Atlee, minister of labor Ernest Bevin, home secretary Herbert Morrison and other labor leaders, now at a labor party conference at Blackpool, were expected to hand over their seats to office to the King by Monday.

Rev. William Stack, pastor of the Holy Souls Catholic church will give the benediction.

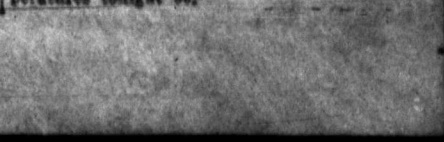

military basis.

In the battle of Okinawa on Japan's southern doorstep, U. S. marines and infantrymen struggling through knee deep mud, bent back both flanks of the enemy defense line and fought off piercing counter-attacks in the center.

Strong air support in other theaters helped infantrymen drive forward ten miles in the southern Philippines, inch ahead on northern Philippines fronts, and push closer to two Japanese-held former U. S. air bases in China.

The record fire bomb attack on Tokyo was only one sign of things in store for the Japanese. More than a million tons of war cargo were diverted through Europe to the Pacific before May 10. "Tough and realistic" training was promised to acquaint European veterans with what they will be up against in the Pacific. And extensive retraining of bomber crews to augment B-29 forces was indicated.

Japanese broadcasts admitted fires were still burning in southern Tokyo hours after the last waves of Superforts hit today. Direct hits, some setting off explosions, were reported in the target area, including the Shinjogawa railway marshalling yards through which a third of Japan's rail traffic passes, and one of the most important sections of Nippon's precision instrument and machine tool industry.

High winds spread the fires so that they were visible for 200 miles at sea, double the distance of any of the four previous incendiary raids which have burned over nearly 33 square miles of the enemy capital.

Tokyo reported that fires broke out in the grounds of the Imperial palace and the detached Kawasaki palace. It claimed 27 Superforts were shot down and 30 damaged.

Returning airmen reported they swept through heavy antiaircraft fire to hit the target but encountered only negligible interception. "Fire balls" rushed past the B-29s, but pilots couldn't agree as to whether they were jet planes, suicide piloted "baka bombs" or flares.

Lt. Gen. Releikichi Tada said the only way his countrymen could halt the Americans was with Kamikaze planes and other suicide attacks.

The Nipponese tried these tactics around the keystone fortress of Shuri on Okinawa. The 96th division fought a 48 hour hand grenade and "jo" warfare for possession of one hill and with the aid of 1,600 rounds from supporting mortars broke up an attack by 500 Japanese only after it had gone a half mile through American lines.

ments at Yalta in February and his long experience in dealing with the Russians.

Within the conference, technical committees are making swift progress on the basic Dumbarton Oaks plan of world organization laid down by the sponsoring powers—the United States, Britain, Russia and China.

One committee last night approved provisions conferring on an 11-nation security council "primary responsibility for the maintenance of international peace and security."

But the authority of the great powers within the council, where they will hold five permanent seats, remained a sore point of controversy. The small nations battled the Yalta voting formula requiring that all five should be unanimously agree before the council takes any important action—or even investigates a trouble-threatening situation in the world.

deated that this year's pig crop would fall 5,000,000 head below the government goal.

A factor said to be influencing farmers is the government's price guarantee of \$13 a hundred pounds, which is less than the market price. A committee, terming this insufficient, recommended \$13.50. He undoubtedly will follow the committee recommendation in an effort to attain the hog goal.

Anderson will set policies affecting producer prices of food products, leaving OPA to establish processor and distributor price margins and to carry out rationing programs as outlined by the agriculture department.

ject to senate confirmation, are effective June 30 next, except that of Anderson, who will succeed to the agriculture post when Wickard is confirmed as REA chief.

Future plans of Biddle and Miss Perkins were not known today. Friends of the attorney general, however, said he probably would resume the practice of law if he does not accept a diplomatic post.

Home Demonstration Canning Is Studied

SHAMROCK, May 24—"Steam or scald vegetables to prevent enzyme action which takes place as soon as vegetables are gathered," stated Mrs. V. J. Zeman, county home demonstration agent to the Victory club Friday afternoon at the home of Mrs. George Braxton.

Mrs. Zeman also said that blanching shrinks the food and brightens the green color in vegetables. It further cleans the product and destroys some bacteria.

"Brine pack is desirable because it protects the product on warm days when it is carried to the locker" declared Mrs. Zeman. To make brine solution, four level teaspoons of salt should be dissolved in a quart of water.



Chief Justice James P. Alexander of the Texas supreme court says that a motorist who breaks a traffic law should be punished.

"But he should be given a fair trial in a court of dignity and justice," he adds.

After a citizen has been given the rush in a dingy court, "he can hardly be expected to have much respect for our court system, and therefore has little respect for our laws," Judge Alexander continues.

Texans Who Survived Bombed Carrier Describe the Escape

DALLAS, May 19—(AP)—Three Texans are known to be among the survivors of the bombing of the aircraft carrier Benjamin Franklin by the Japanese March 19.

Lt. (ig) James Graydon Cole, Jr., Killen, was sitting in his plane ready for take-off when the blast threw him into the sea. He is now at the Corpus Christi naval air station.

Lt. Fred Harris, Dallas, was on deck directing plane traffic when the Jap bomb hit. He is now at his home here.

