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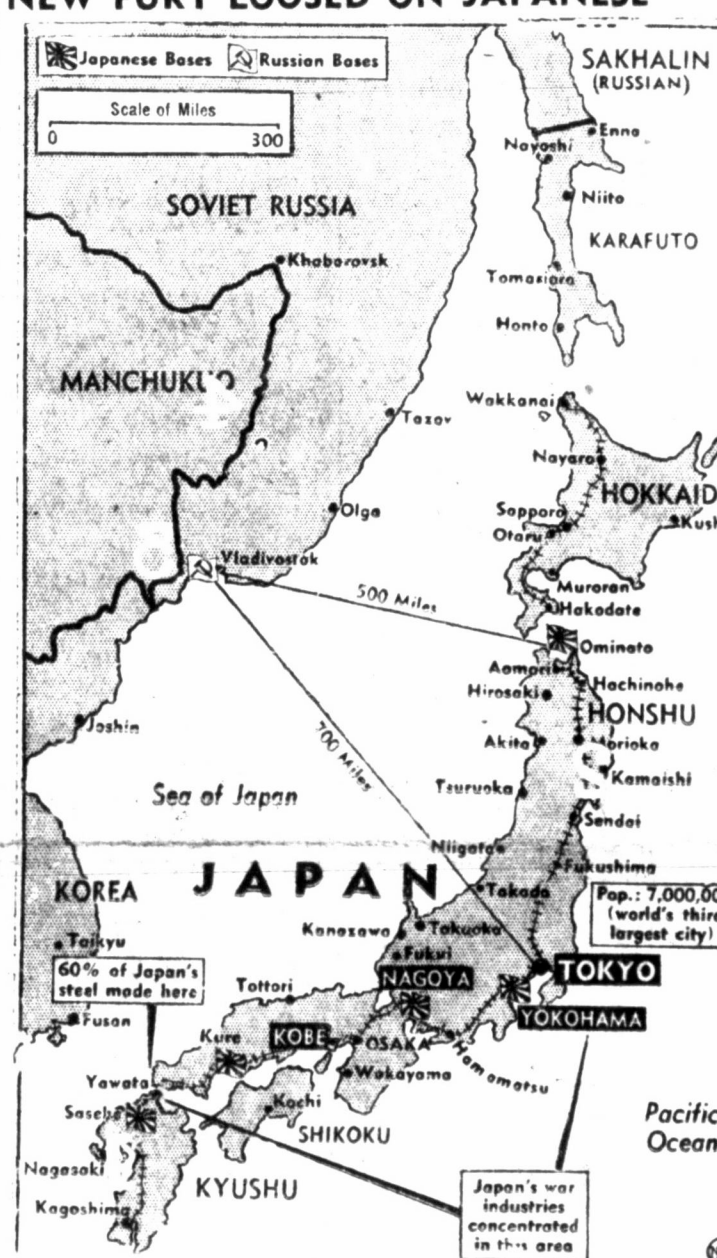
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## Japan Suffers Worst Day of War

Pacific Peace

(Continued from Page One) told Mr. Roosevelt and Churchill, both Cairo signers, that he would enter the Pacific war. But he did not then set a specific date.

At Cairo the three powers then fighting the Japanese renounced all territorial expansion for themselves. If the Soviets are bound by the Cairo agreement, a great many Americans, including members of congress, will breathe easier on that score.

Diplomatic sources generally believe that the Russians were not promised any specific territory at Yalta. If that is true, they must make original claims at the Pacific peace conference for any areas they might desire.

Speculation is that they will want full sovereignty of the island of Sakhalin, which they now share with Japan; that they will want a warmer water outlet through Manchuria, probably at Dairen, which they held on a commercial basis prior to the Russo-Japanese war; and that they may want naval base rights at Port Arthur, which they also had 40 years ago.

But the Soviet voice also will be heard in the postwar disposition of Hong Kong and Singapore, where the British had important pre-war holdings. China may find a strong ally in Russia for her likely bid for complete control of these cities.

Sudden End Will Mean Fast Jump To Reconversion

By JAMES MARLOW WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Japan is caught in a double crunch: The atomic bomb and war with Russia. Japan may have to quit, soon. Then what?

A sudden end—say in a week, two weeks, a month—will mean a painful wrench on the American home front from a war to a peace economy. An end six months from now would make the change-over easier. By that time more and more war plants would have eased over into peacetime work. But a sudden end to the war will

mean: Wholesale cancellation of war contracts. Millions thrown out of jobs, some to seek jobs elsewhere because their plants can't convert, some to hang around until their plants do convert. Gliders Can Be Converted Fast

DALLAS—Surplus military gliders which can be converted into light airplane will be offered for sale at the reconstruction finance corporation sales center at Hicks field, Fort Worth, commencing August 15. L. B. Glidden, manager of the Dallas RFC agency, has announced. The RFC is the agency designated by the surplus property board to handle aircraft disposal. The RFC has altogether 149 Taylorcraft TG6 gliders, of which nine will be placed on sale at Hicks field. These gliders can be converted to powered planes by replacing the nose with an engine mount, adding an engine, and making other alterations required by the civil aeronautics administration. These gliders were adapted from light aircraft designs at the beginning of the war and have much the same general structural features. The RFC also is placing on sale at Hicks field a limited number of 65 horsepower Lycoming and Franklin engines for use in converting the gliders to power.

Carloading Rules Must Be Observed

DALLAS, Aug. 9—Shippers are cautioned today by E. O. Walker, of Dallas, district rail director of the Office of defense transportation, that all provisions of minimum car loading orders of the ODT must be observed meticulously. Heavy freight traffic on railroad lines to the Pacific Coast, at a time when critical car shortages exist in several sections of the country, requires that shippers load every car to capacity, the ODT official said. A tendency on the part of some shippers to relax their efforts to make each freight car do all the work for which it was designed must be corrected at once, it was said. To counteract this relaxation, ODT railway transport regional offices have been instructed to check the observance of general order ODT 18A. Checks have resulted in uncovering some conditions which have been corrected. The checks will continue and, wherever it is found that shippers are not observing the terms of the order, action will be taken to obtain that observance. Walker warned. He said the great majority of shippers already are doing their best to help obtain the maximum use of the car supply and to relieve the western railroad lines. The traffic situation on the western lines, it was emphasized, has never been more critical. All types of cars carrying dry cargo move to the Pacific Coast states in greater volume than loads are available eastbound from that area. Any reduction in the number of loaded westbound cars through heavier loadings will result in a reduction in the eastward movement of empty cars.

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Early Refund of Tax Is Planned

WASHINGTON.—Secretary Vinson has announced that the refund of income taxes in connection with excess withholding made during 1944 is being stepped up with a view to completing the work between September 1-15, this is a month earlier than the original goal of October 15. Of an estimate 22 million individual refunds to be made, 10,000,000. Refund checks are now being to July 27, amounting to \$481,000,000. Refund checks are now being issued at the rate of 1,500,000 a week. This is being accomplished by working day and night shifts and overtime, and utilizing equipment to maximum capacity. Refund checks range from a few cents to several thousand dollars, the average being about \$45. In order to facilitate payments, refunds are based on tax returns as filed by tax payers and are subject to later audit by the Bureau of Internal Revenue.

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
