# 'I WANT A ROOF ABOVE MY HEAD' VETERANS PLEAD IN DESPERATION

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—In New York not it's kiss the real estate agent and marry the man with an apartment.

Veterans and their wives who have been tramping the streets for months, camping in parlors, sleeping in cold water flats, and vagabonding from hotel to hotel while waiting to find a home, have devised desperate apartment-getting schemes.

One naval officer sent his wife into a real estate agency to try her charms on the besieged man. She came out waving a lease.

"I had to kiss him but I got an apartment," she called radiantly.

Others hire a cab and pull up to the New York Times building when the first editions are coming out on the streets at midnight. With the motor still running they dash for a paper, climb back in the cab and head for the nearest available apartment. There they camp on the doorstep until morning when the landlady opens the door to interview the board.

Several thousand soldiers and sailors have adopted the theme song, "I want an apartment," and at a housing rally at Hunter college auditorium they rose and sang to the tune of "I Wanna Get Married":

"I want an apartment,  
"I want an address,  
"With kitchen and foyers  
"And little Tom Sawyers  
"That always put the joint in  
"a mess."  
The song ends:  
"I'm a civilian now, A GI no  
"more.  
"I want the things I've been  
"fighting for  
"I want an a-part-ment!"

Another song sung by the veterans to the tune of "Show Me the Way to Go Home," goes:

Show me a place to call  
"home,  
"I'd like to have a roof  
"above my head.  
"I slept upon the earth when  
"it was muddy and cold,  
"And I'm ready for a bed.  
"No matter where I'd roam  
"O'er land or sea or foam,  
"I never thought you'd hear  
"me singing this song—  
"Show me a place to call  
"home."

When the veterans aren't singing and protesting the housing shortage, they are plotting strategic maneuvers. One couple who had a car watched apartments listed without a telephone. They dashed for their car as soon as they saw a listing and tore-out to the address before subway and bus travelers could get there. They got an apartment.

A veteran of the Italian war saw an apartment building being renovated but learned that the landlord was not taking tenants until the furnishings were completed. However, he edged his way into the

landlord's hall, discovered he was an Italian and used some of his overseas lingo on him. They found that the soldier had been fighting in the landlord's Italian hometown. He got an apartment.

Along with the acute shortage on available apartments was said that he is expecting her husband home from Japan in a few months was offered an apartment if she would pay \$1500 for the old furniture. Her husband will get \$300 mustering out pay, and will not have a job. It was a one-room apartment.

Other cases reported to the American veterans committee indicate that apartments can be had if the tenant will pay the landlord \$300 to \$500 "admission fee" and promise to pay an extra \$50 off the record each month.

A number of the city's real estate agencies contacted for information on available apartments said that they could get one for \$500 a month. They would not take any requests below \$75, and at \$150 to \$200 put names on a long waiting list.

The veterans service center said that the only apartments they had were "substandard."

### Campaign Launched To Revive Plan Of Student Tours of State Capitol

AUSTIN, Nov. 19.—Austin chamber of commerce, the University of Texas and the Interscholastic League are inviting the schools of Texas to resume a pre-war program which each year gave hundreds of high school seniors direct contact with the capitol and state government, the university and the capital city's wealth of historic interest.

This is the plan of the schools' each year sending their senior classes and sometimes other student groups for a personal tour of the capitol, the campus and the state's historical shrines.

The coming Centennial of Statehood observance, reaching its culmination in Austin early in the year, will emphasize anew this opportunity to give high school students a preview of their state government and the university.

Austin chamber of commerce is inviting the schools to plan these trips again for the present school year and in future. It makes special provision and numerous of its members give time and attention to greeting and welcoming the student visitors, and assisting them in a well-rounded organized get-acquainted contact with the city, the university and the state government.

Pres. A. G. Adams, Jr., of the chamber of commerce has announced that it is hoped the pre-war volume of these student and class visits will be reached immediately and much exceeded in the near future. As a preview of what the students have in store is available in a motion picture, made by the chamber of commerce, which can be secured by the school superintendent or principal from the visual education bureau of the University of Texas.

