Venita, who is 11, was taken to a Pampa hospital where she is still



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DID THE ALCOHOL MEAN ANYTHING?

Often we get bits of information which we cannot publish. Sometime it is important. Since Russia has declared war on Japan, the reader will probably be interested in the following information which was written by Ray Tucker, Washington corrrespondent for this newspaper. It was written June 19, after the Germans had been defeated and while Russia was enjoying a brief respite between wars.

The following material, herettofore not for publication, is given verbatim:

"The details of the resumption of industrial alcohol ship ments to Russia are more important than I dar to write for publication in so far as they bear on the Soviet Union's imminent entry into the war on Japan.

"Although Byron Price has asked us not to speculate on this possibility, so many high military men and diplomats have discussed the question that his polite prohibition has gone into the discard. Byron admits it privately.

"Japan expects to have to face Russia on the battlefield. Prince Konoye's diplomatic journey is a desperate effort to insure continued neutrality. Japan has an ambassador in Moscow, and he could handle any routine matters with the Kremlin. For a member of the royal family to make the special trip at this moment suggests that relations between Tokyo and Moscow are Extremely critical.

"When the war ended in Europe, shipments of our industrial alcohol to Russia were stopped because she was no longer a military ally. She was not at war with Japan.

"In fact, a tank ship was then being loaded with Kansas-Nebraska-lowa grain alcohol when Washington sent orders to Seattle to halt further exports of the all-important fluid to the Soviet Union. The state department was observing protocol rather strictly.

"Stalin's commercial attaches attending the San Francisco conference went into a huddle with representatives of Secretary Stettinius at the Golden Gate. I cannot vouch for what happened in the meantime, but within 24 hours Washington authorized its Seattle office to load the tanker mentioned above and send it to Vladivostok.

"Then came WPB's announcement that volume shipments would be resumed. The logical conclusion appears to be that Russia is coming in and that Japan may soon beg for peace!

Probably the most outstanding example of using the sword or force rather than voluntary persuasion that is, in serving force rather than persuasion is public education.

We are attempting to serve so ciety by using compulsion rather than by enlightening the public as to their duties as individuals. It is little wonder that the belief in force and the belief in a government of bare majority rule has grown and grown in our midst when in every community in the land we are practicing the attenint to serve two masters' force and voluntary agreements.

Another example of serving two masters is immigration restrictions: the force of the state against the God-given right of freedom of the individual as set down by the Ten Commandiments, the Sermon on the Mount and the Declaration of Independence.

Tariffs is another example of attempting to use force rather than persuasion.



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

In a very personal letter, rather than the usual official type letter of information, the navy department acknowledged the death of Ensign Clifford F. Wick, yesterday.

Wick, whose home was in Hemp-stead, New York, was the best friend of Larry Jones, city editor of the News. This friedship was started in Florida in 1941 and continued through a very enjoyable navy career, only to be terminated by Wick's untimely death.

In the letter from the officials at the naval air station, Clinton, Oklahoma, Wick was described as "beloved by his associates here, being a dependable aviator, and of excellent character."

The cause of the plane crash in which he was killed has been called due to power failure. One other naval flier escaped with minor injuries. Wick was killed instantly. Realizing that Ensign Wick's death is not of much interest to the people of this area the city editor is only trying to explain how hard it is to lose a buddy.

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
