 boro, N. J., from Persia with a crew of 40, reported two men missing — the third mate and a seaman.

The collision was the third such tragedy within 10 days in this busy shipping area.

On May 15, two ships collided and burned in the nearby Delaware and Chesapeake canal, killing four men. Last week three men drowned when a freighter and tug smashed together in the Delaware near Chester, Pa.

Tellsen told rescuers he was sleeping below decks on the barge when the collision occurred. "When the terrible crash woke me up I didn't wait to find out what the trouble was," he said. "I jumped out the nearest port hole and swam until I reached the buoy."

"There were flames all around me and I could see other men floating and swimming in the water but I was unable to help them. Pretty soon a tug saw me on the buoy and picked me up."

Tellsen said his barge, captained by John D. Elliott of Collierville, Pa., carried 16,500 barrels of gasoline and was bound from Camden, N. J. to Baltimore.

The river, broadening as it becomes the Delaware Bay a few miles farther south, is about three miles wide at the scene of the collision.

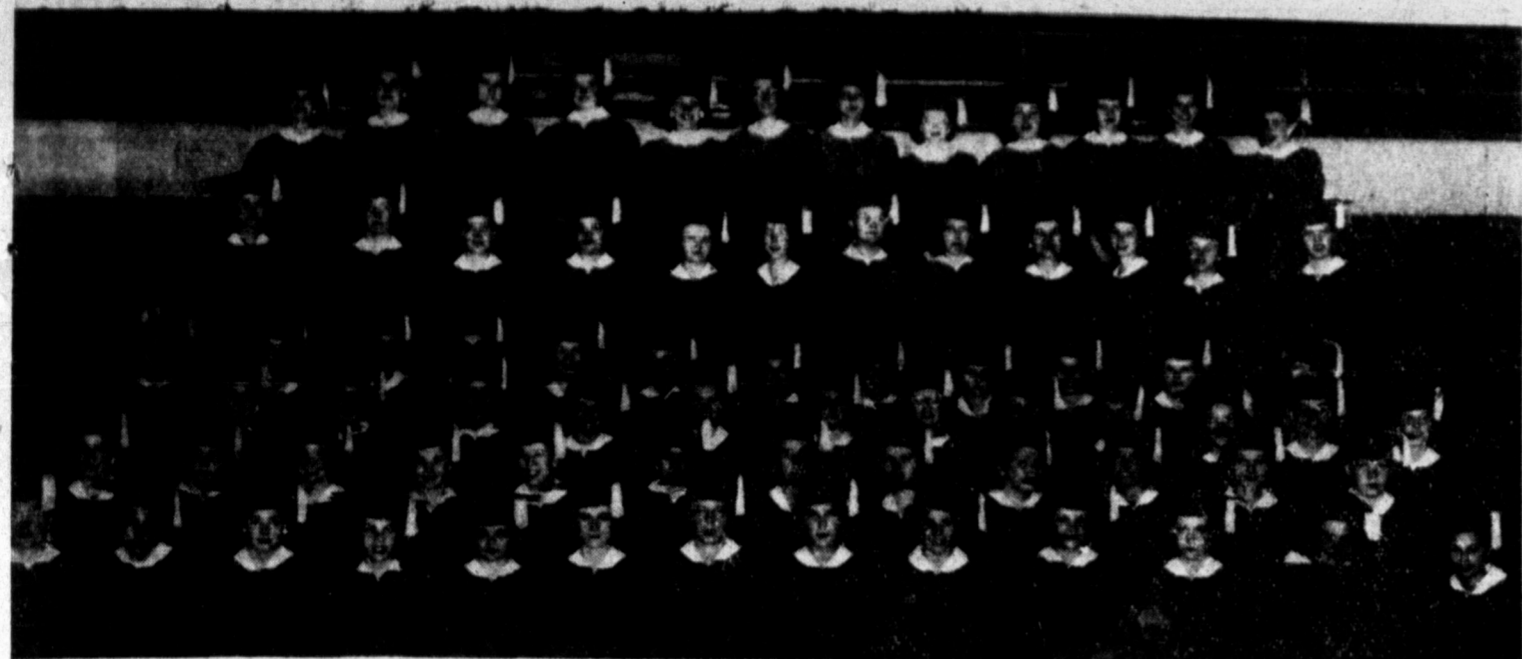

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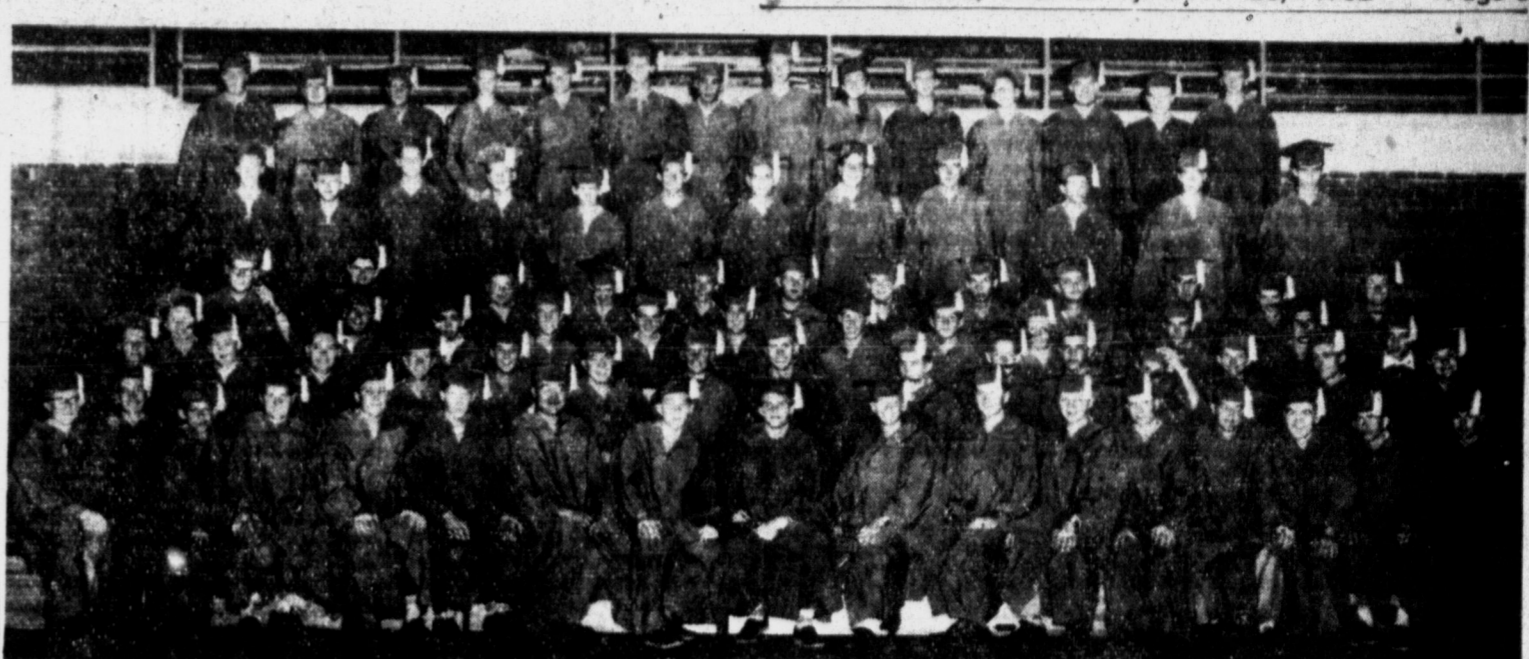

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Flatirons Are Still Used

BOYERTOWN, Pa. — (AP) — One of the oldest iron works in the country still is turning out flatirons for faraway places.

