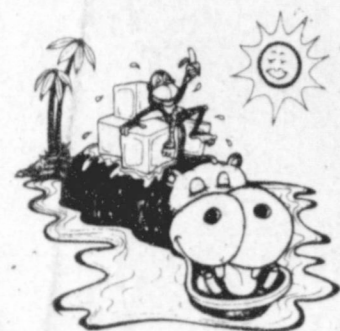

### Weather Modification Permit Under Fire

Plains Weather Improvement Association, Inc. (PWIA) has applied to the Texas Department of Water Resources for a weather modification permit for rain increase and hail damage reduction by the seeding of clouds by aircraft in portions of Lamb, Hale, Castro, and Floyd Counties, Texas.

Jon Green, a Commission hearings examiner, conducted a public hearing in Plainview, Texas on March 11, 12, 13 and 18,

1981. Notice of the Hearing was published in the Floyd county hesperian on February 12 and 19, 1981; the PLAINVIEW DAILY HERALD on February 11 and 18, 1981; the LAMB COUNTY LEADER-NEWS on February 12 and 19, 1981; and the CASTRO COUNTY NEWS on February 12 and 19, 1981. These newspapers are regularly published and circulated in Floyd, Hale, Lamb and Castro Counties, Texas respectively.

The following were admitted at the hearing as parties to the proceeding: the applicant; the Executive Director and the Public Interest Advocate of the Texas Department of Water Resources; and both of the protestants.

The evidence presented at the hearing established that the proposed hail suppression activity would reduce the overall rainfall both in the proposed target area and downwind of that area. Both the applicant and the protestants presented eminent experts Cont. Page 6, Col. 4

### Window Coatings Driving Hazard

Some local motorists may be surprised when they find themselves on the "wrong side of the law" by using glass coatings and one-way glass, according to Acting Muleshoe City Police Chief Jerry Hicks.

He said late last week that officers are going to be forced to start stopping motorists and enforcing the laws governing use of window-covering materials.

"A few motorists may be confused over the use of glass coatings and one-way glass in motor vehicles," said Chief Hicks. "However, the Texas Department of Public Safety reports

that drivers should be aware of the law and exercise caution prior to altering the window glass of a motor vehicle."

The Muleshoe PD chief pointed out that motorists should not put anything on the windshield or front side windows. "No coatings, plastic, liquid or other materials may be put on the Cont. Page 6, Col. 5

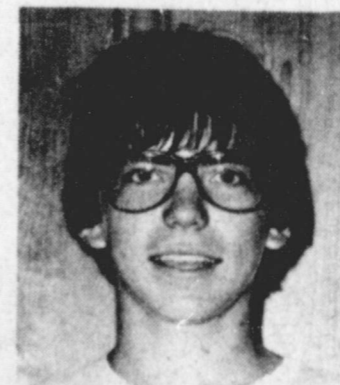

# Farmers Face Irrigation Decisions

It's decision time again for High Plains cotton farmers who irrigate their crop: When should they begin watering?

The stage of growth of the plant is one key to its water needs, said Dr. James R. Supak, area cotton agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The accompanying chart illustrates the approximate rate of water use during various growth stages of the cotton plant, he said.

"Generally, the crop uses less than 0.1 inches a day until the first or second week of squaring," the cotton specialist said. "After that, the demand for water increases rapidly and can easily reach 0.4 inches or more a day at peak bloom."

Adequate soil moisture during the heavy fruiting period from Mid-July to early August is essential for good production, Supak emphasized. Moisture stress during this period

will recede both fiber quality and yield, he cautioned.

Numerous research studies on the number and timing of summer irrigations have been conducted by agronomists with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and USDA-ARS at Lubbock. Generally these studies show that a preplant (4 to 6 inches) plus one to two summer irrigations (4 inches per irrigation) are adequate to produce profitable yields, the Extension specialist said.

The optimum timing of summer irrigations is a rather complex matter, Supak noted. "Generally, irrigations before first bloom is not recommended as high moisture levels prior to this growth stage tend to encourage vegetative growth and delay maturity." The initiation of irrigation is usually determined by such factors as availability of irrigation water, the water needs of

other crops being grown and weather conditions, he said.

As a general guide, he suggested that a single summer irrigation be timed to coincide with bloom initiation. Early maturing determinate varieties frequently need to be watered before bloom to avoid premature "cutout." On the other hand, irrigation timing of the later maturing, indeterminate varieties appears to be less critical and can frequently be delayed until one to three weeks after first bloom.

