## Auto Union Digs In for Long Battle

### Eisenhower Explains Work Of UNRRA at Hearing Today

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22—(AP)—General Dwight D. Eisenhower told the house foreign relations committee today that UNRRA is operating in Europe "with steadily increasing effectiveness."

### General Patch, Seventh Army Leader, Dies

SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 22—(P)—Lt. Gen. Alexander MacFarrell Patch, Jr., 55, decorated veteran of two wars who led the victorious drive of the U. S. Seventh Army across France and Germany last his battle for life last night.

The high-tempered slightly-built, six-footer, "Sandy Patch" to his friends and his men, who triumphed in the Pacific theater as well as on the European continent, died of pneumonia in Brooke general hospital here. He had entered the hospital Nov. 14.

Commander of the Fourth Army at Fort Sam Houston since last July, General Patch would have observed his 56th birthday anniversary tomorrow.

At his bedside, where an oxygen tent had been used to combat what hospital authorities called a special type of pneumonia, were his wife, Julia Lillie Patch; his daughter, Mrs. Charles M. Drummond; his widowed daughter-in-law, Mrs. Alexander M. Patch, 3rd, and his brother, Maj. Gen. Joseph Patch. The general's son, a captain, member of the U. S. First Army in France, was killed Oct. 22, 1944, while assaulting enemy positions.

General Patch was in command of the seventh Army March 1, 1944, he trained the army for amphibious operations and led it when it hit the beaches of southern France Aug. 15, 1944. In three months the Seventh drove the Germans back almost 600 miles. The smashing drive made General Patch the first army commander to pierce successfully the natural frontier formed by the Vosges mountains.

Patch handled the final mopping up of the Japanese on Guadalcanal, moving in with army troops late in 1942 to relieve the Marines. Previously he had commanded United States troops in New Caledonia. For his work at Guadalcanal, he was awarded the navy's Distinguished Service Medal.

He returned to the United States last March to head the Fourth Army corps with headquarters at Fort Lewis, Wash.

Funeral arrangements will be announced by Fourth Army headquarters.

### Regent of Greece Plans to Resign

ATHENS, Nov. 22—(P)—Archbishop Damaskinos said he definitely would resign as regent of Greece.

He made the announcement to a press conference shortly after the 85-year-old liberal leader Themistokles Sophoulis, was sworn in as premier, heading a new cabinet. Damaskinos said he would make a statement to the Greek people later in the day.

Sophoulis said in a press conference that Damaskinos was forced by the British to hold up his resignation last night and swear in the new government. He said British Envoy Hector MacNeill called upon Damaskinos and told him that unless he helped set up the new government, he (MacNeill) would leave at once for London as a mark of protest.

Earlier it had been announced that Damaskinos had withdrawn his resignation so that he could swear in the new government because the outgoing cabinet of Panayotis Kanellopoulos had no constitutional power to do so.

The solution to the crisis came after a day and night of discussions, amid rising political tension, during which British Commander Sir Ronald Scobie was reported to have banned all public gatherings and to have confined British troops in Athens to their barracks.

Taking note of a suggestion by a committee witness yesterday that UNRRA be scrapped and that the United States form its own relief organization, Eisenhower said in a prepared statement:

"While such a method might prove to be efficient, time will not wait while we organize, as a new venture, the gigantic relief system which is required. The need for the services of an experienced and effective relief organization is immediate."

He contended it would be "wasteful to dissipate" UNRRA's experience, trained personnel and "operating momentum."

The general's (9:30 a. m. CST) appearance was a change of pace for the committee, which yesterday heard a former employe of the United Nations relief and rehabilitation administration urge that the agency be abolished as a "noble experiment which failed miserably."

The witness, Raymond E. Lindgren of Evanston, Ill., testified he and other American UNRRA officials had resigned and returned to this country "completely and utterly disillusioned."

UNRRA Director General Herbert H. Lehman, who contested many of Lindgren's statements, promised to supply the committee with UNRRA notes taken at interviews with the resigned officials.

Lehman also said he would provide the committee, if the war department consented, the report of an army investigation into asserted black market activities among UNRRA personnel at the agency's mobilization center at Granville, France, last summer.

Lehman disputed Lindgren's statement that UNRRA has "thousands of employes in Germany who are now excess" and drew from the witness an assertion that he had not been in any of UNRRA's centers in Germany.