Dr. James C. Dolley, vice president of the University of Texas, in joining the invitation, said: "In the pre-war years many schools of the state regularly sent groups of students, especially seniors, to Austin for a brief visit. This practice gave hundreds of our public school students a first-hand acquaintance with the capital city and with the campus of the University of Texas.

"With the ending of the war, we at the university are greatly interested in having this practice resumed and expanded. As residents of Austin, we can assure the public school administrators of a sincere welcome to the capital of the state. As members of the university faculty we extend to the schools of the state a cordial invitation to visit the campus of the largest and, we believe, of the best state university in the South. We were happy to have you with us before the war, and we will be more than pleased to have you with us again. We look forward with real interest to another opportunity to show you around Austin and especially around the university."

Emphatic commendation of the plan was given by the Interscholastic League, in this statement by Roy Bedichek, director: "Visiting the capital of the state, under proper guidance and as a part of a well-organized itinerary, should, in our opinion, be a part of the extra-curricular offerings of every high school in the state for senior classes.

appear if his health permits. **ENGLIS HEARD AGAIN**

The committee began its fourth day of hearings by going over with Rear Admiral T. B. Inglis the sources of information on which he based a summary given the group Saturday of Japan's version of the Pearl Harbor attack.

Under questioning by Rep. Cooper (D-Tenn), Inglis said there is no proof that two observation seaplanes launched by the Japanese task force reached Pearl Harbor an hour before the attacking planes.

The committee learned today that Adm. Osami Nagano, chief of the Japanese naval general staff, testified recently at Tokyo that he alone decided—on Nov. 3, 1941—to attack the Hawaiian bastion.

Nagano's statement was taken during an inquiry conducted by subordinates of Gen. Douglas MacArthur at the request of the congressional committee. The Tokyo testimony has been placed in the record of the current hearing.

The report of the Tokyo investigation conducted by MacArthur's subordinates at the request of the committee showed that Capt. Sadatoshi Tomioka, chief of the operations section of the Japanese naval staff, testified that if the United States had made concessions—the attack plan "would have been discarded."

The report gave this version, with a note that the answers were based "on the recollections of—Admiral Nagano."

mille railway from Mianeh to Garman.

Three towns with Iranian garrisons were reported to have been isolated in two days of fighting in the mountainous northern province of Azerbaijan. The insurgents also were said to be threatening Zenjan and Kazvin, respectively 165 and 80 miles northwest of Tehran.

A high ranking Iranian officer described the situation as "desperate."

An Iranian government spokesman said the insurgents' drive toward the nation's capital was launched after the separatists seized control of Mianeh. One Iranian gendarme captain, four soldiers and two railway station employees were killed, he added.

Separatist forces in Maine have severed communications with both Tehran and Tabriz, Azerbaijan province capital 90 miles to the northwest, the spokesman declared. He explained that the insurgents were dressed in civilian clothes.

# Facts FOR THE VETERAN

**VOCATIONAL REHABILITATION** (Richard B. was inducted into service, but was discharged after less than six months for a respiratory condition. On a hunting trip following his return home, he was accidentally wounded in the ankle and leg.

He received emergency hospitalization in a private hospital. A gangrenous condition set in, requiring extensive hospitalization and removal of part of the leg and foot. With the aid of his local Red Cross chapter Richard was transferred to a Veterans Administration hospital because neither he nor his family was able to pay for the treatment needed. He now has returned home but is unable to follow his former occupation as helper in the shipping department of an industrial firm.)

This veteran is entitled to Veterans Administration hospitalization for the rest of his life. He is not entitled to an artificial limb or vocational rehabilitation through the Veterans Administration because his disability did not occur as a result of service.

All states have developed vocational rehabilitation programs. Prior to the passage of Public Law No. 113 by the federal government,

state funds were sometimes unavailable. This law provides, however, for federal supplementation of funds to the end that adequate programs can be developed on a state level to carry out physical and mental rehabilitation among handicapped residents of each state.

At the present time, almost all states have well-developed programs conforming to the federal statute. Counseling services, vocational guidance, aptitude tests, expenses for necessary schooling, costs of prosthetic appliances, and subsistence allotments are all provided on the basis of need. These services are available to veterans and civilians alike. Because this man's disability is not service-connected, he is not entitled to vocational rehabilitation under the veterans administration program.

