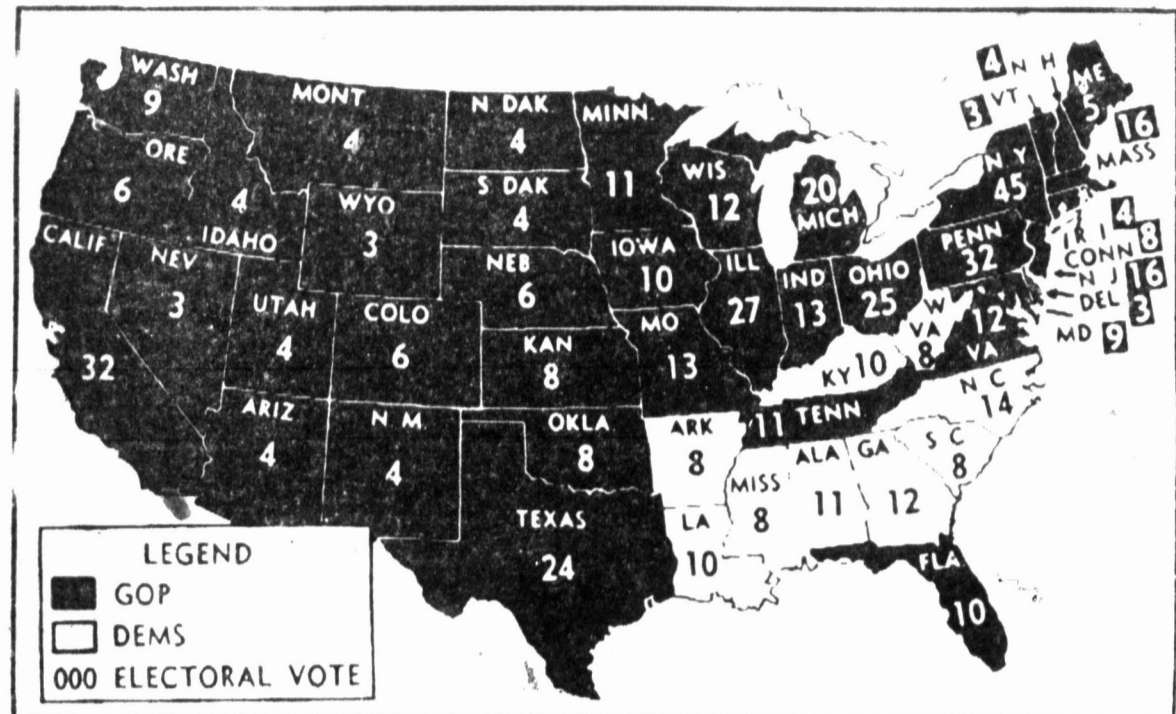

# State Dept. Prepares For Heavy GOP Axe

## From 40 To 100 On Their Way Out

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department, target of Republican attack for six years, got ready today for the inevitable — a Republican shakeup.

Probably no other agency in Washington outside the White House was so stunned by Gen. Dwight Eisenhower's election victory Tuesday night. Unquestionably it meant that heads will roll. Estimates of the number of high officials and diplomats who will get the axe range from around 40 to 100 or more.

That Secretary Dean Acheson is out, no one disputes. He has planned for months to return to his Washington law practice whether Eisenhower or Gov. Adlai Stevenson succeeded Truman. The top echelon under Acheson embraces upwards of 20 persons, including an under secretary, deputies, and assistant secretaries.

### Election At A Glance

This was the election picture early Thursday:

Eisenhower elected president by largest popular vote ever given in any presidential contest. Eisenhower's popular vote 31,875,451; Stevenson's 25,668,925 in 135,819 of 146,361 precincts. Eisenhower's percentage of popular vote: 55.4.

In addition there are men who have been closely identified with Acheson's policies, such as Philip Jessup, ambassador at large, and policy planning chief Paul Nitze, former Wall Street investment banker.

Abroad a total of 72 ambassadors and ministers head up U.S. diplomatic missions. Of those, department officials said today, approximately 50 are career foreign service officers and the rest are political appointees. Many changes in foreign posts are expected to be worked out by the Eisenhower administration over the first few months of next year.

The speculation is that he will accept resignations of all the political appointees including such ambassadors as Richard C. Patterson Jr. in Switzerland, Charles Ulrich Bey in Norway, Walter S. Gifford in Britain, William O'Dwyer in Mexico and Pete Jarman in Australia.

Eisenhower also may weed out some career foreign service officers who for one reason or another have outlived their usefulness or may want to be relieved of their duties.

The big mystery in the department is what will happen to two career diplomats who have been repeatedly assailed by various Republicans in Congress, including Sen. McCarthy of Wisconsin.

They are John Paton Davies, now attached to the U.S. diplomatic staff in Germany, and John Carter Vincent, diplomatic agent and minister in Tangier. Both men were identified with China policy prior to the loss of China to the Communists.

### Dry Cold Front Hangs Over Area

A dry cold front hung stationary over the Top of Texas today, dropping early morning temperatures close to freezing.

Predictions by the weather bureau were for mercury readings in the 60s and 70s today.

The high for Wednesday in the Pampa area was 70 degrees, but early this morning the mercury was in the 40s.

At 11 a.m. today the thermometer read 55 degrees. No rain was reported. The Associated Press said, to follow the drizzles and light showers that spotted some parts of the state election night and Wednesday. There has been none here since Sept. 22, when .04 of an inch hit the ground.

### TMA Head Says GOP Is Better

PORT WORTH (AP) — The head of the Texas Manufacturers Association believes that business will get more attention from the Republicans than it did under the Democrats.

Frank Stevens of Waco said here last night that he believed that the Eisenhower administration "will have a more favorable attitude toward the problems of business" than its predecessors of the past 20 years.

Stevens was here for the opening today of the 30th annual Conference of Texas Industry of the TMA.

"He said he believed a 'fair share' for business should include certain curbs on the power of labor unions, including a ban on industry-wide bargaining 'monopolistic' practices.

## Adlai's Aides Planning For Draft In 1956

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP) — Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson's presidential headquarters were being dismantled today but his top lieutenants already were talking of another draft — Stevenson movement for 1956.

Out of the wreckage of the Democratic defeat has grown a strong feeling here that Stevenson — as titular head of the Democratic party — will be the top challenger against the Republicans in another four years.

Stevenson was expected to make clear within the next few weeks, after a vacation, what his personal plans will be. Those around Stevenson saw the governor as the leader of the party in the months ahead and expected an effort to be made to reorganize and rebuild the organization from the bottom up.

Wilson Wyatt, Stevenson's presidential campaign manager, told reporters yesterday that he and others in the governor's headquarters had discussed the future with Stevenson and he added:

"Our feeling is definitely that it will be Adlai Stevenson in 1956."

Wyatt wryly conceded that he and others in the Stevenson command had underestimated the political appeal of Eisenhower. Wyatt had predicted a Stevenson victory by at least 400 electoral votes.

The Stevenson command still was trying to put together an analysis of just what had happened in Tuesday's election — and what were the reasons for the Stevenson defeat.

## Ike's County Vote Climbs

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower was still the Gray County presidential favorite as the absentee vote counters completed their tally this morning in County Clerk Charlie Thill's office.

The final check of unofficial results for the county showed Eisenhower polling 5,465 and Gov. Adlai Stevenson, 3,373.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur polled 13 on the Christian Democratic ticket and five on the Constitution ticket. Stuart Hamblen, the Prohibitionist, polled nine votes while Vincent Hallinan, the Progressive Party candidate, didn't get a vote.

One precinct 10 voter wrote in the name of Sen. Richard B. Russell for president.

The absentee vote turned in this morning gave the general 417 to Stevenson's 168.

In the county commissioner race, W. E. (Bill) Jarvis had the final tally total of 4,727 to Clayton Husted's, his GOP opponent, 2,162.