Lindgren saying he is convinced that teams of mixed nationalities cannot work efficiently, proposed that the United States form an organization to take over the entire relief operation.

Liehman Langston, chairman of the Gray county National War Fund drive and of the Pampa Community Chest which were conducted jointly from Oct. 4 to the present time, said today a total of \$27,749.58 has been turned in, and that the drive is now considered closed.

It was announced at a meeting of the executive committee at the chamber of commerce office yesterday afternoon that there were still several contributions which would be turned in to the total.

Five Pampa organizations had sought a total of \$20,655 for local operation during the next year; a quota of \$15,000 had been asked by the National War Fund.

Although the committee would have been permitted to retain 95 percent of its original quota of \$20,655 for local use, the directors felt that, since there was such desperate need for funds to be used in other countries both for our own soldiers and for other peoples, the group would split the sums on a percentage basis from the amount raised.

If final figures show that 80 percent of the overall quota was raised, then the local organization will figure its amount on that basis.

Langston said he expected the final total to be something over \$28,000.

Six youths entered the Rex theater last night after assistant manager, Cecil Hudson, had left the theater with the night's receipts to report at the business office for the local theaters.

The youths are reported by Hudson to have attacked one of the two youths employed as doorman. Bonner received bruises about the face, and had one tooth knocked out.

### Army-Navy Data On Pearl Harbor Patrols Ordered

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22—(P)—Senators Lucas (D-Ill.) called today for army and navy testimony on how many planes were available at Pearl Harbor in 1941 and why no long range patrols were being flown when the Japanese struck.

A member of the senate-house committee investigating the disaster, Lucas told reporters he wants to know, if it was possible to fly a 300-mile patrol in 1940, similar daily reconnaissance could not have been in effect a year later.

Adm. J. O. Richardson testified earlier that he instituted the air patrol June 18, 1940 when the army ordered an alert in Hawaii but called it off in December of that year. Previous army and navy inquiries have shown that no regular patrol was flown after Adm. Husband E. Kimmel took over command of the fleet from Richardson on Feb. 1, 1941.

The committee's hearings were in recess today for Thanksgiving. But Lucas asked William D. Mitchell, committee counsel, to obtain information.

### Navy To Reduce Discharge Points

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22—The navy plans to reduce the discharge point score for enlisted men from 41 to 38 on December 1.

It will lower the score to 37 on December 15 and to 36 on January 1. The changes will make another 150,000 men eligible for release, the department announced last night.

The change will not affect some specialists, including key punchers and shore patrolmen, not enlisted women.

For some ratings the score will drop only to 39 on December 1 and 38 on January 1. These are water tenders, machinists mates, chief commissary stewards and ships cooks and bakers. In the Seabees, however, these ratings will be discharged under the new reduced

### ON THIS THANKSGIVING DAY

This is more a day of rumination than it is of rejoicing. When we look about us, read the newspapers and listen to the radio, we realize, if we have any conception at all of what hunger and fear mean, that the world is not yet such as to make everyone happy.

True the war, as we have known it for long years, is over. The fear of receiving those awful messages from the war department is gone—for the nonce.

Around the tables in many homes, there are faces that have been absent these long months. But when we recall that the most of the men—the great majority of the men—who went away to war have not yet returned. Their job is not done.

We can be thankful that we are not hungry as a people—like the people of Holland and countless other countries are at this moment. But to be thankful in that manner is not to be joyfully thankful—if we have the real feeling in us for humanity—little children, women, young girls and boys.

It is no argument to say—in our own rejoicing, if any—that there will always be unhappy people, people who want for something.

So from this—our own argument—we can glean one bit of philosophy, if such we may call it.

Thanksgiving and rejoicing are but relatives. Insofar as the rest of humanity is happy and free from want and fear, we are happy and have something for which we can be thankful.

Happiness, we have come to conclude is relative. It is something determined when we weigh what we have against what we want. In the case of more humanitarian people, it is what we have against what we might want for ourselves—and for others.

"For others," mayhap, must have been the phrase for which we were groping when we began this piece. At any rate, it is a good one to think about.

Holiday tranquility settled over the streets of Pampa today as the Lone Star State joined the nation in the observance of the first peaceful Thanksgiving in four years.