Red Cross will counsel with the veteran and his family and will help in making contact with the state agency in order to help the veteran maintain his confidence and usefulness despite his disability.

Your local Red Cross chapter, on the top floor of City hall, is prepared to give you counsel and assistance with reference to benefits available to veterans and their dependents.

## Smoke Exceeds Actual Fire in China Fighting

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 19.—(AP)—The civil strife in China contains grave implications for every human being, but where actual fighting among the Chinese is concerned, this far, the smoke exceeds the actual fire.

Any Chinese civil war is best understood against the background of deep-seated Chinese ideas on war itself.

These boil down to the principle that it's silly to expend your power to get people killed if you can win by intelligence and maneuver.

These ideas were written down 500 years before Christ by a Chinese militarist named Sun Tzu in "The Art of War."

"They are still so fresh and vivid that the Military Service Publishing Co. of Harrisburg, Pa., has published a condensed version of the Lionel Giles translation of Sun Tzu.

Here are some quotations from one chapter of Sun Tzu which indicate the Chinese communists, at least, have not forgotten him:

"By persistently hanging on the enemy's flank, we shall succeed in the long run in killing the commander-in-chief. This is called ability to accomplish a thing by sheer cunning."

"On the day you assume command, block the frontier passes, void the official passports, and stop the passage of all emissaries."

"Be stern in the council chamber, so that you may control the situation."

"If the enemy leaves a door

open, you must rush in."

"Forestall your opponent by seizing what he holds dear, and subtly contrive to time his arrival on the ground."

(The communists have blocked a frontier, rushed in and seized Chiang Kai-shek's railways, delayed his arrival in north China, temporized, appeared weak and exhibited surprising strength, and have been notably stern in the council chambers in Chungking.)

Sun Tzu said: "All warfare is based on deception. . . . Let your great object be victory, not lengthy campaigns. . . . Hold out baits to the enemy. Feign disorder, and crush him." Both the communists and Chiang Kai-shek followed such principles in their fight against the Japanese.

"To fight and conquer in all your battles is not supreme excellence," declared Sun Tzu 2,500 years ago. "Supreme excellence consists in breaking the enemy's resistance without fighting."

What the ancients called a clever fighter is one who not only wins, but who excels in winning with ease."

Sun Tzu's reference to "the ancients" indicates that he said nothing really new to the Chinese of his day.

Sun Tzu warns: "When you surround an army leave an outlet free. Do not press a desperate foe too hard. . . . Soldiers when in desperate straits lose the sense of fear. If there is no place of refuge, they will stand firm. If they are in the heart of a hostile country, they will show a stubborn front. If there is no help for it, they will fight hard."

That warning may be especially significant today. Both sides are jockeying for position behind screens of secrecy and propaganda. They appear weak in one place, invincible in another. We can't really tell what goes on. But if Sun Tzu still dominates military thinking in China, both sides are in general avoiding pitched battles and trying to win them otherwise. But there is danger of a desperate war.

We (in Korea) remained unconquered and undivided through all the years, under Japanese oppression. We shall fight to remain so at the cost of our very life. The Allied powers might as well know this now.—Dr. Syngman Rhee, former president, Korean provisional government.

## Twitty Students Attend Shamrock Public Schools

SHAMROCK, Nov. 19.—Seventy school children from Twitty Common School District were transferred here to finish the 1945-46 term.

Because of the difficulty of procuring qualified teachers, the Twitty school was closed Friday, and all students from the first through the eighth grade were transferred to the local institution of learning.

The students were accepted on a contract basis for the remainder of the current term. The Twitty district will furnish transportation. At the present time, there is only one bus. It is making two trips daily. In an early-morning trip, it picks up students at their homes. As soon as they have been transported to the local school buildings, a second trip is made to pick up students who gather at the Twitty building.

The Twitty school has employed three teachers until the present

time. High school students have been transferred to Shamrock for the past several years.

Supt. Elmer J. Moore stated this week that he and his faculty are happy to have the new students. He declared that the local schools have been made better by some excellent pupils from the Twitty community, and added that he felt sure the students, in return, will be benefited by the opportunities of the larger school.

Chinese Girl Is Decorated by U.S.

