

# 'Flap' On NATO

Peter Edson, who writes of the Washington scene for The News, reports that on the door of the Pentagon office of Frank C. Nash, special assistant to Secretary of Defense Robert A. Lovett for International Security Affairs, there is a new gadget. It's a "Flap Indicator."

"Flap," to the uninitiated, is a perfectly good Air Force term that is roughly equivalent to "snafy." When people go ground flapping their wings and talking big on subjects they know nothing about, that's Flap. When nobody knows what he's doing or why, that's Flap. When the confusion is utter, that's Flap. Hot gir is Flap. Propa-

Frank Nash's new Flap Indicator consist of a pointer which can be set by hand to various indicated and brightly colored readings, as follows:

Anything Can Happen - Red; Smooth Sailing -Blue; Slightly Shaky - Orange; Full Flap - Green; Super-Flap — Yellow; Be Forewarned — Brown; Reper-

For the last few days the pointer on the indicator has been set at Condition Green, which is Full Flap.

"Though it cannot be said so officially, the apparent reason is the large amount of Flap being leaked by British and French official sources in London and Paris, Edson reports

"The nature of this Flap is that the North Atlantic Treaty Organization is all ready to fall apart. The 50division goal for the NATO army, set at Lisbon last February, cannot possibly be met. Britain will be unable to meet her military commitments and will have to stretch out her rearmament effort over four years instead of three.

"The Flap from France is considered even warse. The story coming from Paris is that unless the French government gets \$600 million worth of defense orders from the United States, the French government will be bankrupt. The Indo-China war will have to be abandoned, Furthermore, Paris sources indicate that the United States must guarantee French government financial stability for the next three years.

"So much for the Flan

"As to whether NATO will makes its 1952 goals, Secretary Lovett admits frankly that he doesn't know and he can't tell until the annual reviews are presented to the next NATO council meeting. This will be held in Paris, probably in December. The Danes have requested a NATO meeting in November. But American authorities have insisted on no meetings till after the U. S. elec-

"At the Lisbon conference last February, the 50division land army goal for Europe was set as a nice round number. Twenty-five of these divisions were to be ready divisions and 25 reserve divisions.

"There was no magic in these numbers, Lovett insists. Forty-nine divisions will not mean no security and 51 divisions would not mean that everything was sitting

"Actually, the number of divisions may be 53 by the end of this calendar year. If there is any shortfall in meeting this goal, it will be in the percentage of readiness of some of the reserve divisions. Instead of being 80 per cent ready, they may be only 50 percent ready. Or instead of being divsions available for M-day plus 30 meaning a month after mobilization orders are received - they may not be ready until M-day plus 35 or

# Exaggerated Talk

Talk about multi-million dollar campaign funds raised by labor unions to influence elections seems to have been pretty well exaggerated. With some 15 million members in labor unions, various drives for "a buck a member" had a potential total of \$15 million. But they have never achieved anything like such results.

CIO's Political Action Committee had its best year in 1950, when it received contributions of \$1,200,000. CIO now claims about six million members, so this represents one out of five contributing. This money was divided half for national headquarters and half for the state and local organizations for congressional and other

With 18 salaried employes in Jack Kroll's PAC headquarters, the big job is research on congressional records for local campaighs, preparation of speaker's handbooks and similar activities. Printing eats up most of the budget. A series of vest-pocket backlets on "'52 acts" has already circulated more than three million copies.

AFL's Labor's League for Political Education has a more complicated financial structure. Its political activities are supported by voluntary contributions, and the best collection it has ever made was \$600,000, also in

In 1949 LLPE started out to get \$2 a head from every AFL member. It was too much. Next year they cut it down to \$1 and did better, but still not too well considering that the organization claims eight million members. All this \$600,000 was sent to the states for local political work.

A Just Society Cannet

Be Produced by Sacrificing Individual Liberty

I enjoyed very much reading an article in the Libertarian Magazine of Bombay, India on the subject of ethics. The author of this article is a close reasoner, I want to pass along some of the gems.

