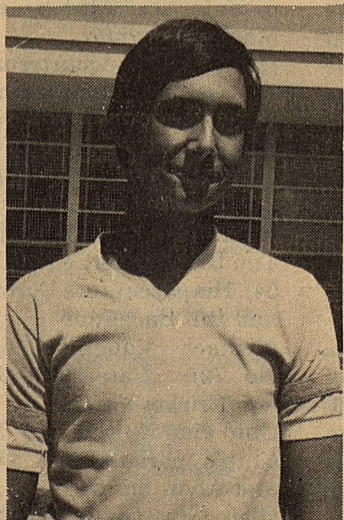

## Daylight saving time to end Sunday

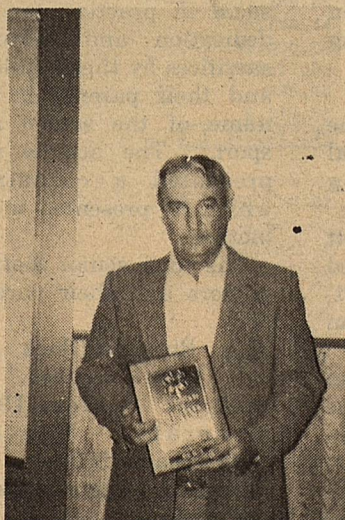
Daylight saving time ends in most of nation next Sunday but it may be that next year it will start sooner in the year.

Congress is thinking of extending the period-adding in March and all of April-not only because it helps conserve energy but also because it may make for safer streets.

The official time change comes at 2 a.m. local time October 25, when it automatically becomes 1 a.m.. Most people find it easy to set their timepieces back one hour before retiring Saturday night. KEITH WILLIAMS, 1981 Borden County 4-H Gold Star Boy.

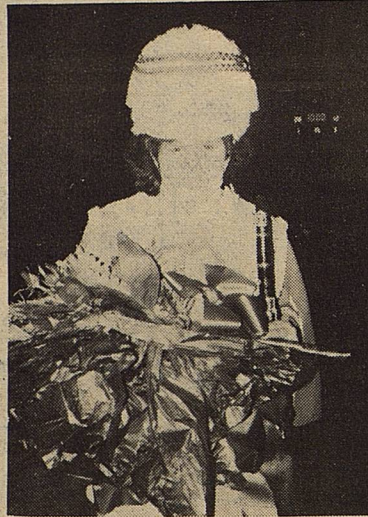

Making their record 4-2 and 2-0 in district. The Coyotes took off slow Friday night but opened up in the 3rd quarter to post a 52-26 victory. 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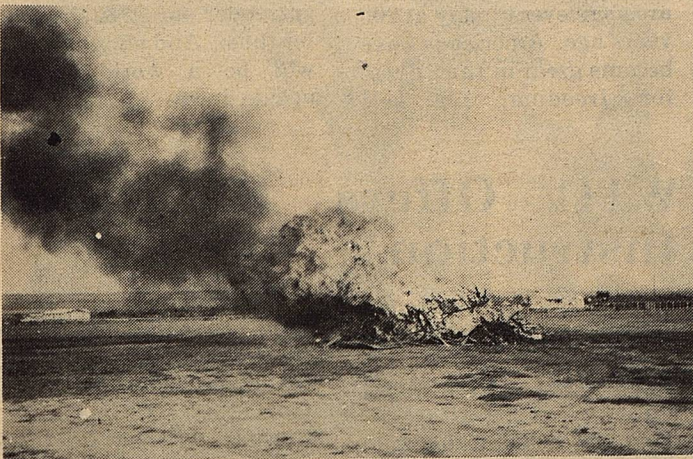

The World Turned Upside Down

The scene: The battlefied at Yorktown, Virginia. The year: 1781. The date: October 17. It was at 10a.m.; October 17 that a drummer boy appeared thru the haze of smoke covering the battlefied at Yorktown. An officer of the British forces, accompanying the young boy, was carrying a white cloth--and it was a world turned upside down.