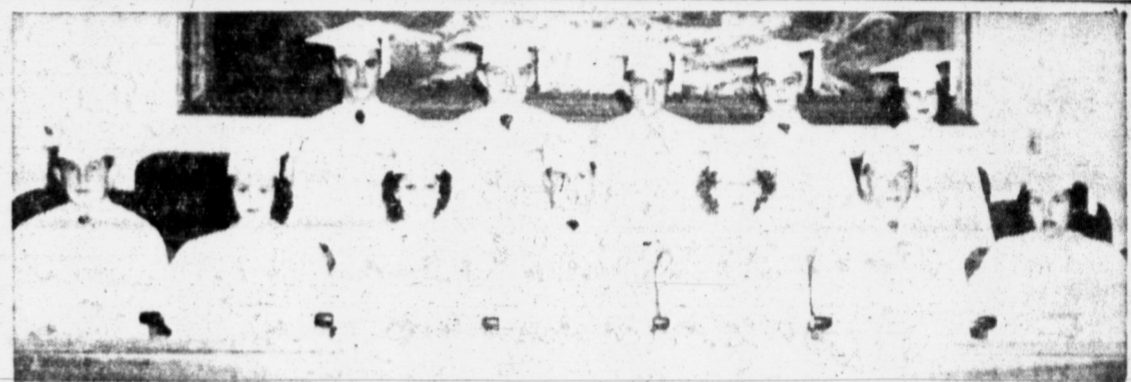
The Colebrookdale Iron Co. was founded in the early 1700's and the blacksmith shop that is still used was one of the original buildings. Until 1929 Colebrookdale's principal product was the old-fashioned iron that must be heated on top of the stove. With the introduction of electrically-heated irons Colebrookdale turned to other products.

But orders still abound for irons from women who live in parts of this country where there is no electrical service, and from many foreign countries. A boom to the flatiron business has been a recent fad to use the irons for door-stops, book ends and desk ornaments.

William B. Keely, head of the firm, recently emptied his warehouse of irons to fill orders from gift shops in New York and other cities. There the irons were painted black and decorated with Pennsylvania - Dutch symbols.