SHAGHAI, Nov. 19.—(AP)—A Chinese girl guerrilla who assisted in the escape of an American pilot downed in Japanese-held territory near here last April was decorated for bravery today by Lt. General George E. Stratemyer, commanding army air forces in China.

The U. S. war department emblem for meritorious service was pinned on Miss Ho Jo-Nei as she lay in bed, still recovering from Japanese tortures inflicted on her in the notorious bridge house here.

The pilot she rescued, Lt. Col. Clyde D. Slocumb, Doerun, Ga., now is commanding the 5th fighter squadron at Hangchow.

Miss Ho was captured when she refused to disclose how he got away. Continued beatings and applications of the "water treatment" drove her to attempt suicide.

DALLAS, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Dedication of Dallas county's newest official town—Truman—is scheduled next week, with a telegram from its namesake, President Harry S. Truman, expected in time to be read at the ceremony.

Truman, Texas, formerly known as Mesquite Tap, is a community of 200 persons on U. S. Highway 80 at Gus Thomasson road. It has three grocery stores, a cafe, three gas stations, a garage and a feed store.

UPTON CLOSE:

Exchanging of Ideas Good Way To Remain Free

A person who compresses his opinions and observations in a column such as this over any considerable length of time becomes: 1. a paid propagandist; 2. a disciple of expediency, whose middle name is compromise; 3. an unscrupulous pecker through bouidior and bureaucratic keyholes; 4. a trumpeting prophet convinced of his own infallibility; 5. a poor man's Will Rogers; 6. a lofty-idealized crusader tilting, like Don Quixote, with windmills; 7. a vinegary cynic; 8. a philosopher, of sorts. Radio commentators, of course, may be listed under these same general classifications.

This simple formula may be applied to any development in the news. It reduces columnists and commentators to their lowest common denominator. Long since, the ordinary listener or reader has attached these particular numbers to his favorites and to the "untouchables." He knows approximately what they are going to say before they say it. The process of tucking another item into one of his mental pigeonholes of prejudice is an automatic as the system which inspires such items. He does not want to be educated. He merely desires confirmation of his own beliefs.

Taking a certain satisfaction in raging at those whose views conflict with his own, he can always feed his own vanity by consulting an old standby, remarking there-fore: "Now, there's somebody who talks sense!" Therefore, in a manner of speaking, Vox Populi not only underwrites but ghost-writes everything which appears in print or is broadcast.

The columnists and commentators either please the public or retire from public life. This is reasonable. The public pays the piper; therefore it should be entitled to call the tune. If Shakespeare had not been "commercial" in his own day, he would not be studied now. On the whole, the system of selection and elimination is equitable. Rarely does a voice cry vainly in the wilderness, provided the voice be sufficiently powerful. Occasionally, however, small pressure groups attempt to stifle voices which are in opposition to them, and the attempts are made at the expense of the public.

It is a truism, of course, that pressure groups—not the general public—sway the temporary destinies of nations. The public prevails in time because conflicting pressure groups tend to obliterate each other, but the period before that happy consummation is bound to be chaotic and threatening to individual liberties. Perhaps the present economic warfare is such a period.

The crowning goal of all bad government and corrupt pressure groups is to silence opposition. Once the voices of criticism are smothered, evil men walk unafraid. It is questionable whether there is much honor among these thieves of the public strongboxes, but there is no question but that they unite into well-organized groups. These pressure instruments are brought to bear against the press and the radio. Being articulate, whereas the general public is not, they often gain temporary victories.

That is why a commentator may be removed from the air, a columnist plucked from the paper, without the consent of the public which pays the freight. One of the tongues of Vox Populi is ripped out at the roots, and, beyond a brief yelp of pain, there is no general outbreak of indignation. Another of the labelled gentry, probably No. 1, takes the vacant place, and freedom of speech is forced to move over.

The legitimate columnist and commentator serve to make the great body of people articulate. Over a period of time, the constant airing of opinions and observations tends to crystallize certain ideas which have lain dormant in the minds of the people. Only in this manner is greater freedom and a better world in prospect.

One Gold Star Is Taken From List At Texas College

DENTON, Nov. 19.—One Gold Star has been removed this week from the "killed in action" list at North Texas State college.

