenty of troubled things on their minds. But they don't seem to feel that the balloting on Nov. 7 is going to ease their dilemmas.

In that circumstance, incumbent team Nixon-Agnew has to be enormously advantaged. A noncampign at root is a campaign whose most likely result is to leave the incumbents in office

McGovern has just five weeks or so to stir millions of American voters into a mood of real urgency, and to persuade enough of them that he should be their chosen instrument of

In the meantime, because tradition or habit or something demands that we conduct full-fledged fall campaigns, McGovern, Agnew, Sargent Shriver and to a small extent the President himself are dashing about the land, creating a lot of commotion but giving us little substance.

The doctor says there is nothing he can do (no surgery), that I'll just have to live with it.

time and hurt an awful lot. My doctor says "watch what you eat and take antacids.' I sleep with my bed on blocks and elevated high in order to sleep. Can you tell me what causes these hernias and am I doing all I can do for comfort. I have to leave off so many things that I would love to eat. If I could have surgery I'd be willing to go through that if it would hold and do any good. I wish you'd tell me what to do if you have any other answers.

become cancerous? Dear Reader-Hiatal hernias are fairly common, particularly as a person grows older. Basically, what happens is that the hole in the diaphragm where the esophagus passes through to join the stomach is too large, and it allows a portion of the stomach to slip through the diaphragm into the chest. The normal closure mechanism that closes the stomach opening is faulty, and the acid contents are squirted back into the lower part of the esophagus causing burning

Keeping your bed elevated is important. Lying flat at any time should be avoided prevent the stomach contents from running back into the esophagus. You should avoid bending over to pull weeds, bending over to tie your shoes, pick up clothes,

or any head down positions. A second way to help prevent difficulties is not to overeat and preferably to have the stomach empty before you lie down. This means eating numerous small meals, perhaps five or six a day and avoiding any large meals. It takes at least an hour for the stomach to empty so you shouldn't eat anything for at least an hour and preferably two or three

Fatty foods are retained by the stomach longer. Thus if you have a fatty meal, it should be in the middle of the day to allow four or five hours to allow the stomach to completely empty before lying down. Cold foods, such as ice cream, tend to stay in the stomach longer and delay the stomach emptying.

·In addition to antacids you should avoid coffee, colas, teas and any drinks or beverages which increase acid pepsin juice by the stomach. This includes avoiding alcohol. You should also avoid smoking cigarettes.



Food for Thought, And the Real Thing

The two most important places in any church building: the library and the kitchen. Without a half-decent library, a congregation is going to vanish from the face of the earth. Without some kind of kitchen and some first-rate cooks, you will never have that mysterious fellowship that gathers around the table for discussion, friendship and life. This is not to ignore the pulpit and pew and communion table. But how can you survive without good books and a good smell in the oven?

Apparently WORD BOOKS in Waco, Tex., believes in the above thesis. In a time when too many large secular publishing houses (and not a few denominational ones, too) are cutting back on religious titles, discouraging authors and bad-mouthing the whole church scene, WORD comes on strong with hot topics and fresh ideas. Their most recent titles touch sanctuary, library, and kitchen.

Creative, contemporary worship fairly zings in "Catch the New Wind" by Marilee Zdenek and Marge Champion (WORD \$8.95). For people and pastor weary of old forms and predictable responses, "Catch the New Wind" is the immediate answer. As the two writers say in the preface—

"This book does not put down traditional services organ music black clerical robes 19th century hymns Ladies without hats or men with ties . .

They do lift up, however, seven services of "celebra-on" used in Bel Air Presbyterian Church, Los Angeles. While most of these programs seem to have been presented as evening or vesper services, they could be used whenever Christians gather for praise and worship.

Someone asked the other day, where is Malcolm Boyd, now that we need him? The answer is, he is writing and his most recent title, again, by WORD, "The Lover" (\$4.95). Father Boyd has penned a dozen books, with "Are You Running With Me, Jesus" on most paperback racks

In "The Lover," he returns to a timely and vital theme, the place of Jesus Christ in one's life and the place of the church in one's society. He reminds us that the church, with all its bumps, scars and foolishness, is still the central core of our common life, the one place that has the capacity to challenge our racism and warfare, our selfishness and short vision. And says Boyd, it has that some-thing else: the sacraments. "We need the church with its sacraments to remind us again and again of the haunting quality of mystery in life. This affords us punctuation marks for the rituals of our own lives—birth, love, marriage, work, study, leisure, crises, tragedy and death

"The Food for Fellowship Cookbook" by Antoinette Kuzmanich Hatfield (WORD \$4.95) is a rare combination of first-rate recipes and personal devotional comment by the author-cook. Mrs. Hatfield touches the high points of the church year with company-size recipes for Christmas and Easter suggestions. She also does well with ideas for youth groups, family night suppers and something for the father-son banquet. Our number-one, cook, my wife, Ann Reid Poling, has used Mrs. Hatfield's recipes before and applauds her latest volume with this comment, "As useful for 'at home' as church gatherings, adaptable for large family gatherings and not many cookbooks tell how to cook well and attractively for a crowd." Since we have gone all the way to the kitchen, we should add Beatrice Trum Hunter's "Whole-Grain Baking Sampler" (KEATS \$6.95. With her natural food coaching, the next baked food sale should be a tasty success.

Joe Namath, a prude! I couldn't believe it.

Like many of America's sports nuts, I had read and believed in Joe Namath's image. The press had me convinced that this young man lived a 36-hour day as the most swinging bachelor who ever suited up for football. I believed that a giant tote board would be required to

tally his conquests. I believed that he gargled with Johnny Walker Red to wake up in time for practice. I believed that his phones were tapped by Pope Pete because his friends were unsavory characters.

But when I heard him confess to Merv Griffin that he, Joltin' Joe Namath, Super Jet, had declined editor Helen Gurley Brown's offer to appear in the buff as Cosmopolitan Magazine's first centerfold nude, I did a double take. Horrors, Burt Reynolds was a second choice.

Joe lowered his eyes modestly as he explained his decision. "I just couldn't see it. I mean, I like the picture they made but I couldn't see it for me.

I know that Joe didn't like the popular Broadway play, "Hair." "I thought it was a dirty show," he had said. But somehow I couldn't see him passing up a chance to re-cline on his famous llama rug, stripped for art's sake. I mean, he took it all off for that razor blade commercial.

I called Dick Schaap, Joe's ghostwriter for his autobiography, "I Can't Wait Until Tomorrow-'Cause I Get Better Looking Every Day," to see if he thought Joe had fallen out of character when he refused Ms. Brown.

"Joe's not an exhibitionist," said Schaap primly. "He has a moral code like everyone else. The only difference between Joe Namath and other football players is that Joe is totally honest about what he does.



He might meet a famous actress and not even notice her. But let a cocktail waitress ask for an autograph, and he'll spend an hour talking to her.

Honest, loyal, modest, compassionate. Really now, Bill Glass preacher or not, how can you attack a fellow that sounds like a chapter from the Boy Scout Manual? Even if it is the new revised edition.




