

## 6-State Area **Cringes Under New Assaults**

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. -(AP) — A flurry of tornadoes, small but destructive and deadly, struck the South late Saturday as a widespread area from deep in Dixie northward to Missouri counted 232 persons killed by storms and rampant flood waters.

Alabama, from mid-state northwestward almost to the Tennessee border shouldered the onslaught of the latest stormsthree within a few hours.

The toll: three dead, 50 left homeless.

In the six-state storm area, stricken first late Friday afternoon, several thousand persons were homeless and more than a thousand were injured, many seriously

Arkansas, hardest hit by the cious storms, reported 149 killed and between 2000 and 3000 homeless

The latest town to be added to the growing and ghastly list of stricken communities was Hartselle, in northwest Alabama. The three dead there were reported by the Alabama highway patrol. In a ravaged section about two miles east of Hartselle, 12 dwellings were toppled by mighty winds. In Hartselle itself, between 30 and 40 homes

were churned into debris. Earlier, Jemison in central Alabama and Tuscaloosa to the vest were struck by ornadoes. Damage was reported but no. fatalities. The roster of the dead, tates, was: Arkansas, 149; Tennessee, Missouri, 13; Mississippi, 11; Kentucky. 7: Alabama 3 The dread task of counting and burying the dead, and .searching through the twisted wreckage of homes and other buildings, continued throughout yesterday. In one area alone, centered at Dyersburg, Tenn., the property damage was estimated by City Judge Lyman Ungram as edging toward \$1,000,000. This huge loss icluded a quarter of a million ollars worth of property leveled by the high winds and fire at the municipal airport. The Doctor Says By EDGAR P. JORDAN M. D.

It is not too early for parents who are considering sending their children to summer camps to complete their arrangements. These camps for boys and girls are now a part of the American scene which thousands of lucky youngsters enjoy each year.

Most camps require that the youngsters have a physical examination before going. This is to re-veal any physical defect which might interfere with full activity so that proper measures can be taken to avoid undesirable risk,

The presence of heart disease, a severe allergy or diabetes, for example, should be known before the youngster gets into trouble from any activity normally conducted in a summer camp.

The camp will also give parents instructions as to what clothes should be taken, the number of nkets, and similar information which is always needed before a nce can be comcamping experience fortable and happy.

Spoon Lure Began As A Teaspoor By AL MCCLANE Fishing Editor

We sat up through the wee hours this morning listening to a fellow talk about a new lure he's putting on the market.

It's a spoon whose shape provides a high-lift hydrafoil, allowing for maximum motion through any speed range. Because of its calculated instability under induced spin, it breaks rotation from one direction to the other. A spoon, in case you forget, is

a metal blade looking much like the business end of a sawed-off teaspoon. Fish grab a spoon under the impression that they are grabbing a smaller fish who's suffering from a handover or a broken landing gear as he wobbles under the cannibal's nose. Getting just the right wobble

Most costly of the conservation services were dams on 37 farms. amounting to \$14,019.96. Listing and chiseling were the practices carried out by most farms, 179, at a cost of \$10,386.90, on 34,623 acres.

Other practices, the extent of the operation, the number of farms, and the amount spent for each practice:

Standard terraces, 194,882 feet, 16 farms, \$2,397.46; diversion terraces, 97,941 cubic yards, 33 farms, \$5,876.46; stalk protection, 8555 acres 67 farms, \$2,138.75; summer fallow, 17,828 acres, 107 farms, \$10,696.80; water wells, 959 feet, six farms, \$1918; sagebush control 1,656 acres, three farms, \$1,987.20. For bindweed control. 43.930
