They Would Kill Privare Schools

people were in possession of limited and identical data and were indoctrinated with a single philosophical doctrine. They would act and think alike under every form

The rulers of the dictatorship would have no problem in controlling their jurisdiction since they could having complete knowledge of what was in the minds of the people—predict the attitude of the subject citizens and foretell any "dangerous" tendencies.

This was the goal of Hitler in the Fascist schools of Germany and it is an almost accomplished goal in the intellectually sterile regions of Russia and its satel-

The process of achieving this condition is a simple one. You take the children of the nation in their earliest school years and you drill a steady stream of instruction into their brains. You make it compulsory for them to go to certain schools and you keep a strict control on the curriculum taught.

Your "robot citizen" will not be perfect in the first or perhaps even the second or third generation but by the fourth generation you should have a one-thought citizenry completely unaware there is any other philosophy than the one imposed.

The public school system in America has been working on this schedule for a good many years. It has not completely succeeded in achieving the "onethought" citizen in the United States because of some 'unfortunate" circumstances.

One of these apparently is the private school system that exists in the country — supported by people who are forced to pay taxes for the public schools but still make the additional financial sacrifice for schools operated on principles in which they believe.

At a recent meeting in Boston of the American Association of School Administrators it developed that war is to be declared on the private schools.

Led by, of all persons, Dr. James B. Conant, president of Harvard University, the attack declares that the growth of private schools in this country is "harmful" to American democracy.

Says this gentleman whose string of degrees would tongue-tie a radio announcer, "The greater the proportion of our youth who attend independent schools, the greater the threat to our democratic unity Now this is unmitigated balderdash.

A democratic Republic thrives and creates energy by the conflict of ideas and opinions. The independent

school is bound to be a contributing factor to the stimulation of ideas — and this stimulation is the only quarantee against stagnation of thought. The Association of School Administrators — and

there was not one but several talks by leading school men in opposition to private schools — is advocating a form of thought control that is abhorrent to the American These people are becoming so entrenched in their

position, so rich with the largesse heaped upon them by a gullible people that they are becoming amazingly brazen in their defense of an educational monopoly. They are reaching for power to determine what the fundamental beliefs of future generations will be, and

to achieve this goal they are striving for the death of They are certainly attacking freedom of education, and if they are successful in their fight they will automatically kill freedom of religion and freedom of con-

science since they will dictate the precepts from which religion and morals are learned. They would ban by law any private school that you

might pick for your child.

They have had the custody of the children so long, they have forgotten that the primary responsibility for the education of children lies with the fathers and mothers and they think that the State is a god.

These pedagogues would create a nation of robots. They have well nigh a monopoly on the machinery of training right now. Let them kill the private schools and their monopoly will be complete. Give them a generation of such thought control and they will mould the nation into "one-thought" automatons. Give them a century and they will have destroyed the integrity of man-

Typical Red Tactics

Outlook for negotiations with the Russians over the German question is that it will be a long-drawn-out affair, Russians have sent two notes to the U.S., Britain and France on German unity and peace treaty. The three western powers have made one reply and are now drafting their second.

This swapping of notes can go on for a long time, since the Russians don't say anything new. They just voice their old proposals a little differently.

Russian proposals have such an appeal to many elements in Germany, however, that they can't just be kissed off as a trick. If they were mishandled, they might wreck the plans to integrate Germany with western Europe. Breaking up this alliance is exactly what the Russians are trying to do by their proposals to neutralize Germany as a buffer state between the Iron Curtain and the West.

> I believe this because I have a basic faith in God, and because I kind to grow, to learn through experience to learn by making midakes, and thus to build a better world. The early American relied on God and received direction from within. He did not need coercion from the State. These pioneers kept government at a distance, and severely carbed the range of a release of human energy as the world had never witnessed before. The new type of representative government they established was built on the solid rock of individual dignity, responsibility and independence set forth by Moses, and codified in the Ten Commandments. It was taught and practiced by Jesus. And in all their teachings we find nothing to suggest that we set apart any of our fellow creatures and delegate to them authority to control the life, liberty or property of another. They did not appoint certain individuals as gods over God.

So much for contrast between the two systems. Now lets look at the human angle, at man's frailties and shortcomings.

I have some acquaintances who are socialists. I have others who would disavow being socialists but strongly argue in favor of government planning for our economic Some of these people are just plain stupid; on the other hand, some are highly intelligent and, I believe, completely sincere. They all point to a standard set of reasons (which seem significant to them) why the capitalistic system is unsound, reactionary, and unfair. Here they are:

(1) Unfair wages, hours, and working conditions. (2) Injustice - some people make too much, some too little,

(3) Unfair trade practices. (1) Discrimination between em-

The answer, of course, it that the capitalistic system, as conceived by our forefathers, never existed with such complete freedom for mankind prior to the birth of the United States. Yet the world has experienced just such periods of prosperity and depression from the beginnings of recorded history. Surely the permission of maximum human endeavor does not cause such cycles. Human fears could well prove to be the real cause. And fear has long been the order of the day under old world governmental restrictions, during wars, and under state controls over mankind. Government interference with the normal market economy is no phenomenon of recent origin. Perhaps all of us should reas again "The Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire."

In conclusion, I return to my friend, the preacher, I must now answer his question about whether he should drop the study of economics and stick to religion.

I know now that I was wrong assuming quickly that he should stick to his religious field. I think my preacher friend, and all other spiritual leaders in this land of ours, should study economics. I think they should seek unceasingly to learn all they can about the whole of human behavior, economic as well as spiritual.

I believe, too, that businessmen should not limit their study to that relatively small segment of life that has to do with human behavior in the market place. I think businessmen, like the clergy, should broaden their horizons and, joining together, proclaim throughout the land that God intended men to be free to make their own decisions and to be responsible for the consequences of those decisions. We should all proclaim that it is an act against God for men to pass laws which destroy individual liberty, which deprive persons of responsibility for their own acts

or their own welfare. As Ben Morrell, Chairman of the Jones & Laughlin said recently ". . . let us resolve that henceforth we shall never again render unto Caesar those things that are God's, for that is precisely what we do when we yield to political rulers the power to administer moral law."

Let us resolve instead that each one of us, every man, shall recognize his rights as God-given, exercise them in his own good conscience, and stand steadfast in heir defense as his most priceless