Jarvis carried each of the nine boxes and the absentee vote. The constitutional amendment (See **IKE**, Page 2).

## Local Write-Ins Numerous; M. K. Brown, Guill Included

M. K. Brown for governor of Texas; Well, somebody on election day thought M. K. might do a good job in Austin and wrote his name on the ballot along with several other write-in votes.

Yarborough polled 40 scattered votes and Beekwith polled 20. Both were also written in for other offices as well.

## Republicans Take Over Reins In Congress By Thin Margin

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress has returned to Republican control by a margin so thin that President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower probably will depend upon bipartisan support to put through many of his policies. This support, many believe, he is likely to get. While the general was winning with a landslide vote Tuesday, his supporters fought bitterly and in some cases neck and neck for seats in the 83rd Congress, which will consider major international and domestic problems next year.

Eight congressional races went into vote-by-vote counting, with at least three of them dependent upon absentee ballots from throughout the world, including Korea. In some close races, defeated candidates have indicated they may contest the outcome.

Morse Independent Complete Senate returns gave the Republicans 48 seats and the Democrats 47. Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon, who resigned from the Republican party to support Gov. Stevenson, was listed as an independent with possibly a decisive vote.

Republicans Tuesday won 220 House seats, two more than necessary for control. The Democrats took 200 but one of these became vacant with the death last night of Rep. Sabath (D-Ill.), dean of the House, who had just been elected to his 24th consecutive term. A House vacancy can be filled only by a special election.

One independent who usually sits with the Democrats was re-elected, and Democrats were leading in all eight undecided districts. The victory gives the GOP a voting edge, particularly if Southern Democratic support continues, but the Republicans will gain greater power by controlling committee chairmanships and other top positions in both houses. From these posts, GOP leaders can direct the progress of legislation.

The new Congress faces basic decisions on how much money to spend on foreign aid and the military buildup, whether to continue the present high tax rates and what to do about expiring wage and price controls.

Many of the top Republicans in Congress favored reducing the national debt. (See **REPUBLICAN**, Page 2)

## Gen. Eisenhower Has Largest Popular Vote

A cold appraisal of election statistics today leads to the conclusion that President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower enjoys a nation-wide popularity to which few, if any, other men in history could lay claim. The political firms which blazed across this nation for four long months have reduced to embers and it is easier to discard personalities and examine statistics. Here are some things the statistics show:

1. Eisenhower received more votes than any presidential candidate in history—millions more than any other too, the total vote was the greatest ever recorded.

2. His immense vote appeal swept into office with him a majority of Republican candidates for the Senate, the House of Representatives and for governors of the several states.

3. His electoral vote total was the second highest ever piled up by a Republican—just a shade under the total accumulated by Herbert Hoover in 1928 when religious prejudice against his opponent, Alfred E. Smith, figured prominently in the returns.

4. Eisenhower shattered the once "Solid South," winning three of the state election night and Wednesday. There has been none here since Sept. 22, when .04 of an inch hit the ground.

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## General Turns To Military As Plans For Korea Trip Develop

WASHINGTON (AP) — President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower turned today to the military to take him on his projected journey to the Korean War zone, politely declining Truman's offer of the White House plane.

Eisenhower replied immediately after receiving Truman's somewhat laconic offer to put the luxurious, four-engined Independence at his disposal, "if you still desire to go to Korea."

A Qualification The President-elect said a suitable military plane would do and that he would notify the Defense Department soon of his plans.

There was no immediate explanation why Truman attached the "if you still desire to go" qualification to his offer. But Eisenhower's reply was definite assurance that he will go through with his campaign pledge.

He said in an address on Oct. 24, "I shall go to Korea" to seek a way to an honorable conclusion of the war.

Defense Secretary Robert Lovett, Gen. Omar Bradley and other high officials of the Pentagon already have shaped tentative plans to take Eisenhower on his Korean journey.

The probability is the military will assign an officer to accompany him, if that is agreeable to Eisenhower. Although the officer probably will be of high rank, there was an impression that it will not be Bradley.

A Private Citizen Although Eisenhower has been one of the nation's most famous soldiers, he no longer holds his five-star command or any other direct connection with the Army. When he goes to Korea, presumably well before the inauguration on Jan. 20, he will be a private citizen — no longer a general and not yet the commander-in-chief.

In Korea, Eisenhower will come to grips with the first and perhaps most difficult question of his presidential term: What to do about an unpopular

war almost 28 months old, stalled on a heavily defended front, fought against an enemy with major supply sources outside the theater of combat, and supported by Russia, the potential major and powerful enemy of the United States?

More South Koreans Eisenhower, in his campaigning, made one proposal: assign an increasing amount of the front-line fighting to troops of the South Koreans.

Beyond this, there exists an old and explosive question which figured in the controversy over the ousting of Gen. Douglas MacArthur from the Far East supreme command:

Should the United States turn to true strategic warfare in an attempt to destroy the Asiatic Communist war-waging ability and bomb supply centers and airfields in the Chinese homeland?

Thought Rebutted Truman and the State Department rebuffed any such thought, and the Joint Chiefs of Staff subsequently followed that up with explanations of the military impracticality of such an operation. However, the administration goes out of office next January and the terms of all but one member of the JCS expires next summer.

With the White House occupied by the general who in World War II commanded more troops than any other American in history, the military has no doubt that the office of commander in chief will be a more directly active one than it has been in a long time — if ever.

General's Vote History Making WASHINGTON (AP) — Dwight D. Eisenhower drew more popular votes Tuesday than any other presidential candidate in history in an election which also set a new high for total votes cast.

The Republican President-elect received 31,875,451 votes with 10,842 of the nation's 146,361 precincts still to be heard from.

The previous high was piled up by Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1936, 25,261,397 when all returns were in from his race with Alf M. Landon.

Tuesday's incomplete total vote cast for both Eisenhower and Adlai Stevenson added up to 57,544,367, compared with previous record of 49,820,312 set in 1940 when Roosevelt defeated Wendell L. Willkie.

By The Associated Press Votes from the forks of the creeks trickled in steadily Thursday as Texas' largest election in history was finally tabulated.

The figures showed close to two million votes cast, even with less than half of the county reports complete. The Texas Election Bureau predicted the two million mark would be passed before counting was over.

The figures also showed that the second day of tabulation did little to change Eisenhower's winning edge over Stevenson in the great victory ever marked up for Texas Republicans.

The last report from the election bureau showed Eisenhower with 53.45 per cent of the votes counted and Stevenson 46.28 per cent. Herbert Hoover carried Texas with only 51.7 per cent of the vote the last time the state went Republican.

With 1,898,679 votes tabulated, Eisenhower had 1,014,814 and Stevenson 878,706. The returns were from 251 of 254 counties, 108 of them complete.

Soon after Stevenson conceded Tuesday night, Eisenhower had 53.36 per cent of the Texas vote. It rose to 53.56 per cent Wednesday morning, then dropped to 53.54 in the afternoon.

The last count on proposed state constitutional amendments was: 483,907 for workmen's insurance, 300,821 against; 388,979 for the medical education fund, 381,724 against.

The Wednesday night report from the election bureau also revealed that MacArthur got barely 3,500 votes. He received 1,812 on the Christian Nationalist ticket and 1,990 on the Constitutionalist listing.

Texas Baptist Hit New Bible Version DALLAS, (AP) — About 2,000 delegates of Baptist churches in Texas adopted a resolution Wednesday criticizing the new full Revised Standard Version of the Bible.

The resolution, by the Rev. O. L. Howard of Lubbock, was approved by the Baptist Missionary Association of Texas at the close of its annual meeting.

The resolution maintains that the National Council of Churches, sponsor and copyright owner of the Revised Standard Version "is definitely modernistic." It said the King James Version was "a good, solid, reliable translation."

A past minister to Denmark, she was the first woman to hold a major diplomatic post.