Prayers of thanksgiving were offered by Pampans in community services held last night at the First Baptist church, special services were also held at the St. Matthews Episcopal and Christian Science churches.

A great part of the Pampa population was to move to Plainview today to support the undefeated Harvesters in the highly-pitched Plainview-Pampa football game.

Grid-irons throughout the state were to play their usual colorful role, including the Longhorn stadium for the traditional football game between Texas university and Texas A. and M. college.

Servicemen's centers planned to stage special events and meals today for personnel who could not be at home for the occasion.

School students were granted a four-day reprieve from studies by the holiday, as classes will not be resumed until Monday.

All over the nation Americans are finding a more earnest and sincere day of thanksgiving, similar to that of the Puritans with an international perspective.

Outward appearances of the holiday observances in Pampa do not give evidence of the deep and sincere thanksgiving in the homes of those whose sons, husbands or fathers have returned from the theaters of war.

Veterans and servicemen in the States for the first Thanksgiving in several years are recalling the pre-war spirit of the day. Turkeys on dinner tables are different than turkeys or no turkeys in fox-holes.

### Government Views GM Labor Problem

DETROIT, Nov. 22—(AP)—The CIO Auto Workers union dug in today for a long battle against General Motors Corp. and simultaneously sought to tighten its already nearly complete strike-hold on the company's nation-wide factory network.

"We will travel the strike road to the bitter end," said Walter P. Reuther, union vice president who has led the fight for a 30 percent wage increase for General Motors' employes.

How far off that "bitter end" may be apparently hinged largely on two factors:

1. The nature of the corporation's reply to a union proposal for arbitration of the wage dispute, promised by Friday.

2. The success of government mediation efforts.

John W. Gibson, special assistant to Secretary of Labor Schwelb, arrived in Detroit last night. Gibson, who was president of the Michigan CIO council when he took the government post, said he would confer with Reuther and other union heads Friday.

Within three hours after the walkouts began at 10 a. m. (CST) yesterday, General Motors' vast production system came to a near standstill. Only the Meriden, Conn., ball bearing unit of the 75 GM

**Federal Seizure Restores Capital Transit Service**  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 22—(P)—Federal seizure of the capital's bus and street car service today for holidays Washingtonians.

President Truman stepped into the second transportation tie-up in as many weeks with a seizure order and a statement terming the walkout "a blow at the sanctity of labor agreements."

The office of defense transportation took over the idle facilities of the capital transit system in mid-afternoon yesterday.

A mass meeting of the AFL-amalgamated street electric railway and motor coach employes broke up in confusion a short while later over whether to go back to work for the ODT. But a company official reported ten percent of normal service restored within an hour, and 50 percent by midnight.

The union is demanding a 30-cent hourly wage increase. The company offered to increase the present 45-cent hourly rate to \$1.02 with a stipulation for a 48-hour week.

The President said the union's contract called for arbitration of differences, and that local and international officers had ordered the strikers to agree to a government conciliation service proposal to arbitrate.

**Texas Division To Be Demobilized**  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 22—(P)—Sen. Tom Connally (D-Texas) announced that the 36th (Texas) division, would be demobilized in New York and not in Texas.

The Texas senator said he had conferred yesterday with Lt. Gen. J. E. Hull of the army general staff, and was informed that the veterans can be discharged and sent home by Christmas if demobilized in New York.

The idea of returning the division to Texas for demobilization was turned down in the interests of the veterans themselves, General Hull told Connally, since it would probably prevent most of them from getting to their homes for Christmas. The division is not expected in New York before the middle of December.

Hull also told Connally that both General Marshall and General Eisenhower had considered the proposal of Brownwood, Texas, citizens that the division be returned there for inactivation. The 36th, 1940.

### 5-Point Plan Designed for Labor Problem

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22—(P)—A five-point program designed to achieve industrial peace through voluntary arbitration, fact-finding procedures and a strengthened federal conciliation service has been placed before the labor-management conference.

A four-day Thanksgiving recess, however, will delay its consideration until Monday.

**PROGRAM SUBMITTED**  
The program was submitted by the conference's public hearings committee headed by Dr. Frank Graham, president of the University of North Carolina. Graham's group has heard reports from a number of labor, business and civic groups not represented in the conference.

The executive committee withheld Graham's report from publication, but a copy was made available to a reporter by a delegate who said he felt it should be made public.

