Makes Attack At Dedication Of Atom Sub

GROTON, Conn. -(AP) -President Truman coupled the dedication of atomic energy to a golden future Saturday with an attack on Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower as a salesman of "cut-rate, bargain counter" national security.

Speaking at the laying of the keel of the nation's first atomic - powered submarine, Truman declared only Russia stands in the way of the development of atomic energy to provide power for businesses, farms and homes everywhere.

He disclosed that full - sized, working atomic engine - a selfcontained power plant able to run almost indefinitely without refueling -- is nearly complete. He described the development as putting the world on "the threshold of a new age."

Then, obviously referring to Eisenhower, now an active candidate for the Republican presidential nomination, the President

"This is a political year and people who are seeking office. Now the air is filled with promises to strengthen nation se-

curity and to cut taxes all at the same time. "I even heard the other day that somebody was talking about a 40 billion dollar tax cut. That would leave us with only about

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Customer Is Boss

An official of a retailers' association recently had this to say about merchandising: "Stores are as different from each other as people are. Each store has its own personality which reflects its method of doing business. All of them are united, however, in one principle. They consider themselves NOT as distributors for manufacturers or as manufacturers' agents. They are purchasing agents for the consumers. As such, they find out what their bosses, the customers, want to own. They locate this merchandise. They offer it for sale."

Here we have a situation which is typical of a free competitive economy - and only of a free competitive economy. If manufacturers produce and stores stock something which people don't want, the goods tarnish on the shelves and must be sold at a loss or not at all. For, when the customer becomes dissatisfied, there's always a manufacturer who makes what he does want and a store which sells it. And that's where his business

In a socialized or government controlled economy, the case is utterly different. The government decides what shall be produced, in what quantity and quality, and at what price it will be sold. If the consumer doesn't happen to like the article, it's his tough luck. He has to take it or go without - for no one is allowed to make or sell a competitive product. This totalitarian method of controlling consumption has reached its full flowering in Russia, where the people's living standards are incredibly low as compared to ours.

Yes, in this country the customer is boss. And our conomic system is responsible for that happy fact.

Prodigality Danger

"Profits are the lifeblood of private enterprise," says U. S. News & World Report. "They help provide the capital for improvement and expansion. They finance inventories and provide the cushion that staves off trouble when times get hard. With prices where they are, more money than ever is required by private business to finance its operations. Yet the tax collector has moved in to take the bulk of all corporate earnings."

To back this up, the magazine showed the extent of the tax burden carried by a number of representative corporations in such basic fields of activity as steel, aviation, agricultural implements, rubber, railroads, chemical, and so on. In every case, the government takes more in taxes than the company can keep or distribute to its twice as much. This happened with 1951 tax rates - the 1952 burden will be materially greater. Corporate taxes now are actually higher than during the peak of the war

You needn't be an economist to understand what this will do to our economy if it is continued long enough. The cards are stacked — if a man takes a risk and loses he must bear the whole loss, while if he wins the government will take most of what he makes. There is no surer way to dry up the sources of capital which are vital to a dynamic, progressive economy. And, in the long run, there is no surer way to undermine the living standards

History has proven, time and time again, that prodigal government can destroy a nation. And history repeats

Who Is Thaddeus Ashb,?

In this issue we are running a very important article on "The Ornament of Prosperity" by Thaddeus Ashby. In this article he attempts to prove, and we believe does prove, that there would be more financial support for education under a voluntary basis or a free enterprise basis than there is when it is supported by the state.

The Ornament Of Prosperity

By Thaddeus Ashby

On one occasion Aristotie was i asked how much educated men were superior to those uneducated: "As much," said he, "as the living

I am going to explore here a very provocative idea: Can public education keep pace with progress? Could private education do it better? I hope to show that public education cannot greatly expand without ald from the federal government. I believe that public education will then become a monore oly of the federal government; in the same way that after local school boards applied to the states for subsidy, éducation then became a monopoly of the states.

