CHICAGO (AP) - Warring partisans of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio headed today toward another clash over delegate contests in their battle for the GOP presidential nomination.





Depression Relic Should Be Dropped

President Truman's Materials Policy Commission has recommended repeal of the "Buy American" act of 1933 and other laws restricting federal and state purchases of

This legislation which seeks to ward off foreign competition is a relic of depression psychology and amounts to a self-imposed blockade. Such curbs on imports of raw materials have succeeded only in increasing costs at

Insidiously rising costs of materials have undermined our standard of living, impaired the dynamic quality of American capitalism, and weakened the economic foundations of national security.

The five-man commission, headed by William S. Paley, board chairman of the Columbia Broadcasting system, was appointed by Mr. Truman 18 months ago to investigate the long-range problem of raw material supplies. Other members include Industrialists George Rufus Brown and Arthur H. Bunker, Magazine Editor Eric Hodgins, and Edward S. Mason of the Committee for Economic Development and the American Economic Assn.

The commission's 140,000-word first report contained more than 70 recommendations on how existing and threatened shortages may be alleviated in the next 25 years. Other reports, in more detail will follow.

The report said the United States now uses 10 per cent more materials than it produces and is "outgrowing its present usable domestic resource base." It predicted that by 1957 the nation's demand for minerals and power will double.

The commission said the search for untapped raw materials at home must be intensified to help meet the coming crisis, and it noted that only 11 per cent of the United States is adequately mapped geologically,

It said Americans must make more effective use of materials through technological research, which they now are "neglecting," and must shift to more abundant substitute materials wherever possible.

We blow some 125,000 tons of lead a year into the atmosphere from the exhaust pipes of automobiles burning anti-knock gas because we like quick pick-up on the road. We waste materials by over-design. In discarding tin cans, we throw away annually 2,000,000 tons of tin very little of which is recovered.

Even if domestic resources are conserved and increased they will not meet the growing demands of the next quarter-century. Imports will have to rise by perhaps onefifth or one-quarter.

Meanwhile, foreign demand for raw materials is climbing even faster than in the United States, as less - industrialized countries catch up with the American standard

It is impossible for the United States to become selfsufficient in many raw materials. The theory of self sufficiency is fallacious and dangerous, because it checks economic growth by interfering with normal trade, damages security arrangements made with allied hations, and adds to this country's material costs.

This commission report is not a sensational one but it is important since it highlights a threat to the industrial machine which has made America a wealthy land.

We are scattering largesse in foreign lands but only a small portion of these "gifts" are going toward exploration and research in underdeveloped countries. We are following a blind policy of restricting imports to "protect" special interests to the point where we are damaging national interests. We are discouraging industrial efficiency and encouraging high costs.

If we do not return to the cardinal principle of "least cost," we will soon destroy our standard of living — a standard that is already hard pressed by inflation and

Shoemaker, Stick To Your Last

Without going into the profundities of economics, a California lawyer, James L. Beebe of Los Angeles, expressed a truism on the unsoundness of governmental intrusion into private finance so simply that the veriest schoolboy could not misunderstand. The occasion was the conference of California members of the Investment Bankers Association of America at Santa Barbara, and Lawyer Beebe was voicing opposition to the proposed establishment of a state "little" Reconstruction Finance Corporation, introduced by Assemblyman Earl Stanley of Balboa Island, now being considered by an Assembly committee, when he said:

"The State should not engage in the business of lending money - for the reason that the State is not a banker. The State is run by politicians. We should not expect politicians to act like bankers."

Certain it is that banking, in its dual role of protecting the savings entrusted to banks by the public, while at the same time providing the lifeblood of sound credit to the entire economy, is a highly technical function. It is hardly an exaggeration to say that turning over authority and responsibility in the field of banking to a politician is very like calling in a plumber to repair a watch or a lumberjack to take out an appendix.

The record of bungling and profligacy of the Feueral RFC on a national scale should serve as a public danger signal against the imprudence of repeating that unhappy experiment in California - or in any other state.

"Human Rights And The United Nations"

Here is a continuation of "Hu-

man Rights and the United Nations" by Russell J. Clinchy, staff member of the Foundation for Economic Education, Inc.

Rights which the United Nations will submit to the various member nations for ratification.

The article continues as follows:

"Let us pursue these questions relative to the matter of housing. Article 23 says that the governments must recognize the right of everyone to adequate housing. This means that the state shall build 'adequate' housing for each person who claims the need. Of course, a representative of the state will determine what is 'adequate.' But visualize his problem by asking yourself, if your own housing is 'adequate' today. Adequate in terms of what? Your need for housing? Or your capacity to provide housing, in addition to satisfyng more urgent needs for other

"Will some public official do a better job than you can in determining the relative urgency of your various needs? Are you going to be happy some morning when you are informed that you shall spend so many days providing adequate housing for someone-quite. probably someone unknown to ou? Yet that is the inevitable conuence-whether done directly or indirectly-if the state takes cognizance and control of everyone's 'right to work' and his 'right o adequate housing.'

MEDICINE "The health and medical care of the community are dealt with in Articles 25 and 26. A restudy of these articles will show that the Covenant fails to acknowledge that it is now the right and privilege of each person-by his own efforts or through voluntary cooperation with others-to provide such

health, medical care, and good standards of living as he and his family can afford. Instead of that, it states that everyone has the ight to the highest standard of health obtainable and that, therefore, each nation must undertake to provide by legislation measures o promote and protect health all through life. Article 25 states that. ach government must provide leglation which will reduce infant nortality and promote the healthy evelopment of the child. It says it nust improve nutrition, and also that it must provide conditions thich will assure the right of allo medical service and medical atention in the event of any kind of


