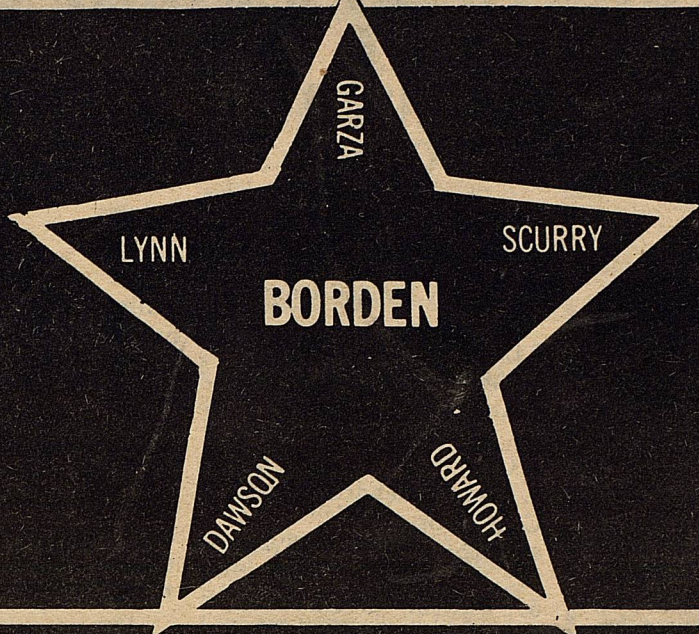

## Texas drivers face fines for no liability coverage

Beginning January 1, 1982, Texas drivers contacted by Department of Public Safety officers during traffic stops and vehicle accident investigations will be required to furnish proof of compliance with the new compulsory liability insurance law.

Under House Bill 197, an amendment to the Safety Responsibility Act approved this year by the Texas Legislature, all drivers must carry minimum liability coverage for medical expenses of \$10,000 per person (\$20,000 for two or more persons) and property damages of \$5,000.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, said troopers will accept as evidence of insurance coverage the policy for the vehicle being operated or a document

issued by the insurance company.

"Such a document must contain a statement that the liability coverage for the motor vehicle is the minimum prescribed by the law," Adams said. "The document must also include the name of the insurance company, name of the insured person, policy period and policy number. This document may take the form of a letter or a card, depending upon the preference of the insuring company."

Adams pointed out that DPS troopers will be enforcing the provisions of this law along highways and rural roads. "Local police officers and sheriff's deputies also have the authority to request this information from drivers," the DPS director said. "I am

sure most law enforcement agencies in our state will also be enforcing this statute in their respective jurisdictions."

Drivers who do not maintain the specified coverage risk will be fined at least \$75 for the first offense and a minimum \$200 for subsequent violations. In addition, a conviction under this new law will result in the suspension of the violator's driver license and motor vehicle registration unless the violator establishes and maintains proof of financial responsibility for five years from the conviction date.

Adams also said vehicles which are to be used in the driving test by new driver license applicants must be covered by the minimum liability insurance specified by the law. Applicants will have to certify on the license application that the minimum coverage is in effect on the license application that the minimum coverage is in effect for the vehicle before they will be permitted to take the driving test.

The DPS director predicted that more Texans will obtain the required liability coverage when the new law goes into effect.

Current figures show that approximately 74 percent of the drivers involved in accidents carry liability insurance," Adams said. "This indicates that a substantial number of people must secure the required coverage or face the possibility of heavy fines and loss of driving

## Texas cotton harvest way ahead of last year's

While estimates for the Texas cotton harvest are down slightly from last month's figures, overall cotton production estimates for the state are still way ahead of last year's, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown announced.

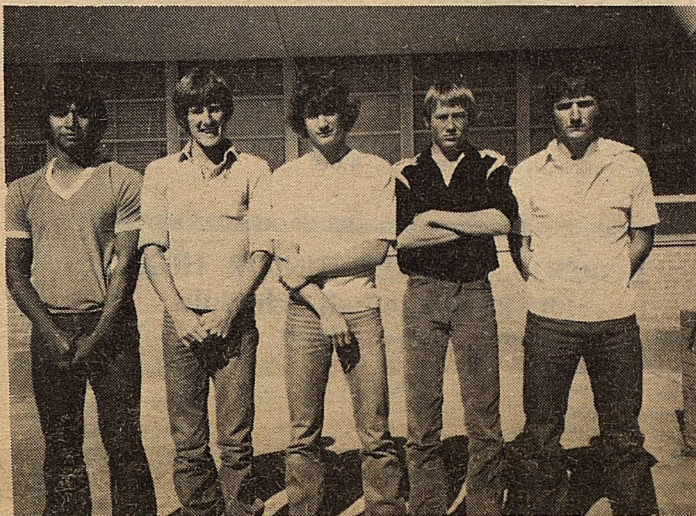
"With 29 percent of the cotton already harvested we are running a little below last month's estimate. We had too much rain in October and not enough sunshine in the High Plains when the cotton really needed it," Brown said.