Knowledge Dies Without Liberty Progress depends upon liberty, in the field of knowledge. History shows that when the state monopolizes any branch of knowledge, liberty in the field of knowledge dies. All liberty may die soon after. Liberty is not a divisible thing. You cannot have freedom in one field and restrict it in another. Freedom of action without freedom of thought cannot long endure. There can't be different. "freedoms" applied to different activities: there is only freedom. Curtailment of liberty in one field does not mean that "one freedom" has been taken away; all freedom has been diminished. This article presumes to present a practical alternative to state monopoly or state dominance of the dissemina-

tion of knowledge. Let us begin by defining liberals. We all eall ourselves liberals. We all claim to believe in liberty. Let us start from there. In recent years "liberal" has been applied to persons who believe in government operation of services which had formerly been provided privately. I urge you to dam this flowing tide, and to embrace with me a much older definition of liberal-

"A liberal knows that liberty

will work." To know that liberty will work demands great imagination. You must envision man straining, striving, exerting himself, burning the candle at both ends-in the future. Free human intelligence defies prognostications. We admire and marvel at the way free intelligence performs miracles in other fields. From them we must infer how liberty would operate in the field of education, What? Would I educate everybody privately? Impossible! Let us explore seriously th's alleged impossibility. You probably have not previously examined any atternative to the status quo, Let's do so. As economists let's ask:

"Is there a demand for educa-Be very careful how you answer. A trap yawns for you, whether you. answer, yes, or, no. I repeat the question: Do people want education? Watch your step: You answer, yes, yes, of course there's a demand for education! Then you sey: "But once we stop forcing tax. supported schools upon our people, a large percentage of children must stop receiving education." You say: "Stop forcing parents to send children to school; and they will stop going to school." Aren't you saying the supply is greater than the demand? Nevertheless you assure me that you still want public education no matter if it's in excess of demand. Are you sure you say this? Then you need read no further. You believe the economic law of supply and demand

has no practical validity.

Education In Short Supply Perhaps, however, you have used your eyes. Perhaps you've taken a look at the overcrowded conditions of our schools. With the evidance of your eyes you reject your above pessimistic view, that we are surfeited with education, You see, that on the contrary, education is in short supply. You see now that the demand is greater than the supply. Everyone who wishes to see education expanded agrees with you. We are optimists then. We believe that people not only need more education. We believe they are smart enough to know it. Now follow me carefully. The economy expands. Jobs become more technical, Education must expand too, You agree? Good. Now-Can public education do this? I won't press you for reply until you have looked at present day schools Crammed with pupils to the bursting point, The teachers harassed. The teachers undernaid. The teachers too inundated with the beneficiaries of the school tax to and to

them peneficially, Look at them. One look convinces you that for the moment, the supply of public education lags far behind the expanding economy's demand. Can it keep up in the future? Or will it always lag behind? Must education always be inadequate? We have scrutinized the state school tax structures to find ways of raising new taxes. We find most states so sorely strained for funds

that their school men agree: public schools cannot possibly expandwithout federal aid. That is a certainty. You can't expend public schools indefinitely without federal aid. But look to the federal government when local resources have dried up? Isn't that a contradiction

Education Must Never Stop

Great expansion of education will not and cannot come about through government action, For a very simple economic reason. Taxes cannot shoot up and up, forever increasing. No government agency can expand forever. But to keep up with private production education must extend, enlarge, augment, germinate and flourish, It must never stop growing. It must expand forever with no more limitation imposed on schools than we should impose limitations on man's imagination. The government can't provide this constant growth. Even we became a total dictatorship. The moment production stops the government will expand only a little beyond, then it will collapse. Do you argue that you will curtail other government agencies and use the money saved for education? That sounds reasonable. Stop, look and think. It is the same argument of every other government agency which wishes to preserve itself. All outstretcheed palms allege equal claims. Politiexpediency doesn't counsel chopping off any of them.

