Oil Industry Leaders Say Nation Needs A National Energy Policy

HOUSTON (AP) — Oil industry leaders are in general agreement the nation needs a national energy policy which will encourage the search for and development of new domestic oil and gas reserves.

Frank N. Ikard, president of the American Petroleum Institute, says one of the bright spots of 1971 was the Nixon administration's recognition of the necessity for such a policy.

Walter E. Rogers, president of the Independent Natural Gas Association of America, says action must be taken now to induce and stimulate exploration and production to fully develop all available reserves and to encourage dedication of new gas reserves to the interstate market.

"For the longer term, it is clear there must be a coordinated national approach toward energy development," Rogers said.

"We must inventory our energy resources against the anticipated demands of the future and then we must establish national energy goals toward which all segments of the energy industries can cooperate in directing their efforts."

The National Petroleum Council, a group of oilmen serving in an advisory capacity, is working on a series of energy policy options for submission to the Secretary of Interior in mid-1972. The Senate Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs also has launched a comprehensive study of national energy policy proposals.

John G. McLean, president and chief executive officer of Continental Oil Co., has expressed hope such studies will permit the government to get on with the task of formulating a unified energy policy—which certainly is urgently needed.

"Our necessary funds cannot be generated internally by the energy companies at today's levels of prices and profits," McLean said. "They cannot easily be attracted from outside sources at current rates of return on investment."

McLean added, however, that the development of a comprehensive, carefully integrated national energy policy to meet the fundamental energy problems and many related issues will take much time and effort.

Meanwhile, McLean said, corrective actions should be taken or the developing natural gas shortage will increase in severity, the nation will become increasingly dependent upon Eastern Hemisphere oil and companies will face growing problems in generating the massive capital inputs necessary to provide the nation's burgeoning energy requirements.

Ikard said industry and government experts agree the petroleum potential of the United States and its Outer Continental Shelf is extremely large.

What the nation needs, and must have in order to realize its economic, social and environmental goals, is a comprehensive, coherent national energy policy which will encourage the search for and development of oil and gas reserves," said Ikard, a former Texas congressman and member of the powerful House Ways and Means Committee.

Ikard said President Nixon's June 4 energy message indicated support of such a policy. This, plus congressional studies now under way, Ikard said, offer hope a viable energy policy may soon be a reality.

U.S. Tourists To Visit China

NEW YORK (AP) — About 300 Americans are among some 1,200 passengers booked aboard the liner France for a three-month world cruise that will include an optional two-day sidetrip in Communist China.

A French Line spokesman said Monday the special excursion to Canton, after the ship docks at Hong Kong in late February, was arranged with the official Chinese Agency of International Tourism.

The excursion, coming at about the same time as President Nixon's visit to Peking, will mark the first time in more than two decades that China has opened its doors to American tourists.

NEW MOOD ON CAMPUS

Students Would Rather Read Than Riot

LOS ANGELES (NEA) — At the University of Southern California, a group of militant Chicago students took over a floor in one of the buildings. Nobody paid much attention to them and, within an hour, the whole thing had fizzled out.

At the University of California, Los Angeles, students met to organize a movement to do something about ecology. They turned down the suggestion that they march and, instead, agreed to support Cal Advocates, which wants to charge each student \$1.50 and hire lawyers and lobbyists to press their demands.

These are typical of the mood on California campuses this year. It is a mood which one USC professor characterizes as "closer to their parents' attitude than to the student body of a year ago."

A new breed has appeared on campus, and the student rebellion which threatened to wreck American colleges is over. The militant student body has been replaced, generally by young men and women who would rather read than riot.

"For the first time in five years," says Irwin R. Blacker, professor of film writing at USC, "I listed the class assignments—and they are tough—and I didn't hear a single squawk."

What accounts for the sudden change? Blacker believes it is economic, a byproduct of the depression. Today's collegian has noted that there are no recruiters on campus, that tuition costs have jumped while income has gone down, that it isn't easy, financially, to stay in college.

Fees have gone up while the general economic condition has gone down," says Chandler Harris, head of UCLA's public information department. "When the wolf is at the door, you want to chase him away and not raise hell."

Many students today have to work to make ends meet. So they either take fewer courses or they take more, in an effort

to get through faster. In either case, they haven't got time for such extracurricular activities as setting fire to buildings.

"Student activism has not only tapered off," Blacker says, "it has virtually disappeared."