Mrs. Rohde made her first public appearance when, as a young girl, she campaigned in behalf of her father — William Jennings Bryan — for election as U.S. president.

Some Ike Rooters Are Down In Dumps BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — It's possible for Ike supporters to be down in the dumps. Four at the University of California are—by judge's orders.

The four — Terry A. Walsh, 18; Daniel H. Power, 20; Karel A. Smith, 21; and Ted Moriarty, 22 — were nabbed by police while setting Eisenhower victory bonfires.

## U.S. Charged In Blockade

MOSCOW (AP) — A Russian note to Washington charges the United States with an illegal and aggressive new blockade in Korean waters and warns that the United States must make the "responsibility for consequences."

Moscow radio Wednesday night broadcast the text of the terse 350-word note and announced that it was delivered by the Russian Embassy in Washington Tuesday.

The State Department acknowledged receipt of the protest Wednesday night but diplomatic and naval officials declined comment until it is studied.

The Soviet Union objected to an order Sept. 27 by U.N. commander Gen. Mark Clark which established a "sea defense zone" in South Korean waters to "eliminate infiltration of enemy agents" into Allied prisoner of war camps on Koje and other Korean islands, as well as to prevent attacks on the South Korean coast, protect U.N. Command lines of communications and halt smuggling.

Korea Prepares For Huge Ike Reception PUSAN, Korea (AP) — South Korean President Syngman Rhee today messaged President-elect Eisenhower "we are delighted and the entire nation is thrilled" over his projected trip to Korea to seek an end to the war.

"Please include . . . Mrs. Eisenhower," Rhee said. "Her presence will be a great honor and encouragement to our suffering people and the U. N. forces fighting in the front line."

A government spokesman said both were also written in for other offices as well.

By adding four of the almost-always Democratic border states, he punctured the Democratic stronghold of Massachusetts and Rhode Island where Irish-Catholic citizens have voted in blocs for the Democrats for a quarter of a century.

Of the nation's 146,351 voters tabulated by daybreak today, Eisenhower had piled up a vote total of 31,875,151 compared to 25,698,925 for Adlai Stevenson, his Democratic opponent.

In the electoral college, where presidents are usually chosen, Eisenhower had won 412 votes against 89 for Stevenson. Some states might yet swing over to the Democratic side.

**Allied, Red Jets Tangle Over Korea**

SEOUL (AP) — American Sabres and Communist MIG-15s clashed today in four air battles deep in northwest Korea. The Fifth Air Force said its airmen shot down one Red jet and damaged four.

In addition, seven more damage claims were pending checks of gun camera film.

The jet battles were the first since Sunday.

The flare-up of air fighting came as ground battles along the 155-mile front tapered off to patrol skirmishes.

Fourteen Sabres tangled with 27 Red warplanes in two morning battles just south of the Yalu River. One MIG was reported destroyed and seven damaged, but three of the damage claims were withheld for confirmation.

In a pair of afternoon battles, 28 Sabres clashed with more than a score of MIGs. Four MIGs were reported damaged, one positively.

The hard fighting for the frozen hills north of Kumhwa slack almost continuous battle. Battered assault forces retired to rest and regroup.

For the moment at least, neither side showed any will to renew the bloody Central Front struggle.

South Korean troops held grimly to Sniper Ridge after throwing back a pre-dawn assault by 150 Chinese Reds. The attack, relatively light for that sector, was the only Communist offensive move in 24 hours.

The Reds held the crest of nearby Triangle Hill without opposition. Allied leaders ordered the South Koreans to halt their suicide charges up the slope and called instead for intensive artillery barrages.

**Putnam To Resign Post This Month**

PROVIDENCE, R. I. (AP) — The Providence Journal says today Economic Stabilizer Roger L. Putnam will resign his post about the middle of the month to return to his private business interests in Springfield, Mass.

The Journal quotes Putnam as saying "a year is long enough for anyone to handle this thankless job."

The Journal says also that Putnam is holding off his resignation so he can clean up pending matters, including the appeal of the Wage Stabilization Board's decision to pare 40 cents from the \$500 daily pay boost John L. Lewis recently negotiated with the soft coal industry.

Putnam, former mayor of Springfield, took over his \$20,000 a year post on Nov. 26, 1951.

### Matador Is Get Action On Baches

MADRID (AP) — Few American mothers want their sons to grow up to be prize fighters. But in Spain many mothers—particularly among the poor—fondly hope

their little muchachos end up in the bull ring. That is one of the great dreams of Spanish poor children. The dream is even stronger in recent years than in the past as the "take-home pay" of the matador has soared tremendously. A dozen years or so ago the leading bull stabber might get only a thousand dollars for an engagement — which sounds like a nice money, but matadors, like bricklayers, don't work the year around. Today the fat man with

the sword can pick up six thousand dollars for more for a show, and even that fee has been doubled. Visions of such fat fees in youthful heads have created a new traffic hazard in the cities here. Ambitious young boys practice the bull fighter's art by dodging among passing taxis and cars. There are three schools in Spain which for a total fee of a hundred pesetas — about \$2.50 — will give a student a certificate

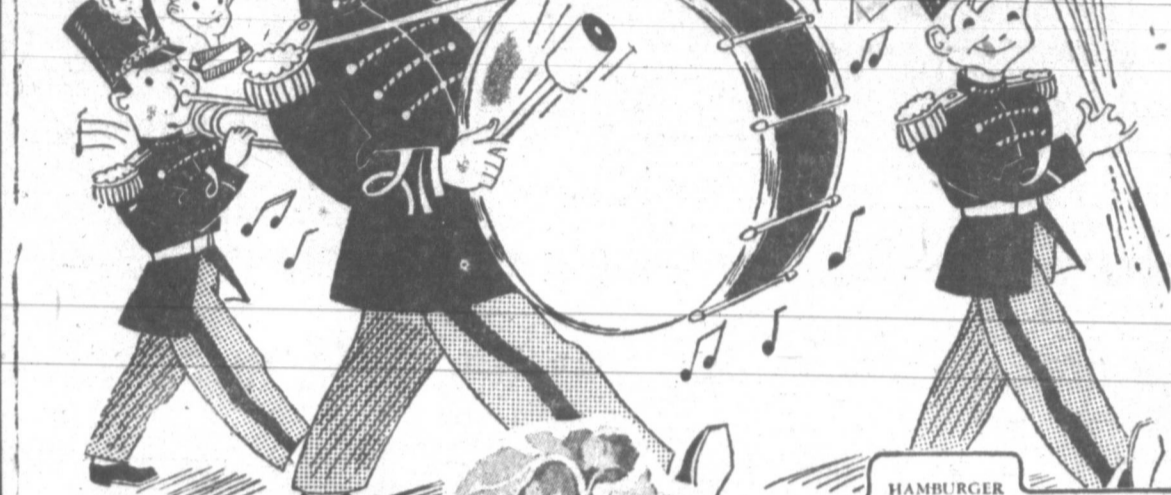
entitling him to fight in any bull ring in this country. But the problem of these embryo fighters then is to find a promoter willing to gamble a good bull on him. It isn't just a matter of killing the bull—a visiting Iowa farmer might do that with a baseball bat. The bull must be killed in a way to please the crowds. To the fans, bull fighting is more an art form, like painting or sculpturing, than it is a science. They like best the battle be-

tween a brave man who takes chances and the bull which attacks incessantly until, after receiving the deadly sword shaft, he turns his back to the arena wall, kneels and dies. It also has to be fast, colorful and neat. The crowd whistles a ragged or cowardly performance on the part of either man or bull — the Spanish equivalent of the Bronx cheer.

"You have to see at least a hundred bull fights before you even begin to understand what it's all about," a veteran fan said. An experienced fan prides himself on the fact that he can predict by the first steps he takes into the ring than a bull who says to himself "to hell with all this—I'm not mad at anybody." The crowd whistles in disdain as he is dragged out later with six black darts stuck in his carcass to show he was yellow.