The educators themselves refuse to rescue us from this dilemma, for they are notoriously unselfish persons. They believe in charity, They believe in aid to Europe. The World Bank, Point Four, Health and sanitation projects for the world. They demand continuance of all other eleemasynary propositions which compete with public education in the race for federal funds. The educators, therefore, will be hardpressed to decide which agencies should be killed in order to appropriate more funds for

Let Education Expand

W h Production

Only one way exists to cond education, so that it will expand indefinitely. That is: Let education expand marginally as the rest of the economy expands. Let the schools sprout up at the same rate and for the same reason as skyscrapers. Do you think the government can achieve this? Federal aid. taxes go up, production slows down. The margin narrows, Funds for education dry up. But why should education be marginal, you ask. Why shouldn't it come ahead or production? Why not dip into capital to support so worthy a cause? Those are good questions. Format education rates bigh on everybody's list of 1 mportant things. But it is a long range benefit, intangible in nature, Do you call education the same thing as an investment in a quart of milk? It's not the same. If the quart of milk doesn't come first, you will not live to reap the harvest of we don't rate formal education es important as production. We call it marginal to production. That is. it must be paid for out of surplus funds. You cannot dip into capital safely. Admit this important point and you will see why poor nations have poor schools. Whether they are operated privately or publicly need not complicate this specific point. This point shows: private or public, schools must be operated with money marginal to production, So rich nations (nations in which production comes first) always build expensive schools. Do you cite Spain as an example of an illiterate citizenry, because Spain has no public schools? We know Spain's private schools are poverty stricken. We don't all see the real reason why, Since Spain expelled the Moors and the Jews everything in Spain has been poverty stricken. Since then Spain's production lagged behind government spending. Spain dipped into capital. But private or public, the U. S. would have rich schools, Let us concentrate on this point, Would U. S. schools not be richer and more capable of infinite expansion if they were run privately? Put it

this way: What is the best way of building as many schools as possible at an ever expanding rate? That phrase, an ever expanding rate-there lies the key to my whole argument, A dictator who believed in public education might build a school on every block. But what happens to the schools when he bankrupts the nation? His programme cannot continue at an ever expanding rate. If he puts schools, or anything else, ahead of production, his programme will. shortly collapse, Remember the legend of The Golden Eggs? Our schools show no signs of collapsing yet - but they lag woefully behind demand. They can't catch up-without resort to the stultify. ing effects of federal aid, and ultimate federal domination. Then the other agencies will have been expanded as well. Then the golden

goose will stand with at least one foot in the grave.

I promised to present a practical alternative to public education, It is simple. But I warn you. You must be wise sometimes to understand simple things. Understanding my proposal demands enough imagination, let us say, enough liberal thinking to know that liberty, will work under all conditions. My proposal?

Tie school to the law of

supply and demand. You might say in answer: "There may be an infinite desire for schools. But if people can't afford schools there won't be any schools." An excellent point. I agree completely. Do you agree with me, then, that if people can afford schools, there will be schools in plenty? If so, the problem is how to make people rich.

Socialism discourages Production If we are truly imaginative we want our economy to expand. To double. Re-double. To make grand slams as it has in the past. Then we can't cherish socialism in any field. Why not? Do you accept the ldea that socialism discourages production in one field, e. g. coal production? Then you must be prepared to concede the logic that socialism discourages production even where your heart desires it most, i. e. in education. Production holds the key to expansion. Now we agree that we all want the prospective patrons of private schools to possess the means of

payment for their children's tultion, If this problem can be solved few people will continue to aroue for government monopoly of education. The problem of how to nake people rich becomes: How can we expand the general production of the nation? If our economy expands, you will

see how fifty years from now we

may possess ten times as much wealth. Then there will be ten times as much marginal surplus in existence. Normal expansion are celerates its own rate. For example. An airplane climbing at 100 feet per minute climbs at a fixed rate. I said you need imagination to know that liberty will work. The following incident illustrates this. A champion of public education read some of my writing. It advocated that all education be provided privately, just as food is. He said when he was finished: "This is all very fine in theory. But in practice it wan't work. Why not? Because a high school with an enrollment of 1000 pupils costs two million dollars to build. Where will you find 1000 pupils with two million dollars in their pockets?"