"While the rain hurt the cotton crop, it has really

helped peanut and soybean crops. The estimates for peanut production for November are up 2 percent from last month and soybeans are up 8 percent from last year," Brown said. "Overall the estimates from last month haven't changed that much, and it looks like it's going to be a good year for Texas production. The profit picture is not as good as we would hope to have. Exports are down and supplies are up," he said.

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service has reported that Texas upland cotton is

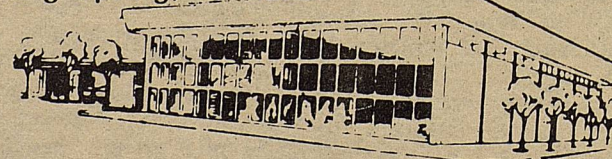

## Spotlight on HEALTH

### Health & Science Briefs

Americans are becoming more conscious of nutrition and the need to change eating habits to help prevent disease. Those on a diet requiring them to cut down on salt should check labels of foods they buy for the words salt, sodium, brine, disodium phosphate, sodium benzoate, or sodium propionate.

\*\*\*  
Bicarbonate of soda is sometimes used as an antacid and it, too, contains a significant amount of sodium. An effective antacid such as Riopan liquid or tablets, containing very little sodium or sugar, can be used instead. Many physicians prefer it to bicarbonate of soda or baking soda for acid indigestion.

\*\*\*  
Thousands of burn injuries could be prevented each year if home water heaters were set at lower temperatures, according to a pediatrician writing in the *Journal of the American Medical Association*. Scalding with hot liquids is the most frequent cause of burns. Most at risk are children under 5 years, adults older than 65 years,

and persons who are mentally or physically disabled.

A unique protective "skin barrier cream that repels water", used in industrial and manufacturing companies to protect the hands of employees, is now available in pharmacies for home use. The cream, called Kerodex 71 spreads on hands, and on wrists like a fine cosmetic cream and is nongreasy. It also acts like a barrier film against a great many irritants and provides protection for about three to four hours, according to the manufacturer, Ayerst Laboratories.

Meat, fish, eggs, garlic and paprika, chemicals, cosmetics and medicines are among the substances producing skin rashes. "Those who develop contact urticaria after touching or working with one of these substances may develop a variety of adverse effects including hives and possibly difficulty in breathing, according to a report in the *Journal of the American Academy of Dermatology*. Cooking is reported to destroy the allergenic properties of certain foods responsible for reactions.

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## USDA Conservation Program Out For Public Review

The Secretary of Agriculture has invited the public to comment on the U.S. Department of Agriculture's proposed soil and water conservation program. The Secretary's preferred program features expanded roles for local and state governments and the targeting of USDA dollars and personnel to conserving critical resource problem areas.

People who are interested in the program, or potentially affected by it, are urged to comment. Responses will be accepted through January 15, 1982, and can be mailed to State Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service (scs), P.O. Box 648, Temple, Texas 76503.

Erwin A. Pavlik, district conservationist for SCS at Snyder said the Secretary's proposed program would concentrate more USDA assistance in areas where soil erosion and other problems threaten to reduce agricultural productive capacity and to increase agriculture production costs. Basic USDA technical and financial assistance would continue in all areas.

The program would use local and state conservation coordinating boards to identify critical problem areas, set priorities, and

develop program for local and state action to solve the problems. These boards would be based on existing organizations conservation district boards, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) committees, extension advisory boards, and other groups.

Based on the recommendation from these local and state boards and national priorities, more USDA assistance would be aimed at reducing the most serious soil erosion and related problems.

Pavlik said the program is the Secretary's proposed response to the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977 (RCA). It is contained in an RCA Program report and a summary leaflet with response form that can be reviewed at the local SCS or Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office.

The basis for the program is an appraisal of the condition, trends and natural resource problems of the nation. Published in two reports, the appraisal is also available for public reference in the two USDA offices.

## American Agriculture State Convention Set In Abilene

American Agriculture Movement members will gather December 4 and 5 at the Sheraton in Abilene for their annual state convention.