The British officer was also carrying a letter from General Cornwallis to General George Washington. The letter read, "Sir: I propose a cessation of hostilities for twenty four hours, and that two officers may be

appointed by each side to meet at Mr. Moore's house to settle terms for surrender of the posts at York and Gloucester." General Washington, although the surrender was sooner than expected, did not trust Cornwallis and was leary of granting the twenty four hour requested cease fire, changed it to two hours. After further preliminary proposals by Cornwallis, Washington believed "there would be no difficulty in fixing the terms." About 5 p.m. hostilities between the British and the Colonists and their allies the French wens suspended-- and a world turned upside down.

It was October 19, 1781 that the final articles of surrender were signed by Cornwallis and Cap't. Thomas Symonds and sent to Washington, Rochambeau and de Barras. General Washington added the line, "Done in trenches before York Town in Virginia, October 19, 1781." And it was a world turned upside down.

At 2 o'clock the British column in newly issued dress uniforms marched

with shouldered arms between the lines of American and Franch troops. They marched in slow cadence--the drums beating a melancholy English tune--"A World Turned Upside Down."

And so it is that on October 19, 1981 that we commemorate the bicentennial of the surrender at Yorktown. We look back over those 200 years and we realize a world was turned upside down. The Americans had won more than a war and independence for the 13 colonies. They had won a principle--they had cast off the belief of the divine right of kings and had established the principle of government of and by the people. The effects of that war are still being felt these 200 years hence. The Constitution of the United States of America was the end result of the Revolution--and it has endured longer than any other written constitution in history.

It has been said, "The American war is over, but this is far from being the case with the American

Revolution--" Yes, the revlolution continues. Those same ideas that prompted the colonial revolt against the parent country are as relevent today at 200 years ago. Americans have become great in thier quest for freedom, for self

determination, for change, for understanding and tolerance. We can lose those hard earned principles if we become complacent and surrender our eternal quest for them. And once again it will be a world turned upside down.

## Freeze not likely early

Freezing temperatures likely will not be early for most areas of Texas this year, says an agricultural meteorologist with the National Weather Service at Texas A&M University. This would help the High Plains cotton crop that is late this year and needs more warm, open weather to

mature properly. A late freeze would also extend the grazing season for livestock, as most areas of Texas still have an abundance of forage due to favorable moisture conditions. The NWS has established freeze probability dates for the various regions of Texas to help farmers and ranchers as well as homeowners prepare for the upcoming winter season.

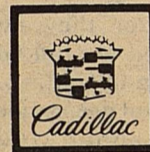
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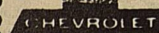

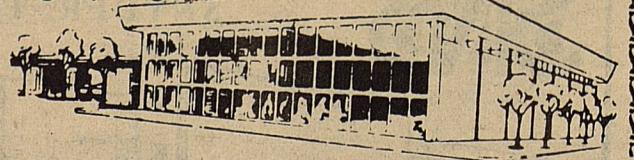
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## GOVERNOR'S REPORT

by William P. Clements Jr.

Texans will vote on seven more proposed changes in their State Constitution November 3.

As Governor, I support them. Space does not permit detailed arguments here in favor of all seven, but at least three are of such commanding importance as to warrant elaboration.

Amendment 4 creates a State Water Trust Fund. Contrary to some deliberately misleading propaganda, this is not a proposal designed to benefit some part of the State over others. Neither is it hastily planned or illconceived, as opponents have implied falsely.

Within less than two decades, nearly all parts of this great State must have additional sources of water to insure our continued growth and prosperity and expanded opportunities for future generations of Texans.

Amendment 4 will set aside half of surplus State revenues, which otherwise would be eaten up by

current spending demands, to build the kind of water projects adequate to needs of a population exceeding 22 million people within just two decades. The amendment also allows use of the State's credit to guarantee local water project bonds, creates a state bond retirement program and increases interest rates to make authorized, but unissued, state bonds marketable.

