Robots Answer Bombing Woe

WASHINGTON (AP) Navy today sees in its "pilotless suicide planes" a possible \$300 answer to low-level bombing, a special problem that has been

costly in lives in Korea. That \$300 is the approximate cost given by the Navy representative for converting a \$60,000 obsolete plane - of which the Navy has thousands in mothballs needed weapon in the mountainous

terrain of Korea. Thi, several Navy representatives said in interview, is the reason for Navy enthusiasm over the latest news in air warfare - Navy robot planes equipped with television eyes and a \$2,000 pound bomb, which dived onto North Ko-

But the Navy was cautious about making any claims. Rear Adm. John H. Sides, director of guided cautioned against talk about "the push-nutton age in warfare" being here.

And the Air Force said in reply to a query that expendable "warweary" B17s and B24s, loaded with 18,500 pounds of high explosives, were used as pilotless guided missiles on five combat missions dur-

ing World War II. Navy representatives explained that the type of fighting in the mountains of Korea means that nes have to fly low to find and strike enemy targets in the vaileys. That brings the planes within close range of enemy anti-aircraft fireand the Navy admits thiis has been

Navy spokesmen now describe the converted Grumman Hellcat fighter, such as was catapulted Sept. 1 from the aircraft carrier Boxer, as so efficient that it can be directed into a railway tunnel. They said this was done with one of the pilotless craft.

The Hellcat used in the first combat test lambasted a target range of about 900 miles-and need not be within sight of a remote control "mother" plane.

Along the battlefront, U.N. soldiers fought grimly to break a new Chinese toothold on Old Baldy Hill in one of four bloody flareups.

Brig. Gen. Wiley D. Ganey, of an B-29s in the rar East, personally led the late afternoon strike against Red barracks and stockpiles along North Korea's main coastal railway. The planes used electronic aiming equipment to drop clusters of fused incendiary bombs through the clouds.





Bureaucrats Caught

There erupted onto page one of the nation's newspapers the other day two stories which never should have gotten that big a play.

The fact that they did is due to one thing — secrecy. In one story the Federal Trade Commission charged that an international oil cartel — five American and two foreign companies - controlled the amount of production and the prices of most of the world's oil.

In the other a Senate subcommittee accused the Army of holding back information on this country's scandalously expensive air base program in North Africa.

The 189,000-word report on the oil business had originally been labeled secret by the government. Some of it was finally shaken loose after pressure by members of Congress. But a lot was blue-penciled and will forever remain secret as far as the public is concerned.

The air base story, which has been smoldering and sputtering for some time, hit page one the other day because the subcommittee said the Army hadn't been telling the public everything there was to know about the fantastic costs of the North African job.

If in both cases — oil and air bases — the public had been kept regularly and adequately informed of the situation, there wouldn't have been enough news left in the stories to warrant putting them on page one.

This secrecy business — as far as government is concerned — is not a new thing, but is a growing thing. And it's getting a little frightening.

The bureaucrat's dream — a government which can function free from the annoying light of publicity and consequent public reaction — came a bit closer to reality recently when the President, by executive order, extended military security to all federal departments.

A certain amount of security is, of course, necessary. But a blanket arrangement covering all departments can make it awfully tough for people to find out what's going on in Washington, where even expert factfinders can easily get bogged down.

Some of the biggest government scandals in recent years have occurred under the thick, protective blanket of official secrecy that had nothing whatsoever to do with military security.

In the corruption-ridden Reconstruction Finance Corporation, for instance, the public was not allowed to know who was applying for how much of a loan, what the terms of the loan were, and how the RFC members voted on it.

Only after the deal had been made was a brief an nouncement issued that such-and-such a firm had gotten a loan for so much. The RFC has since taken certain remedial steps, but things there are still hardly an open

The Internal Revenue Bureau, also rocked by recent revelations of corruption, has its own special secrecy blanket. Under its protection occurred shenanigans

which rocked the country. Why farming should be secret is a little hard to figure. but even the Agriculture Department was recently hauled up for allowing some loan frauds to operate in its bailiwick. And a department official had the gall to say it was an administrative matter in which the public was not interested.

Not interested, our eye!

The public is completely interested in what its government is up to.