There are less and less protests on campus," says a UCLA graduate student, Coby Atlas. "I think it's because it didn't do much good—nobody wants to get out and march when it doesn't help anything."

Simultaneously, college administrations have gotten tougher. Blacker says they will listen to student complaints, but they do not easily yield.

"The days when they shivered and cowered before student activists are gone," he says. "They are prepared to kick a student out like a shot."

Was the student rebellion successful? Blacker, a novelist as well as professor and author of the current book, "Middle of the Fire," believes it accomplished a little, but not much.

The big push for ethnic studies, he says, didn't work. The black studies programs on most campuses have been a bust.

"Most intelligent blacks," Blacker says, "listened to men like Roy Wilkins who said you have to succeed by taking general courses, not black studies."

At many campuses across the nation, those hastily installed black studies programs have been quietly dropped. At UCLA, for example, black studies have been integrated into the general curriculum—the English department has some courses in black poets and writers, the History department includes black history in its regular courses.

But the rebellion did cause many campuses to give students a somewhat stronger voice in campus matters. The consensus is that, curiously, students are frequently rougher on student activists today than the faculties were formerly.

At USC, students now sit on certain academic committees

which used to be entirely faculty-manned. When a faculty member seeks a promotion today, he must have a certain number of student signatures on his request. Handbooks are circulated which give a student assessment of courses offered and the professors who give them. Students have a voice in what happens to their funds.

In certain departments in UCLA, students now get to pick their professors. When there is to be a faculty change, students interview prospective professors and have a voice in selecting the new one. Students are also given a voice in the curriculum.

"Before the rebellion," says Miss Atlas, "most of us never were able to talk to a professor individually. But now, most professors attempt an on-going relationship and are available."

There are, today, many Vietnam veterans on campus and they are older and more serious toward their work. Then, too, the colleges are caught in a population-growth squeeze—each year there are more applications for admission, yet no more places, so the academic standards are raised and a more serious crop of students results.

From all these factors, a new type of student body is emerging. Blacker says there seems to be less interest in athletics (but that could be because both USC and UCLA had off-years in football).

He also thinks fraternities and sororities no longer have much appeal. Harris says that, on the UCLA campus, the number of fraternities has declined from a high of 29 to 18.

"The Spring Sing is dead," Hassis says. "Homecoming is declining. The only big campus activity that seems to survive is the Mardi Gras, and I believe that's because it benefits student charities."

"Today's students," he says, "are coming to school

for the purpose of getting an education, not to change the world. This is a much more stimulating academic community. The word 'relevance' has all but disappeared."

"This year's student is just plain more interested in getting his work done than he has been for the past 10 years."

