Brings Total To 316 . . . Sabre Jets Down Seven Red MIGs

SEOUL, Korea — (AP) — U. S. Sabre pilots shot down seven Russian-built MIG-15s and damaged two today as the Red jets swooped on Allied fighter-bombers blasting North Korean rail lines near Manchuria, the Air Force announced. The MIG kills were the first reported since Saturday. Five were shot down and two damaged in a battle just before noon between a screening force of 36 Sabre jets and 16 Red fighters.

ABILENE, Kas. — (AP) — Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's plunge into the turbulent pool of politics produced the well-defined impression today he is in the conservative camp of Republicans.

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Peace talks to end the five-day-old steel strike took on a hopeful air today as three-man negotiating teams for union and industry resumed intensive bargaining talks at the White House.

New Threat To Foreign Aid

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Senate Majority Leader McFarland faced a new fight today by Sen. Kean (R-Mo) for a tightened Allied blockade of steel nations when the Senate considers a \$6,447,730,750 foreign aid bill.

Postmen Pocket Pay

Pampa postoffice employees began to pocket their tardy paychecks late yesterday as authorization for payment finally came through from Washington.

Both houses of Congress rushed through appropriation bill and President Truman signed it so that 300,000 postal workers could begin getting their money. Postmaster Jesse Donaldson immediately authorized postmasters to resume salary payments.

On the Normandy beaches, France, Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway marks the eighth anniversary today of the World War II Normandy invasion with a return to the spot where the invasion was launched in the D-Day spearhead.

Price Director Ellis Aronson announced the revision of his government's five-month-old price ceiling on white potatoes, he told a news conference it would be "interesting to watch" which happens to potato prices, but refused to make any predictions.

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Home Craft, Adult Education Topics For Teachers' Meet

Approximately 20 homemaking teachers from the north part of Area 1 attended a workshop at the Pampa High School yesterday under the sponsorship of the Texas Education Agency. Demonstrations in re-upholstering furniture and discussions of developing adult education programs were main features on the program.

Mrs. Alsie Burch, teacher of homemaking at Pampa, presided over the workshop. Mrs. Martha Graves, director of home and family life education at Texas Tech, Lubbock, discussed the techniques for developing adult education programs.

A report on a recent planning committee meeting in San Antonio was made by Mrs. Sue Lynn Hilkey, Hereford. She announced that the State Conference for Homemaking Teachers would be in San Antonio August 11-15.

Presiding at the workshop was Miss Esther Sorenson, district supervisor in Area 1. Miss Sorenson and Mrs. Graves participated in a similar workshop at Floyd Tuesday.

Miss Edith Kral and Mrs. Frances Tuntor, local homemaking teachers, served as hostesses. It was pointed out during the meeting that education for adults is available through the vocational homemaking education program in the public schools. Oilmen Warned Of 'Salami' Tactics

ALBUQUERQUE, June 5 — "Salami tactics" such as those used by European Communists are the big danger to American freedom, the nation's oil prospectors were told today.

Carl E. Reistle, Jr., of Houston, director in charge of production for Humble Oil & Refining Co., said the answer is to build up national reserves to the point that "liberty is inseparable from a free economy."

Reistle expressed his views in a speech prepared for the opening of the 29th annual convention of the National Oil Scouts and Landmen's Association.

He described salami tactics as "the principle of demanding a little more each day, like cutting salami slice after slice."

"When oil men speak of reserves," Reistle said, "we think of the billions of barrels of oil and the trillions of cubic feet of natural gas locked in nature's storehouse.

"Those reserves we shall certainly need if ever again the right for freedom is joined on a worldwide scale. But the reserves I have in mind now are those needed on the home front."

Western Union Seeks Increase In Rates

WASHINGTON, June 5 — The Western Union Telegraph Co. petitioned the government today for authority to raise its domestic message and money order rates 9.5 per cent. It said the boost is needed to pay its employees.

The company posted proposed higher rates with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) and fixed July 6 as the effective date of the boost.

Retail Meat Prices Drop

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio appealed to the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) for a nationwide radio-TV hookup such as the three major networks gave Dwight D. Eisenhower's Abilene address.

Taft and Eisenhower are the top contenders for the Republican presidential nomination.

Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) seeking the Democratic nomination, has similarly protested the refusal of CBS to give him the same amount of time it gave Eisenhower.

Taft told the FCC in a letter yesterday that the Columbia, National and American broadcasting systems had turned down his request for a simultaneous half-hour over the three networks at the same time of day Eisenhower spoke. That was 6 to 6:30 p.m. EST.

NBC officials said in New York they were "still discussing" the matter. ABC and CBS officials could not be reached for comment.

