Expert Says Organized Crime Infiltrates Texas On Several Fronts

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) - Organized crime has slipped into Texas on several fronts, including narcotics, securities swindlines and gambling, a crime expert

Joe Phillips, chief counsel of the U.S. House Select Committee on Crime, also says the Mexican border presents special problems in fighting organized crime.

There is "tentative evidence" that recent gangland-style slayings in the Nuevo Laredo. Mexico, area across the Rio Grande from Laredo are part of a battle over narcotics smuggling into the United States, Phillips said here Tuesday.

He told a news conference that the ease in

crossing the Mexican border plays a part in organized crime activities.

"People of an extremely dangerous nature are coming across the border to murder someone and then going back across," he

He also warned that action by the Justice Department to reduce the production of amphetamines by 40 per cent can be expected to produce an increased illegal flow of such narcotics from Mexico.

In the Dallas area, he said, three men have

been identified as a part of the Cosa Nostra and six other persons have been tentatively identified as members of that organization. Racketeers are steadily moving into the

Traffic in stolen cars and pornography are becoming national problems, Phillips said, adding: "In New York they stealing cars to and this is becoming a nationwide

Pornography is attractive to organized crime "because it sees a profit to be made," he said. "If there are profits in pornography that's where they'll go.

Gambling is a multi-milliondollar business in Texas, Phillips said. He said about \$25 million was wagered on football in Texas last year, with bookmakers earning a \$2.5 million profit

Texas bookmakers get their odds from Nevada, Chicago and New Orleans, he said. "Again we have an organized criminal apparatus.

Phillips pointed out that "organized crime is not like street crime and can't be prosecuted the same old way.

There is no complainant in most organized

narcotics is happy, with the deal. You have to. go out and get the evidence.

Phillips, considered a leading authority on crime, said that "one of the critical necessities" in the fight against organized crime is wire-tapping authority.

He also voiced support for immunity provisions, saying it is necessary to offer immunity to fow-ranking members of an organization if prosecutors hope to convict the high-level members

Pay Board Reported To Have **Vetoed First Labor Contract**

WASHINGTON (AP) - The President Floyd E. Smith of Pay Board was reported today the AFL-CIO International to have vetoed its first labor contract by rejecting by a 9-5 vote a 12 per cent raise for aerospace workers.

An informed source said the board did not roll back the raise to any specific figure. Rather, the source said, it simply turned down a motion

by the five labor members to approve the raise The board recessed after the

vote, leaving open the possibility that it might later set some standard to guide labor and management in renegotiating the matter. The two unions involved, the

AFL-CIO International Association of Machinists and the United Auto Workers. have scheduled a strategy session of more than 300 plant negotiators and union representatives for next Saturday in St. Louis. An IAM spokesman said any decision on how to proceed would emerge from that meeting.

WASHINGTON (AP) -Nixon administration officials are starting to discuss a further reduction of U.S. troops in South Korea, possibly late this year.

Pentagon sources indicate some administration officials favor a total pullout of U.S. ground forces while others. notably the Joint Chiefs of Staff, contend the United States should station at least a firebrigade-type force in Korea.

U.S. troop strength in Korea was scaled down to 43,000 men last spring, a reduction of about 20,000. One Army infantry division was returned to the United States and inactivated. The remaining American division was pulled off the demilitarized zone and replaced by South Korean sol-



Oil Industry Leaders Say Nation **Needs A National Energy Policy**

By MAX B. SKELTON **AP Oil Writer**

HOUSTON (AP) - Oil industry leaders are in general agreement the nation needs a national energy policy which will encourage the search for and development of new domestic oil and gas reserves.

Frank N. Ikard, president of the American Petroleum Institute, says one of the bright spots of 1971 was the Nixon administration's recognition of the necessity for such a policy.

Walter E. Rogers, president of the Independent Natural Gas Association of America, says action must be taken now to induce and stimulate exploration and production to fully develop all available reserves and to encourage dedication of new gas reserves to the interstate market.

