

Republicans Take Over Reins n Congress By Thin Margin

From 40 To 100 **On Their Way Out**

VASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department, target of Republican attack for six years, got ready today to face the inevitable — a Republican shakeup.

Probably no other agency in Washington outside the White House was so stunned by Gen. Dwight Eisenhower's election victory Tuesday night. Unquestionably it meant that heads will roll. Estimates of the number of high officials and diplomats who will get the axe range from around 40 to 100 or more.

Thaf Secretary Dean Acheson is out, no one disputes. He has planned for months to return to his Washington law practice whether Eisenhower or Gov. Adlai Stevenson succeeded Truman. The top echelon under Acheson embraces upwards of 20 persons, including an under secretary, deputies, and assistant secretaries.



The McCarthy Case

ed schools, I can say with some degree of authority that school leaders themselves, are the ones who are bringing on a socialistic regime; and not the tax-pavers. "I have served two terms in the

Illinois House of Representatives; and I have seen the teachers' lobby at work, first hand. They have little regard for scruples; seeming to operate on the assumption that tax-supported schools exist for the benefit of the teaching profession. They, themselves, are largely to blame for the so-called scarcity of teachers.' Here in Illinois, former teachers by the hundreds have been legislated out of the profession under the guise of 'raising scholastic standards.'

"Since 1946, our little rural schools in Illinois have been destroyed by the thousand; and our rural children are being hauled in these yellow 'death-traps' to the cities to be 'educated.' One of these 'educators' ran for re-elec-tion to the office of County Superintendent of Schools here in my ounty (Crawford) in November, 1950. He didn't carry a single precinct in the county. It's not good taste to mention them as examples of innocent people who got smeared by McCarthy and his rough friends; because the F. B. The "liberals" are not so good at drawing these lines themselves. They have called themselves anti-Communists and proceeded to defend Hiss (Stevenson did) and Lattimore (most "liberals" did).

So if these "liberals" who are worried about getting smeared don't themselves worry about their associates; if they don't distinguish between the Reds they defend and the Reds they fight, how can they demand that anticollectivists such as McCarthy should distinguish between them?

Why should we draw careful lines between one Red and one Pink when the "liberals" are careless in the utmost about drawing any such lines themselves?

And suppose all left-wingers, from Stevenson to Lattimore were permanently branded as standing for some kind of collectivism.

What harm would be done? Their friends would still make them rich by reading their books, even though we kept them out of our government.



MEANING OF THE BARBER'S POLE The red and white striped barber's pole dates back to the time when a barber not only cut hair and shaved his customers but also practiced minor surgery such as blood letting and wound dressing. It was not until 1745 that the barber-surgeons (as they were called) were prohibited from practicing surgery in England. It was abolished in France about the time of the revolution and in Germany around 1803, in the original symbol, a brass basin hung from the striped pole. 