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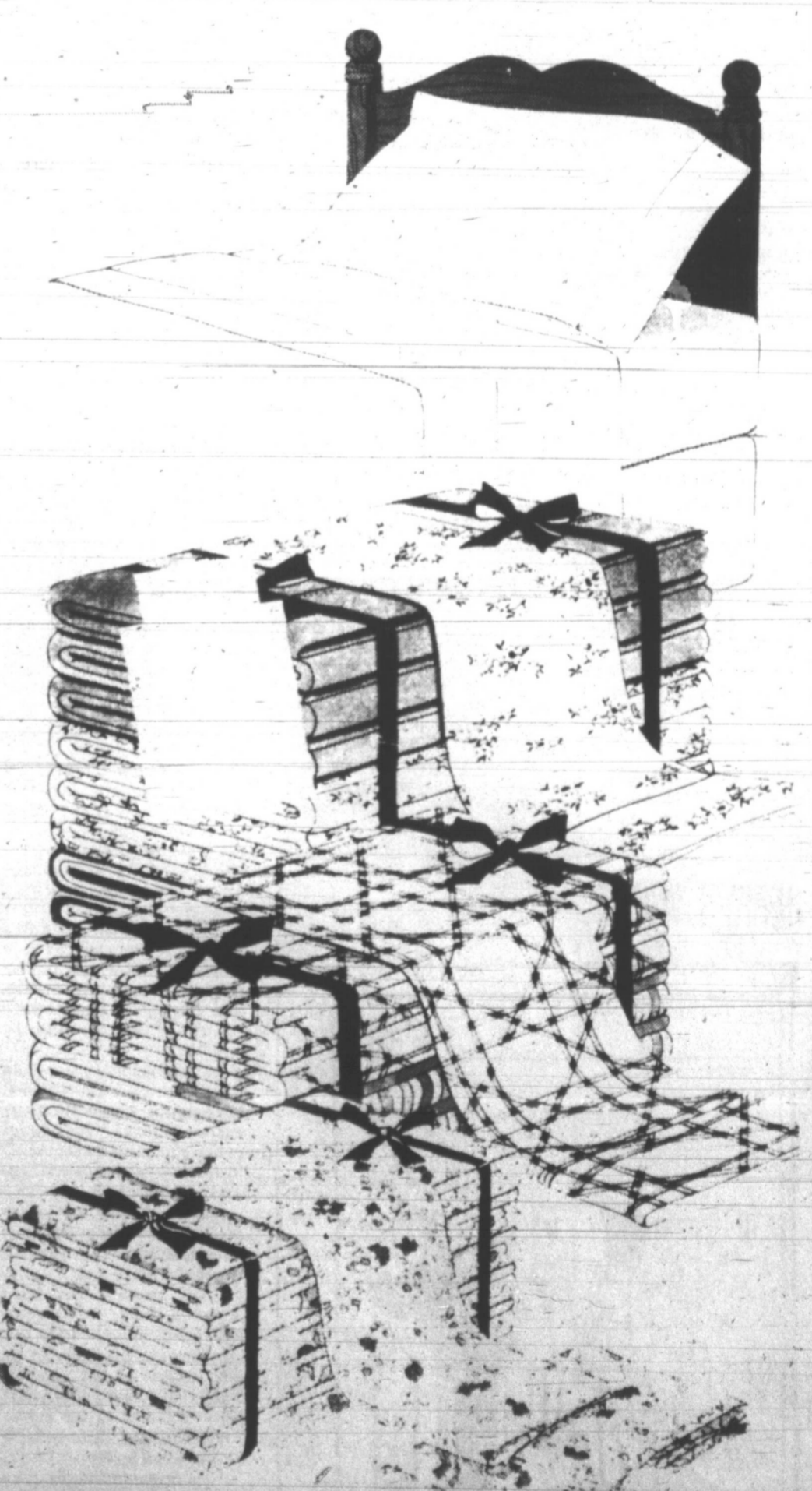

Some of Yarborough's associates have predicted recently that he will challenge Sen. John Tower, R-Tex., who is expected to seek re-election this year.

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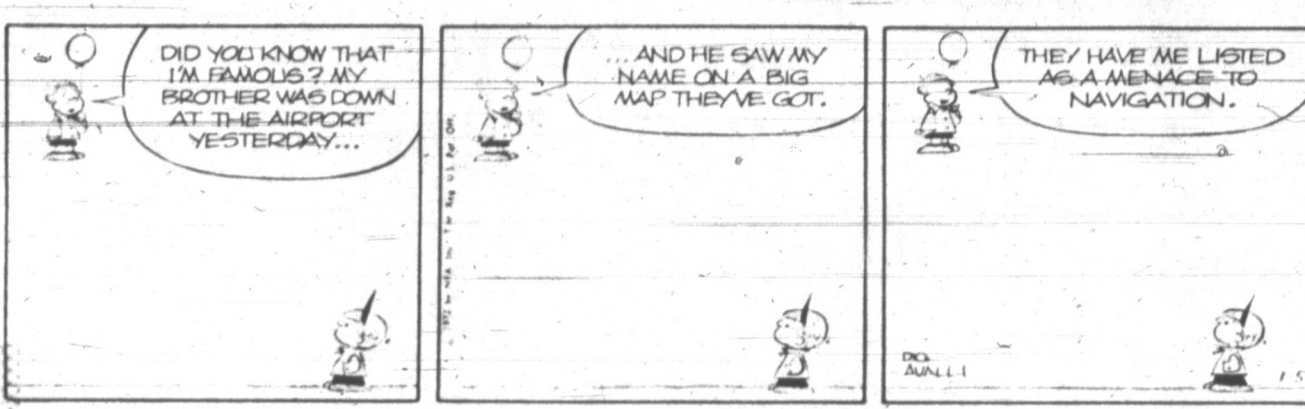