Marine Opl. James (Jimmy) Gee, son of Mrs. James Gee of Frisco, returned to his alma mater this week after three and a half years in 25 Japanese prison camps to cross out the gold star that had been placed on the college list when he was reported "presumed dead" a year after he had been torpedoed on the first and ill-fated USS Houston.

Gee was liberated in August and recently returned to the States. Aboard the USS Houston when the ship was sunk in the Java sea battle March 1, 1942, Gee was one of only 356 survivors rescued of the 1,061 passengers and personnel on board the ship.

He was picked up by the Japanese, he related, and for the next three and a half years, never hearing from home or his parents, he was moved from one prison camp to another, through Burma, Java, Singapore, and Thailand.

"We helped build a railroad through Burma," he said. "We built a dry dock at Singapore and then we were taken to Japan proper to dig coal."

"I think my football training at North Texas State helped me come out in as good a condition as I did," Gee said, "as I was in pretty good physical condition, and there were many times while in prison camp that I looked back over my football training days, and was grateful."

One hundred and one gold stars remain on the list.

Well, they can't do too much about it. But at least all of them can shout. And when they all shout together they can set up quite a holler.

David Lawrence DAY-BY-DAY COUNT ON WASHINGTON'S ACTIVITIES GIVEN

WASHINGTON — Great Britain is postponing action on the subject of universal military training. The British government is much too busy on other matters to take the subject up at this time.

There is no evidence either that Canada or Australia or any other members of the British empire have instituted plans for a universal military training program of their own.

Many members of congress feel that the United States should not be asked to furnish all the manpower to support the decrees of the United Nations organization but that all countries which are members of it should assume their logical share of the obligation.

Public opinion, as recorded by the Gallup poll, appears to favor some form of military training but the timing of it is not believed that public opinion has as yet crystallized.

"We recognize the imperative need of preparedness for the adequate defense of our country in all circumstances. In determining what constitutes national defense in our present circumstances, our government, we feel, should explore the possibility of having military conscription abolished in all countries, and, to that end, might well consider how our control of economic assistance to other countries may be used to lead weight to our plea for such abolition."

"If a wide extension of military training is found necessary for present adequate defense of our nation, we feel that such training should be in keeping with American traditions, and that, specifically: 1. Voluntary enlistments in the armed forces should be stimulated as much as possible, to provide our first line of defense;

"2. Any period of enforced training should be integrated with normal school life; and 3. The war and navy departments should recognize moral leadership to correct certain political pocketbook schemes."

Take for example one operation: We were quite anxious to assemble all the fighting elements of the 82d Division in the rear of Patton's line as a general reserve since all intelligence showed that he might receive some rather serious counterattacks.

# Bulldogs Definite Favorites To Beat Pampa Harvesters

## Plainview Gridders Have Done Better Against Common Foes

On the basis of showings against common foes, the Plainview Bulldogs will be a two-touchdown favorite to beat the Pampa Harvesters when the two meet at Plainview at 2:30 Thursday afternoon in a Turkey-day clash.

Plainview has dropped only one game this year—a 7-0 loss to the Amarillo Sandies—while Pampa has won all, although one—a 7-7 tie with Lubbock—was on penetrations.

By way of comparative scores, Plainview beat Brownfield 54-7 while Pampa bested the Cubs 25-0. Plainview won over Midland 20-0. Pampa triumphed over the same team 25-6. Plainview beat Lubbock 13-7 while the best Pampa could do was win on penetrations.

Although the Harvesters won over Borger by a greater margin than did Plainview, the differences in season scores adds up to a 12-point margin for Plainview.

Another point in the Bulldogs' favor is that the Bulldogs will be playing on their home field, a fact usually giving the home team a six-point margin alone.

A victory for Plainview would practically clinch the title for the Amarillo Sandies. Plainview can't win a clear-cut title but can tie with Amarillo should the Bulldogs beat Pampa.

In that case, however, the title would still go to Amarillo because the rule states that when two teams are tied for the title, the winner when the two teams meet shall be champion.

Only two days of practice will be behind the Harvesters when they tackle the Bulldogs Thursday.

The team came out of the Borger game in fairly good shape, although Guard Jack Hood, one of the mainstays of the Harvesters line, received a badly cut lip.