### Want To Win? Learn To Meld

Sometimes the question of whether to make the initial meld early or late depends on the kind of pairs you have in your hand. With high pairs, you tend to meld early; with low pairs, you tend to meld late. Let's take an example. You hold a pair of jacks and a pair of kings, with both sides needing 120 points for the initial meld. Hence you are in position to make the initial meld with only four cards. If the rest of your cards include, say, a pair of queens and a pair of jacks, you should make the initial meld at once. You have to be sure a fair chance to win the pack, but the enemy will probably throw low cards rather than queens or jacks. Contrariwise, if the rest of your cards include a pair of sixes and a pair of sevens (instead of those queens and jacks) you should tend not to make your meld so quickly. The opponent at your right is likely to throw a six or seven in the hope that you don't have the count, but if you make your meld he will discard much more cautiously. We play six-handed Canasta and sometimes six-handed Samba. In such a game, what is the rule when a player wants to ask permission to meld out? The player has two partners, as you know. Does he ask both of them, or only one? A—When you want to ask permission to go out, you must ask the partner at your left. You can't ask both partners, and you can't ask the partner at your right—at least, not to begin with. The partner at your left must answer you question with "yes," "no," or "I pass." If he says "yes," you must meld out; and if he says "no," you must continue to play. In either such case, the partner at your right

### Yule Stockings To Hold \$60 Million In Toys This Year

NEW YORK (AP) — America's Christmas stocking should hold around 600 million dollars worth of toys at retail value this year. This means American fathers, grandmothers and uncles will be buying 10 per cent more toys this year. Toy manufacturers in the U. S. estimate toy prices average 5 per cent less than last year and the 10 per cent rise in dollar sales volume will add up to more toys around the Christmas tree. In addition to more playthings, the young fry will find most of the old favorites—in fair supply and many others of new designs and new materials. The steel strike may mean a shortage of a few old favorites in some stores, because most makers of metal toys had to stop taking orders awhile back. But there'll be around 20 per cent more plastic toys in the shops this year, with a wholesale value of around 100 million dollars. The toy manufacturers' president, Norman G. Wintermantel, says most of this gain, however, is not at the expense of other types of toys. About 11 million dollars worth of the toys at retail value will be foreign made, although in the first eight months of this year imports are running 6 per cent behind a year ago.

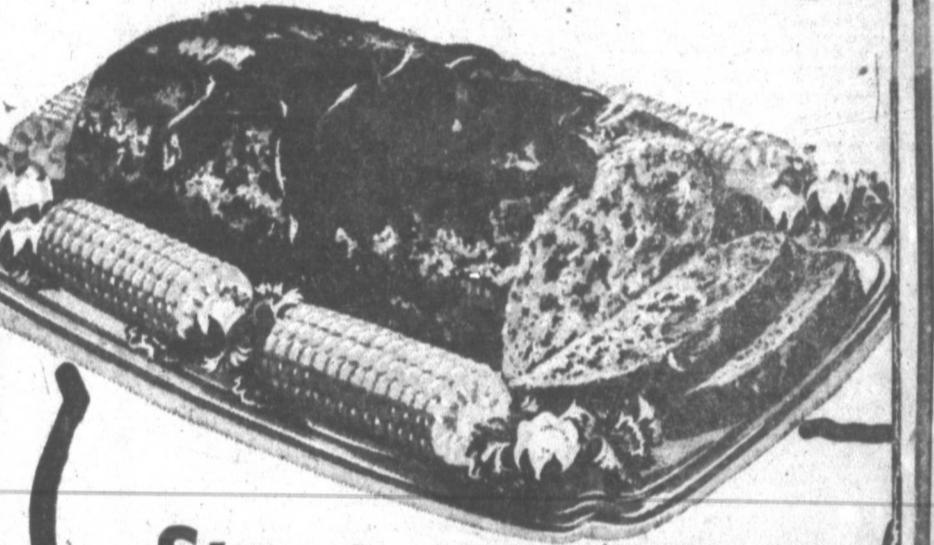

# Law Forcing Gamblers To Pay Failure So Far, Bureau Says

WASHINGTON (AP) — The law that was to force most gamblers to pay heavy taxes or put them out of business has done neither in its first year.

Frank Lohn, chief of the Internal Revenue Bureau's intelligence division, in an interview summing up a year's administration of the law said it has brought in only a fraction of the expected revenue, and has not materially reduced gambling.

**Take Is Low**

The government collected probably less than nine million dollars in taxes, compared with congressional estimates the take might be 400 million.

And, Lohn said, instead of being forced out of business, gamblers "have just gone underground."

However, he added the law is a "deterrent to the gambling fraternity."

Immediately after it went into effect he said there was a large scale suspension of activity along with a dive underground.

"We know of places where gambling is still slowed up," Lohn added.

**Manpower Shortage**

Why hasn't the law worked? For one reason, the bureau hasn't enough men to enforce it, he said. Congress provided no extra money for additional personnel, and the bureau could spare only 100 men to tap the gambling world for taxes.

Also, the Supreme Court has not yet ruled on whether the stamp tax is constitutional. Last spring a federal judge held it was not. Revenue officials say many gamblers believe the high court will overturn the law, and in the meantime they are not afraid of violating it.

The gambling tax law was a byproduct of two things:

1. The investigation by the crime committee of Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.), which put the finger on gambling as the big money artery of the underworld.
2. High taxes, which made tax-paying citizens sensitive to reports that gamblers made big money but paid little or no taxes.

**Double-Barreled**

Congress reacted with a double-barreled law. It required gamblers to buy a \$50 - a year occupational tax stamp, and to pay an excise tax amounting to 16 per cent of their gross take.

Gamblers reacted with hurt and defiance. Payoffs, protection money, donations to good works

all were always part of a gambler's traditional overhead. But not taxes.

Lohn said after the initial largescale dive underground, and suspension of activity, many gamblers resumed operations, mainly underground.

Definitely, he said, the law has not stopped gambling, or cut it down to a small scale.

Congress never said it intended to knock out the gambling business. But the inference was plain between the lines of the law.

The law provided that gamblers step up to Internal Revenue offices, state their business, place all sales, income and outgo, and buy a gaming stamp. The names of persons who bought gaming stamps were to be posted. Local officials interested in wiping out gambling had only to look at the list and go after the quarry.

The government collected in the first 11 months a total of \$81,190,438 from gamblers, Lohn said. Of this, \$1,082,259 was from sale of gambling stamps. The rest, \$7,108,179 was from the 10 per cent excise tax.

Some 32,500 gambling stamps were sold at the rate of about \$4.16 per remaining month of the fiscal year.

There is a popular belief that along Broadway, and, in fact, New York City, gamblers are so thick a wink will get you a chance on anything you like. But only 38 stamps were sold during the first eight months of the law in all New York City, and only 260 stamps in New York State.

The most stamps were sold in the Northwest—38 per cent of all sales were in Montana, Utah and Washington. Gamblers in the state of Washington alone bought 3,576 stamps, the biggest number for any state.

Illinois ranked second, with 3,129 stamps.

Montana came next, with 1,994 stamps, and Louisiana was fourth, with 1,295. Utah was fifth, with 1,085.

The next five were: Indiana, 988; Ohio, 885; Pennsylvania, 691; Idaho, 597, and Texas, 501.

## Witching Hour Loses Appeal

BERLIN (AP) — The witching hour is losing some of its attraction for American soldiers and officers in Germany.

A command order from Lt. Gen. Manton Eddy imposes a midnight curfew.

The aim is to get the uniform off the streets and out of public places by midnight. Purpose is to cut down the number of "incidents" involving Americans and Germans, most of which occur only late at night.

The military police have been given unusual power to act. They are picking up officers, ranging in rank up to colonels, and reporting to their headquarters when the curfew has been violated.