It's only when government operations are so beclouded by secrecy that people can't make head or tail of them that they're liable to lose interest. And while we're on the subject, let's not forget for

one minute whose government this is. It belongs to the people and no one else

And every aspect of it - short of really top-secret military matters — should be on open display for all the

Declining Profits

Recent statistical studies show that the profits earned by retailers, which are modest in the best of times, have in many cases declined to an alarming extent and come close to the point of non-existence. This is true of both chains and independents, and of small stores and large. And it has happened during periods when dollar sales were increasing. In other words, many retailers have done more business - but there has been less and less money left in the till after the bills and wages and taxes are paid.

Various causes have been responsible — rising wage and material costs, unjust price regulations and interpretations of regulations, and so on. The net result is that the retailer's ability to do the best possible job of serving the consumer is threatened.

Neither the consumer nor anyone else is benefited when essential business operates at a near-profitless level. It is profit which makes for initiative, enterprise and the taking of risks. It is profit which makes for growth and progress. It is profit which keeps the whole complex economic machine, from the biggest factory to the smallest store, operating.

No one defends excessive profits - and in a free, competitive economy that is taken care of automatically. We see that every day at the retail level - price is the major inducement to most consumers and they go where they get the best break. The merchant who tries to work on the "all the traffic will bear" principle soon sees his customers going post his doors. So retail profits are always quite small. But the consumer should realize that when they become too small damage is done to the interest of us all.

"The Christian's Political Responsibility'

In the last issue I was quoting rom an article in the magazine Faith and Freedom under the heading "The Christian's Political Responsibility." Today I want to continue to quote from this article starting under the sub-heading of "The Nature of Government." I

"Why have governments of every - monarchies, dictatorships aristocracies, democracies, oligarchies, republics -why have they always enslaved people? Why have people never found a formula for government that would perpetually guarantee their freedom? The anser lies in the nature of man and the nature of government which

"The necessity for government is the weakness of men. This weakness, as we have seen, produces evil. And evil cannot be made to produce good — 'a good tree can-not bring forth evil fruit, neither can a corrupt tree bring forth good fruit.' Therefore, man, always imperfect, can never create a perfect government. Moreover, government, in action, is only some men wielding power over other men. And there is no way, ever, to insure that men employed by government will be any less imperfect or sinful than other men for whom they govern. The corruption in our governments today - city, state and federal -bears witness to this

"Since government is a creation of man, and is operated by men, it contains all the potential for evil that is in man — multiplied by power, As Lord Acton said: 'Power tends to corrupt and absolute power corrupts absolutely:

"This, then, is the third principle of politics for the Christian: Government inherently possesses potential for evil and this evil potential grows as the government's power increases.

The Function of Government

When thinking of government, simply think of a policeman. The duty of a policeman is to protect you and your neighbors from murderers and thieves, to enforce contracts, to keep peace in society (and, in a large sense, to provide protection against the marauders of foreign nations). That is why you and other taxpayers have 'hired' the policeman, why you supply him with money to buy his gun and uniform.

How safe would your home be if you sent your policeman off to run a power company, to buy and

sell potatoes, eggs, corn and cotton; retary Dean Achor if you asked your policeman to set up a bank with the money you had given him for guns? If you

"(1) Have to hire another policeman to walk the beat and safeguard you from murderers and thieves. And if this second policenian were sent off as was the first, you would have to find still another, and as the third was sent off, -and so on. As each succeeding officer stopped policing

you would be adding to your taxe "(2) As each policeman turned to buying and selling potatoes, o started running a bank or sellin electric power, his status woul change completely. Instead of ba ing an impartial overseer of the public safety he would quickly ac quire a money interest in and a ower over the business of you and your neighbors. Having a chance to make a profit for himself by manipulating your money he could be tempted easily. And that is exactly what has happened. The policeman - government - be-

comes corrupted. "(3) What is worse, you and your neighbors, having created so many policemen armed with guns, would no longer have your freedom. The policemen, finding their power and positions profitable would refuse to relinquish either. "You and your fellow citizens would never have been in danger of one policeman gone berserk. One man with a gun cannot stand off a whole community determined

to keep its freedom. But multiply the men whose directives are enforced by guns and the citizens are soon left powerless. "In country after country, as people have assigned more 'duties' to their policemen — their governments-the process described above has taken place. The corruption in our government in America today

is taking place here, government preving on its own citizens. "From all this follows the fourth rinciple of politics for the Christian: In proportion as government is given duties other than policing, the police power itself may be exercized against the citizen instead