A new ground-gainer was uncovered in the Borger game as little Bertie Brown, reconverted end, raced for a total of 91 yards in 11 carries and scored one of the Harvesters' five touchdowns.

Brown was a reserve end last year but was shifted to the backfield at mid-season of this year and Friday was his first chance to really "show his stuff".

Coaches Otis Coffey and "Jiggs" Whittington of the Harvesters were highly pleased with the performance of the team in the Borger game but warned the Green and Gold clad lads that they would really have to "go some" to throtle the Plainview eleven.

Plainview, coached by W. D. O. Harris and Clyde Flowers, won its first seven games this year before dropping the contest to Amarillo. In the first five victories, over Childress, Electra, Midland, Tolls, and Sweetwater, the Bulldogs were not scored on. Lubbock was the first team to score on Plainview, dropping a 13 to 7 decision.

Borger next counted on the bulldogs, also scoring seven points in losing 21-7 and Amarillo scored another seven.

Plainview's biggest threat is All District Fullback Jack Weldon, 179 pounds of dynamite who has repeatedly roared through the opposition for several hundred yards and no few touchdowns.

Also leading the Plainview offense is Jack Williams, one of the outstanding backs in the district and an especially fine passer.

Stalwarts in the line include Guards Claude May and John Stoneham. Both of these players were regulars on last year's team as were Williams and Weldon.

Tickets for the Pampa-Plainview battle are on sale at the school tax office in the city hall. Student tickets are on sale at the high school.

## Army, Alabama, Oklahoma A & M, Virginia Are Being Considered for Bowl Invitations

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—(AP)—The national championship, several sectional races and the very confused bowl situation today remained to be cleared up as the collegiate football campaign neared its conclusion.

Army and Navy went into training for their championship clash in Philadelphia Dec. 1, but the Big Ten, Big Seven and Big Six chases were slated to be decided this Thursday and Saturday.

The bowl picture, never a clear one at best because of the weekly batch of upsets, became cloudier than ever today following surprise defeats of St. Mary's, Holy Cross and Penn State Saturday.

Heading the list of contenders for the post-season contests were the four remaining major unbeaten and untied elevens—Army, Alabama, Oklahoma A. & M., and Virginia.

Army, which rolled to its 17th straight victory in two years by trouncing Pennsylvania 61-0 Saturday, topped the field for the Rose Bowl bid.

Alabama was rated the second choice for the Pasadena classic and the No. 1 nominee for any other bowl game in which it would like to play.

The Red Elephants captured the Southeastern title by walloping Vanderbilt 71-0 and still has two games to go.

Oklahoma A. & M. became a much sought after club following its 46-6 whipping of a good Texas Tech squad. The Aggies wind up their campaign Saturday against Oklahoma and shouldn't have too much difficulty in annexing the state title.

Virginia, which was overlooked in the early hunt for bowl teams because of its weak schedule, also became a desirable attraction with its unblemished record. The Cavaliers head into the rocky end of their season this Saturday and the week after when they meet Maryland and North Carolina in order.

C. L. A. the Gaels of St. Mary's were considered to stand a firm chance of landing a bowl invite down south.

In the Big Ten, Indiana, which beat Pittsburgh 18-0 in its last outing, can clinch its first western conference title by beating Purdue Saturday. But if the Hoosiers should lose, the winner of the Michigan-Ohio State shindig would become champions.

Michigan ousted Purdue from the race 27-13 while Ohio State overcame Illinois 27-2.

Missouri, which nipped Oklahoma 14-6, can clinch the Big Six flag against Kansas Saturday. In the event of an upset, however, Oklahoma could tie for the bunting.

Colorado, with a 3-0 Big Seven record, meets runner-up Denver (3-1) Thursday in a Rocky mountains circuit deciding clash.

The Southwest Conference, which send one representative to the Cotton Bowl, had Texas in undisputed possession of first place but the race was far from decided. Here's the way the leaders run now: Texas 4-1, Rice 3-1, Texas A. & M. 3-2, Southern Methodist 2-2 and Texas Christian 2-2. Saturday Rice plays Texas Christian but a number of later scheduled tilts could conclude the conference season in a four-way tie.

The Southern Conference title fight could be cleaned up Saturday if Duke, beaten only by Army and Navy, conquers North Carolina. The Blue Devils lead the loop with 3-0 followed by Clemson with two wins, no losses and a tie.

