PARIS, Aug. 1 — (/P) — Adm. William D. Leahy, chief of staff to President Truman, expressed the belief that Marshal Petain always acted in the best interests of France in a letter read today at the treason tria! of the old soldier.

As read in court the letter of Leahy, who is attending the Big Three conference at Potsdam, ex-"high regard" for Petain and said he was unable to appear as a witness because of his position, bearded prosecutor Andre Morsador to the Vichy regime of Marshal Petain until the Germans took over the unoccupied portions of France in November, 1942, when North Africa was invaded.

The old soldier's counsel said also that Pierre Laval, described yesterday as Petain's "evil genius," would be summoned as a witness.

**NEA** Washington Correspondent WASHINGTON—One of the most intensive manhunts in U. S. criminal history has been the 91/2-year earch for the kidnaper and murderer of 10-year-old Charles Fletcher Mattson of Tacoma, Wash. In FBI records and in local police headquarters all over the country this Mattson kidnapping has become known as the "Matnap" case, FBI hasn't given up trying to solve it, and won't give up.

There are three slender clews to go on. When the kidnaper broke into Dr. Mattson's home on Dec. 26, 1936, and abducted his oldest boy, a note demanding \$50,000 ransom was left on the chair. #### **U.S.** Government **Must Now Define Delegate Powers**

(Editor's note: The following questions and answer series on the United Nations is furnished by the American Associatin for the United Nations, and is published for the benefit of the reader. 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Q. What are the next steps, now that the Senuate has ratified the Charter?

A. The United States must define the authority of our delegates on the Security Council, and also must must negotiate an agreement with the United Nations stating what armed forces, assistance, and facilities we are going to place at the or prevent war.

Q. Does the Charter take away the right of Congress to declare war?

A. No. No international agreement could take away from Congress its witness. constitutional right to declare war. It will be up to the American peo ple to decide whether our delegate, on the Security Council is to have the power to vote the use of American armed forces in collective action with the consent of the Congress. But we must remember that this action under international law is police action, not war. Q. What will the Economic and

Social Council do? A. Its job will be to promote better economic and social conditions.



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