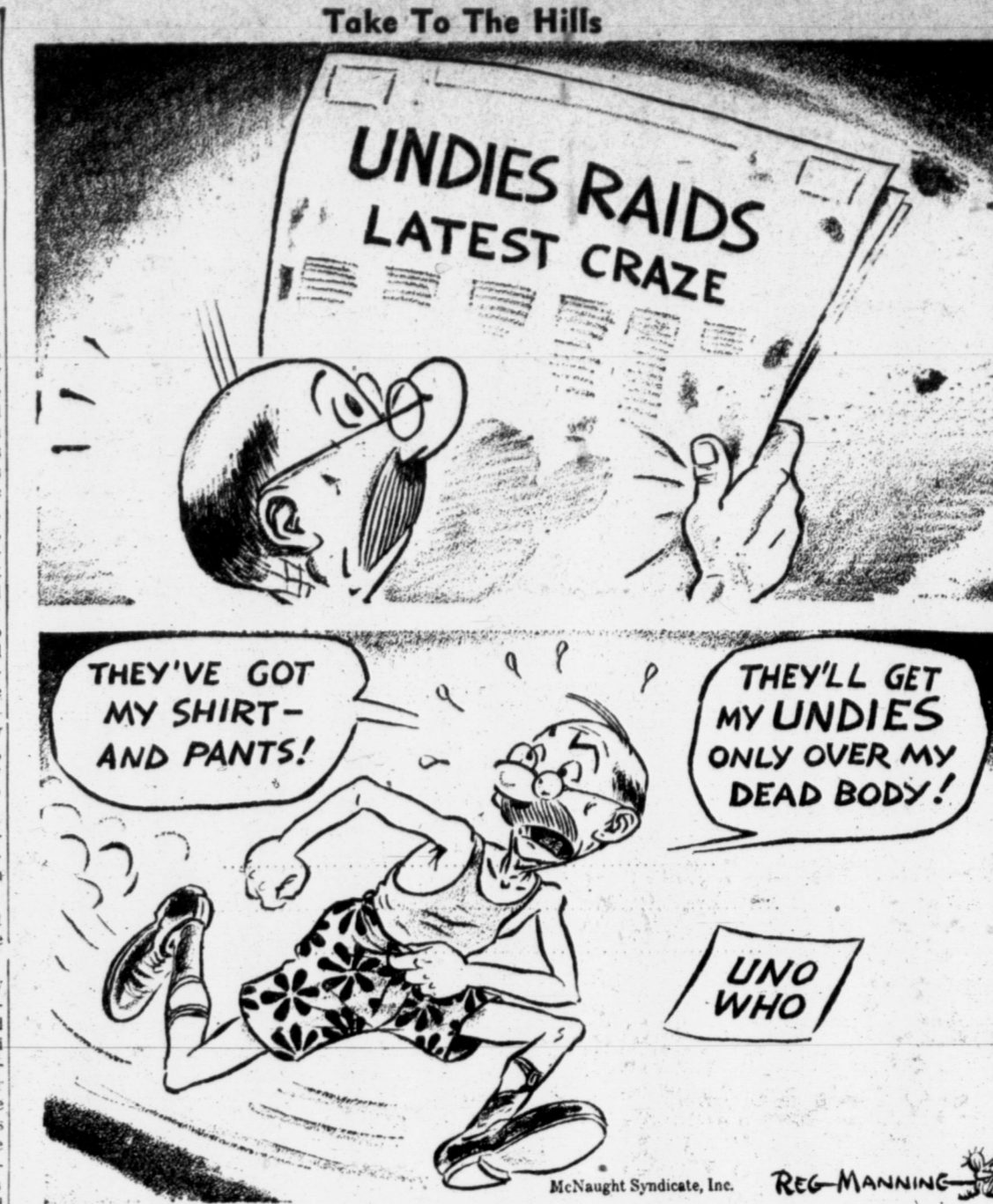

Fair Enough.... Pegler Says Nation's Editors Aren't 'Voice Of The People'

There is no formulated voice of the people. The voice of the people is a babble of editorials, speeches, and editorials from pitchmen preaching the message of cathartics and hair-do and faint echoes of this or that Commandment Confused with the Gettysburg Address.

"They Preached Liberty" VI I have had several articles on the book "They Preached Liberty," by Franklin P. Cole, referring to the preachers during the Revolutionary period from 1750 to 1784.

The following is a quotation from a sermon preached by Samuel Cooke, of Cambridge, Mass., in 1770:

"There are ambitious and designing men in the state, as well as in the church; and there are fit tools to serve the purposes of both. As some make heretics in the church, and raise it up sects above all that is called God and that is worshipped. People have no security against unmerciful priest-ridden, but by keeping all imperious bishops and other clergymen who love to lord it over God's heritage, from getting their foot into the stirrup at all. Let them once be fairly mounted, and their 'beasts, the laity' may prance and flounce about to no purpose; and they will be as long as they can, and backed by these reverend jockeys, that they will not even have spirit enough to complain that their backs are galled, or like Balaam's ass, to rebuke the madness of the prophet."

"This is a melancholy truth, confirmed by the history of all nations, that the rulers of this world have generally set themselves in opposition to the interest of true religion and the cause of Christ..."

"To have incomprehensible mysteries in Government is the Divine prerogative. Profound secrets in human governments, inaccessible to mortal eyes, are too liable to become insufferable mysteries of iniquity."

"The following is from a sermon by Samuel Webster, of Salisbury, Mass., which he preached in 1777: Gradual Encroachments On Liberty"

"The business of all in power is to defend the lives, liberties, and property of the people; and they have no other business. Yet every one of these have the great tyrants of the world invaded! They have not only robbed and spoiled them of their property by their violent exactions and by engaging them in needless wars, but at length rose to such a pitch of arrogance as to claim the people and all that they had as their property, to be disposed of at their pleasure, as if all the people were made for them and not they for the people!"

LOOK OUT He brushed his teeth twice daily this doctor examined his twice a year. He wore his rubbers when it rained. He slept with the windows open at least eight hours every night. Texas Legislator Defends Tax Cuts -- For Legislators

AP Special Washington Service. WASHINGTON — (AP) — Does the \$12,500 a year salary Congressmen receive enable them to put something away for a rainy day?

That may sound like a debatable question down in Texas, but for the 435 members of the House, the answer probably would be no.

Least there be an idea that they're extravagant, let it be noted that they watch their pennies even as you and I. Certainly that is true if they have to live and rear families on congressional pay. The reason: they have countless expenses not incurred by the average citizen.

The question of individual congressional finances came up as a result of the action last week by the House in voting to reduce the taxes of its members. The proposal — which still has to be approved by the Senate and President before becoming effective — provides that the lawmakers can deduct from their incomes all expenses incurred in Washington.

This means that most Congressmen would be in a position to

save about \$2,000 a year in income taxes. And, if a member spent most of his \$12,500 in Washington, he would probably pay little, if any, tax.

Specific Case
Some of the folks back home may wonder if this is a break the average taxpayer doesn't get. To cite a specific illustration of a congressman's financial situation, Rep. Wingate Lucas (D-Tex.) was asked to discuss the situation.