The man who asked this question concerns himself more with protecting the schools from my analysis than he concerns himself with economics. He regards economics as theoretical and therefore impractical. To him, I reply: Do you seriously want an answer to your argument that 1000 children would never have two million dollars? I will answer it. But first

A Truly Free Society

The argument that 1000 children can never afford a two million dollar school house will be easy for you to refute without my aid. Have you ever gone into an A & P store? Or entered a multi-million dollar movie palace? Then you will realize that you as a patron were not imposed upon to capitalize the building. A supermarket is not put up by its customers. The enterpreneurs of a \$2,000,000. private school will raise money for it through any accepted method, If they can get 1000 prospective students per year, tuition at \$200 per head will pay for the building in ten years. Assuming, that is, all income goes to retire the debt. Probably they will pay for the building at \$50 per head per year over forty years. Some office buildings are amortized over 90 years, Let them finance it any way they

An expensive school on the West Coast can today educate children for \$100 per year. Chain schools modeled after chain stores can at least cut costs in half, trimming the price down to \$200. This is less than good public schools now charge taxpayers. But remember one thing. Parents won't have to save that \$200 over and above current expenses. Why not? Because that \$200 will not be collected in taxes. Parents can set the money aside for their children directly without having to pay the upkeep

of taxcollectors. Something else: By the time schools are returned to private ownership, every other form of socialism will have become a memory, Public schools, our most popular form of socialism, will be the last to go. Income tax will be abolished long before, Parents can apply that money to their children if they wish, I anticipate your next question: - What about people who can't afford even \$200 for their children? Those now subsidized by their neighbors. Wouldn't they suffer if socialism were sholished? For our answer let's turn to economics of capitalism. If it helps us out of this difficulty, we these children to suffer any more than you do.

You have said: "It seems only fair to educate as many children

as possible." Scems, madam! nay, it is: I know not 'seems'. Of course we must educate -- not only children - but as many grown ups as possible too. We can supply people with every demand they make. Go further. way beyond elementary needs, such as food, clothing and shelter, Provide them with all the luxury they want, as well, How can we do it? It sains like a miracle when we see how nuch we've done. Post miracles lead small compared to what we might do in the future. Yet we've worked miracles already compared to the accomplishments of the rest of humanity. We called this miracle, capitalism. But it means actually nothing more than recognizing natural law.

freely will supply people with everything they want. If they are rich enough to afford it. Ay, there's the rub, you say. And I agree with you. The problem then, we both agree, still deals with how to enable everybody to afford schools, How can we increase people's surplus out of which they pay for schools? How can we make our wealth resemble an upside-down pyramid which never stops growing? One day making enough bathtubs for everybody. The next year enough automobiles for everybody. That's where we are now, you know, Enough cars on the American roads for the whole population to go riding at once. Only Free Economy.

The law of supply and demand

Ad rocket ships, Ad infinitum. Somewhere along the way private schools will be built for everybody who demands them. It takes imagination to envision this, Yet we need no more imagination to dream of this than persons of the 19th Century who read of "airy navies" in Tennyson. Or atomic bombs in H. G. Wells, For this great expension we need no new formula. We need production; and only production, Working men stand a chance to afford great luxuries in our economy. But only on

our economy. Radios, automobiles, completely equipped kitchens, telephones and television. Absurd! If you'd lived fifty years ago. As absurd as widespread private education seems to you now, But workingmen now consider these things minimum pecessities.

All Education They Want Our economy can double, even

It did in the last fifty, If it does, I foresee a future in which factory workers afford not only cars and homes, but all the education they want. Not only factory workers. Here's where you apply that phrase, at an ever expanding rate. But people who work only a few months of the year. Part time labor, migratory farm workers may also aiford these things. I foresee a future in which the poorest will be rich compared to the poor of today, Impractical theorizing, you say? Wait-use your imagination. Or your money-we've seen the beginnings already. Under normal capitalism, the government bor-

rows no money and thereby causes no inflation, Prices ai.... down. The price of new cars went from 10,000 dollars in 1910 down to \$60) in 1939 before inflation began. Men's real cernings thus inercase constantly in normal times through increased purchasing nower. Finally a man need work all year long only if he wishes to fulfill some great dream. To afford the luxuries and necessities he need work but a few months. And finally but a few weel's. (Whether - not he uses his increased leisure to his benefit depends on the individual. Some will.) It takes a true liberal to be able to imagine this. But it's not a crackpot theory. It's not even a personal prediction. It's the logical future of the American idea.