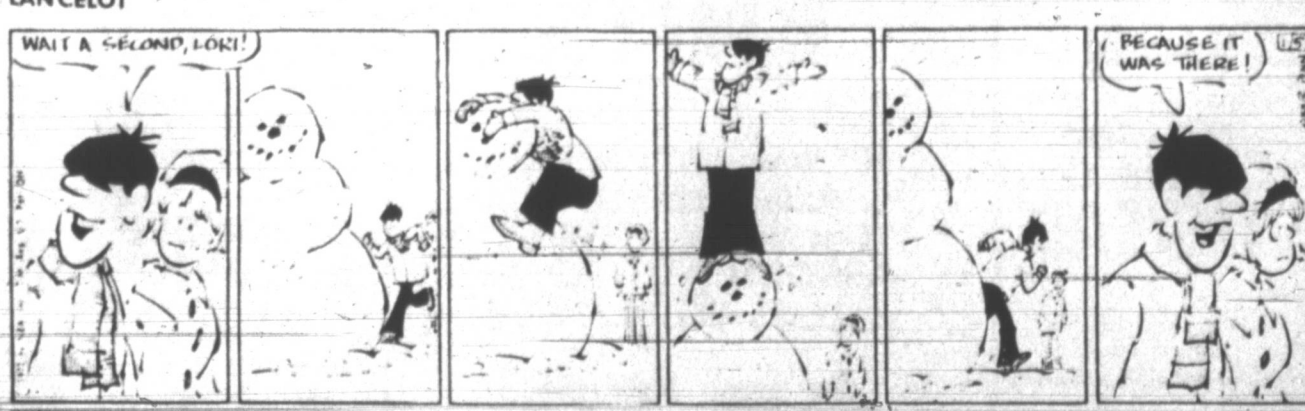
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Europe Hopes 1972 Will Mark Beginning Of Cooperation Era

LONDON (AP) — Europe, the seedbed of two world wars in this century, welcomes in 1972 the chance of leading the way toward new heights of international cooperation.

In the West, Europe awaits the birth by the end of the year of an enlarged Common market, a 10-nation superpower that will submerge rivalries dating back 2,000 years to the Roman invasion of Britain.

In both East and West, major efforts are under way to ease the tensions that have divided the continent throughout the Cold War. They include a Berlin accord, West Germany's program to improve relations with the Communist East, and Soviet leader Leonid Brezhnev's call

for a European security conference during the year.

Opportunities for detente stretch beyond the continent, as President Nixon concludes a series of summit meetings later this month to consolidate the Western Alliance and then goes on the Moscow and Peking.

At the same time, many of the old problems seem likely to remain as intractable as ever in 1972—among them the communal strife in Northern Ireland, inflation and unemployment in some Western countries, intellectual dissent and consumer shortages in the East.

And the enlargement of the Common Market may create a host of new problems, such as

a changed relationship between the United States and its European allies.

The international monetary settlement Dec. 18 dramatized that change. A united Europe, speaking as an equal partner, demanded and won American concessions, including a dollar devaluation.

By the end of 1972 Britain, Ireland, Denmark and Norway are due to pass the necessary legislation to join France, West Germany, Italy, Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg in an enlarged Common Market.

Together they will form the largest free-trade area in the world. As they move toward unity they will speak with new strength on political, defense and economic questions.

On the other side, the Soviet Union, pressed by a Chinese challenge, is moving to ease tensions with the West.

The Bonn parliament is expected to ratify treaties, renouncing before midyear the use of force and establishing normal relations with the Soviet Union and Poland. Similar pacts are likely to follow with Czechoslovakia, Hungary and Bulgaria.

A Berlin accord will take effect in 1972, improving access to the divided city 110 miles inside East Germany, and allowing West Berliners to visit the East on a regular basis for the first time since the Berlin Wall was built in 1961.

DPA Sets Up Only Club Exclusively For Police

DALLAS (AP) — The Dallas Police Association has established what its president believes is the only private club in Texas operated exclusively for policemen.

The club, located in the Dallas Police Association Building, features a large bar room with a 24-foot-long padded bar, a hardwood dance floor, a lounge room with television, books and magazines, a game room with two pool tables, a marble board and other recreation facilities as well as office space.

Membership will be limited only to the 1,500 members of the Dallas Police Association and their guests, said Sgt. Preston Parks, president of the Dallas association.

As far as I know it is the

only private police club in the state," he said.

Membership is acquired simultaneously with membership in the police association. Club hours are 3 p.m. to 2 a.m. Monday through Saturday.