Featured speaker at noon Saturday will be Wayne Cryts, the gutsy Missouri farmer who made national headlines when he and 3,000 other farmers removed his soybeans from the bankrupt Ristine, Missouri elevator in defiance of court orders. Bankruptcy trustees planned to sell Cryts' soybeans, which he had stored on warehouse receipts, to pay off the debts of the elevator. Legal action is still pending against Cryts in what will be a landmark case. A well-known Arkansas farmer, Odis Chapman, will deliver the banquet address Friday night, December 4, at 7 p.m.

National AAM Chairman Marvin Meek from Plainview and National Washington Coordinator David Senter, formerly of Burleson, will speak Saturday afternoon, December 5.

AAM members will discuss the farm bill that is coming out of Washington and plan strategy for 1982.

## Your County Agent Says

### CULL OPEN, LATE CALVING COWS

Despite a weak cattle market, it's a wise decision to "clean up" herds by culling open cows and giving more attention to a controlled breeding program by culling late-calving cows.

There's no need to put expensive winter feed into unproductive cows. Culling your cow herd now will also help you plan on feed supplies for the winter months.

Also, pregnancy testing cows this fall may be a more profitable management tool than ever before.

Since it's difficult for a cow to produce a calf large enough to pay her annual maintenance bill and leave some profit for the producer, we know an open cow is surely losing money. In addition, cows calving during the summer months wean calves 30 to 90 pounds lighter than their herd mates which calve at other times. For this reason it's advisable to cull cows which will calve late next year and buy a replacement which will calve early.

Whoever does the pregnancy testing will be able to estimate the calving date on each animal and make it easy to identify next year's late calving cows. Your definition of a late calving cow should change every year until your

calving season has been reduced to no longer than 90 days.

Removing barren and late calving cows from the herd will increase both the herd's reproductive potential and pounds of calf weaned.

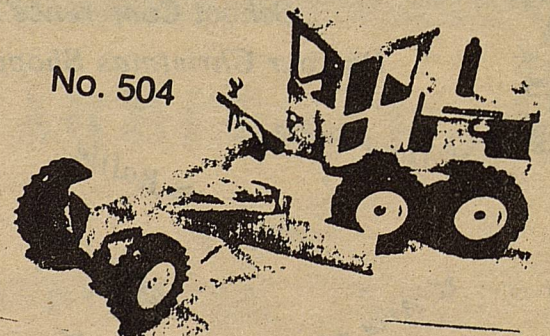
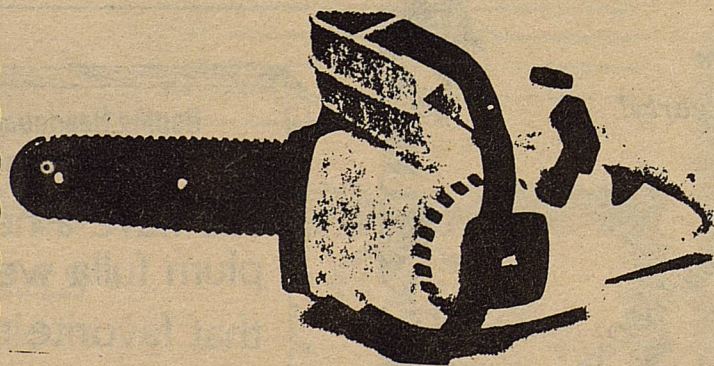

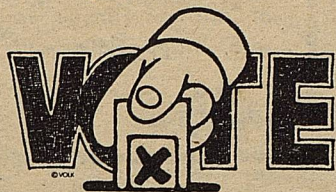

down 3 percent from last month's estimate at 5.6 million bales for November, 69 percent above last year's crop. Yield is forecast at 379 pounds, down 13 pound from the October estimate. Harvested acreage of 7,100,000 acres remains unchanged from the previous month, but up 4 percent from the 1980 acreage.

Production of American-Pima cotton is forecast at 25,000 bales, 7 percent below the October estimate.

Sorghum production based on November 1 conditions, is forecast at 134,848,000 cwt., unchanged from the October forecast. Yield is estimated at 3,136 pounds per acre from 4,300,000 acres.

Estimates for Texas corn and peanut production for November are both up from last year with corn up 23 percent from the 1980 crop at 143,750,000 bushels, unchanged from last month's forecast. With peanuts estimated at 463,125,000 pounds, 2 percent above the previous month's estimate, showing an increase of 58 percent from last year's crop.

Soybean production is up slightly from last year at 14,950,000 bushels, up 8 percent from last month's estimate.
