

### Use Polish Base To Protect Nails

Manicure fingernails with more gentleness and edit the tasks they perform, if you want to coax more growth from stubby tips.

When you file, use the coarse side of an emery board merely to shape tips and smooth edges. This let alone, sides of nails will grow out square and strong. When you polish, if you'll use your fingers to use coat first, you'll strengthen tips.

Then stop using nails to tug on a girde or dial a phone—two celebrated causes of casualties. Using the cushions of your fingers to jockey a girde will spare both nails and rubber. Keeping a pencil handy for dialing a phone will spare one nail tip from cracking, and using other mechanical aids for opening up things will save many more.

### President Moves To Help Postwar GI's

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—(AP)—President Roosevelt acted yesterday to give war veterans a better break in obtaining government jobs when peace comes.

He issued an order which has the effect of "freeing" hundreds of temporary civil service employees in that status. It affects those appointed before March 16, 1942.

Permanent appointments to government jobs were stopped in March, 1942. Persons taken on since then have been put on a war service basis.

Although these non-permanent employees will have a chance to compete in examinations for positions to be continued after the war, returning veterans will be given preference.

The President in a statement issued along with his one paragraph executive order said that one of the primary purposes of the civil service commission's war service regulations was to "insure that positions which were not already filled on a permanent basis would not be so filled until veterans could have an equal opportunity with others to compete for them."

### M-m-m! Cookies That Are Tops For Christmas

The Christmas season would be incomplete without the delicious fragrance of mother's cookies baking. A few of these tasty sweets will never reach the cookie jar! Many, however, will be hidden away for holiday entertainment or gaily wrapped and sent off as Christmas gifts.

Don't forget—that boy at camp hasn't outgrown his taste for cookies, either! A boxful at Christmas time, besides being a welcome gift, will remind him of home and give him a share in the family's holiday celebration.

Jessie Alice Cline, home economist suggests Brownies and Mince-meat Cookies (see recipes below) because they're especially popular with men and may be mailed more satisfactorily. Both may be made with brown sugar, in case the white sugar is scarce. The shortening in these recipes is lard—a plentiful, economical fat which makes delicious cookies stay fresh longer.

Here are a few hints on packing the cookies. Wrap individually in waxed paper. Fill the box full, so they won't jostle and break. Use a strong box with plenty of outer wrapping. Of course, an airtight metal container is best. If the cookies have far to travel, choose the kinds that keep best. And by the way, be sure to send enough, so GI Joe can pass them around and still have a few left for himself!

1 1/2 cup flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 cup chopped nuts  
2 squares chocolate.  
2 eggs  
1 cup sugar  
1 teaspoon vanilla

Sift flour once, measure, add salt and sift again. Cream lard until soft; add warm melted chocolate and stir until thoroughly blended. Beat whole eggs until very light and fluffy; add sugar, a small amount at a time, beating after each addition. Add egg mixture to chocolate mixture; fold in flour, nuts and vanilla. Bake in shallow oiled pan for 25 to 30 minutes at 250 degrees F. Cool and cut into squares.

**MINCEMEAT DROP COOKIES**  
3/4 cups flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup chopped pecans  
1/2 cup lard  
1 1/2 cups brown sugar  
3 eggs  
1 1/2 tablespoons hot water  
1 9-oz. pkg. dry mince-meat  
2 teaspoons vanilla

Sift flour, measure, and sift again with soda and salt. Combine chopped nuts with flour mixture. Cream lard and sugar thoroughly. Add eggs one by one. Beat. Break up mince-meat and add alternately with dry ingredients to creamed mixture. Add vanilla. Drop from teaspoon onto cookie sheet; bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F) for 15 minutes.

ordinance was not acted on at this week's commission meeting due to lack of a quorum. He also explained the controversy over the type of plumbing.

"Local plumbing contractors," he said, "maintain that in this particular section of the country where houses settle, lead plumbing will give, while cast iron plumbing does not give, but instead has a tendency to break and cause trouble."

NHA authorities say need of lead in other channels of the war effort does not permit the use of this critical material in residential construction right now.

NHA Regional Representative Tufts said normally such applications, as the one made to NHA today, are acted upon in 10 days or two weeks. The next step would be for contractors to make their applications for priorities before the federal housing administration in Port Worth.

Tom Poore, NHA field representative for West Texas, said the NHA application had been held up until the present because the war manpower commission had to ascertain a demand for housing in that area.

George Noble, regional director of the war production board, said that at a meeting at Dallas with a delegation from Pampa early this week it was found that housing was one of the problems in attempting to increase the production of carbon black in the Pampa area. There are some 30 or 40 carbon black plants within a radius of 50 miles, Noble explained. More housing was deemed essential in increasing the available labor; and, said Noble, "we are keeping hot after it."

Noble said he understood that one of the questions that arose in connection with the housing proposal involved materials. Pampa city authorities, under their building code, were insisting on lead pipe for the houses, Noble said, whereas minimum standards of NHA did not call for lead.

