Four Coyotes Named to All-State Football Team

There were four members of the Borden County football team named to the 6-Man Coaches All State Football Team. This team is voted on by the Coaches of 6-Man football, and to be eligible to be nominated you have to be a first team All Region member. This is a very high honor and the team members truly depict the best talent in the state. We are honored to have four members of the Borden County football team to be on this highly coveted team.

Colt McCook was selected for the second year in a row First Team All State quarterback. McCook finished the year completing 107 of 193 passes for 2059 yards. He threw 10 interceptions and 34 touchdowns. Colt ran the ball 56 times for 504 yards and 3 touchdowns.

Fernando Baeza was selected to the First Team for the second year in a row. This year he was First Team All State Runningback. Last year he was chosen to the First Team on the defensive side of the ball at safety. Baeza is running with a good crowd here as other First

Team Runningbacks are Damian Jackson from Trinidad, and Jeremy Holt from Silverton. Baeza ran the ball 175 times for 1622 yards and 33 touchdowns. He also caught the ball 39 times for 620 yards and 10 touchdowns.

Ryan Grant was selected as First Team All State defensive end for the second year in a row. Grant had 25 assisted tackles, 91 unassisted tackles, had 5 fumble recoveries, 8 caused fumbles, 12 quarterback hurries, and 15 sacks. Grant is also in a good crowd as other First Teamers include Demond Smith of Trinidad, and Dusty Crump of Groom.

Colt Miller was selected Second Team All State Linebacker. Miller was basically overlooked last season for post season honors, but not this year. Miller's defensive play has always raised coaches eyebrows and this year he received the honors he deserves. Miller had 49 assisted tackles, and 78 unassisted tackles. He had 4 interceptions, and 4 fumble recoveries.

DISTRICT PLAY OPENS

Coyotes Complete Sweep While Making History Manhandling the Mustangs

Three down and one to go, that was the battle cry for the Coyotes entering their district opener against the Sands Mustangs Friday night. That's exactly what the situation was, Borden County had already won the first three contests of the evening with one contest remaining, the varsity boys game. Throw in the fact that this was the district opener, in Sands, and the fact that the Borden Coyotes had not beaten the Mustangs in Ackerly in over ten years themselves let alone had the Borden County Basketball teams swept the Mustangs either. Sources said after the game, that the feat had not been accomplished in fifty years. Fifty years, that is older than not only any kid that contributed to this history making evening, but that is also older than probably more than 75% of the fans that watched the game Friday night. So, you could say, there wasn't any pressure at all on the young men from Coyote land. You just go out and do something that has never been done. Throw in the fact, that the Mustangs beat the Coyote football team by one point to take the district championship from the Coyotes earlier this year. so as you can see, the Borden County - vs - Sands basketball game was not your typical basketball game.

The Coyotes wasted little time in giving the themselves faithful belief that the fifty year drought was going to come to a close Friday, as they used some early offensive firepower to jump out to a commanding 21 to 12 lead. The Coyotes got points from four different players

as Justin Lawrence accounted for 6 points, Colt McCook knocked down 7 points, Jeff Dennis added 6 and Fernando Baeza hit a bucket as well.

The early 9 point lead the Coyotes gained was as close as the Mustangs would ever be to the Coyotes throughout the rest of the contest. In the 2nd quarter the Coyotes built as much as an 18 point lead only to see the Mustangs battle back to 11 to give a score of 37 to 26 in favor of the Coyotes.

The Coyotes continued there early domination in the 3rd quarter as they once again built as much as a 19 point lead, but you have to give the Mustangs credit, because they kept coming back at the Coyotes and would not allow the Coyote fans to celebrate the history making day just yet. After three periods of play the Coyotes held a comfortable 55 to 40 lead. With just 8 minutes to go before a fifty year drought would end, the Coyotes began to play a little timid. Considering the circumstances surrounding this game, the tightness and timid play was very understandable. As the final minutes ticked away it was obvious to everyone that history was being made. It marked the first time that Borden County swept all four games: JV Girls & Boys and Varsity Girls and Boys. The final score was Borden County 66, Sands 53.

The Lady Coyotes were anxiously awaiting this game because they went to Sands to open the season last year only to be defeated. The pressure was on to see if they could break a long losing spell in the Sands gym. The Lady Coyotes still missing some of their players had all the confidence in themselves to start the district on a winning note. With the Lady Coyotes opening the game with the tip going in their favor only to let it slip out of bounds allowed the Lady Mustangs to have the first shot at 2 points. The Lady Mustangs turned the ball over to the Lady Coyotes that scored the

first points of the game. with a free throw, which they made 4 for 6 from there. They added 7 field goals to the 6 free throws for a total of 18 points in the first quarter. Stop the Spread of Colds

With winter weather comes to cold and flu season. You can get a cold any time of the year, but more colds occur during the "cold season," which is late winter through early spring. The common cold is the most frequent infection in all age groups in the United States. Colds are caused by any one 200 viruses and they have no cure. Children usually get 6-10 colds a year, while adults get slightly fewer.

During the winter months people spend more time together, indoors, with some form of centralized heating, closer contact with others, and warm, dry air, which can dry the nose and throat tissue, add up to the perfect environment for viral infection.