**THE RECOMMENDATIONS:**  
1. Genuine collective bargaining without adamant positions in matters customarily negotiable but with a give and take spirit in good faith on both sides.

2. Provision in contracts for final arbitration or for the decisions of an impartial umpire as the conclusion of the grievance procedures for the settlement of disputes over the interpretation and application of the terms of the contracts.

3. Provisions for the structure and machinery of voluntary arbitration according to specified criteria and within specified areas of conflict.

4. The strengthening of the true values of the conciliation service by See FIVE-POINTS, Page 2

mation on the number of planes attached to the fleet under Richardson's command and the number under Kimmel's command. He asked also for a listing of the long-range planes available at the time of the Japanese attack. The Illinois senator said he also wants information on an army night patrol.

The committee may delay its inquiry into this subject, however, because Mitchell announced that the diplomatic side of the story will be brought under investigation with testimony tomorrow from former Secretary of State Hull.

Hull, in ill health, can appear for only 45 minutes at a time, the counsel said. He added that Sumner Welles, former undersecretary; Maxwell Hamilton, former head of the Far Eastern division; and Joseph C. Grew, ambassador to Japan in 1941, will be on hand to fill in a full picture.

Yesterday the committee heard Fleet Admiral William D. Leahy testify that he had guessed late in 1941 that the Japanese might attack the Philippines but that he did not foresee an assault on Pearl Harbor.

### Nazi Documents To Be Presented In War Trials

NUERNBERG, Nov. 22—(AP)—A mounting pile of documents ranging from intimate diaries of leading Nazis to carefully worded secret plans of the German high command, was placed before the international tribunal today as the Allied prosecution moved to convict 20 of Hitler's highest aides as war criminals.

As the third day's session opened the four-power court ruled that Jew-baiter Julius Striecher was sane and must stand trial and denied a defense motion which asked postponement of the trial of Martin Bormann, Hitler's missing deputy, who is being tried in Absentia.

The tribunal accepted a medical board report finding Striecher sane and Lord Justice Geoffrey Lawrence, presiding, ruled that his trial will proceed.

162,000 ARE IDLE

A company spokesman announced at 1 p. m. (CST) that the corporation's entire production force of 162,000 workers was idle. Another 100,000 on the company payroll are either salaried workers or members of other unions, the spokesman said, adding there was no way of determining how many of these were affected by the strike.

George Romney, general manager of the automobile manufacturers association, had predicted a shut-down of all but one other car producer (presumably Ford) within a week after the start of a General Motors strike.

**OTHERS WILL STRUGGLE**

In a statement late yesterday Romney said the other companies would "struggle to continue production" despite their reliance on General Motors for essential parts.

R. J. Thomas, UAW-CIO president, said the union had a \$4,000,000 strike fund. Additional support from the national CIO has been intimated.

"We will fight to prevent evictions," he declared. "We will pay rent where it is necessary. We will pay doctor bills."

### Nationalists Near Seizure

Chinese government troops drove to within eight miles of the communist-held Manchurian seaport of Hulutao today as another far east trouble spot, the Netherlands East Indies, stirred with ominous portents of further violence.

The Chinese nationalists reported by captured Hingcheng on the Peiping-Mukden railroad 60 miles northeast of the great wall gateway of Shanhaikwan and are near Lianshan, rail town 15 miles beyond.

Capture of Hulutao, less than eight miles to the east, would give Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's forces control of a strategic port for debarkation of troops needed in the drive toward Changchun, Manchurian capital 325 miles farther north-east.

Contradictory reports continued on Chinese-Russian negotiations for the transport of nationalists into Manchuria; some claimed the conferences had broken down altogether while others said the parleys are being renewed by the Chinese.

Indonesian leaders announced they would refuse to meet with Netherlands East Indies officials "so long as the Dutch keep their present attitude." This apparently quashed hopes for a conference of nationalist leaders and Dutch officials with Lt. Gen. Sir Philip Christison, British commander.

The Indonesians said they would negotiate only with the British, until "the Dutch give an order for the cessation of shooting, and the burning of our villages and murdering of our people is stopped."

The native spokesmen viewed gravely fighting in the capital city of Batavia, where at least a score

of natives were killed within the last 24 hours.