There have been several dozen court martials since the curfew was imposed.

The night spots are growing accustomed now to the nightly visit of the MPs. They stroll in, in pairs, shortly before midnight and again after that. The masters of ceremonies have added a few jokes about the "controls" to their nightly repertoire, wisecracks which tickle the German patrons but hit a rather sour note among the Americans.

Army men say the Eddy order was inspired by the State Department which was anxious to reduce any friction between the occupation soldiers and the German population, especially with the Bonn agreements about to be ratified.

The gag line on a night out now for American soldiers is: "Synchronize your watches, men."

Carstens said some neighbors have indicated they would like him to extend his "city limits," but he plans to limit it to his wife, Carol, their son, Keith, 18, and himself.

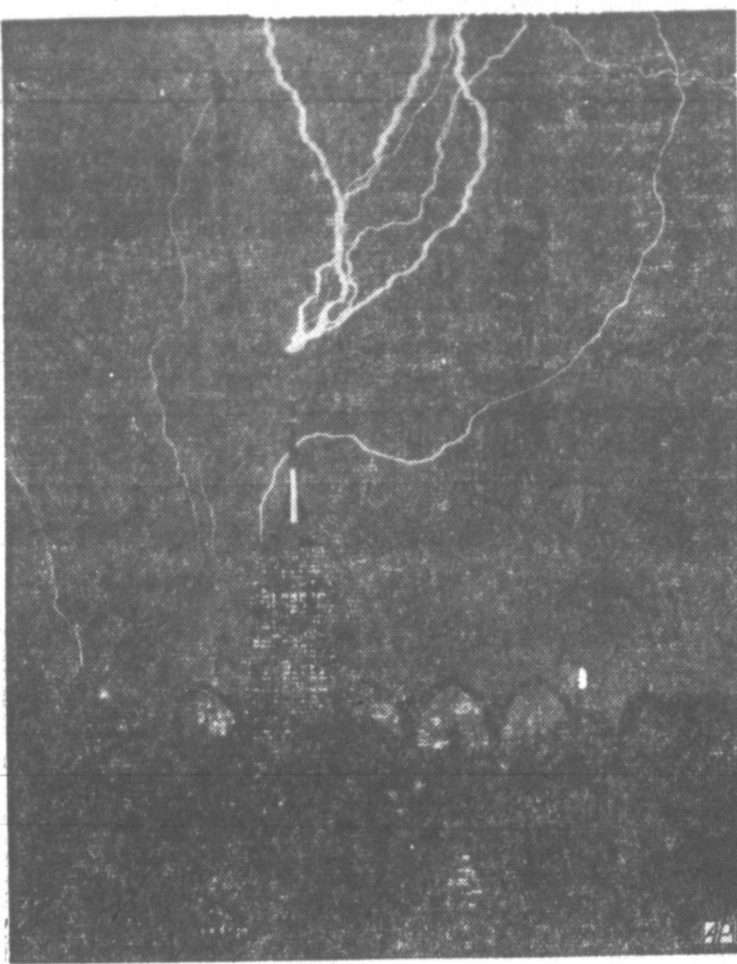

GIF-SUR-YVETT, France (AP) — The Duke of Windsor, in shirt-sleeves and a pair of business-like ski boots, is working with blue-overalled French workmen from this village to prepare the new country home he will occupy next spring.

Every fine day he drives out 25 miles from Paris in his green and brown Buick station wagon to work on the 200-year-old mill-

house which he is converting into a week-end hideout for himself and the duchess when in France.

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### Wet County Control Could Stop Bootlegging, Say Officials

**EDITOR'S Note:** This is one in a series of stories giving background of events leading up to the State House Crime Investigating Committee's decision to hold public hearings today on charges a widespread bootleg ring exists in Texas.

**AMARILLO (AP)**—A Lubbock County grand jury reported recently that Texas' dry-county bootleggers probably can best be controlled by effective liquor law enforcement in the wet counties.

The grand jury said bootlegging should be cut off at the wet-county source of supply rather than in the dry county where the goods reach the consumer.

Under the state Liquor Control Act, agents for the state Liquor Control Board police the wet counties and take administrative action in Austin against offending liquor dealers.

The state House Crime Investigating Committee, which has slated a bootleg liquor probe in Amarillo today, will study the current and proposed means of control. Under present law, officers of the liquor board have two possible means of stopping the flow of bootleg whisky into dry counties.

First, liquor agents can file criminal charges of illegal transportation, possession or sale against offenders, in local courts. Next, under certain circumstances, the board administrator can suspend or cancel the sales permit of liquor dealers supplying the whisky to bootleggers.

Neither liquor agents nor liquor dealers agree on what result the Liquor Control Act has on the industry. Some liquor agents say the law is full of loopholes that let liquor and beer dealers dodge prosecution and administrative action.

On the other hand, liquor dealers charge the law gives the liquor boards "gestapo-like power" over their businesses.

The Potter County grand jury, in a recent report on the liquor situation, was inclined to agree with both the agents and the dealers on at least some phases of the law. The jury said the law was obviously inadequate if a major bootleg liquor syndicate could exist without being caught.

The Potter jury was particularly critical of the wide powers vested with the liquor board. It said the board had authority without parallel in state government. It charged the liquor law put "almost unlimited discretionary power in the hands of a group of persons as few as two and no larger than six."

As an example of political pressures applied to help defend

ple charged with liquor violations, the jury report referred to a case involving the relative of a state senator. It reported: "A whisky running prosecution against a relative of a state senator was dismissed at the request of a district supervisor for the board; the violator involved was apprehended (by liquor agents) while wearing a .38 pistol and driving a car loaded with whisky. The senator's law firm represented the violator in the case."

In another case, the jury said: "A charge of violation of the liquor act against a hotel night club, in which hotel a high state official is financially interested, was withdrawn by the board in an administrative hearing in Austin."

Liquor agents complain that the act gives liquor and beer dealers too many loopholes if they violate the law.

One referred to that portion of the act pertaining to sale of intoxicants to minors. "The law charges knowingly sold to a minor," the agent explained. "Therefore if a minor buys intoxicants we are virtually in a position of having to prove the permit holder knew the age of the boy or girl, which is almost impossible to do." He said that if a permit holder "decides to fight such a case," he can almost always beat it.

These and other phases of the law are to come under study by the crime committee in its Amarillo hearings.

### Matador Is Tops In Glory For Spanish

**HAVANA (AP)**—It looks like Havana's guagueros are beating the baches, thanks to a strike threat and the intervention of President Fulgencio Batista.

But for awhile it was a toss-up as to which was the worst menace to life and limb on the streets, the guagueros or the baches. Now the former are on the way to reigning supreme again on that score.

The guagueros are bus drivers. Their buses are called guaguas because their horns sound "gwah gwah."

And the bacher are the holes in Havana's streets, which despite violent newspaper editorial screams and cartoons have been getting more and bigger.

The government had a ready answer. Just goes to show, said information Minister Ernesto de la Fe, that the administration of exiled President Carlos Prío Socarras—which Batista kicked out—was really inefficient. "Couldn't even build streets that would last eight months."

But the baches still got bigger and bigger.

Then the guagueros acted. The baches were so bad, they said, they could not continue to risk themselves among them. Havana's guaguas henceforth would have no guagueros, they announced.

# Unbeaten Georgia Tech Takes Bid To Play In Sugar Bowl

NEW YORK (AP) — The scramble for teams for the Jan. 1 football bowl spectacles was on today with New Orleans' Sugar Bowl out in front of the pack. Georgia Tech, unbeaten, untied and unsurpassed at the moment as a bowl attraction, agreed to play in the Sugar Bowl yesterday, thus becoming one of the earliest bowl-bound teams since the New Year's Day classics were started. Who the powerful Engineers, third-ranked in the Associated Press poll, will meet is anybody's guess.

