Solon Challenged On Acheson's View

Foreign Ministers Seek Compromise On Peace Treaties

LONDON, Sept. 24.—(AP)—The Big Five council of foreign ministers sought in two successive meetings today to compromise conflicting views which have prevented essential agreement on peace treaties for Italy and the Balkan nations.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—(AP)—Acting Secretary of State Acheson told Senator Wherry (R-Neb.) today "to test" for himself the correctness of Acheson's view on Japanese occupation policy and General Douglas MacArthur's role.

Wherry promptly labeled Acheson's statement "unsatisfactory" and told reporters he would fight to send his nomination as undersecretary of state back to committee.

Hirohito Has Made Plans to Visit M'Arthur

TOKYO, Sept. 24.—(AP)—Well-informed Japanese sources said today that Emperor Hirohito has arranged to pay a precedent-shattering call on General MacArthur at the latter's residence, the American embassy building. No date was specified.

The decision on a meeting place of conqueror and conquered was reached, these sources told Associated Press Correspondent Russell Brines, at a recent conference between MacArthur and Admiral Fujita, grand chamberlain.

Official confirmation was lacking, although a meeting of MacArthur and Hirohito long has been expected. If the emperor goes to MacArthur's residence at the embassy, it would be the first time in modern history that any Japanese emperor has gone to another ruler for an audience.

Truman Will Control Use Of A-Energy

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—(AP)—The White House disclosed today the President soon will submit to Congress his recommendations for the development and use of atomic energy.

Press Secretary Charles G. Ross told reporters that the President "is not setting himself up as sole arbiter" of the future of the atomic bomb's secret.

Ross said he wanted to make it clear today that this did not mean that he would play a lone hand. "The President will submit his recommendations to Congress," Ross said. "He is taking advice from the cabinet but his is the responsibility of deciding what the recommendations to Congress shall be. It is expected the recommendations will be sent to the hill fairly soon."

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—(AP)—Administration leaders in Congress braced themselves today for a sound licking on jobless pay proposals.

Investigators May Travel to Pearl Harbor

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—(AP)—Congressional investigators may go to Pearl Harbor to look over the ground of the Japanese attack that put a major share of the American navy out of action.

This trip was disclosed to be under consideration today as committee members awaited a recommendation from Chairman Barkley (D-Ky.) on the hiring of an attorney.

The committee went along, meanwhile, under an agreement that members wouldn't talk about issues likely to arise before it.

More Refineries Closing in Texas

By the Associated Press Two new disputes entered the nation's labor picture today, boosting the number of idle to more than 323,000 and emphasizing the wage issue as the crux of most of the difficulties.

After 10,000 New York painters returned to work, the total idle had stood at 240,000. Some 60,000 members of the AFL lumber and sawmill workers, however, later were called off their jobs in the Pacific Northwest, while on the other side of the continent, New York City building service employes numbering 23,000 also were slated to leave their jobs.

Labor Disputes Act Headed for Possible Repeal

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—(AP)—Repeal of the Smith-Connally war labor disputes act loomed today as a possible aftermath of CIO auto workers' plans for strike votes by more than a half million members.

Rep. Howard D. Smith (D-Va.), co-sponsor of the labor disputes act, already has introduced a repeal measure. It is being studied by the house military committee.

Sneak Attack by British Revealed

CHUNGKING, China, Sept. 24.—(AP)—Adm. Sir Bruce Fraser, commander in chief of the British Pacific fleet, disclosed today that three British two-man submarines sneaked into Singapore harbor by daylight three weeks before the end of the war.

Mr. and Mrs. Palmittes will be at home in Pampa Oct. 15.

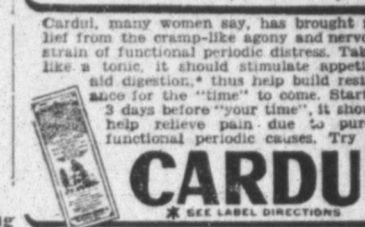
The origin of how a ship came to be called "she" can probably be traced back to the Greek mariners who gave their ships feminine names.