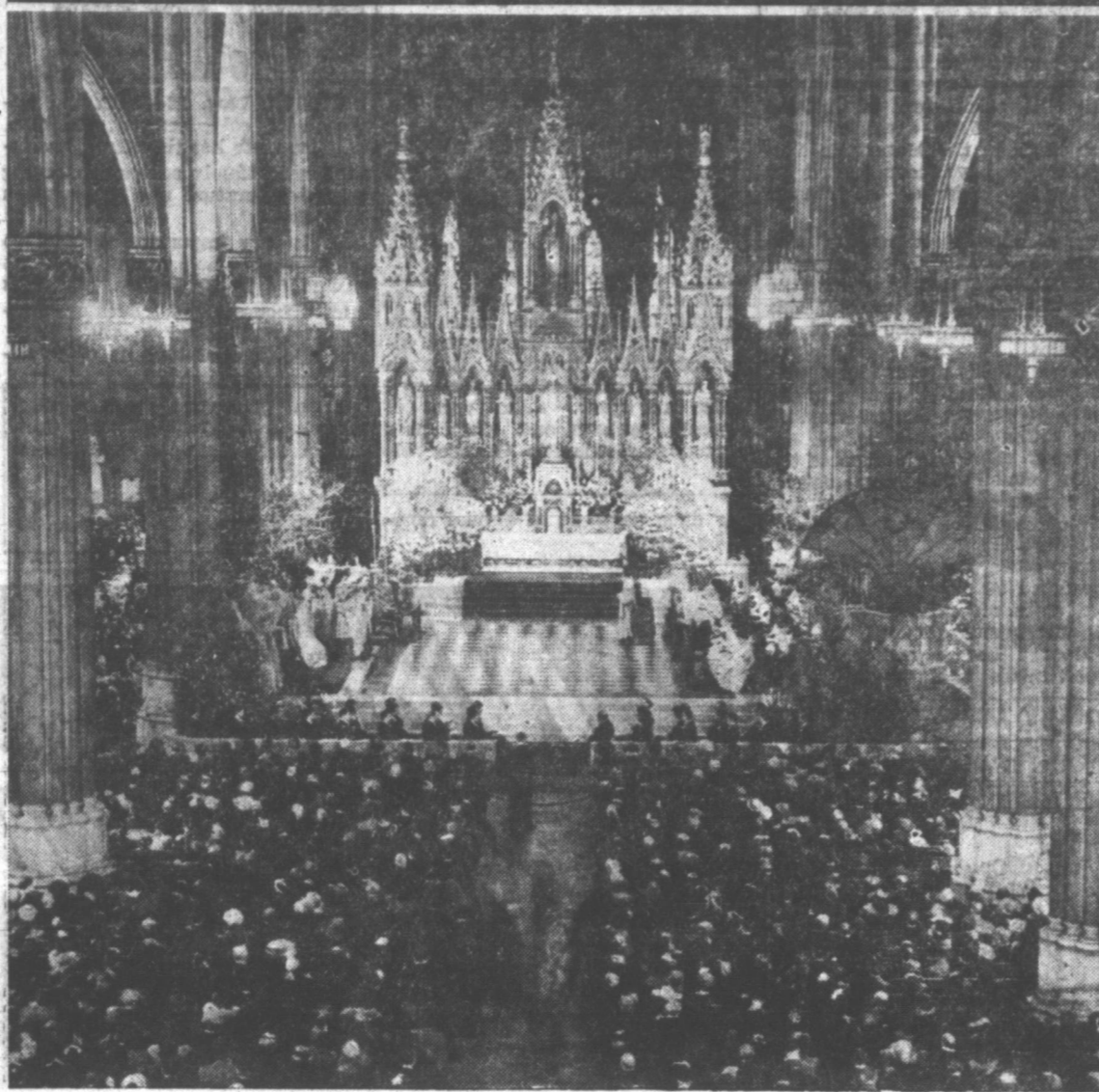

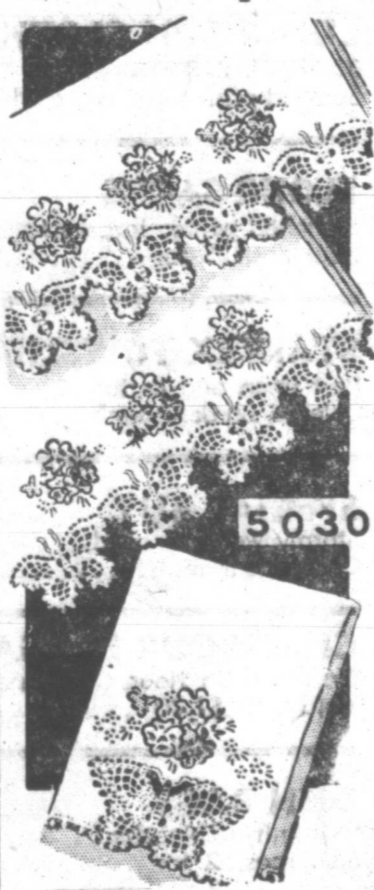

## REVIEW OF DISCHARGE

(Arthur A. distinguished himself as an athlete in high school. He volunteered for service shortly after the declaration of war with Japan. After training, he was shipped to New Guinea. One day during a barrage a mortar shell exploded within feet of his foxhole. He was not physically injured, but from that day he seemed nervous and peculiar. He was hospitalized shortly thereafter. His condition was diagnosed as combat neurosis.

He was treated in various hospitals and finally shipped to the states for reassignment. Somehow, he had changed. His nervousness had disappeared, but he seemed to have grown cruel and abusive. He disobeyed orders, went AWOL and was insubordinate to his superior officers. He finally was discharged

with an "other than honorable" discharge, popularly known as a "blue" discharge.

The GI Bill provided for the establishment of army and navy review boards to reconsider blue discharges. Arthur's case is not unique. It has been experienced time and again. Under the pressure of war, many things happen that bring about personality changes.

The discharge review boards that are authorized to review cases like Arthur's are composed of men of the highest integrity whose duty it is to consider all of the facts surrounding the issuance of a blue discharge.

In providing for these review boards, congress recognized the problem both to the veteran and the community in saddling ex-service-

