Coyotes Storm Back for 48-22 Regional Victory

"Uh, Grandmother? Uh, Your favorite It's me. grandson. Uh, well, I know you were counting on a big Thanksgiving and all, but, uh, well, we won again. Yeah, I know Grandmawe've done this to you three years in a row now. I think you're gonna have to come see us again this Thanksgiving, but I promise I'll get you 40-yard line seats. Thanks, Grandmother, I knew you would understand--again."

Coyote football players, coaches, cheerleaders, and fans have probably made a few phone calls like the one above over the weekend. The reason: the Coyotes once again proved they are a team to reckon with in November as they came back to defeat a talented Sanderson Eagle team 48-22 and claim the regional title in the 1999 State Six-Man playoffs.

Sanderson scored first on a pass play with 6:03 remaining in the 1st quarter, Borden County responded with less than a minute to go in the quarter on a 42-yard run by Ed Rodriguez. PAT's were good on both sides of the ball and the score was tied at 8-8.

It remained that way throughout the 2nd quarter as defense and turnovers stifled both teams. With a minute to go before half, the Eagles found the end zone on a seven-yard scoring pass and made the PAT.

But, the Coyotes took a page from the old Roger Staubach/Drew Pearson playbook (the famous Hail Mary) as Kevin Pinkerton found Ed Rodriguez in the end zone with no time The 27-yard remaining. scoring strike gave the Coyotes a much-needed boost going in to half-time, half as they did in the first,"

still trailing 16-14.

Half-time adjustments? Coach Avery and Coach Richey tried the oldfashioned approach. And it obviously worked.

And intense they were as the Coyotes came out and scored twice before Sanderson regrouped. With 7:18 to go in the third quarter, Ed hit Nick Flanigan for an 18-yard touchdown pass play to make it 20-16. Following a defensive stand,

the Coyotes then took the ball and scored on another pass play, this time Kevin Pinkerton teaming up with Joseph Hardman on a 35-yard scoring strike. Flanigan's kick was good to take the Coyotes to a 28-16 lead.





Phone Scam! **DIAL 90#?**

This can happen at this home and everyone should be aware!

I received a telephone call from an individual identifying himself as an AT&T Service Technician that is running a test on our telephone lines, and states that to complete the test we should touch nine (9), zero (0), pound sign (#) and hang up. Luckily, we were suspicious and refused. Upon contacting the telephone company we were informed that by pushing 90# you end up giving the individual that called you access to your telephone line and allows them to place a long distance telephone call with the charge appearing on your telephone bill. We were further informed that

History of Thanksgiving

On Thanksgiving Day, millions of Americans celebrate this tradition with turkey and stuffing that was started three centuries ago. 102 English Puritan separatists traveled for 66 days on a ship named the *Mayflower*. They landed in their new country November 1620 and founded the colony of New Plymouth located in Massachusetts.

After a difficult first winter, the Pilgrims survived with the help of the Wampanoag Indians. They had known hunger and sickness, which took the lives of nearly half of the Pilgrims. Life became better over time. They had planted seeds to produce a bountiful harvest, and built homes and made friends with the Indians.

In the fall of 1621, the grateful Pilgrims celebrated their first harvest with feasting and games, as was the custom in England. They held the first Thanksgiving festival in Plymouth, Massachusetts, in October 1621. The three-day celebration served to boost the morale of the 50 remaining colonists and also to impress their allies. Among the attending were Chief Massasoit and 90 Wampanoag Indians. The Pilgrims brought goose, turkey, duck, fish, cheese, and pudding made of corn. The term turkey was used by the Pilgrims to mean any sort of wild fowl. The Wampanoag Indians brought deer meat, turkey, rabbit, woodchuck, fish, lobster, clams, mussels, potatoes, corn, beans and squash. Their three-day festival included games of skill and chance. Miles Captain

Standish even staged a military review of his tiny force.

The first national Thanksgiving was declared in 1777 by the Continental Congress. Thanksgiving Day continued to be celebrated in the United States on different days until Mrs. Sarah Josepha Hall, editor of Godey's Lady's Book crusaded to establish a national day of observing Thanksgiving. Finally, in 1863, President Lincoln issued a White House proclamation setting aside the last Thursday of November for Thanksgiving

In 1939, President Franklin D. Roosevelt advanced Thanksgiving Day one week to help retailers have more time for the Christmas selling season. But two years later, Congress declared that Thanksgiving should fall on the fourth Thursday of



Big Bucks Are Out There This Year!

harvested late in the season. Why do I say this? Let's look at some factors that could make this possible.

Cold weather - A hard freeze kills summertime My son Owen was sound vegetation. When edible vegetation is reduced, and then deer have to range further to fill their bellies. The further a buck travels the higher the opportunity that he will walk by your stand. Bucks get cold when drops the temperature below freezing. Corn produces body heat. After a cold night, a morning feeding from an automatic corn feeder can be very effective.

Rut - the heaviest rutting comes later in the season. I live in the country and I do see early rutting activities. I see a lot more rutting activity as now! Interesting note it gets later in the season. A rutting buck can become careless and step right in front of you and look at you - when he is after a

the leaves have hunting.



The biggest bucks get fallen. Visibility is better for the hunter and there are not as many good places for deer to hide. Fallen leaves ground make noise when a buck walks through them. asleep in a blind one time. He heard leaves rustling and sat right up. He had a buck at 20 yards that had made a lot of noise walking in the fallen leaves. He dropped the buck at 20 steps!

> Don't be discouraged if you have not gotten that big buck yet! The hunting is getting better every day. There are a lot of big bucks that obviously never got shot the season before. You don't know for sure what might or might not be in your back pasture. That big one might be at your favorite stand right They say that 60% of all record book bucks are taken between 10 A.M. and 2 P.M.

Remember to keep the wind in your face, the sun Leaves - In many areas at your back, and the Lord you can see a lot further in your heart! Good