"Again, keep in mind that these are generalizations that can be modified by weather and other factors," Supak said.

Many farmers with limited water often plant a portion of their cotton acreage for an early maturing variety and the remainder to a late variety. Irrigation is initiated in the early variety (as early as the 1/2 to 1/2 grown square stage) and continues across later maturing cotton. In this manner, both varieties receive water at or near the growth stage where it can be efficiently utilized in fiber and seed production.

"Where two summer irrigations can be applied, the recommendation is to apply the first at bloom initiation and the second two to four weeks later, as

determined by water availability and rainfall. The last irrigation should be applied before mid-August," Supak said.

The need for a second summer irrigation is often questionable, especially in the northern counties of the South Plains, the cotton agronomist said. "Granted, in hot, dry years such as 1980, that second irrigation can pay great dividends. Under more typical conditions, however the September rains and resulting cooler temperatures tend to negate much of the benefit from a second irrigation." In the "bad" years, the extra watering can contribute to excessive growth, delayed maturity and ultimately reduced yields and fiber quality, Supak warned.

Alternate furrow irrigation is a practice that helps achieve timeliness and efficiency of irrigation, the Extension specialist said. This method is effective in early (pre-bloom) irrigation where soil moisture reserves are only partially depleted. It also leaves a dry furrow that can be diked to help conserve rainfall, he added.

Sprinkler systems allow timely application of irrigation water and many have higher application efficiencies than furrow systems. There is a tendency, especially with the center pivot system, to initiate early irrigation. Frequently sprinkler systems are started at the first sign of mid-afternoon wilt with little or no consideration of the overall soil moisture situation or stage of growth.

Light, frequent irrigations early in the season tend to reduce root development and enhance vegetative growth. Consequently, during the peak water use period the crop may become stressed and shed fruit because the irrigation system can't meet the moisture demand and the plant roots aren't sufficiently developed to utilize all available soil moisture, Supak said.

During the early square development period, some mid-afternoon wilting followed by recovery in the evening and morning hours tends to encourage root development and establish a good balance of fruiting and vegetative growth, Supak said. A similar stress condition after the first irrigation is apt to result in fruit shed followed by excessive vegetative growth once additional water is received by the crop, he cautioned.

A schedule of the Fourth of July Celebration was read and the Chapter voted to contribute \$25 to this worthy cause.

