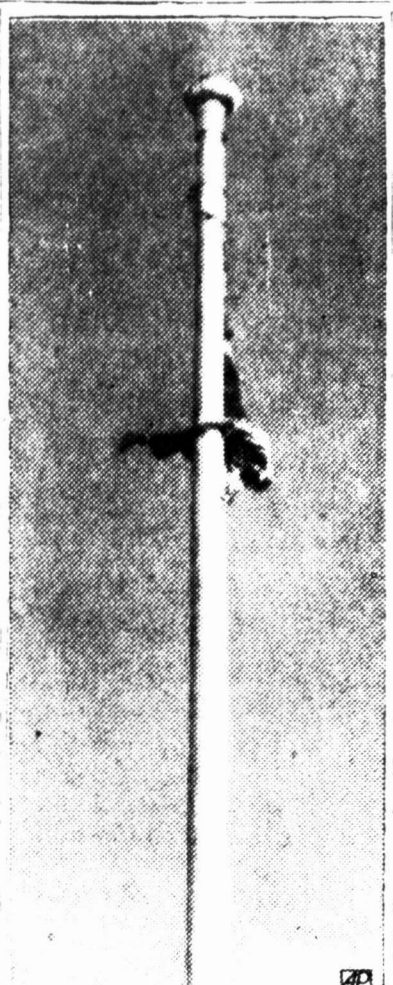
Several of Edwards' coworkers at the Panhandle packing house had stopped their car on the south side of the street in order to pick up Edwards and carry him to work.

### Romania Halts Jewish Flight

VIENNA, Austria (AP)—Diplomatic reports from Bucharest claim that Romania's Communist government has suspended completely the migration of thousands of Jews to Israel.

The reports said also that the Communist government's mass deportation of "politically unreliable" citizens from the cities has spread to Brasov in the Transylvanian Alps, and that thousands are being driven from their homes there.

Through last March, the Romanian government permitted up to 8000 Jews to leave Romania each month.

In April only a trickle of Jews boarded the S. S. Transylvania, which plies between Constanta and Haifa. In May and early

### Japanese Developing Industrial Power

TOKYO (AP)—Japanese power companies expect to spend 235 million dollars this year in developing new hydroelectric and coal plants to meet increasing demands.

The National Public Utility Commission said present capacity of 9 million kilowatts will be increased by 1,287,000 kilowatts.

June, the diplomatic reports said, no Jews secured exit permits. The ban on emigration appeared designed to force the Jewish population into Romania's labor force. The Communists reportedly have set up a "Jewish Democratic Committee" to drive Jews into factories, mines and farms.

The committee, the diplomats said, has been publishing alleged letters from emigrants to Israel, severely criticizing conditions here.

This campaign also is being accompanied by a wave of anti-Semitism current in Romania and believed a factor in the recent fall from grace of Ana Pauker, the country's Jewish-born foreign minister.

### Ike Edging Into Role Of A Fighter

WASHINGTON (AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower is edging slowly into the role of a fighting candidate. He and Sen. Robert A. Taft may yet be slugging it out toe-to-toe for the Republican presidential nomination.

Two weeks of civilian campaigning appear to have drawn the five-star general much further into the active battle for the nomination than he expected when he first returned from Europe. Some of Eisenhower's associates are predicting that before the end of another week he will abandon his already strained "no personalities" rule and will be striking out directly at Taft, his chief rival.

Already, his aides say, the general came closer in a Saturday night speech in Detroit than ever before to becoming the battling candidate they want to see in action.

In that speech Eisenhower lashed himself a "no-deal candidate"—a thrust at Taft's maneuvers to control the machinery of the GOP convention opening in Chicago July 7.

Having kissed babies, ridden bareheaded in parades, signed autographs and accepted carved wooden elephants, Eisenhower has come a long way from the attitude he expressed in Europe. There he said if the American people wanted him they knew where to find him.

The next step, some of his advisers say, will be to join personally in the hue and cry his campaign managers have raised about what they call the theft of delegates by the Taft forces in Texas and other states.