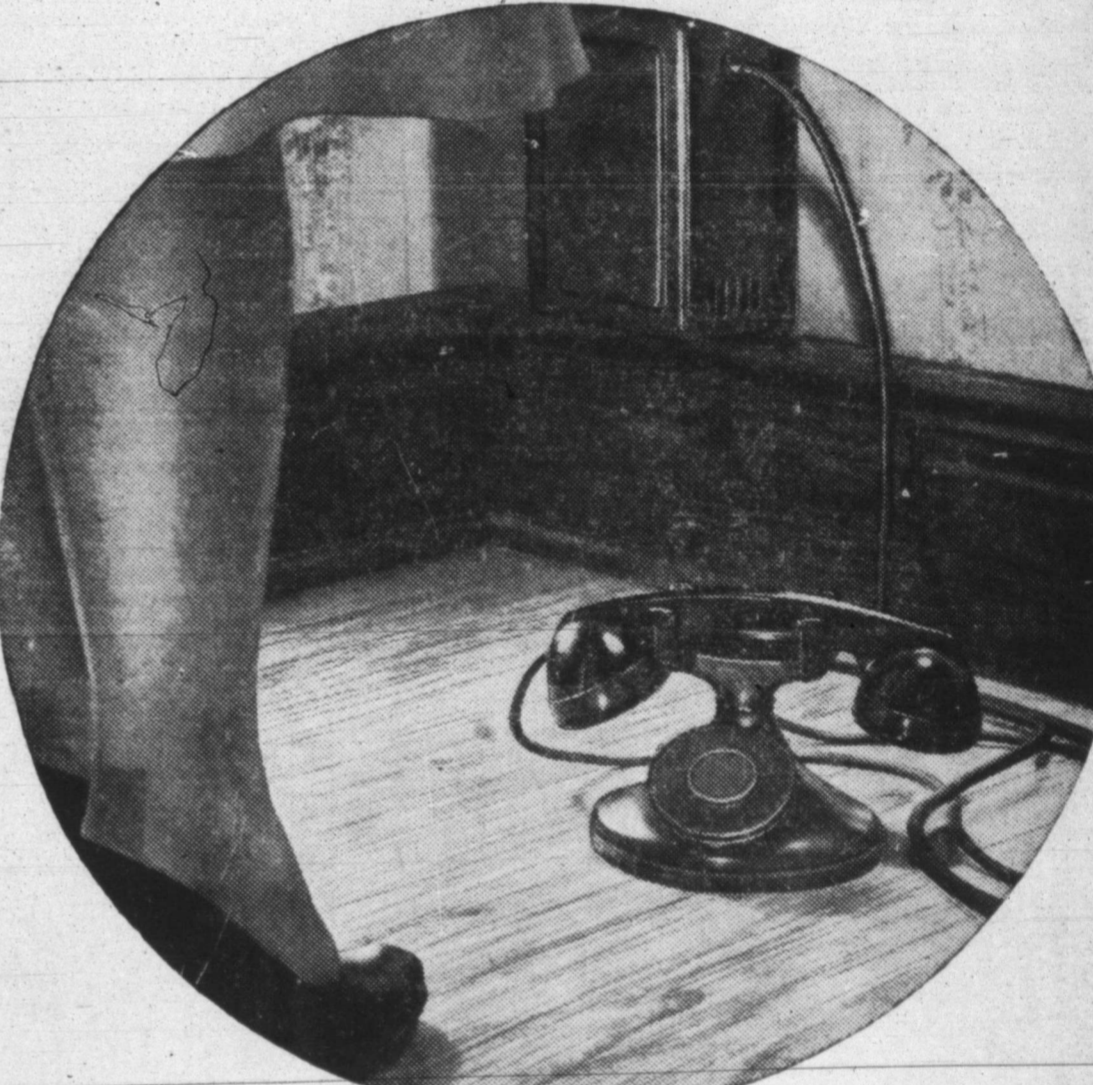