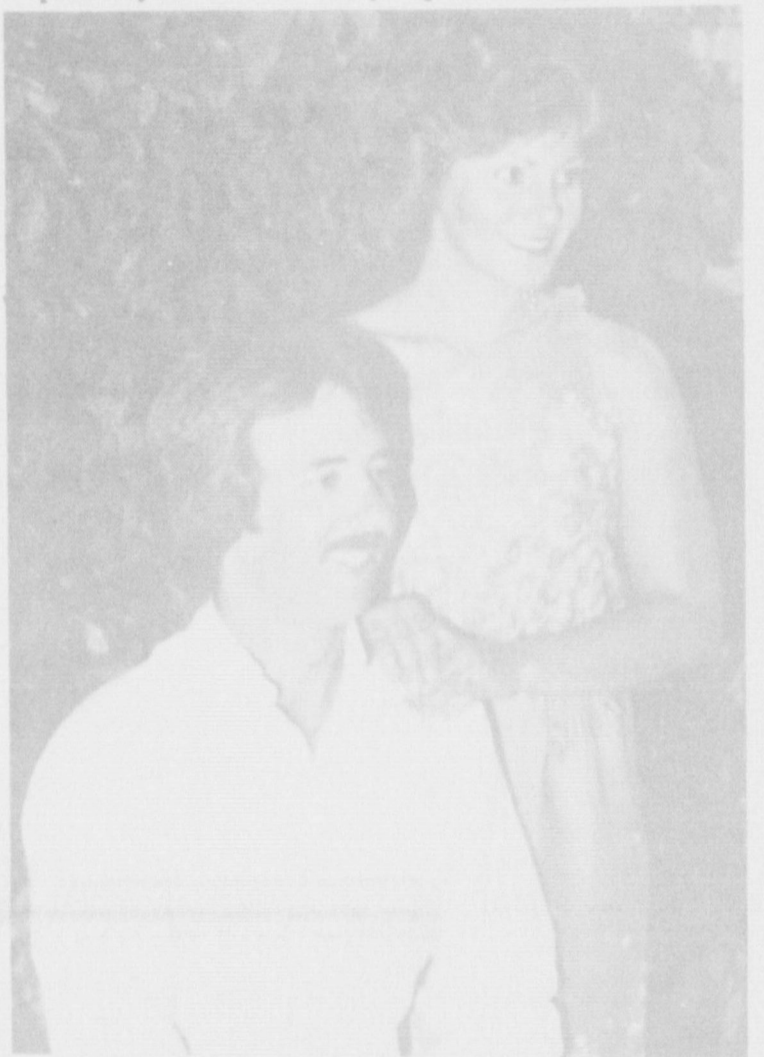

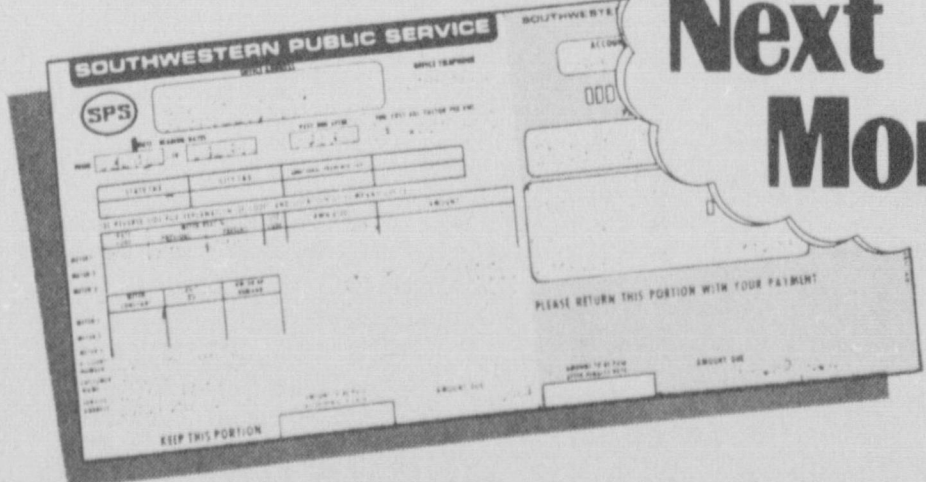

whose testimonies conflicted in almost every area, but the Examiner found the testimony of the protestors' expert on the issue of reduction of rainfall to be the most persuasive.

The evidence established that hail suppression and rain enhancement were mutually exclusive operations. The applicant had proceeded totally under a theory of increased rain through hail suppression activity. No significant evidence of applicant's rain enhancement plans apart from hail suppression was presented. It was the distinct impression of the Examiner that rain enhancement was subordinate to the primary goal of hail suppression, without which activity the applicant was not much interested in modifying the weather.

Finally, the testimony at the hearing was transcribed into two volumes. Where possible, the Examiner cites to relevant testimony and documentary evidence. This was done purely for the convenience of the Commission and should not be considered binding or conclusive in any way. The Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law are based on the entire record. After a review of that record, the Examiner proposes that the Texas Water Commission deny the application of Plains Weather Improvement Association, Inc. for a weather modification permit.

windshield or front windows of any motor vehicle that has not been approved by the Department of Public Safety. Glass coating materials may be applied to the rear window and the rear side windows if the vehicle has outside rear-view mirrors, however."

Hicks also commented that no motor vehicle glass coatings are currently approved by the DPS for application on windshield or front side windows. "Under state law, the DPS has the authority to approve, but due to the variations of the materials and the numerous methods in which they are applied, the DPS will not

approve any of the coatings," added Chief Hicks. "Frequently we find these coatings to be dangerous since they often obstruct the driver's vision."

Some of the materials which have been used include spray-on tint, metallized mylar plastic or other kinds of applicable materials. "The use of curtains, blinds or stick-on

novelty designs are not prohibited on rear windows, but common sense should be considered when applying these designs to a vehicle," he continued. "The driver must be able to maintain good external vision during the operation of any motor vehicle."

