# Senator Taft Blasts 'Can't Win' Bugaboo

## **House** Passes Compromise **Control Bill**

WASHINGTON (.P)- The House last night passed, 194 to 142, and sped to President Truman a compromise 10month extension of price and wage controls due to expire at midnight Monday.

The Senate had approved the measure earlier in the day on a voice vote. The compromise had been hammered out by a Senate-House conference committee in a grueling night session that ended early Saturday.

Although the administration did not get all it asked, by any means, the bill was regarded as something of a victory for President Truman. The Senate-House amendment by Rep. Talle (R-lowa) to remove controls from all commodities not under rationing or allo cation.

Since nothing is rationed now. and few things are allocated, this would have been a body blow to the adinistration control plans. The conferees also drastically modified a provision by Rep. Cole (R-Kan) to guarantee sellers their price markups based on individual rather than industry-wide profit margins before the outbreak of

## **Claims Foes Have No Other Argument**

WASHINGTON (.P)-Sen. Robert Taft of Ohio blasted Saturday at the "can't win" bugaboo he said is his chief remaining hurdle in the race for the Republican presidential nonmation.

Taft told a news conference there isn't any other effective argument being used against him except what he called the mistaken belief on the part of some delegates that he would have difficulty beating the Democratic nominee in November.

"The only thing anybody has got against me is the claim that I can't carry the election and there is no basis for that," he said. "It's the only effective argument left, There is no other argument



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wheat-producing areas, the department's production and marketing administration is telling farmers this year's prospective big crop could cause prices to drop considerably.

One way to prevent his, it says, is to store wheat under the department's price support program until prices get netter. A sharp drop in prices might well become a campaign issue as was the case in 1948. In the last election, Democrats named a Republican Congress, contending it weakened the government ability to support prices by limit ing the department's authority to provide storage facilities.

This year the Democratic administration has had a free rein in settling farm policies and programs. It has set price supports for wheat and other major crops at the top limit of price support legislation, and has had full authority to provide storage facilities.

This year's wheat crop has been forecast at 1,326,000,000 bushels a third larger than last year. The administration has promised to support the grain at a national average of not less than \$2.19 a bushel

In its circular to growers, the department said records of past performance in the marketing and price of wheat show that nistorically more than a third of the crop is sold in July and August.

"Prices during these months in the big crop years are us-ually considerably below wheat prices during the remainder of the year, and also below the suppert price," it says.

The department says farmers should not sell lower than the government support price. If market prices drop below support levels, it says, farmers should store their grain on the tarm or in approved warehouses and get a government price support loan on

A similar "hold-off the-market campaign was carried on by the department in the case of cotton last year, when cotton prices started tumbling after prospects of a big crop.

Officials said plans are being made to use the same technique for corn, soybeans and other crops should big production start pulling prices downward,

# A Look At Education

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Wonder if it isn't about time to take stock of this "education" business? The thought is prompted by a recent press report that "Education Level Is Now Highest in U. S. History."

On the face of it, this ought to indicate real progress on the part of America. This general statement con-cerning the "education level" ought to be accompanied with addditional embellishments showing that the increase in the level has resulted in greater progress, happiness, sound prosperity, true peace and all of the rest of the things that go toward making life better for all of us.

Since we have increased the "education level" there should have followed an increase in other fields of human endeavor as the result of being "smarter" than we were in previous generations. If we are no better off than we were before, then maybe it is time to look a little more closely at the field of education and see just what it is that we're spending our money for.

In the first place, it should be realized that this "level" really represents a considerable span of time. That is, it does not mean that we suddenly or in over-night fashion jumped the level from one point to another. Theoretically, we have been getting "smarter" steadily and consistently so that in 40 - 44 age group in this country today the average person had completed only two years of high school. In the 25 - 29 group, which finished schooling in the past, the average person was a high school graduate. And this has been the pattern through all of the schooling years from approximately 1915 to the present time, the 1915 date being about that time the 40 - 44 age group started their school work.

Well, how does the record look?

Are we better off than we were in, say 1915? Or 1925? Or 1935? Or 1945?

Keeping in mind that it is impossible to pin it down to just one year or any specific date, how does the overall picture look to you today as compared with some of these previous years?

In the field of progress from the standpoint of material wealth and production there can be little doubt but that there has been advancement. We know how to make more things out of more things faster and better than we did before although some of the edge might be worn a little thin inasmuch as we have more people in the field of production than we have ever had before. We have speeded mechanical production in virtually every field and have made simple the task of living that once occupied so many of our waking hours. Keeping a home, for instance, has been increasingly simplified from the standpoint of the housekeeper so that we have developed all manner of interests for homemakers, including working regularly and steadily at an outside job. That more and more families are finding it necessary to have two producers in the family in order to "get along" may be contributed to a flood of new desires coupled with the unvarnished fact that we are devoting more and more of our productive hours to pay for all of the nonproductive government we have. So we have progressed to the point that there is more leisure time in the home but it is taken up in providing the livelihood to pay for the things that provide the leisure time.

During the time that we have been making this advance in schooling we have fought two full-scale wars, are now embroiled in a third war and the present one looks as though it will come "busting out all over" any minute. The rate of broken homes continues to mount and the juvenile delinquency" figures continue climbing. Crime is an organized and flourishing business in spite of all of the Congressional investigations. Does it seem as though we are any happier?

True, we are living in an "era of prosperity" but it is an era of false prosperity and more and more people are finding it out as they check the amount of deductions from their pay checks. We have borrowed ahead so many generations that it is now impossible to pay our debts and sooner or later the day of reckoning will come to prove the fact.

All in all, the score card looks very much as though we had made a little progress in the field of material production and should be a lot better off than we were in previous years but we're not. It looks as though all of the "education" we have received has taught us very little except disrespect for the inherent rights of others. It looks as though we have learned to read and write, only to read and write ourselves down the road to socialism and slavery. We have advanced communications only to see and hear the wrong things. We have advanced our creature comforts largely at the expense of having one war after another.

We who are convinced that most of the difficulties that beset us today have their fountainhead in the belief in and the fostering of state controlled "education" feel that it is time that our nation took careful stock of the field of education. We who believe in the free enterprise system are more convinced than ever that it is vital to our survival as a free nation to let the free enterprise system operate in the field of ideas and education.