This, in effect, is goal-oriented planning at its best and a positive form of tax relief. It assures excess public revenues are set aside and saved for a known, identifiable need instead of squandered in the usual spend-everything-now-cry-later budget cycle.

In an effort to curb residential tax increases and head off so called homeowners' "tax revolts," Amendment 6 would authorize local jurisdictions to exempt a percentage of the market value of the residence homesteads. The amendment would also

allow the Legislature to change some current property tax administrative procedures, including the "truth in taxation" notice requirement. I believe the amendment would make it easier for those on low or fixed incomes to buy and keep a home.

It is worth mentioning that other amendments to be voted on November 3 would authorize an additional \$250 million in Veterans Land Bonds at marketable interest rates; authorize issuing patents for school lands held in good faith for a half century; make property tax relief available to encourage redevelopment or improvement of blighted areas; and include livestock and poultry with farm products exempt from taxation.

Among the most important of all, Amendment 3 provides significant budget execution authority subject to limitations imposed by law. I campaigned for a similar measure two years ago, but misunderstanding due in part to an ambiguous ballot listing led to its defeat. The finance management committee and procedures to be set up by Proposition 3 are now needed urgently.

The committee to be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, House Speaker, two key Senators and two Representatives will provide the vehicle for allocation of tremendous sums in federal block grants anticipated to flow into the State, without the necessity of a special legislative session.

In the future, subject to legislative direction, the committee may become an effective mechanism for meeting other unexpected financial emergencies when the Legislature is not in session, may significantly improve budgeting of State funds and save millions in tax dollars.

## 1982 UPLAND COTTON NATIONAL MARKETING QUOTA, ACREAGE ALLOTMENT ANNOUNCED

The U.S. Department of Agriculture set the 1982 upland cotton national marketing quota at 14,666,667 bales and the national acreage allotment at 16,000,000 acres.

To become effective, marketing quotas must be approved by two thirds of the producers voting in a referendum held not later than December 15. If approved, quotas would limit the quantity of cotton which a producer could market without penalty. The date for this referendum will be

According to Everett Rank, administrator of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, USDA is required to set a marketing quota for the next crop of upland cotton whenever the current year's total supply is projected to exceed the normal supply. Recent projections indicate that a marketing quota is required under the statutory formulas.

The amount of the national marketing quota corresponds to the national acreage allotment of 16,000,000 acres, which is the minimum allowed by law. If, in the absence of new legislation, individual allotments were made effective, producers would have to plant within their allotments to be eligible for price support benefits.

Legislation currently under consideration in Congress could suspend permanent legislation, eliminate marketing quotas for the 1982 crop and make the referendum unnecessary. No other upland cotton program decisions will be made at this time because the expected new legislation would also make them unnecessary.

If it becomes necessary to make further program announcements concerning quotas and allotments for the 1982 crop, they will be made before the referendum is held.

## PUBLIC COMMENT SOUGHT ON 1981 CONSERVATION AND ENVIRONMENTAL PROGRAMS

The U.S. Department of Agriculture will hold a public meeting on November 19 to consider recommendations by state and county development groups concerning agricultural conservation, pollution control and forestry programs.

The public also is invited to submit comments and suggestions on these USDA programs.

Development groups were formed to help USDA carry out rural conservation and environmental programs. These groups have the responsibility for developing program recommendations, including changes in administrative procedures and policy guidelines, and evaluations of program effectiveness and operating arrangements.

Agricultural conservation program

assistance is offered to encourage eligible farmers to voluntarily perform soil and water conservation, energy conservation and pollution abatement measures. Under the program, USDA shares the cost of such work with farmers who ordinarily would not or could not perform needed conservation practices without the federal assistance.

## DISASTER PROTECTION

Should your grain sorghum or cotton fail or produce an abnormally low yield because of conditions beyond your control, the disaster program is still in effect for 1981. You must file an application for disaster credit within 15 days after harvest or abandonment, and before plowing or making other use of the affected acreage.

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