On that point, Poore said the minimum standards were imposed by the war production board, which did not permit the use of critical material in residential construction. He added that the City Manager de Cordova, had been advised accordingly and that the city manager said city authorities would consider the question of waiving the requirements under their building code.

According to Poore, the city of Pampa once had removed their standards, then resumed them, and now, to carry out the proposed housing project, "it will be necessary to change to minimum standards."

Tufts said that was not an immediate problem, that "the builders and city will have to work it out."

scarcely 12 hours after reporting about 60 China-based B29's effectively bombed an aircraft plant at Mukden, Manchuria. Two attacking planes were lost. At least 15 and possibly 22 interceptors were shot down.

Eleven or more Japanese aircraft were knocked out in dogfights over the newly completed U. S. airstrip on Mindoro Island. Twenty-nine Japanese planes attacked the field, 130 B-29's were shot down.

American bombers patrolling from the Central Philippines to Borneo sank four enemy coastal freighters and damaged ten other surface craft ranging in tonnage to 6,000 ton freighter-transport. Five Japanese planes were wiped out.

Two island, 750 miles south of Tokyo and 200 miles from Saigon, was bombed for the thirteenth successive day as Japan showed increasing alarm over air strikes. The diet prepared to meet Sunday, ready to adjourn to air raid shelters at the first sound of air raid sirens. Japanese trains began changing the tones on their whistles to avoid confusion with recently blown air raid sirens. Chungking said large numbers of laborers were conscripted to move more war industries from the home islands to Manchuria.

Tokyo reported a wholesale shake-up in the puppet Manchurian army. Japanese reinforcements were rushed into Hochin, central China town threatened by attacking Chinese armies moving toward Luichow. Former U. S. air base.

Enemy broadcasts announced the death of the 81st Japanese admiral since May 1 and claimed the sinking of an Allied submarine.

British infantrymen pursuing remnants of three Japanese divisions down the Burma railway advanced eight miles, virtually unopposed and occupied Kawlin, 127 miles north of Mandalay. Other front dispatches added new indications of a general Japanese withdrawal from North Burma toward Manalay. On the southern front, Allied naval forces shelled the enemy base at Ratha-daung.

Joy to the world! The Lord is come!  
Let earth receive her King.  
Let every heart prepare Him room,  
And Heaven and nature sing.  
It was thus that Isaac Watts wrote in the nineteenth century. "Behold I bring you tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people." Those are universal words, and the angels might have added to all people, of every time.  
Jesus brings joy because He saves from sin. Broken and discouraged men and women, who had lost heart and hope, have found new life as they have looked to Him. "Joy shall be in heaven," said Jesus, "over one sinner that repenteth." But there is joy in the soul of the sinner himself. Nor need we think of sin in terms of guilt, degrading, befouling character and actions, when we stress the joy of redemption. There are respectable sins of pride and pharisaism, and intolerance, that are none the less against God and against man, and hurt. He who is a sinner, who is at least conscious of sin, in alienating him from God and man, and in limiting his life's outlook and work.

That universal joy was first proclaimed in the carol of the angels, heard by the shepherds in the field: "Behold I bring you tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people." Those are universal words, and the angels might have added to all people, of every time.  
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Paul was such a sinner, zealous, living in all good conscience, but in his blind devotion persecuting his fellowmen, hateful instead of loving, holding the garments of those who stoned Stephen to death. Is it any wonder that Paul, after his conversion writes a great deal about joy? He knew the joy of having his spiritual blindness removed. He wrote of "joy unspeakable and full of glory." Why should he not? It was the joy of a great, overwhelming experience.

"We know that we have passed from death into life, because we love the brethren." It was John who wrote those words, but they accord with the words in which Paul described the same rich experience. "If any man be in Christ he is a new creature; old things have passed away, all things have become new." And this stresses the positive joy that Christ brings. It is joy not only in what the Christ saves us from, but in what He saves us to, "I am come," said He, "that they might have life, and may have it more abundantly." The joy that Christ brings is in the consciousness of a right direction of living in the sense of life as worth while, and of life at its best as the working out of God's plan. Here there is no defeatism, no apathy, no halfheartedness. Life is a daily prayer, and what a prayer! Daily bread is the sustenance of great endeavor and great goals the Kingdom of God, and the making of earth as heaven.

There will be joy in this Christmas season; but how much of it will be the truest and highest joy of all? My heart goes out to the thousands in America today who are seeking joy in ways of escape in noise and excitement, and intoxication. Poor souls! They don't realize that they are seeking escape from life, instead of accepting life and finding its deepest joys. To them Jesus says as He said to those of old, "Ye will not come unto me that ye might have life." Perhaps some will heed, and find their part in this universal joy, "Joy to the world, the Lord is come!"

## Harvesting Expected To Go Into New Year

WHEELER, Dec. 22—It is expected that harvesting of the cotton and feed crops around Wheeler will extend far into the new year, principally on account of the shortage of help.

The past three or four sunny days have aided the farmers greatly in getting the cotton out of the fields.