The Rose Bowl at Pasadena, grand-daddy of the January spectacles, will, of course, match the Pacific Coast Conference and Big Ten champions, Dallas' Cotton Bowl will have the Southwest Conference winner as host team. But the three conference races are far from settled, and nobody can say for sure at this date who'll be defending conference honors.

The Miami Orange Bowl, fourth of the big four bowls, will hold a committee meeting this week end, and members declined to discuss any possible teams until then. A spokesman commented, however, that "November is an important month in football and we want to pick the best teams."

A rundown of the top 10 teams shows that only one other team, eighth-ranked Tennessee, is eligible for a bowl bid. The Volunteers, who have appeared in many bowl games in past years, are still trying to live down an early season loss to Duke, which was whopped, 8-7, by Georgia Tech last Saturday.

Michigan State, No. 1, is a member of the Big Ten, although not eligible until next year. Maryland, No. 2, is barred by a Southern Conference ruling against bowl games.

Oklahoma, No. 4, and Kansas, No. 7, are members of the Big Seven, which frowns on bowls, while UCLA, No. 5, will meet sixth-ranked Southern California Nov. 15 in the battle for Pacific Coast honors.

Purdue, No. 9, is the current favorite to meet the UCLA-USC winner in the Rose Bowl, and Notre Dame, No. 10, does not go in for bowl games.

NEW DELHI (AP)—A religious sect maintains a bird hospital here capable of handling 400 feathered patients. The Delhi Jain Bird Hospital attends sick or injured birds on its premises and sends out patrols to pick up strays in need of care.

Its service is free, but one rule of admission stops many keepers of bird pets. Once a patient is on his feet he goes free and not back into a cage.

Founded 20 years ago, the Jain Bird Hospital is supported by India's most nonviolent sect of Hindus. The Jains preach and practice nonviolence. They walk and sit with extreme care to avoid harming an ant or worm.

**Jains Are Wealthy**

The Jains, however, are among India's wealthiest people. Their religion ordains that a part of this wealth be earmarked for temples, hospitals and homes for the poor.

The bird hospital has an eight-man staff, most of them retired Jain doctors whose avocation is attending birds.

WASHINGTON (AP)—New blueprint of the oil industry's potential is being undertaken with the idea of assuring adequate petroleum supplies in the event of all-out war.

The expansion program sponsored by the Petroleum Administration for Defense (PAD) since outbreak of the Korean conflict has just about kept pace with a 21 per cent increase in demand for oil and gasoline.

The industry, in the eyes of the PAD, must be prepared to do far better than this. Hence, the PAD has called for a new study of this country's potential production.

The first step will be to determine the present production capacity in excess of current needs. PAD has set up a force of specialists to do this and then to arrive at an estimate of the additional capacity required as six-year protection in event of full-scale war.

This group of specialists also will try to forecast how many new wells will be drilled through 1957.

### New Oil Industry Blueprint Drawn To Assure Supplies

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to-be-determined number of wells between now and Jan. 1, 1958.

Perhaps the biggest problem facing the PAD study group is finding a way to get the excess productive capacity. Wells are costly and the industry naturally is inclined to sink only enough to meet foreseeable needs, plus those drilled in normal wildcatting operations.

The PAD, while it has power under the Defense Production Act of 1950 to order things done, prefers to achieve its goal through voluntary action from the oil industry.

### Motorist Finds Out Why Car Goes Slow

HOUSTON (AP)—Motorist Edward Taylor Duff, 38, wondered why his car was going so slowly.