Vernon G. Bowen, seaman second class, Post, was trapped below decks. His rescue was told in a delayed dispatch from the USS Franklin.

"It was just one of those things that couldn't happen—but did," Lieutenant Harris said.

"I had just launched the first few fighters from the flight deck," Harris' story began. "Everything we had aboard was loaded and gassed. We were getting into the bomber section when a single plane came out of a hazy cloud at masthead height—barely missing one of our bombers taking off. She came in too fast for our guns to catch her."

Time and time again, Harris said, he could see men blown into the water by violent explosions.

Bowen and about 300 others were caught in the after mess hall when the Franklin was hit, a navy dispatch reported. They were led to safety by Lt. Donald A. Gary of Oakland, Calif., who risked his life to save them.

"There were about 300 of us in all," Bowen related, "and we thought we'd never get out of there. I prayed all the time I was there."

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Holder of Medal Relates How He Escaped Death
U. S. STRATEGIC AIR FORCE IN EUROPE HQ, May 24—(AP)—Lt. John (Red) Morgan, Amarillo, Texas, eighth airforce bomber pilot and holder of the Congressional Medal of Honor, has described how he escaped death when his flying Fortress exploded at 20,000 feet during the second daylight raid on Berlin, June, 1944.

MORGAN, who spent 14 months in German prison camps, was liberated when the Russians overran Stalag Luft one at Pouch.

MORGAN said he was hurled through the fuselage with his parachute attached beneath his arms, fell more than three miles before he could catch it.

MORGAN said that the four seconds after it popped open he landed on top of a tree. "I fell out of it—about 30 feet—and landed on my feet. It felt like I had busted every bone in me. What a jolt!"

If men and women began their business or artistic careers as unprepared as they do marriage, their careers would necessarily be failures.

Happiness comes not by accident but by intelligent effort and tireless good will and endless hard work.

Not long ago, a young friend of mine brought his fiancée to see me and to make arrangements for their wedding. She told me that she had just finished her long training and she was going to be a nurse.

"You have spent a lot of time and effort and thought at that," I said. "But what preparation have you made for marriage? Have you thought about it?"

"Well, do you?" she asked. "It is going to be a harder job than nursing," I pointed out, "and there aren't any graduation exercises. Your study must go on and on. You two will find that you don't like the same things, you won't enjoy the same people, you are accustomed to spending your leisure time in different ways. Learning to adjust to one another is going to take patience and a lot of good clear thinking."

German Police Have New Role

GERMANY, May 24—(AP)—That whimsical Gilbert and Sullivan line "the policeman's lot is not a happy one" could be applied with a dramatic emphasis to the German civilian police under American military government.

Many of them are still under 70, some perhaps only 50, but along with the old men are some of the American MP's their look singularly old and tired.

One reason for the grandfatherly impression they make as a group is that the Germans put practically every able-bodied man into the army, leaving a rather elderly lot for police duty.

None of these policemen is permitted to carry arms. In some towns they function in the same uniform as before the American occupation, but with the American MG arm band. In most places they work in civilian clothes and the white armband is their only insignia.

The real police power in the American area is military. But there are not enough American security guards to perform all the police tasks so the military government leans on the German civilian police force to maintain order among civilians, including foreigners.

There is where the headaches begin for the unhappy police. Among their fellow Germans they manage fairly well, but to many of the recently liberated foreign workers the German policeman is

my best, and try to get used to thinking of marriage as my real career, my life work.

LIVING is an art. It is not a haphazard, irresponsible experience. Like any art, its technique must be learned, its meaning must be explored.

A clear knowledge of sex and a sense of proportion about it are a protection to every child or young person on the verge of marriage.

When the child begins to question you, answer in terms he will understand. As he grows older, put into his hands some of the competent books which have been written on the subject, an ignorant mind is not an innocent mind.

Sex must not be disregarded. It should not and it cannot be. But if you teach your child from the very start the truth about it, the good and beautiful and natural part it plays in life, the child will grow up without abnormal curiosity or exaggerated carnal appetites. Marriage will then be stabilized and entered upon in a deeper and holier spirit.

ORDINANCE NO. 246
AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE TRANSPORTING OVER OR PARKING ON THE STREETS AND ALLEYS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF PAMPA, TEXAS, OF VEHICLES CONTAINING BUTANE OR LIQUEFIED PETROLEUM GASES AND PRESCRIBING A PENALTY AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

SECTION I
It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to transport over or to park any tank truck or tank trailer containing butane or liquefied petroleum gases upon any of the streets or alleys within the City Limits of the City of Pampa, Texas, except Brown, Frederick, Hobart, Alcock and Wilks Streets. No truck, tank or tank trailer containing butane or liquefied petroleum gases shall be parked on Brown Street within one block of Cuyler.

SECTION II
Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction, be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined in an amount not to exceed \$100.00.

SECTION III
The fact that there does not now exist any rule or ordinance regulating the parking or transporting of liquefied petroleum gases within the corporate limits of the City of Pampa, which said gases are highly volatile and inflammable and if not properly controlled and regulated constitute a dangerous and hazardous condition affecting life and property, creates an emergency and imperative necessity for the immediate preservation of the public welfare and safety, which necessitates the suspension of the rule requiring ordinances to be read on three separate days before the final passage thereof, wherefore such rule is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall be effective from and after its final passage, and it is so ordained.