In the east and elsewhere emphasis was on traditional games. Saturday's pairings match Yale vs. Princeton, Colgate vs. Brown, Dartmouth vs. Columbia, Cornell vs. Pennsylvania, Penn State vs. Pittsburgh, Boston U. vs. Harvard, Mississippi State vs. Mississippi, Tennessee vs. Kentucky, Southern Methodist vs. Baylor, Notre Dame vs. Tulane, Illinois vs. Northwestern, Wisconsin vs. Minnesota, Iowa vs. Nebraska, and Colorado A. & M. vs. Colorado college.

cago the general's train stopped at the Pennsylvania station here and he was mobbed when his car was switched alongside a troop train.

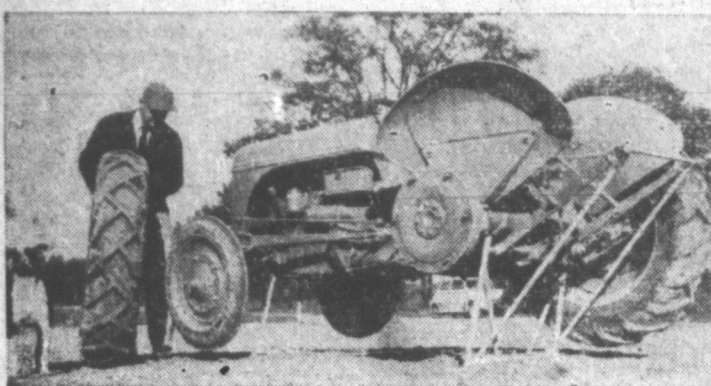
Disheveled and tired G.I.s crowded around the rear platform of the Allied commander's car, shook hands with him and had him sign about a hundred autographs.

## U. S. Lays Down Far-Reaching Terms for World

By JAMES MARLOW

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—(AP)—This country within two days has laid down the most far-reaching terms for the rest of the world.

We have the atomic bomb, industrial production, and money. Other countries don't have the bomb, production of many have been devastated, and they have no money.

On Thursday we said we'd share the atomic bomb secret with others provided they satisfied us they meant to play ball and provided safeguards could be set up to prevent use on the bomb in warfare.

Last night Secretary of State Byrnes outlined a program for improving world trade. That program is not a one way charity street. It would help other nations. It would help us very much.

Mr. Byrnes, making a speech at Charleston, S. C., very realistically called his shots in proposing his program. He said:

"Whatever foreign loans we make will of course increase the markets for American products, for in the

long run the dollars we lend can be spent only in this country.

"We cannot play Santa Claus to the world but we can make loans to governments whose credit is good, provided such governments will make changes in commercial policies which will make it possible for us to increase our trade with them."

He wants the various nations, including our own, to cooperate in lowering tariffs.

To understand what is involved in the tariff reductions it is necessary to consider foreign tariffs in relation to our own reciprocal trade agreements act.

This act was first passed in 1934 and has been renewed at intervals by congress. It was last renewed in June. Simply the act means this:

We have "tariffs on a number of items coming into this country. Other countries have tariffs on items we export to them.

Under the act as it now stands we can reduce our tariffs as much as 50 percent below the Jan. 1, 1941, figure provided we work out an agreement with another nation

## Veteran Writers To Write News of Nuernberg Trials

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Five veteran war correspondents who followed the European war from the invasion of Africa to the fall of Berlin will provide a play-by-play account of the Nuernberg trials, for Associated Press members and subscribers around the world.

Heading the staff will be Wes Gallagher, AP chief of bureau for Germany, who has been on hand for most of the big events in Europe during the past six years.

Working with Gallagher will be Louis Louchner, Daniel De Luce, George Tucker and Roland Norgaard. Louchner and De Luce are Pulitzer prize winners, the former for his 1938 reporting of the Munich crisis. AP chief of bureau in Berlin for almost 20 years, Louchner knew personally a number of the men on trial.

Both Tucker and Norgaard went through the African and Italian campaigns.

For picture coverage of the trial, AP has assigned photographers B. I. Sanders and Henry Burroughs.