Taft backers generally will welcome a knock-down fight with Eisenhower, believing the Ohio senator is more adept at that kind of politics than the general. Compared with the smooth political sides, the Eisenhower campaign still bears the aura of an amateur performance. Nobody is quite certain what is going to happen, or where.

Eisenhower himself makes it plain he isn't used to doing many of the things men reported of him and doesn't like some of them. He regards it as a chore to have to make speeches, particularly those with prepared texts. The general has found he isn't his own boss any more.

He has been briefed extensively since his return, but still isn't familiar with political details. He didn't know, for instance, that Secretary of Defense Lovett and John J. McCloy, defense commissioner in Germany are Republicans.

### Kefauver Warns Of Isolationism Under Taft Or Eisenhower

CLEVELAND (AP)—Confident he will win the Democratic nomination, Sen. Estes Kefauver says if either White House, isolationism will dominate the Republican party.

The Taft-Hartley Act was his main target in his address at the convention of the CIO Communications Workers of America.

Kefauver said he might be nominated on the first ballot, but it was more likely to be the fifth or sixth ballot. He estimated he has more than 30 convention delegates committed to him. For nomination, 616 votes are required.

The senator told reporters he thought Gen. Eisenhower's candidacy "is weaker today than when he came back from Europe."

He said he was "surprised to find him so conservative on domestic issues," and declared the general and Sen. Taft of Ohio agree on the Taft-Hartley Act.

In his convention talk he said he doubted whether the general shares "the isolationist sentiments of most of the leaders of his party."

"But I don't think that will do Gen. Eisenhower much good," he went on. "No matter what Republican is in the White House, the Republican isolationists will dominate the party."

# Carl Erskine Throws No-Hitter Against Cubs

The boys who know baseball best have been saying for some time that when Carl Erskine learned to control the ball consistently he would be a great pitcher.

The 5-year old Brooklyn right hander from Anderson, Ind., apparently has learned that lesson. If he hasn't there were a lot of people, including the Chicago Cubs, badly fooled yesterday as he faced only 28 men while holding the Bruin's hitless for a 5-0 Dodger victory.

And the only thing that kept him from pitching the first perfect game since Charley Robertson of the Chicago White Sox retired 27 Detroit Tigers in 1921 was a walk to opposing pitcher Willie Ramadell in the third inning.

"The only man who couldn't have hit the ball out of the park if I'd tied it up for him," said the slim Dodger hurler.

Ramadell, who relieved Warren Hacker in the second after the league leaders had scored four runs, has made only one hit in 16 times at bat this season.

"It was going to rain any minute," Carl explained. "I was trying to hurry it up. I threw four fast balls in a hurry and just couldn't get them over."

Sure enough, rain started falling a few minutes later and the game was held up for 45 minutes. But Erskine came back ever stronger.

Erskine's feat highlighted a day of top flight pitching performances.

Philadelphia's pint-sized Bob Shantz racked up his 11th successive victory and his 12th of the season as the Athletics divided a double header with the Chicago White Sox, winning 4-1 and losing 5-4.

Allie Reynolds, the big New York Yankee righthander who shuns help from relief pitchers, hurled his third shutout of the year and his 15th consecutive complete game in blanking the Detroit Tigers, 6-0.

Ivan Delock, whose regular chores with the Boston Red Sox in relief pitching, held the St. Louis Browns to five scattered hits to record his third victory, 2-0.

Little Murry Dickson of the Pittsburgh Pirates also twirled five-hit ball as the cellar-dwelling Buccs defeated the New York Yankees 3-1 in an argument-studded game played under protest after the third inning.

**Redlegs Rally**

The defeat dropped the Giants five games back of the Dodgers.

Hank Edwards blasted relief pitcher Sheldon Jones for a three-run homer in the ninth to give the Cincinnati Reds a 7-4 arc-light victory over the Boston Braves. In another night contest the St. Louis Cardinals bunched five tallies in the sixth for a 6-4 decision over the Philadelphia Phillies. Doubles by Hal Rice and Red Schoendienst and Cloyd Boyer's triple were the big blows.