Taft said the networks asserted he had been accorded nationwide broadcasting facilities a number of times in the past. But, Taft said, that was before he announced his candidacy.

FCC made the rules for radio and TV. It could order the networks to give Taft the cost-free time he requests.

Taft wrote FCC that Eisenhower got the half-hour of coast-to-coast broadcasting time for "a purely political speech" and that he, therefore, was entitled to the same treatment.

He said any day within the next week would do.

Eisenhower tried hard to avoid personalities but he offered an olive branch to friends of Sen. Douglas MacArthur, who has been supporting Taft openly.

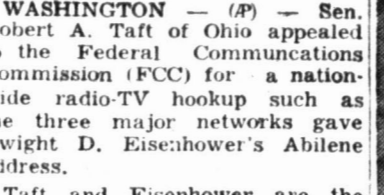

At least one judicial hopeful believes in taking his wife campaigning with him.

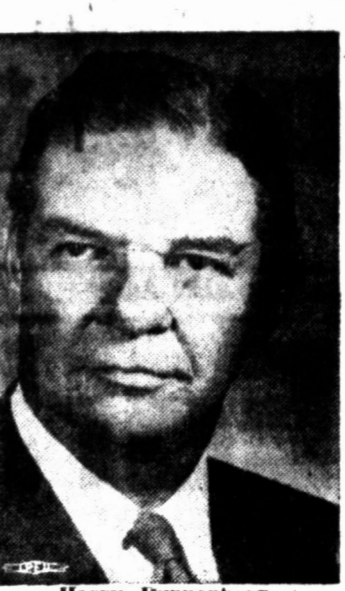
He is Atty. Harry Bunnenberg, Vernon, seeking the seat on the Court of Civil Appeals, 7th Supreme Judicial District, Amarillo, being vacated by Justice James G. Jamppin.

Both Atty. and Mrs. Bunnenberg contacted old friends, attorneys and others, Mrs. Bunnenberg visited the press, radio and various merchants in an attempt to gain support for her husband in the coming July 26 Democratic primary.

Bunnenberg is not to be confused with a fellow townsman, Jesse Owens, who is seeking a place on the Court of Criminal Appeals at Austin.

The civil appeals candidate has practiced law in Vernon and Wichita Falls for 30 years, sticking solely to civil cases. He has served several times as special judge when his home district judge was unable to hold court for various reasons.

Born in Missouri, Bunnenberg moved to Wichita Falls as a boy of six. Following graduation from high school he entered University of Missouri law school, graduating in 1920. He returned to Wichita Falls to enter private practice and 16 years ago moved his residence to Vernon.

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Air Force Ready To Resume Berlin Air Lift If Necessary

FRANKFURT, Germany — (AP) — If the Communist squeeze on Berlin turns into a new blockade, the U. S. Air Force is ready and able to revive the airlift which broke the first siege three years ago.

Although the Russians have instituted a system of passes for travel between Berlin and the western occupation zones which could be the lever for a blockade, they have not yet cracked down. Road, rail and barge traf-

ic so far has been moving normally.

An Air Force spokesman says lanes for an airlift are available and plans have been kept up to date for such an emergency. He said, however, the Air Force has not been given 'any new alert' to prepare for an airlift.

Such instructions would have to come from the State Department, he said.

Sources here believe British and French planes also would be available if needed. Both these occupation powers participated in the original airlift which fed and supplied West Berlin for nearly a year during the first Soviet blockade in 1948 and 1949.

U. S. Air Force officials conceded they do not have as many cargo planes immediately available now as they used during the height of the first airlift, when more than 10,000 tons of supplies were flown to Berlin every day.

But the supply of planes is adequate, they said, and exceeds the number available at the start of the last airlift.

There are more big cargo planes in Germany today than during most of the airlift period. In addition to the two - engine C47s and four - engine C54s which did the bulk of the American work before, the U. S. Air Force now has in Germany many of the much larger C 119 "Flying Packets" and C189 "Flying Boxcars."

A new Red crackdown also would find Berlin far better backlogged than in 1948. Officials estimate that West Berlin now has enough food and

United Pipeline Seeks Rate Hike

WASHINGTON — (AP) — United Gas Pipe Line Co. wants to hike its wholesale natural gas rates and transportation charges by 64 percent.

The firm has asked the Power Commission for an \$8,400,000 yearly increase, effective July 1. At the same time it proposes to replace all of its special contracts with a generally available tariff.

The FPC said the proposed increases would affect customers which serve areas throughout the Midwest, South and East. It listed the companies and in-

Mystery Fires Solved—Partly

DANVILLE, Ky. — (AP) — Those mysterious fires plaguing the John Gibson household since Saturday have been solved—almost.

