Poinsettias, one of the popular holiday most can cause skin plants. severe irritation and stomach symptoms. Holly and mistletoe berries are poisonous, so be on the lookout for berries that fall to the floor.

Keep these poisonous holiday plants out of reach: amaryllis, azalea, boxwood, Christmas cherry, Christmas rose, crown of thorns,

English and American Ivy and mountain laurel.

PUBLIC NOTICE

The Borden County Commissioners Court will be accepting resumes until December 29, 1999 from persons interested in the appointment to the office of Justice of the Peace for Borden County. Resumes are to be turned in to the County Judge's Office by 5:00 p.m., December 29, 1999. The resumes will be reviewed by the Commissioners and the appointment will take place at the Commissioners Court meeting on January 10, 2000. This appointment will be from the date of the appointment until the next succeeding General Election, November 7, 2000.

To be eligible for this appointment a candidate must meet all the requirements for public office and be able to devote one day per week to be in the office at the Courthouse in Gail. Texas. Persons can contact Judge Van York for any further questions about this appointment.

Persons interested in running for the unexpired term of the Justice of the Peace must file with their appropriate political party by January 3, 2000. The eligibility requirements for public office in Texas are:

- 1. be a United States Citizen;
- 2. be 18 years of age;
- 3. have not been determined mentally incompetent by a final judgement of a court;
- 4. have not been finally convicted of a felony;
- 5. have resided continuously in the state for 12 months an in the county for 6 months.

The Borden County Commissioners Court has passed the following order restricting the use of fireworks in an unincorporated area of Borden County.

- A. No person may sell, detonate, ignite, or in any way use certain restricted fireworks in the town section of Gail, Texas, an unincorporated area of Borden County.
- B. A person commits an offense if the person knowingly or intentionally violates a prohibition established by this order. An offense under this order is a Class C Misdemeanor.
- C. Certain restricted fireworks means only those items classified under 49 C.F.R. par. 173.100 (r)(2) (10-1-86 addition), as "skyrockets with sticks" and "missiles with fins."
- D. Fireworks not prohibited under this order are:
 - 1. Common fireworks, small in size classified as Class C explosives
 - 2. Large fireworks devices designed primarily to produce visible or audible effects by combustion, deflagration, or detonation and classified as Class B explosive by U.S. Dept. of Trans. V.A.T.S. Ins. Code, Art. 5.43-4, Sec. 1(2).

A. A person commits an offense if he or she sells or intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly detonates, ignites, or in any way use fireworks on a county road or in the right-of-way on a county road. B. An offense under this Order is a Class C Misdemeanor punishable by a fine up to \$500.00
