





Your cooperation in completing the entry form ahead of time and bringing it to the meeting will lessen the possibility for errors when completing entry cards for each show. Please include exhibitor's social security number on the entry form along with parent and exhibitor signatures, and bring the form with you to

the meeting. Remember, fill out one (1) form for each exhibitor (child).

All FFA entries will need to be made through Mr. Wallace. Be sure to not enter the same animal through FFA and 4-H. This constitutes what is termed a "double entry" and major stock shows will void both entries, keep your entry fee, and not allow you to show. Therefore, it is important you take extra precautions with your entries when you exhibit projects in both FFA and 4-H

RRC Urges Propane Safety Checks Before Winter Cold Weather Hits Texas

nights have signaled the beginning of fall and the start of the propane-heating Texas Railroad season. Commission Chairman Michael L. Williams, Commissioner Charles R. Matthews, and Commissioner Tony Garza reminds Texans to have their propane tanks and heating appliances properly inspected before the first signs of cold weather.

Williams, Matthews and Garza urged propane users to contact their local propane company to schedule an inspection of their heating system for leaks and to ensure it meets all safety standards. In addition, propane technicians can evaluate tank parts and appliance controls to make 1. If your home has a sure the entire system is all in good working condition.

"With the mild fall temperatures we've had across Texas, it's hard to think about trying to stay 2. warm," Williams said. "But having your propane systems checked now will

Shorter days and cooler ensure you're not left out in the cold when winter truly arrives."


> "An estimated half million Texas homes use efficient and reliable propane as their primary energy source," Matthews 3. said. "It's a fuel that must be maintained in order to safely provide the maximum benefits."

"Taking time for routine maintenance on your propane system is time well spent." Garza added. "We're feeling the first chills of winter, and there's no better time to properly inspect your system than before colder weather hits." According to Williams,

Matthews, and Garza, other important safety tips to remember include:

propane furnace, water heater, range or other conveniences, schedule a check of the whole propane system includeing appliances. Your local propane service technician should check your tank,

piping, regulators, gau-



ges, connectors, valves, vents, thermostats, pilots, burners, and appliance controls to in good working condition.

Homes with propane gas logs or fireplace systems should be checked each fall.

4. Naturally odorless propane gas has a rotten egg smell added to it to help identify any leaks. If you smell gas, leave the home immediately without using any electrical switches or appliances. Close the service valve under the protective dome of your tank by turning it to the right as far as it can go. Call your propane supplier or local fire department neighbor's from a home.

To help consumers properly use propane-fueled appliances, the Railroad Commission of Texas offers a free safety brochure entitled Home Safe Home. Copies are available in both English and Spanish and can be obtained by contacting the Railroad Commission's Alternative make sure they are all Fuels Research and Education Division toll-free at 1-800-64-CLEAR [1-800-642-53271.