American press and radio correspondents will have 20 to 100 of the 250 press seats in the Nuernberg courtroom. A press camp to accommodate 400 correspondents is being established at the estate of Eberhard Faber, the German pencil manufacturers, and buses will shuttle the reporters the four miles to the courtroom.

The U. S. army public relations section, in charge of press arrangements, will provide every courtroom reporter with earphones and a selective switch enabling him to tune in on a running translation in English, French, German or Russian. There will be radio and cable circuits direct to the United States, and in the event of a breakdown in commercial facilities, the army will make available its six radio circuits to the war department in Washington.

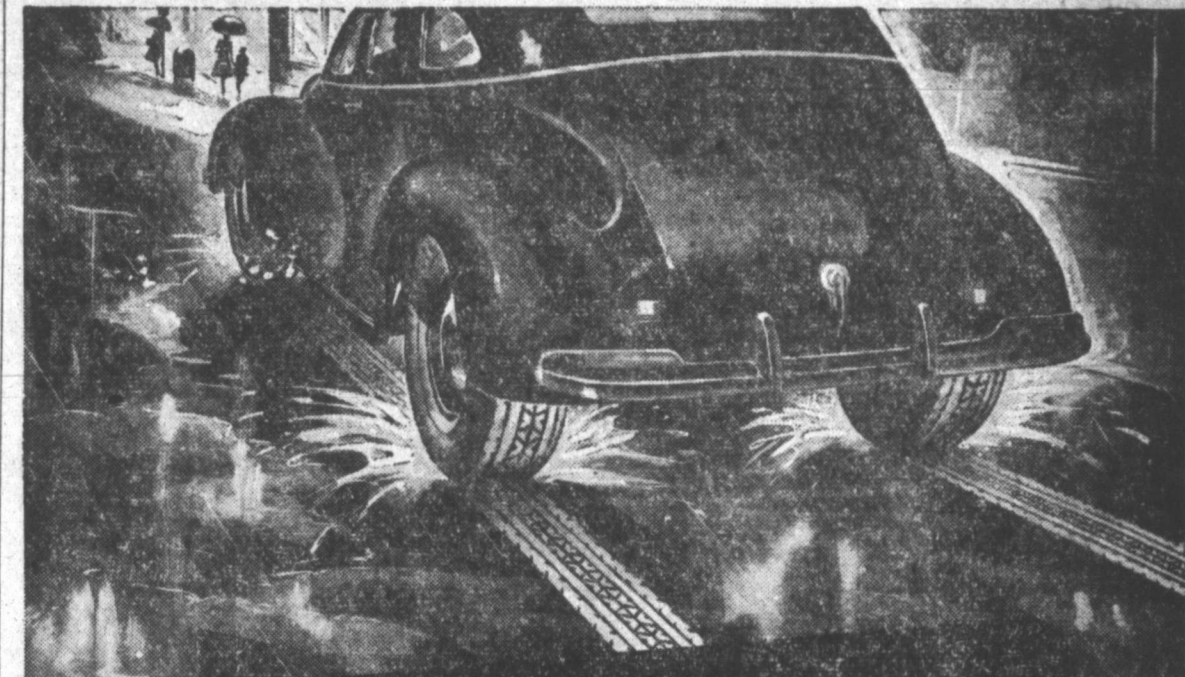
FUSAN, Korea.—(AP)—California-born Bob Fujikawa has been in service long enough to win the points required for a ticket home but there isn't any immediate likelihood he will be able to cash in on them.

"I got my points in the wrong army," explained the former Fresno truck gardener, who is a private in the Japanese armed forces. Fujikawa is known as "Fresno Joe" to troops of the American 40th infantry division who took him on as an interpreter as soon as they heard his state-side slang. He helps them—still wearing his Japanese army uniform—in the task of sending hundreds of thousands of Nipponese soldiers and civilians, uprooted from Korea, back to their homeland. This post is the chief tunnel for the homeward trek.

"We decided to put Joe to work for us," said his boss, Col. R. G. Stanton, Washington, D. C., "after we asked if he could speak English and he replied 'I getcha.'"

"Fresno Joe" is something of a mascot in the 100th infantry regiment now, but his future is a twilight matter, with Fujikawa himself completely uncertain what will happen to him, although he knows what he wants.