Trying A New Bill of Rights Public education, and every other form of socialism violates the American idea as set down by the Founding Fathers, Lately the champions of various kinds of socialism have tried to reconcile their programme to the American idea. They have tried to write a new Bill of Rights. Roosevelt's Four Freedoms illustrates this attempt. Did Roosevelt respect our Bill of Rights? Then he might have offered it to the world. Instead he invented one of his own He wanted to make the socialist idea of freedom from fear and want (guaranteed security) respeciable. He associated guaranteed security with the already respected freedom of worship and speech. We don't have to refute the idea of freedom from fear and want here. Any respectable psychiatrist will tell you that wants and fears behave subjectively. Their absence can't be guaranteed without a major operation on everybody's psyche. A man's great-

Intelligent objection overruled, by pointing out: Do you consider man to have a God given right to property at birth? Then some other man must be forced to give him some of his property. The point was well taken and the pursuit of happiness was the happy choice. Nobody ever has a right to property. Or the right to work. Or the right to an education. Or the right to talk over the radio, People have a right to try to get these things. If some people fail, no agency can guarantee their success in attaining these privileges, without depriving other people of their lib-

Meaning of Equal Liberty Equal liberty does not mean that

people start on an equal footing. Do you want absolute equality? Then everybody will have to become exactly alike. Life will lose the spice of variety. Do you entertain the idea that children should be started on an equal footing? The idea contains a false premise. Children cannot be started on an equal footing without heavily subsidizing some, and trimming others down, Brain surgery would be required. Nature knows no such thing as equality. Our Founding Fathers provided for but one kind of equality: Equal Liberty. Do you want liberty for all? You can't have it if you take liberty away from so 12 in order to subsidize others, Does education determine opportunities? Not strictly ----

ing. Nothing determines opportunitles. Some steelworkers go to night school to learn more about their own jobs, Some don't, Who's to say that those who don't, can't Opportunities knock everywhere. Some answer the door. Others go out and make their own opportunities. Individual limitations may be determined. Lut nothing eise is. One way crists to help people fulfill their highert constities. Set them free, Private giving may help them a little. But nobedy should be forced to help ciliers against his will. Is education a boon to mankind? Does it increase a man's

Does it promote liberty? Can it teach the concept of freedom of knowledge? Then I am all for it, But it must be provided at an ever expanding rate, a rate that keeps pace with the skyrocket pace of capitalism. I believe eduism only by becoming a part of capitalism. Otherwise it must look to the federal government for funds, eventually losing touch with capitalism, eventually becoming completely stultified.

One Socialist Idea Demands Another

Do you believe that liberty will vork? You cannot at the same time believe in privilege guaranteed by law. Those two things are mutually contradictory. We can't believe in government subsidy of anybody. We can't believe in tariffs. Nor in an RFC. Nor in guarantees to bull market gamblers. Nor in public subsidy of shipping, airlines, nor of any business, Nor of the aged. The middle aged, Nor their children. Do you still argue for government dominance of the dissemination of knowledge? If soyour argument applies equally well to food, jobs, shelter, clothing and medical care. Do you allow one socialist idea? You cannot consistently deny others. Especially if those others rank higher up on the list of necessities. No stretch of imagination will make education more important to survival than food. Only the most doctrinaire and reactionary mind can admit the private supply of food and yet assert dogmatically that to supply education privately and in abundance is impossible. Will the law of supply and demand work for food? The most important thing to survival? The most perishable? The most difficult to handle? Then that law will work for anything. Some persons still refuse to con-

sider this idea and how it will work. We write them off as simply too reactionary to stretch their imaginations into fresh explorations. Others have imagina-

tions that refuse to remain asleep. Something stirs. They may have believed in public education religiously all their lives. But their doubts are now aroused. Once they've grasped the validity of the premise of liberty, logic will do the rest. Their minds will open when logic rings. And logic will lead them past the confusion, past the real obstacles. If they follow on and on, it will reveal to them & glimpse of beauty, It will reveal

the truly free society. H. G. Wells represented a kind of mind that thrived during the 19th Century Big minds that could look shead. Liberal minds that could envision and lay the groundwork for all our modern inventions including atomic energy. Wells once lamented: "Obscure men of letters are made the subject of intensive research . . . the far more romantic, thrilling and Illuminating document about the seekers and finders of great fortunes, are neither gathered nor cherished."

But Wells believed that these romantic men would triumph and lift the world to new heights, In THE DISCOVERY OF THE FU-TURE he described the creed ofthe true liberal in this burst of herole poetry! "The past is but the beginning of

a beginning, and all that is and has been is but the twilight of the dawn . . .