The Congressman and Mrs. Lucas have five children, ranging from a teenage daughter down. Lucas thoroughly enjoys his Congressional duties. He is satisfied with the salary and is not proposing any pay-boost.

"I don't have any other source of income," he said. "And, as any family man realizes, we sometimes have to squeeze every penny at the end of the month to get by."

"What we have just done in regard to this tax allowance measure is to give congressmen the same benefits that already are extended to anyone who comes up to Washington on business. They're allowed to deduct their living costs here as legitimate business expenses."

He remarked that years ago congressmen were permitted to make such deductions, "but one of the bureaucrats here drew up some regulations" that barred further itemizing of such expenses on income tax returns.

Mentioning his own expenses, Lucas pointed out that he not only has to provide housing here for his family but also must maintain a home in Texas.

When Congress adjourns he takes his brood and moves to their farm near Grapevine. He drives daily from there to his office in the federal building in Fort Worth.

Trips Necessary
Entertaining visiting constituents, a limited amount of which cannot be avoided, costs several hundred dollars a year, he says. Then, there are contributions to many causes — and Congressman are called on to contribute to everything under the sun.

Another major expense is for essential travel. They're allowed fare for only one round trip per session.

"We'd certainly lose contact with our people if we didn't get back home more often than that," he added. "Those extra trips come out of our pocket, and it's a long ways from Washington to Texas and back."

At present Congressmen get \$2,500 per year annual tax-free expense account. The expense account system ends as of Dec. 31 this year, after which their salaries will be a straight \$10,000 a year. (The same pay and allowances prevail in the Senate.) Lucas considers himself an average member, neither extravagant nor "skinny." He lives in a modest residential suburb in adjacent Arlington, Virginia. Some congressional colleagues are independently wealthy, so his association with these individuals is restricted largely to business on Capitol Hill.

"That saying about keeping up with the Joneses applies here just as it does in Texas," he concluded with a smile.

"We don't try to. Nor do we envy them. I'm well satisfied if I can break even on my salary, because the job is one I like."

Employees Run Own Lunchroom

TULSA, Okla. — (AP) — The employees of one firm here are beating inflation by running a co-operative lunchroom where they eat at noon for 37 cents.

This amount will get you a serving of ham, navy beans, corn bread, sliced tomatoes and cottage cheese, ice cream and cookies. In addition you get all the coffee you want all day long at no extra charge.

The employees of the Tulsa Farmers and Merchants Bank chip in every two weeks and buy wholesale. The bank vault custodian does the buying and plans menus.

The bank furnished the kitchen, pays the cook's salary and provides the coffee. Because the "cafeteria" is small, the employees eat at staggered hours.

Drilling Crews Busy In Texas

AUSTIN — (AP) — Drilling crews kept busy in Texas this week, completing 253 oil wells. The Railroad Commission reported the total, which compared with 216 last week. Completions for the year numbered 4,739 compared with 4,286 a year ago. Twenty nine gas wells were brought in, but the year's total lagged behind last year's 308 to 381. Wildcat drilling produced 19 oil wells, five more than last week, and brought the year's total to 254, a year ago, the figure stood at 226. Plugged were 122 dry wells, one gas well, and 33 oil wells. The total average calendar day crude allowable as of May 24 was 2,928,807 barrels, up 11,356 barrels from a week ago.

Their home was ready last month. They asked for the refrigerator. They were told they had to give three days notice. They did. The store sent the wrong refrigerator. EVANSVILLE, Ind. — (AP) — A letter postage rate of four or five cents was proposed Saturday by William C. Doherty, president of the National Association of Letter Carriers. Before the mailmen's convention closed last night, Doherty told a reporter that adding a cent or two to the first-class postal rate should wipe out the Post Office Department's deficit of 667 million dollars. He said it would end the country's "inferior brand of postal service."

Speedy Progress On Rocket Program

LEAMINGTON, Eng. — (AP) — Britain has made "remarkable progress" in developing guided rockets, Supply Minister Duncan Sandys said yesterday. He told a conference of guided rocket scientists and experts that the government has given "superior priority" to speedy development of the new weapon which he said may some day supersede more orthodox armaments. Sandys added that a whole new guided rocket industry had been set up in the past few years.