Don't let the common cold get you down! You can lower your risk for getting a cold by taking a few precautions.

^Eat well and get plenty of rest and exercise - Take good care of yourself to keep up your resistance to colds before the cold season begins.

^Use disposable tissues - Always try to cover your mouth when coughing or sneezing, preferable with a tissue, then dispose of the tissue immediately to reduce the spread of germs

in the air or through physical contact.

^Wash your hands often - Colds are usually spread through physical contact with an infected person or something they've touched.

^Stop Smoking - Smokers and those who live with them are more susceptible to colds because smoke can irritate the lungs and nose.

^Breast feed babies - Studies show that babies who are breast fed have fewer and milder colds.

There is no known medication that will cure the common cold. There are, however, drugs that may help relieve the uncomfortable symptoms. But, with so many choices

today, how do you know which drug to choose? Here are a few definitions that may be helpful in making your decision.

Antihistamines are drugs that dry up a runny nose and relieve sneezing. They should not be used when congested because they can thicken mucus making it more difficult to drain.

Pain Relievers (e.g., acetaminophen, ibuprofen, naproxen, aspirin) pain, headache, and fever. Never give a child age under age 20 aspirin because it can cause a serious illness.

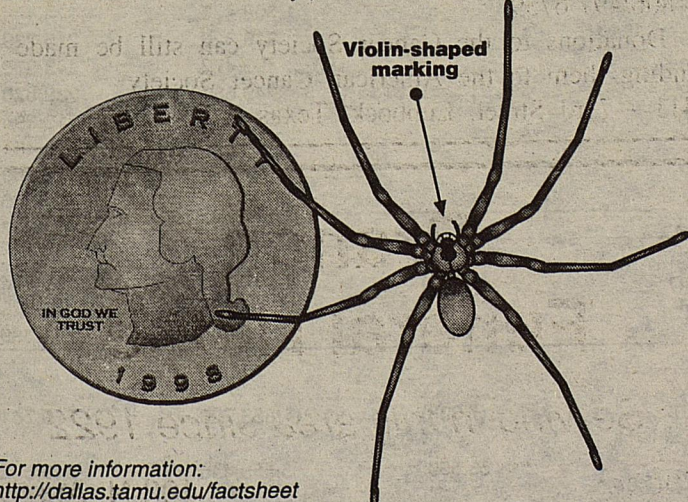

Identification: Look for a dark brown, violin-shaped marking on the head. The body is tan to light brown. Full-grown spiders can range from a quarter to a half-dollar in size. They prefer dark, hidden places.

“State of the Arts” license plate becomes Texas’ top-selling specialty plate

Texans love this state. And, they show their pride every chance they get. According to figures from the Texas Department of Transportation, the “State of the Arts” license plate has surpassed the standard personalized license plate as Texas’ fastest selling specialty plate.

The Texas Commission on the Arts (TCA), which developed the State of the Arts plate as a means of raising money to promote the Texas Cultural Endowment Fund, sold on average 456 plates per month from December 1997 through October 1998. Texans purchased on average 299 personalized plates over the same period. TCA has sold more

than 13,800 plates since the State of Arts place was introduced in 1995.

You have probably seen the plate. It resembles the Texas state flag with a white star embedded in a blue background, the word “Texas” and the five-character license plate number in the white stripe, and “State of the Arts” written across the bottom in the red stripe.

“Although the plate was developed to help support the arts and culture of Texas, we realize that many of the purchases are made because of the plate design itself,” said Gaye Greever McElwain, TCA’s administrator of marketing. “Texas is a state filled with extremely proud

citizens, and anything that symbolizes our pride – in this case, a license plate that resembles the Texas flag – is highly popular.”

To help offset public contributions to the arts, the Texas Cultural Endowment Fund was established in 1993 under house bill 2223 as a public/private initiative to provide TCA with a stable funding source for the enhancement of the performing, visual and literary arts, as well as art education.

TCA hopes to raise \$200 million for the Fund by 2005 from a variety of sources, including the license plate program. If TCA can achieve this goal, it will allow the Commission to be financially independent, ending the need for taxpayer dollars. The \$200 million Fund also would boost Texas’

per capita spending from the current \$.18 to \$.52. Texas ranks 55th among the 50 states and six U.S. territories in per capita spending on the arts.

“We couldn’t be more pleased with the number of Texans interested in the plate,” said John Paul Batiste, TCA’s executive director. “Our job is to encourage all Texans and visitors to experience what our state has to offer in terms of art and culture, and our license plate program has provided a highly successful financial mechanism to continue our efforts.”

The State of Arts specialty plates are available for \$25 each (\$20 goes to promote the Texas Cultural Endowment Fund and \$5 reimburses the Texas Department of Transportation’s cost of produce

the plate.) For an additional \$40, Texans may personalize the specialty plates using up to five characters.

TCA was organized in 1965 by the Texas Legislature to develop a receptive climate for the arts in Texas. TCA provides funding and other supportive measures, such as arts education and cultural tourism programs, for a variety of arts-related activities, including visual and literary arts, film and multi-media, music, dance and theater.