Washington shoved Cleveland deeper into fourth place with a 6-3 victory.

Erskine struck out just one Cub but only five balls were hit to the outfield. Third baseman Bobby Morgan came up with two great stops and throws. Shortstop Pee Wee Reese and second baseman Jackie Robinson also sparkled. And Erskine himself figured in six of the putouts.

**Thanks Control**

"My control did it," said Erskine who had a 16-12 record with the Dodgers in 1951 — his first full season in the majors. "I threw a lot of curves and some fast ball. I had them hitting the pitch I wanted them to. My control was so good, I didn't have to resort to my change of pace, which is my best pitch."

In fact he threw his change-up only once in the 103 serves required for his masterpiece.

"It was a 'Fondy' Cuba's first baseman," recalled Roy Campanella, who was on the receiving end of a no-hitter for the first time in his 16 years of baseball. "He had a good slider and a good curve and a live fast ball that hopped."

The no-hitter, the second in the majors this season, marked the first time the Cubs had been held hitless since Fred Toney of Cincinnati did it in 1917. The other 1952 no-hitter was turned in by Detroit's Virgil Trucks against Washington May 15.

The Pirates backed up Dickson's pitching with an attack good for five runs in a hectic third inning. The rhabarb started when Dick Groat, star Duke University athlete, made his first major league hit. The single sent two

How did the seventh-inning stretch originate in baseball? It's not of any great consequence and the world will go on without the answer but for those who deal in "how it began" it's an intriguing question.

Even the baseball powers do not know exactly.

Commissioner Ford Frick's office says the generally accepted origin is that the late President Howard Taft, while attending a big league game, got up to stretch his legs in the seventh inning. Everybody else followed suit.

Dave Grose, manager of the National League service bureau, gives two versions.

1. During a game between Providence and Boston in 1884-1886 for some unknown reason, the fans decided to rise and stretch at that particular point of the contest. The newspapers commented on it and it grew to be a habit in Providence and was picked up from there.

2. A newspaper clipping says the seventh-inning stretch originated during a game in Pittsburgh (the year not mentioned) when President Taft decided to take a stretch. The clipping says: "Thinking the chief executive was about to leave the ball park, the fans stood out of respect. Then, when it was discovered that Taft was only stretching, baseball fans took up the idea and since that time it has been customary for the spectators to rise and stretch before the home team goes to bat in the seventh inning." But this clipping said other accounts differed as to the origin of the stretch.

That's as close as can be gotten on why you rise and take a stretch in the middle of the seventh inning. But, like the Texas League and other terms and customs in baseball, it just goes on and on without anybody knowing

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## Montes Off For National AAU

**EL PASO (AP)** — Javier Montes, the Texas western distance runner who passed up the 1952 pro circuit, has accepted an invitation to compete in the National AAU in an effort to make the United States team. He will run the 1,500 meters.

Montes decided to compete in the United States because of criticism he had received for accepting an invitation to run on the Mexican team. Eric Pohl, registrar of the South Texas AAU, had protested Montes' competing for Mexico.

The Texas Western runner said he was born in Socorro, Chihuahua, Mexico, and was qualified to represent Mexico under that country's dual citizenship law.

The Mexican Olympics team was named last night and Montes was left off of it.

Gen. Jose Clark Flores, head of the Mexican Sports Federation which picked the Olympic squad said Montes' name was not included because "we don't want any international problems."

In the opposite bracket, hot-shooting Betty Jameson, who won the meet in 1942, tangled over 18 holes with the only surviving amateur Barbara Romack of Sacramento, Calif.

Miss Jameson yesterday knocked out Patty Berg, defending champion, 5 and 3. Miss Romack eliminated Barbara McIntire 4 and 3. Miss Rawls beat Peggy Kirk 2 up and Miss Suggs eliminated Mary Lena Faulk, 5 and 4.