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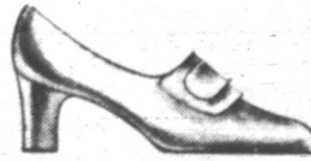

Some Wage Earners Needn't File Returns

Many wage earners, particularly retired persons who have a part-time job and students who have an afterschool or summertime job, have been relieved of the requirement for filing income tax returns.

Under current tax laws you must file a return if you are:

SINGLE and have an income of \$1,700 or more and you are under 65; \$2,300 or more if you are 65 or older. REMEMBER that your age is determined as of last Jan. 1. The same dollar requirements apply to an unmarried head of a household, or a surviving widow or widower with a dependent child. Under new tax law changes, certain married persons living apart may file separate returns this year and claim status of a single person.

MARRIED, entitled to file a joint return, and the combined income of both spouses is \$2,300 or more if both are under 65; \$2,900 if one is at

least 65; \$3,500 if both are 65 or older. These requirements of married persons apply only if they lived together at the end of the taxable year, file jointly and neither is the dependent of another person.

Persons with a net income of \$400 or more from self-employment must also file a return. They might not be liable for an income tax on their self-employment income.

While not required to file a return, any one in these categories with less than the specified income requirements who had withholding tax deducted from his earnings should file a return. Filing a return is the only way you can establish your claim to a refund on your withholding.

There is now a way for low-income earners to avoid all withholding on their income. This gives them the opportunity to have the extra income now, instead of waiting until the end of the year when they can claim a

full refund on the withholding. The only requirements are that:

1. You owed no income tax for 1971.

2. The expectation is that you would owe no income tax for this year, meaning an income of less than \$1,725.

If you meet both of these conditions ask your employer for a Form W-4-E. When you complete this form he will not be required to deduct withholding tax.

NY Banks Cut Lending Rates

NEW YORK (AP) — Three major New York banks cut their prime lending rates today to 5 per cent from 5 1/4 per cent.

Bankers Trust Co., Chase Manhattan Bank and Manufacturers Hanover Trust Co. announced they were reducing the minimum interest they charge their most credit-worthy corporate customers to keep it in line with short-term money rates. These rates had been falling recently.

The three banks followed the lead of Irving Trust Co., which announced a similar cut Friday, which went into effect Monday.

At present, most major banks still offer a prime rate of 5 1/4 per cent. First National City Bank, however, recently cut its rate to 5 1/8 per cent.

LONDON (AP) — A London newspaper reports that Jackie Onassis and her husband Aristotle had a "furious row" at London's Heathrow Airport which culminated in Mrs. Onassis flying off alone to the United States.

Onassis dismissed the report as "complete nonsense." He said he planned to join his wife in New York next week.

The Daily Mirror reported today that the dispute took place in a VIP lounge at the airport Monday and that at one time Onassis waved the staff into an adjoining kitchen and closed the door. One waiter was quoted as saying the argument was a "flaming row."

Onassis told newsmen, "I am afraid this story has come from some of my lesser friends on the press who seem to be trying either to bury me or divorce me."

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Universal Studios and ABC-TV say Roger Davis has been signed as a replacement for the late Pete Duel on ABC's Thursday night television

series "Alias Smith and Jones."

Duel, 31, died of a gunshot wound in the head at his Hollywood Hills home New Year's Eve. Police have listed his death as probable suicide.

In "Alias Smith and Jones," Davis will play opposite Ben Murphy. They portray two young outlaws looking for amnesty in the old West.

Davis, a native of Louisville, Ky., will make his first appearance Feb. 3 in an episode called "The Biggest Game in the West."

Married-to-model-actress Jaclyn Elle, Smith, Davis has appeared in the television series "The Gallant Men" and "Dark Shadows" and played in the Broadway show "Macbride."

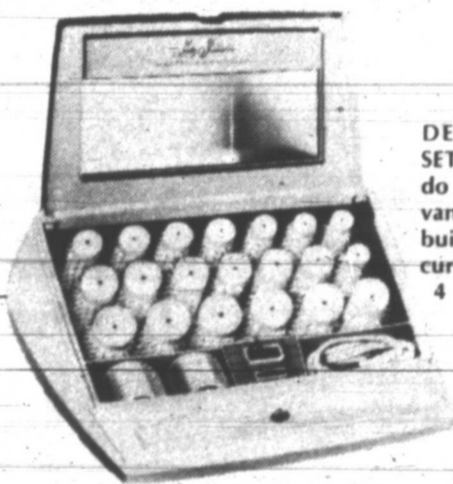