'A day will come when beings who are now latent in our loins shall stand upon this earth as one stands upon a foo'stool, and shall laugh and reach out their hands amid the stars,"

Listen, idealists, you who wish to do good in the world, You have my understanding for I am one of you. Our present strivings are but prelude. Fledglings beating their wings often flail one another. Stop encumbering those around you with your good intentions. Stand out of your brother's path and list en. Above you the high flights call. 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
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



Pampa Wages Fight Against **Polio Invasion**

Gray County's first polio victim this year finds the city of Pampa in the midst of fogging business and residential areas with DDT, pine oil and diesel oil to help rid the city of flies, reputed to be a carrier of the disease.

This process, said Ray Evans, city engineer, is being done for the second time this season and will be continued throughout the summer. Before polio and fly season began, the city sprayed each trash barrel and surrounding ground area with chlordane and diesel fuel to kill as many fly eggs as possible.

Swimming pools in the city Evans pointed out, are filled with chlorinated water which is recirculated at 600 gallons per minute. There is a complete change of water every six hours. Wading pools are also chlorinated, he said, and water in them changed every day.

During the recent clean - up campaign, 300 loads of trash were hauled out of the city in addition to the regular loads. Garbage in Pampa is picked up twice a week from each home and busi

All these measures are being taken to help keep down the spread of polio as local doctors urge special precaution not only in sanitation conditions but also in the area of small children.

X-Rays That Are Shown On TV Described

CHICAGO - (AP) - X-rays that put a picture on a TV screen can make a mosquito seem as big as a grapefruit.

These new pictures promise a safe, easy method of X-raying to detect early cancers or other troubles of the stomach or intestines. Or of letting a doctor watch exactly what happens when he sets broken bones. Hard . To Take

The X-ray device has been described to the American Medical Association by Robert J. Moon, University of Chicago physicist. X-ray pictures of the middle of the human body are hard to take clearly without using a fairly heavy dose of X-rays. Needed is some method that uses a light dose but gets clear pictures, and a method suitable for mass survey use like Chest X-rays to spot TB.

Moon's device gets X-rays from

electrons hitting a tungsten tar-get. The rays go through a tiny pinhole, and form a pattern. But only one in 10,000 of the rays gets through.

The rays pass through the body. then are turned into bursts of ultraviolet or suntan rays. A tube picks up these rays, turns them into electric impulses, and multiplies them many millions of times. These impulses go through a TV viewing tube, and appear magnified on the screen. The pictures are a thousand times more brilliant than the usual ones on a fluoroscopic screen. Can Watch Picture

The doctor can watch the picture on the screen, or take movies or still photographs of it. Atomic cocktails or radioactive iodine have helped 384 patients suffering from overactive thyroid glands, said four University of

through the spring — surprising-ly, in view of official estimates six months ago that the total wouldn't run much over 800,000. But now some of them have shifted to a cautious attitude. In part this may be due to disappointment over the federal reserve action in lowering slightly the required down payments on new houses under Regulation 'X" Many thought such controls should have been dropped en-drely, as the House Banking Com-

nittee has proposed. Also a factor are a few signs, including price cuts on older houses and more trouble in selling new ones, that actual de-mand for the building industry's output has slacked off a bit.

These developments were cited by George W. Warnecke, New Lork building financier, in expressing doubt that present volume of building will continue through the rest of the year. He believes many builders pushed housing projects in the arry months this year and now plan to sit back and see how they sell, before committing themselves further.

While Warnecke says there is ample financing for well-planned homes and apartment buildings in attractive locations, he points out that some large insurance sompanies and banks have uned their investment portfolios and now are doing only a replace-ment business in mortgages.

More analysts don't think this week's easing of Regulation "X"
will have much effect on the pace

of building. They reason that a home buyer still will have to find a lender willing to issue a mortgage on the somewhat more liberal terms. and this may prove dimcult.

Along this line, complaints like this are heard from some build-ers: many persons loaded them-selves with installment payments sor automobiles and appliances after credit controls on those articles were dropped. Now some of them want to buy homes but can't prove ability to meet addi-

tional payments.
Lower home prices could stime late lagging demand, but not much likelihood of this is seen.