## Land Board Lifts Shutdown Order

AUSTIN, Nov. 22—(AP)—The school land board in special session yesterday entered an order lifting the suspension of drilling activities on 45,640 acres of tide-water lands in the Matagorda Bay area, which have been halted by an executive order of the federal government since 1942.

Lifting of the suspension also opened to drilling operations an additional 3,787 acres under the act of the legislature in 1941. This acreage is under lease to 14 oil companies.

Several other areas along the Gulf Coast including acreage in the vicinity of Corpus Christi are still under drilling suspensions.

Notice to the lease holders of the board's action yesterday carries with it the information that exploration activities may be begun in 90 days.

Under state law operations may be resumed 90 days after the land board gives official notice of federal government removal of restrictions. The leases have remained in frozen status during the

## Irrigated Fall Crops Make Good Progress

AUSTIN, Nov. 22—(AP)—Fall crops made good progress in the irrigated commercial vegetable districts of Texas in the first half of November.

The U. S. department of agriculture reported that hardy crops needed cooler weather. Shipments of peppers and tomatoes increased and carrot movement of spinach started in the Eagle Pass section. Total movement of vegetables was about 14 percent less than last year however. Beets, beans and peppers increased while tomatoes, spinach and mixed car loadings were well under last year. Solid cars of broccoli, cabbage and green peas started from the Rio Grande valley.

AUSTIN, Nov. 22—With the approach of cold weather, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, has issued some timely advice concerning room temperature and its relation to health.