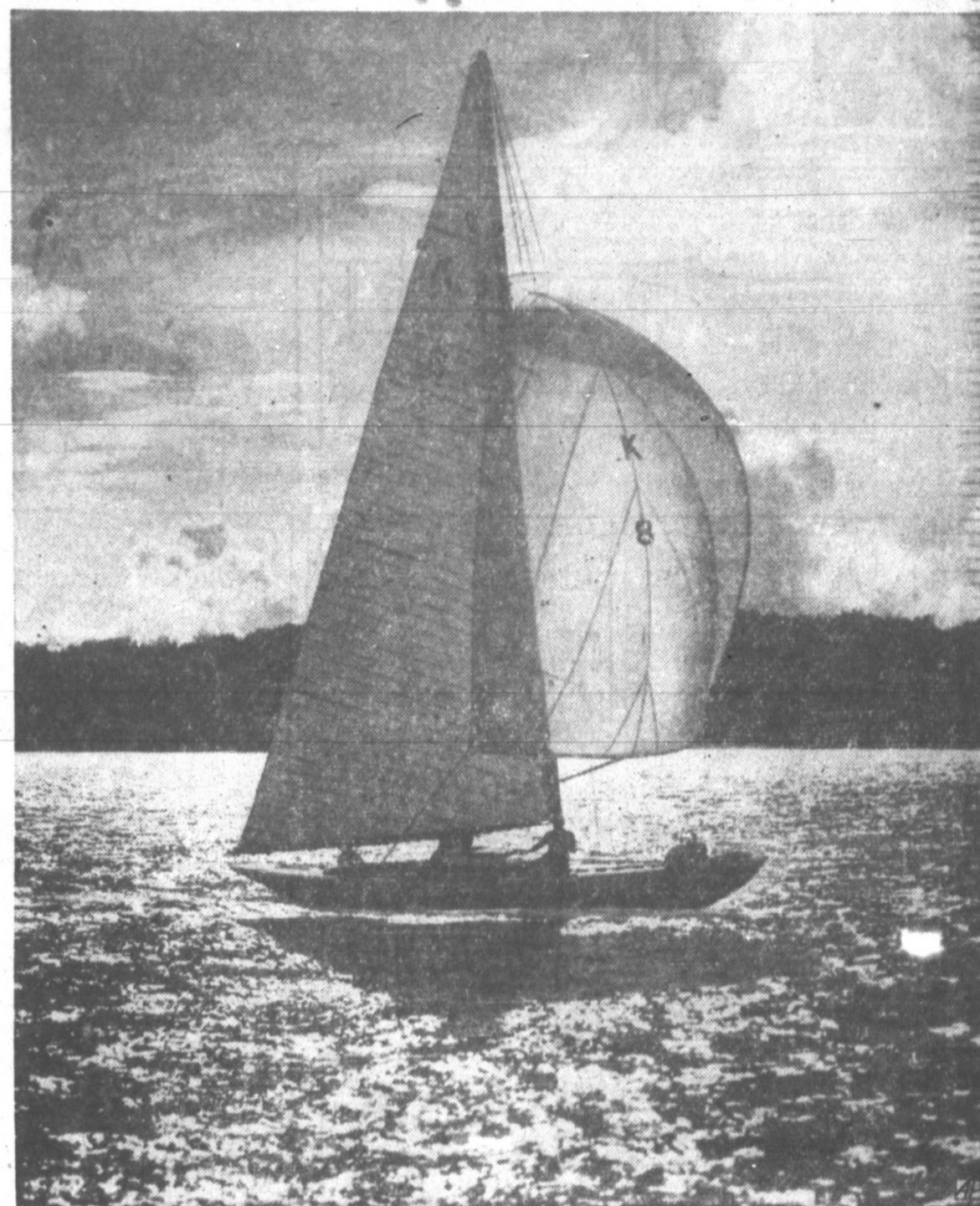

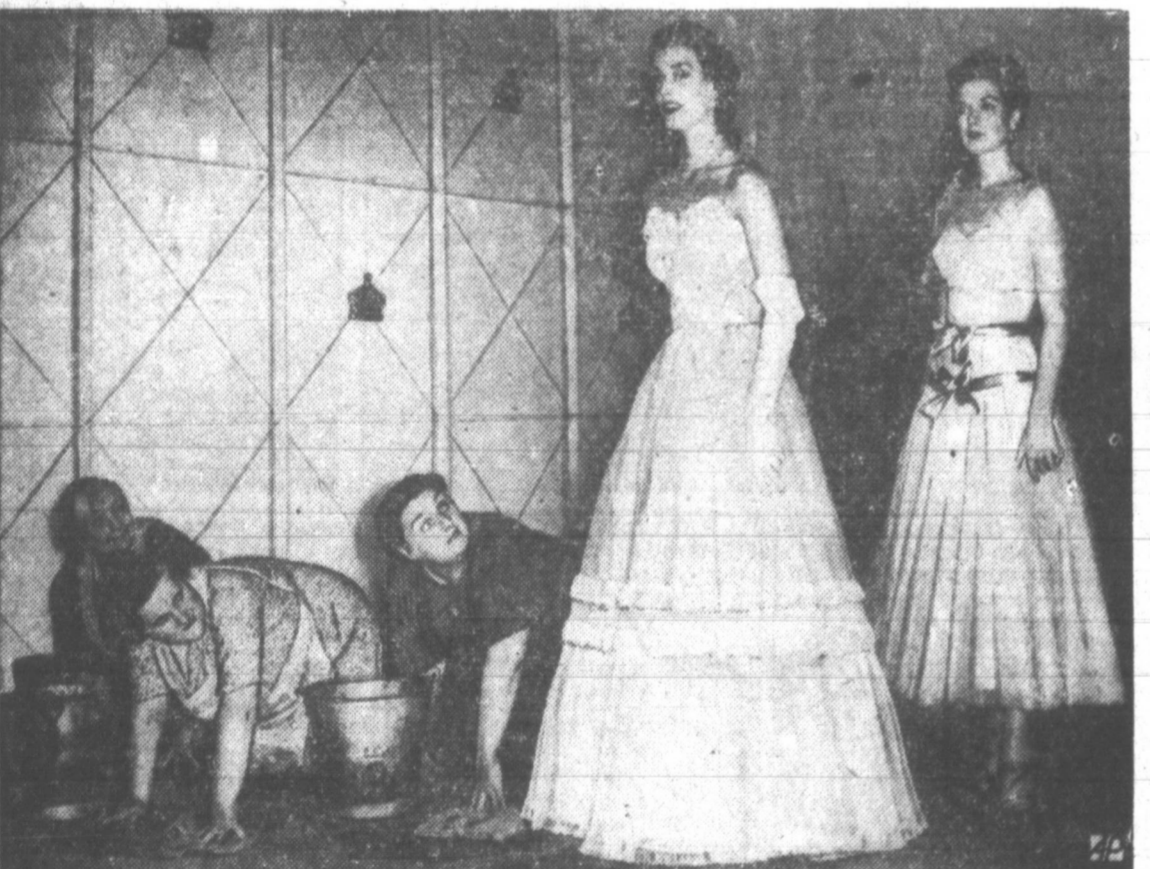

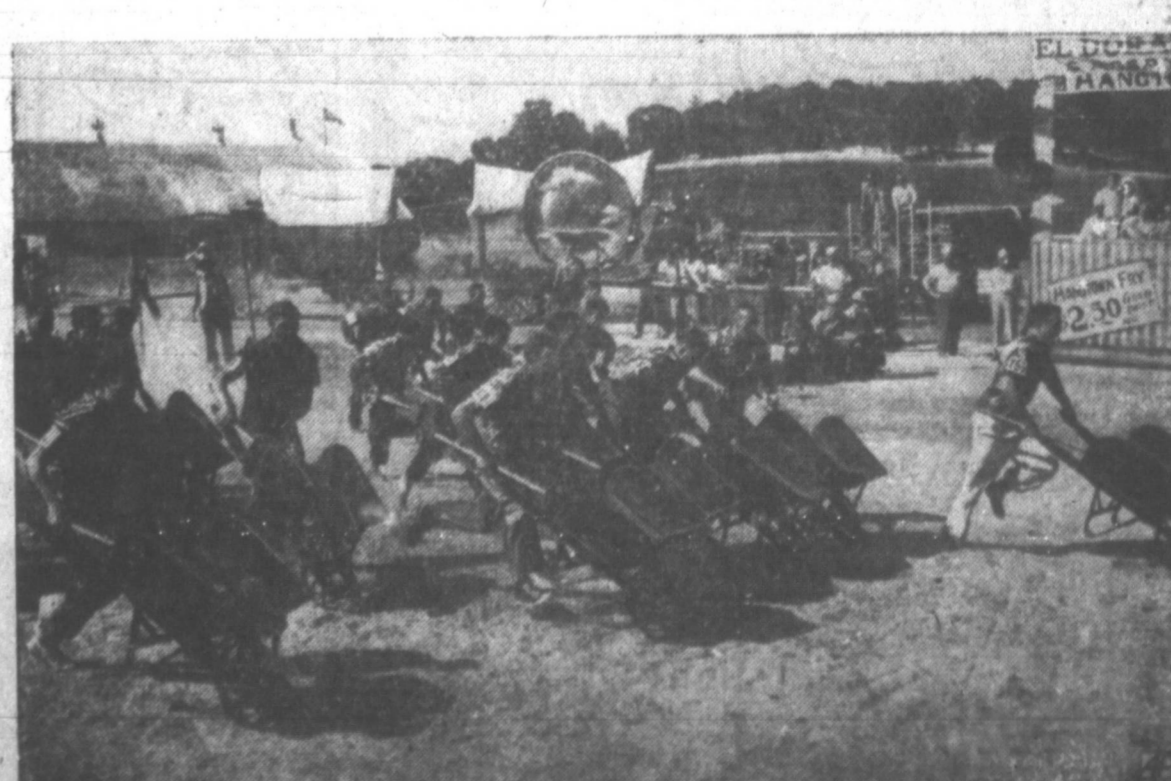

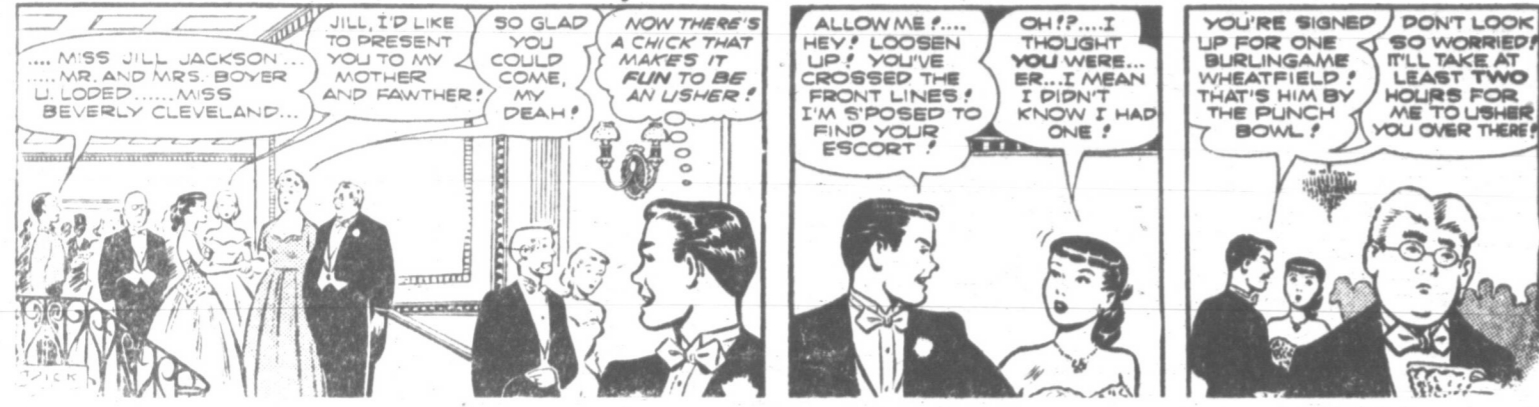

# America's New First Lady

The real key to the true personality of the new First Lady is the fact that she has been the wife of a career Army officer, say those who have been close to Mrs. Dwight Eisenhower.