The author points out that there is a difference between morality and ethics. He says: "Morality is concerned more with a sense of rightness springing from necessity. pervades nature and which is expressed in mutual aid."

Then the author quotes Peter the instincts of benevolence, sympathy and love."

Then the author contends: "The object of ethics is to inspire men to purposeful work, to discipline their activities by values, For instance, without inspiring ideals and a lofty conception of ethics, those who call themselves revolutionaries are likely to be morally unstable. History teaches that in the absence of high ideals and austere moral standards revolutionary action degenerates into careerism, and is impotent to elevate social morality or even to bring about a betterment of condi-

"Good conduct concerns man not merely as a nation or a race, but as a species, and ethics is a necessity to human life considered as an organic whole. This, I think, should be obvious to all. It must be so, for man is very much a creature of unconscious control, and he can rationalize his behaviour towards any specific end quite unaware of the subconscious impulses which really propel him.

Listen to this: There is no better word than wisdom to describe the delicate adjustment of relationships necessary to safeguard the liberty and privacy of the individual in soclety, and at the same time to promote the collective interests of all. Nowadays wisdom is a quality which is in disrepute, Indeed, the very mention of the word sounds archaic, almost biblical, and if one stated that the enjoyment of life is dependent upon it, I have no doubt there would be many an eyebrow raised in polite derision. view, is the spreading belief that a just and equitable society can be established by sacrificing the liberty of the individual in the interesis of the community. The concrete person is to be nothing, the abstract society everything, and happiness of all secured by political management.

Again he quotes Peter Kropotkin: "The most important condition which a modern ethical system is bound to satisfy is that it must not fetter individual initiative, be it for so high a purpose as the welspecies. It is the most deadly poison to ethical living. I believe, that most so-called advanced thinkers indicate today that the future betterment of society means a still greater absorption of the individual by society. The want of development of the individual, leading to herd-psychology is certainly of the chief defects of our time. As of yore, creative work in the fields of sociology is extremely slow, and imitation remains the chief means of spreading progressive innovations in making. Modern nations repeat the history of the barbarian tribes and the medieval cities when they copied from one another the same political, religious and economic movements, and charters of freedom, Whole nations have appropriated to themselves with astonishing rapidity, the results of west European industrial and military givilization; and in these unrevised new editions of old types we see best how super ficial is that which is called culture, how much of it is mere imitation. It is only natural, therefore, to ask ourselves whether the current moral teachings are not instrumental in maintaining the imitative submission. Did they not aim too much at converting man into an ideational automation?" Then the author goes on to say:

"Whilst I am on this subject, perhaps it is permissible to declare nce again, that political power of any sort is demoralizing. Not merely because it places individuals in a privileged position, nor only because it is too great a burden to share among any less than the whole community, but most importantly because it permits a reease of subconscious instincts, and lets loose frustration in ways impossible to foresee since not often s a man aware of the extent of his own repression. Any system which elevates the State to a position of absolute power is sub-hu-man and immoral, because it always means the suppression of the free personality in the interests of uniformity, and at the same time

## Selective Service Reclassifies 4-F's;

Service officials have reported that up to Aug. 1, a total of 10.703 men originally classified as 4-F and unfit for military had been drafted following rexaminations.

The re-examinations were ordered last year after Congress lowered minimum passing score in the armed forces qualification test from 13 to 10. This made necessary to examine again all men who had been rejected with scores between 10 and 13.

Up to August 1, selctive service said in a statement made available to reporters, a total of 114,233 such men out of an estimated total of about 300,000 had been re-examined. "More than half of these are ow 'nducted," the statement

the statement said. "Virtually all of them should be in the armed forces within relatively short time." Mai. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, selective service derector, has contended since 1948 that the simed forces should adopt what he describes as more realistic mental and physical standards for inductees.
