Moves One Step Closer to \$25,000 College Scholarship

John Wilson, a 6th grade student at Borden County School, won the school-level competition of the National Geography Bee on January 12, 1999 and a chance at a \$25,000 college scholarship. school-level Bee, at which students answered questions on geography, was the first round in the eleventh annual National Geography Bee. The Bee is sponsored by the National Geographic Society and ONE, which BANK operates more than 1,500 banking centers in 12 states and is the largest credit-card issuer in the nation. This year, BANK ONE is giving each school that registers for the Bee a one-year membership in the Geographic National Society, which includes a subscription to NATIONAL GEOGRAPHIC magazine.

The kickoff for this year's Bee was the week of November 30, with thousands of schools around the United States and in five U.S. territories participating. The school winners, including John Wilson, will now take a written test; up to 100 of the top scores in each state

territory will be eligible to compete in their state Bee April 9.

The National Geographic Society and BANK ONE will provide an allexpenses paid trip to Washington, D.C., for state champions and teacher-escorts to participate in the National Geographic Bee National Championship on May 25 and 26. The first-place national winner will receive a \$25,000 college scholarship.

Alex Trebek, host of "Jeopardy!" will moderate the national finals on May 26. The program will be produced by Maryland Public Television and will air on PBS stations. Check Cont. to pg. 3



Before bad weather hits:


^Fill your tank early to avoid the winter rush. Ask your propane supplier to familiarize you with your propane equipment, including the location of the regulators and the tank service valve. (See illustra-

^Make sure you have a protective cap or "dome"

covering the regulator and regulator vent on your propane tank. This dome will keep out snow, ice, or rain that might clog the regulator vent. In systems using more than one regulator, or where the protective cover is not in place make certain the exposed regulator's vent is the downward position to keep out moisture. If the regulator vent becomes clogged, a malfunction could possibly occur, resulting in an accident or

Taking Care of Eczema - A Challenge **During Winter Months**

(DM)-The most common type of eczema, atopic dermatitis, affects more than 15 million Americans. Its symptoms include dry, itchy, scaly skin; rashes on the cheeks; redness and inflammation behind the elbows and knees, as well as on the eyelids, neck, hands and wrists. childhood, usually in infancy.

· Cover more of your skin to stay warm. Dress in layers, but avoid irritating fabrics, such as wool and some synthetics.



Take time to relax. Higher stress levels triggered by social and workrelated events often lead to flare-ups.


Stick to your usual moisturizing plan, even when hectic schedules or inclement weather intrude on your daily routine.

 Bathe as needed to soothe any discomfort. Remember the "Three Minute Rule" – applying moisturizer within the first three minutes after a bath improves penetration by as much as 10 times.