Today it's popular on the part of Mamie's more casual friends to claim that she has emerged from Ike's campaign with a brand new personality. They say that they never thought (1) that she was physically strong enough to take the rigorous effort in stride, and (2) that she would take to the limelight the way she has. They are announcing a new-found Mamie.

Her really intimate friends don't see it quite that way. They agree that she has been able to stand up so well physically under the strain. As one puts it: "Let's hope that Ike's campaign proves once and for all to the gossips that Mamie isn't frail and that she can be a real First Lady with the best of them."

Like almost every American wife with a husband overseas, she was proved to be a great physical and emotional strain in Mamie's life. Before the war she had developed a non-critical heart murmur, which only prohibited such things as running upstairs and violent outdoor ac-

Had she wanted to tap the gay honors of Washington's war-torn social life she could have had the town at her feet. Plenty of wives of other important officers overseas yielded to this exciting alternative.

She lost weight, began suffering from the same headaches which bothered her during much of the GOP convention, and did her best to fight boredom and frustration. At the end of the war her health really broke. A near-fatal pneumonia which was near-fatal kept her in bed for a long time.

That she is now completely recovered from her war ordeal can be testified to by millions of Americans who were charmed and delighted during the campaign by her vivacious and warm personality.

But this is not a new Mamie, her oldest friends claim. And

She handled the whole thing beautifully, just as she was perfectly comfortable at the celebrity-studded affairs in Paris while Ike was NATO chief.

If she has a phobia it's irritation over malicious or idle gossip. It all adds up to a social surefootedness which is now in-

By any standard Mamie is feminine, pretty and attractive. Five feet, three inches tall, weighing 125 pounds, she wears a size 14 dress. Her ankles are as trim as her figure. Her famed bangs are worn because of a high forehead. They have become a pleasant fixture above her pretty face. Her excellent coloring—which unfortunately doesn't show up in black and white photos—is probably her outstanding feature.

## Catholic Scholars Receive 1st Vol. Of New Translation

NEW YORK (AP)—American Catholic scholars now have copies of the first volume of the new English translation of the Catholic Bible—the first of four volumes of the Old Testament.

Only a few are available so far for general distribution, but sponsors of the project hope to print more before Christmas. The first edition was kept small so that if corrections were necessary they could be made before many were printed.

Clamor for the book has been growing. Catholics, judging from that and the fact that the new Protestant translation has sold a million copies, expect the demand to be large.

The Rev. Louis F. Hartman, who edits and coordinates the work of some 35 scholars in the new Old Testament translation, sees the work as part of recognition by the church at the great increase in literacy among laymen.

"It is wrong to say the church ever forbade reading of the Bible," he says. He explains that some churches in the past, faced with illiterate or semiliterate congregations, discouraged their attempts to deal with material they could not understand and frowned on attempts to translate the Bible.

## Opium Smokers Appealing For Help From Government

SINGAPORE (AP)—Relentless police raids on illegal opium dens in this British colony have forced addicts to come into the distribution of the drug. Truckloads of police swoop several times a night on some of the estimated 2,000 dens in Chinatown and along the waterfront appealed to Gov. John F. Nicoll to reintroduce legal opium distribution in the name of "humanity and mercy." The petition added: "The millions that opium brought to the government's coffers before the war now seeps underground into the pockets of smugglers." A legislative councillor, Dr. C. J. Faglar, asked the government to consider registering the estimated 80,000 addicts here and rationing the drug to them on a diminishing scale.

There is not much likelihood the Singapore government will consider seriously either suggestion. The colonial secretary, W. L. Elythe, made this statement: "We are sure depriving addicts of opium is the only certain cure. I cannot agree at this stage that the government should open the opium trade and introduce rationing."

Before World War II, the Malaya and Borneo governments grossed profits equal to 6 1/2 million dollars annually from opium.

Before the war opium cost \$4.30 for 1 1/4 ounces. Now it costs \$23 for the same amount. A smoker pays 35 cents for enough to fill a pipe.

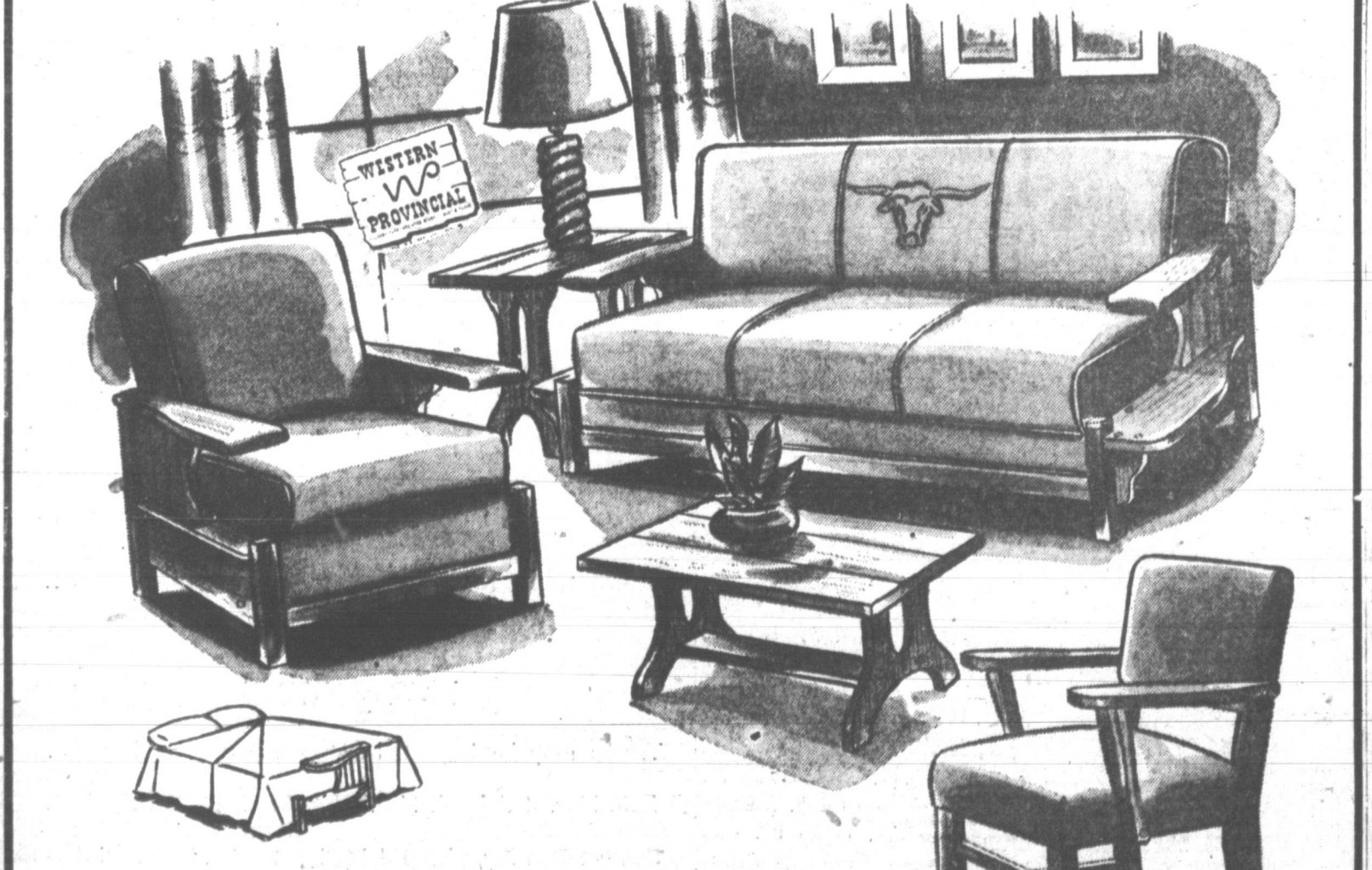