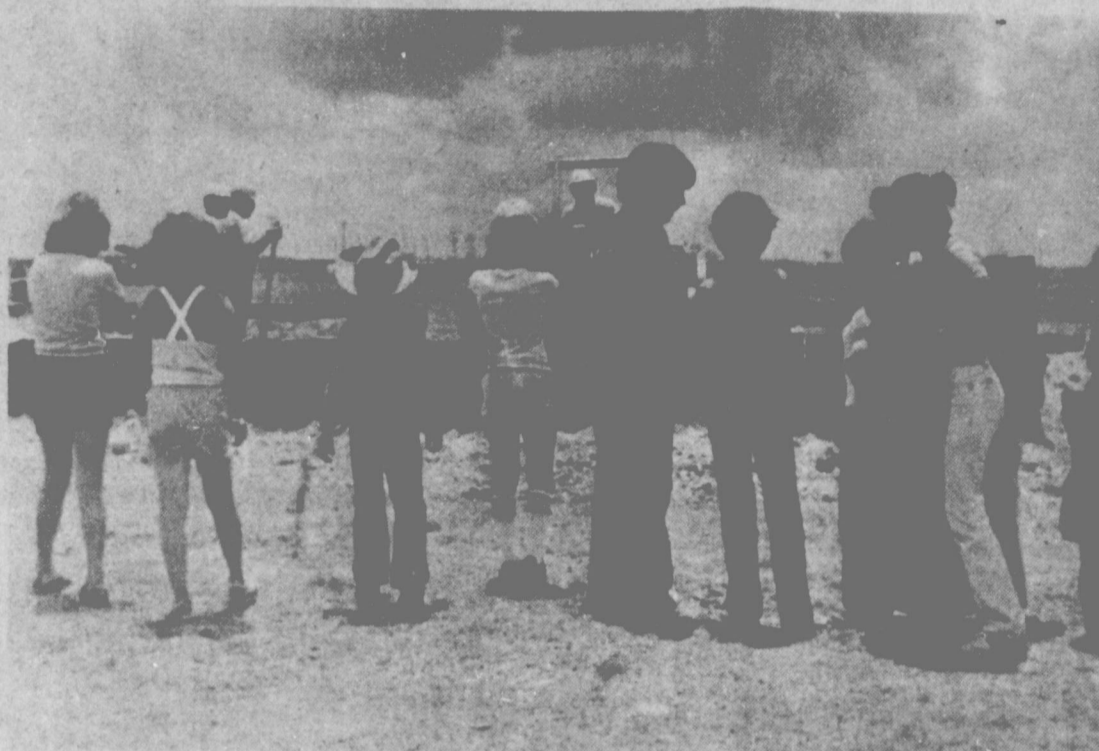
A rather unusual, but promising idea for increased corn yields in dry weather comes from research being carried out at South Dakota State University. The process might be called "row ripping". Soil between rows of knee-high corn was ripped to a depth of 10 inches by the S. D. agronomists. They were trying to reduce irrigation water loss and improve the reserve of soil moisture during dry weather. In preliminary reports, corn yields from a number of ripping sites increased from 11 to 48 bushels per acre. Keeping in mind irrigated corn yields in South Dakota may differ from those elsewhere, researchers are hoping farmers may try the ripping process on a small scale. Areas they feel it may work best are those where the ground tends to seal tight immediately after planting. And, as usual, the weather will have the upper hand since the time to do your ripping is - you guessed it - just before a good heavy downpour.

**SPRAYS CAN HELP IN AVOIDING BITES**

Anyone making hiking, camping or picnicking plans this summer should plan to avoid being bitten, stung or eaten upon.

The woods and meadows this time of year are alive with ticks, chiggers, mosquitos, spiders, snakes and other creatures designed to take the fun out of your excursion.

Various products are on the market in spray form to kill flying or crawling pests. Some repellents may be sprayed on the body or clothing to ward off bites or body infestation.

If you see ticks around, it's a good idea to check your body periodically and remove them before they become attached. If a tick is found which already has "dug in", you may remove it safely by coating it with oil. This cuts off the ticks capacity to breathe and makes it let go its hold.

Campers and hikers need to beware of snakes. If you are in brush country, wear long pants and sturdy high topped boots to ward off snakebites. Avoid stepping over logs without looking first — and never put your hands up over a ledge where you can't see them. If you can't see your hands, you couldn't see a snake.

If walking, make lots of noise because snakes don't like noise. Stay on well-trodden paths and learned trails if possible because snakes usually stay back in the brush where there is plenty of protection.

**You are what you eat**

HOUSTON, TX. — Can some cancers possibly be controlled at the dinner table through the diet?

