Navy To Reduce **Discharge Points**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22-The navy plans to reduce the discharge point score for enlisted men from a good one to think about 41 to 38 on December 1.

It will lower the score to 37 on December 15 and to 36 on January The changes will make another 150,000 men eligible for release, the department announced last night The change will not affect some specialists, including key punchers and shore patrolmen, nor enlisted

For some ratings the score will drop only to 39 on December 1 and 38 on January 1. These are water enders, machinists mates, chief commissary stewards and ships cooks and bakers. In the Seabees, however, these ratings will be discharged under the new reduced