# Storm Signals Hint Everything Rising in Value Except Women

NEW YORK (AP)—Ladies, there are storm signals in the news hinting that everything is rising in value today except wives. Are wives over-inflated? Should they be put under controls? These issues have been raised by two recent items of interest to every thoughtful woman and by that, of course, I mean every woman:

1. — A British judge, granting a divorce to a husband whose wife ran off with another man, cut the husband's claim for damages from \$700 to \$210, and said: "Her value to her husband was diminishing from year to year because of disagreements."

2. — Dr. Samuel W. Stevenson, a Virginia professor, describing women as "the arch foe," called for a new St. George to emancipate American men and give them four new freedoms, to wit: "Freedom from nagging, freedom from backseat driving, freedom to relax in old clothes after a hard day's work, and freedom from indignation."

Observing with sad hilarity that men no longer deserved the title "mice" as women are afraid of mice, he said "we have become worms."

It is high time, the good professor added, that we force the restoration of the word "obey" in the marriage ceremony, if I think men also ought to decide when they need a haircut, pick their own clothes and their wife's hats, and decide whether "the nearby are to be kept up with or not."

But this was his most revolutionary idea: "No woman, married or single, shall be permitted to speak of her intuition until she had kept in writing for one year an accurate account of all her snap judgments and has compiled a

record of at least 60 per cent accuracy."

The average wife would leap at this chance to show Dr. Stevenson up. Any woman instinctively knows enough about double entry bookkeeping to prove her intuition is at least 99 per cent correct — not a lame 60 per cent.

Nor can we see many wives getting thin from worrying over the professor's bugle call for a male rebellion in America. If husbands have become worms in this country it is through sheer laziness, the abandonment of masculine responsibility to the philosophy of "let the little woman do it." Such worms are unlikely to turn in revolt.

But that British judge's decision is an entirely different matter. It strikes at the very heart of women's theory of power.

Does any wife want it written in the lawbooks that her value decreases "from year to year because of disagreements?" It is an uneasy precedent.

**Persistent Suitor Finally Wins Wife**

NORFOLK, Va. (AP)—Edward Allen Smith was turned down when he first proposed to Miss Kathryn Voss but he has finally won her over—53 years later.

They were married Wednesday at nearby Ocean View.

The two grew up together in Big Rapids, Mich., but Smith came here in 1899 to get a job. He wrote her and proposed.

"I was visiting friends in a good time and was going with other boys. I wrote and turned him down," she explains.

She later married someone else. So did Smith.

Smith's wife died, as did Mrs. Roberts' husband. The two were reunited in January of this year in St. Petersburg, Fla. Smith said, "I wanted her 53 years ago so I proposed again."

Mrs. Monte B. Jones, Gold Star Mothers president here and in charge of Saturday's arrangements, expressed regret Mrs. Eisenhower won't be able to make it.

"But any parent with children in the service can appreciate the situation," she said.

## American Love For Good Food Brings A Boom To Farmers

NEW YORK (AP)—The American Institute of Food Distribution says almost all retail food store operators expect to go right on, the rest of this year at least, selling more food than last year. They credit the continued heavy spending of prosperous consumers.

Chief factor in recent years has been the ability of lower income groups to enlarge their buying of food, both in the amount they buy and the better quality they can afford.

The sharp increase in total food sales in this country is due in part to the big baby crops which push population totals higher. But other factors are more important.

Chief is the change that has come over the national diet. Since the depression years the lower-priced bulky and starchy foods have lost ground, relatively to meats, eggs, milk, fresh fruit and vegetables. Over the year's Americans also have tended to spend more of their income on choicer meats and better quality vegetables and groceries.

All of this can change quickly if incomes drop, due to unemployment or other reasons.

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## Government Seeks Home for Lab.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Communities usually clamor for 10-million-dollar federal projects but the Senate has approved one the government may have trouble finding a home for.

The sum was approved for a laboratory to investigate foot and mouth and other animal diseases. Some places already mentioned as sites have expressed downright hostility.

## Kefauver Gets 71.9 Percent Of Oregon Vote