A 13-year-old niece of the Gibsons has admitted she set 22 of the pesky little blazes.

But sparks of mystery, and fire, continue. Investigators said a twenty-third fire was reported after the girl was taken from the four-room Gibson home for questioning. The cause of this blaze hasn't been solved.

Further questioning of the girl and Mr. and Mrs. Gibson was planned, authorities said. The investigators said Johnnie Dee Bailey, a fifth grader, admitted setting the fires—the first on impulse for fun, the others to keep up the mystery. The family managed to put out most of the fires.

She has been residing with the Gibsons but was sent to the home of friends for the night. Her father, Clarence Bailey, was killed in an accident in Indiana eight years ago.

Fire Chief Alex Upton had reported Monday after "a thorough investigation" that he thought the fires were set, but blamed no one then. Table cloths, curtains and bed clothing were among articles burned.

Investigators from the state fire marshal's office were called in and conducted the inquiry with city and county officers. No charges were filed.

Youngsters Play Bulldozer

KANSAS City, Mo. — (AP) — The two youngsters were playing "tank" aboard two bulldozers when one of them accidentally pressed the starter on one of them.

MOSCOW — (AP) — The Moscow film studio — which has recently been under criticism — is coming out with a new program of pictures.

"Unfortunately, last year the studio did not cope with this task and preparation of scenarios was unsatisfactory," says S. Kuznetsov, director of the Moscow film studio.

"We were obliged to plan only on the basis of one scenario to each producer. And this led to uncompleted scenarios being used for film production, work having to be continued on them during the shooting of the film,

which had a bad effect on regular release of films," he says.

NEW YORK — (AP) — How much real democracy is there among dog lovers? Quite a bit, according to bartender Bill O'Brien, who forked over \$50 to a customer for a puppy that looked like a four-legged gray mop and has turned out to be a blue ribbon show dog.

I have written about Bill before. He's a big ex-army sergeant who blew the alarm bugle at Pearl Harbor. Rendezvous O'Brien is night maestro at Moriarty's Midtown Bar and Grill, an establishment two doors from Toot Shor's that has become a rendezvous for newspapermen, dancers, singers, actors and musicians.

Overwhelmed by this victory, Bill entered Mike soon after in another top-flight metropolitan canine show. But Mike still grows

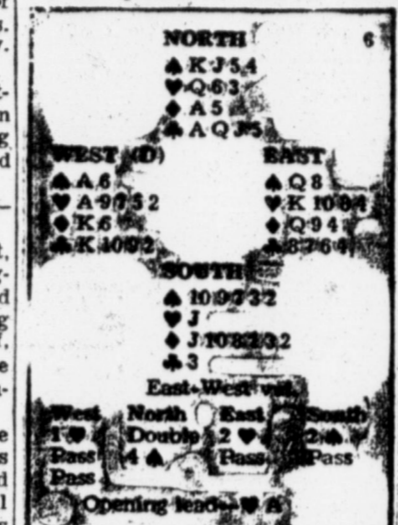

Here Is Precision Free-Bid Playing

If you make free bids on distributional values without high cards you have to be prepared to play the cards with great precision. It's a cinch that your partner will rely on you for strength, because of your free bid, and he will therefore tend to get you into high contracts.

In today's hand South made a free bid with 6-3-1 distribution but with only a couple of jacks in high card strength. North promptly put him into game, which South would have made if his play had been as correct as his bidding was ambitious. West opened the ace of hearts



and continued the suit, forcing South to ruff. South decided, properly enough, to establish his own hand and led the jack of diamonds at the third trick. West covered with the king of diamonds, and dummy won with the ace.

Declarer now fell on his nose by returning dummy's low diamond. East stepped up with the queen of diamonds and had no trouble in seeing that the contract could be defeated only if the defense could get two trump tricks.

East saw that the best chance was to return his last diamond in the hope that South had led on distribution and that his partner could ruff with the ace of spades.

East's analysis was perfectly correct. West ruffed with the ace of spades, and East later got the queen of spades for the setting trick.

Declarer would have made the contract if he had played the hand properly. After winning in dummy with the ace of diamonds, he should ruff a heart to get to his own hand and should then lead a trump towards dummy.

If West puts up the ace of spades he is then unable to over-ruff dummy on the third round of diamonds. If West plays his low trump, dummy wins with the king of spades and returns a trump to clear the suit.

West's best defense is to lead the fourth round of hearts, but dummy can take the punch. Now a low diamond is returned from the dummy and East can take the queen of diamonds but no more.

When Helper Counts Sheep, He Counts 'Em
