# **Traffic Deaths** Fall Far Short **Of Predictions**

BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Traffic fatalities in Texas ove the Fourth of July week end apparently fell far short of prediction made by the State Department of Public Safety,

Safety Director Homer Garrison confimed that the low traffic death rate reported up to midnight Sunday was correct.

At least 17 Texans had died in traffic crashes. But Garrison's department, basing its prediction on past experience, figured that the Independence Day celebration would claimm at least 42 lives by traffic. by traffic.

'It's marvelous if it's true, Garrison said Sunday night. He said that up to that time, the deaths by traffic were below the normal seven per day.

"I hope for once people have decided to drive sately for the sake of their own lives and the lives of others," he added.

But other violence early Monday had claimed almost enough dead to fill in for the slow-down in the traffic fatalities. Seven persons were reported drowned, six were shot to death, and eight cied in a variety of other acci-

dents.



CHICAGO (AP) - Shock troops in the Taft - Eisenhower battle for the Republican presidential nomination headed toward a major skirmish today over proposed changes in GOP convention rules.

Both sides seemed determined to fight it out. Peacemakers working into the dawn trudged wearily to their hotel beds conceding they saw little chance of averting a head-on clash.







An opinion approved by Atty. Gen. Price Daniel revealed one loophole in the new Texas election code. It is a gap big enough for a political machine in control of a county government to drive a bandwagon through.

The code provides, according to the ruling of the attorney general's office, that absentee ballots are to be counted by a special canvassing board in the county clerk's office and not distributed to the various voting · precincts even after they are counted.

Furthermore, returns of absentee voters counted in the clerk's office need not be made separate for each voting precinct, except for the office of precinct chairman in primary elections and for governor in general elections.

The opinion says it is left to the special canvassing board as to how it shall determine the precinct residence. of the voter without impinging on the secrecy of the ballot

Now there is the machine politician's dream of an election law!

No longer will he run the risk of having his obsentee ballots challenged by some alert representative of the opposition at the polling place. The absentee votes will be counted in secret, by the machine's handpicked special convassing board. The votes will not be credited to the precinct in which the voter lives.


It is recalled that in fairly recent elections in Starr and Webb counties, more absentee ballots were cast than in the most populous counties of the state. If all those absentee ballots were legitimate, then Starr and Webb have the highest percentage of traveling salesmen residing within their boundaries of any other spots in Texas

It has long been the "Old Spanish Custom" of the Bexar county (San Antonio) machine to require all prostitutes and taxi drivers to vote absentee ballots. That made it sure that they would vote, and vote right.

Except when they use voting machines, there is still no secrecy about how anybody votes if the county election machinery is dominated by a political machine. So in many of these counties there has been a gradual increase in the number of absentee ballots cast by city and county employees. The bosses order it that way so that is the way the employe votes can be checked.

Under this new election code we can expect the cbsentee vote totals to rise to new heights.



# Principles Obscured

A great deal of debate over the pros and cons of the price control laws has been confined to whether or not retail prices would rise if the restrictions were abandoned. Advocates of continued controls say prices would go upopponents of controls believe there would be little if any change

This argument over possible price trends, unfortunately, has tended to hide the far more important long range principles which are involved. The controls --- which simply represent an effort to run our complex economy by political fiat — are a disease which attacks the vitals of the free enterprise system of doing things. They are tremendously costly to business of all kinds --- to say nothing of the taxpayers who must pay the large administrative overhead. They discourage initiative. They retard production. Over the long pull, they always create scarcities -a fact which has been demonstrated in nation after nation in both ancient and modern times.

But, people may ask, how can prices be held to a fair level? That can be answered in a phrase — through open competition. As consumers, we see the working of competition best at the retail level of business. The nation is served by hundreds of thousands of stores. Some are small) some are large. Some are specialized, some deal in almost any kind of merchandise. Some are operated independently, some are part of national and regional chain systems. But all have one thing in common --- they are out to get the consumer's business and use every legitimate inducement to that end. This is the classical way in which prices are held down and service to the public is continually bettered.

Defence

Some time ago the President slashingly attacked the power and light utilities because of their advertising and related activities in opposition to socialization of this great industry. The attack caused a great deal of editorial comment throughout the nation, most of it strongly opposing the President's stand. The Johnstown, Pennsylvania, Tribune expressed a widely held attitude when it said

"The Tribune holds no brief for private power companies. They have made some very serious errors in the past. They have also produced cheap and plentiful electric power for the American people, and contributed greatly to the economic progress of the nation . . . There is one sort of power, however, to which this newspaper strongly objects, and that is the centralized, bureducratic power of government over the economy and the people of this nation. And the concentration of the resources of electric power in the hands of the government would be a long step in that direction. But an even longer step toward this centralization of all power in the hands of the chief executive of the nation is implied In his seeming proposal to deprive the opponents of administration policies of their right to carry their case to the American people, through the recognized methods of public information."