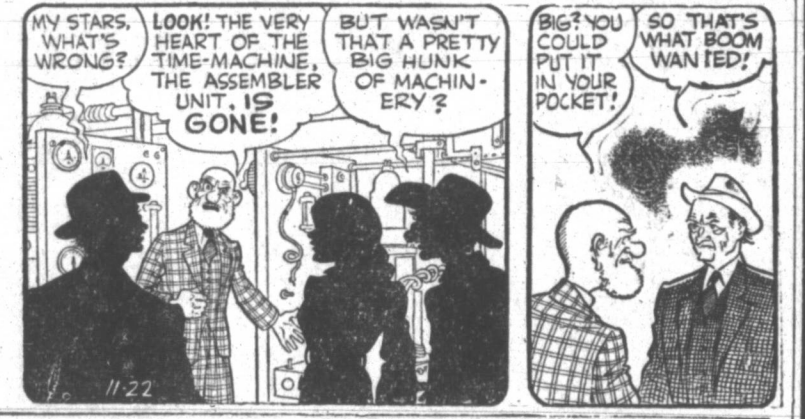

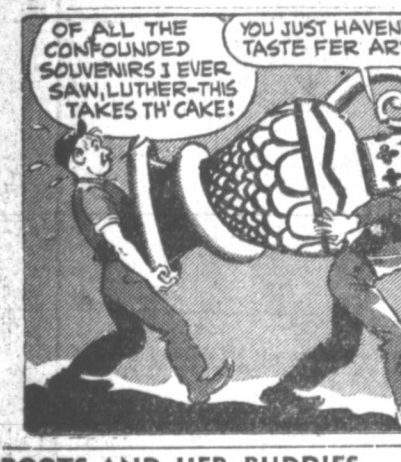

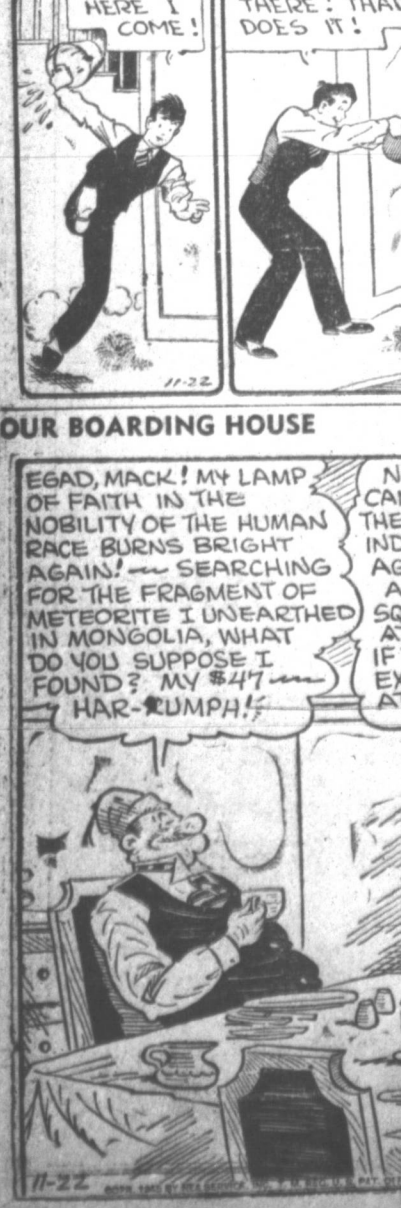

### Expanded World Trade Solution To Wool Problem

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Assistant Secretary of State William L. Clayton told a senate committee yesterday that expanded world trade is the only sound solution to the problems facing American sheep raisers.

Testifying before the O'Mahoney special wool committee, he declared there is no alternative to government subsidies for growers in the United States to enable their stocks to sell in competition with British wools from Australia, New Zealand and South Africa.

Imposition of restrictive import quotas, he said, would "have much the same result as an increase in the import duty on wool above the present basic rate of 24 cents per pound." An increase in the tariff, he declared, would be "contrary to everything we are trying to do to open up the channels of international trade."

Clayton was questioned about moves on the part of the British government indicating a desire to sell some of its surplus wool stocks on the American market. Chairman O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.) said he had heard rationing of woolen goods in England is contemplated so as to increase the exports of such commodities to the United States.

Explaining that he was not en-

deavoring to "defend the British policy," Clayton said the explanation lay in the fact that the very existence of the United Kingdom depended on world trade, and that without exports there could be no imports.

As far as estimates that 13 years would be required for liquidation of the British surplus wool stockpile, Clayton said he felt they were exaggerated.

He urged the committee to avoid any steps which would be counter to the administration's policy of fostering greater world trade and expressed hope it would approve measures enabling domestic wools to compete with foreign production.

"The question at issue here," he testified, is not whether there shall be a subsidy, but what kind of a subsidy there shall be, who shall pay it, and how much it will cost.

"Tariffs or other controls over imports have the purpose of increasing the price of wool in the domestic market above the world price and thus they constitute a subsidy to the domestic producer in that his return is higher than he would otherwise receive from the sale of the product.

"The difference is that, if imports are restricted, the consumer pays the subsidy on all the wool consumed whether domestically produced or imported, whereas in the procedure I have favored, the subsidy is paid by the taxpayers only on that part of domestic consumption which is domestically produced."