"For the longer term, it is clear there must be a coordinated national approach toward energy development. Rogers said

We must inventory our energy resources against the future and then we must establish national energy directing their efforts.

McLean added. however. that the development of a comprehensive, carefully integrated national energy policy to meet the fundamental energy problems and many related issues will take much time and



January is National Volunteer Blood Donor Month. As part of the observances there are 60 blood donors across the country who will receive plaques from the American Association of Blood Banks "for noble generosity to the ill and injured over many years. Each of them has donated 10 or more gallons of blood. Two donors have given 14 gallons

Our hospitals now require seven million pints of blood a year. For reasons of safety as well as cost, it is preferable that this blood come from volunteer, unpaid donors.

According to Dr. William Battaile, president of the AABB. at least 80 per cent of it does. "This results in a saving to the American people of more than \$100 million a year. This is despite the fact that only three per cent of those qualified by age and health to give blood do so. The remaining 90 per cent do not donate because of apathy. inconvenience and baseless fears, he says.

Anyone in good health between ages 21 and 66 can give blood. If you're between 18 and 21 you can give blood. If you're between 18 and 21 you can give blood without parental consent in more than half the states.

exists in most public school districts is the result of unwise and irresponsible spending of tax dollars, particularly in the large school districts where they have spent themselves into bankruptcy

The door is now open to force the rural communities to help bail them out. The solutions proposed thus far. are: Federal value added tax and State personal income tax, both of which lead to more Federal and State control. bureaucracy and unlimited spending of tax dollars. Do not let yourselves be misled into thinking that the ad valorem (property) tax will be discontinued simply because it has been declared unconstitutional

There is too much bonded indebtedness to be retired from this source of revenue. It is a very definite fact that when the State and Federal government take control of the public school system, the cost to each of us will be many times greater than it is now.

If the bureaucrats are allowed to railroad us. within two years we will have a federal value added (sales) tax, a state personal income tax, along with the property tax and all the other taxes we now pay.

The politicians are saying that is is time the Federal government should fulfill its responsibility to support public education by beginning to assume all its operational costs, including the 'dedicated and innovative professionals" who will have the opportunity to help build the kind of educational system in this country they have dreamed about. This kind of thinking leads only to uncontrolled spending and, as any student of law can tell you, you cannot offer such great bounties to the public without forcing them to bear the burden of its cost-





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

Some Wage Earners Needn't File Returns

Many wage earners. particularly retired persons who have a part-time job and students who have an afterschool or summertime job. have been relieved of the requirement for filing income tax returns.

Under current tax laws you

must file a return if you are: SINGLE and have an income of \$1,700 or more and you are under 65; \$2,300 or more if you are 65 or older. REmember that your age is determined as of last Jan. 1. The same dollar requirements apply to an unmarried head of a household, or a surviving widow or widower with a dependent child. Under new tax law changes, certain married persons living apart may file separate returns this

single person MARRIED, entitled to file a joint return, and the combined income of both spouses is \$2,300 or more if both are under 65: \$2.900 if one is at

older. These requirements of rmarried persons apply only if they lived together at the end of the taxable year, file jointly and neither is the dependent of another person.

Persons with a net income of \$400 or more from self employment must also file a return. They might not be liable for an income tax on their self employment income.

While not required to file a return, any one in these categories with less than the specified income. requirements who had withholding tax deducted from his earnings should file a return. Filing a return is the only way you can establish your claim to a refund on your withholding.

There is now a way for low-income earners to avoid year and claim status of a all withholding on their income. This gives them the opportunity to have the extra income now; instead of waiting until the end of the year when they can claim a The only requirements are

1. You owed no income tax

for 1971. 2. The expectation is that you would owe no income tax for this year, meaning an

income of less than \$1.725. If you meet both of these conditions ask your employer for a Form W-4-E. When you complete this form he will not be required to deduct withholding tax.