"It is very likely," says Dr. Guy R. Newell, director of cancer prevention programs at The University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute.

Low levels of fiber in the diet are indirectly associated with cancer of the large intestine or colon, he says. Because a high fiber intake helps dilute the contents of the bowel and increases transit time, scientists think that potential carcinogens (cancer-causing agents) do not remain in the digestive system as long.

Dr. Newell says, "A person can increase the amount of fiber received daily by eating more fruits and vegetables and by substituting whole-grain products, such as oats, wheat or rice, for refined grains."

shows that you are protected.  
This may discourage burglars  
from taking your goods, and it  
will make identification of  
recovered items much easier.

11. Keep a list of all items of  
value with an estimate of their  
cost. Many insurance com-  
panies suggest this be done  
and that photographs be  
taken of the valuables as  
well. This can be of major im-  
portance if you have to file a  
claim for loss with an in-  
surance carrier. Your in-  
surance agent can provide you  
with information on how fre-  
quently such lists should be  
updated.

If you'll take the time to  
follow the above check-list,  
you can at least have the  
benefit of knowing that you  
have done everything in your  
power to insure a burglar-free  
home upon your return from  
your vacation. Don't do  
criminals a favor by making  
their task easier for them.

A free barbeque will be offered to all ticket purchasers on the 16th immediately following the parade.

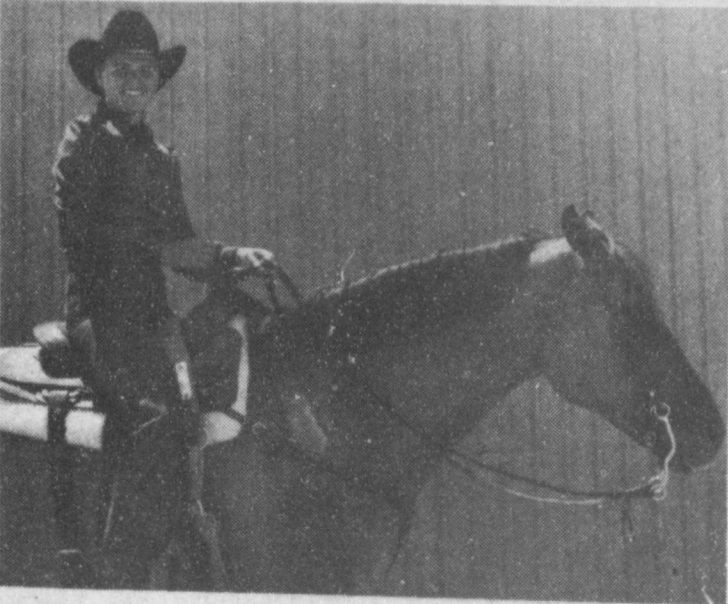
The rodeo office is located at the rodeo grounds in Earth with phone-ins being taken at 257-2125.

Entries will be accepted from 12 noon to 6 p.m. on Wednesday, July 15.

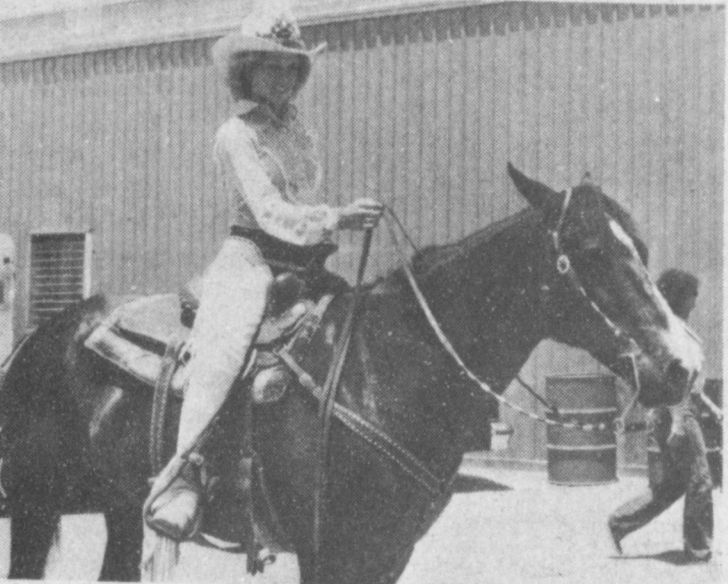

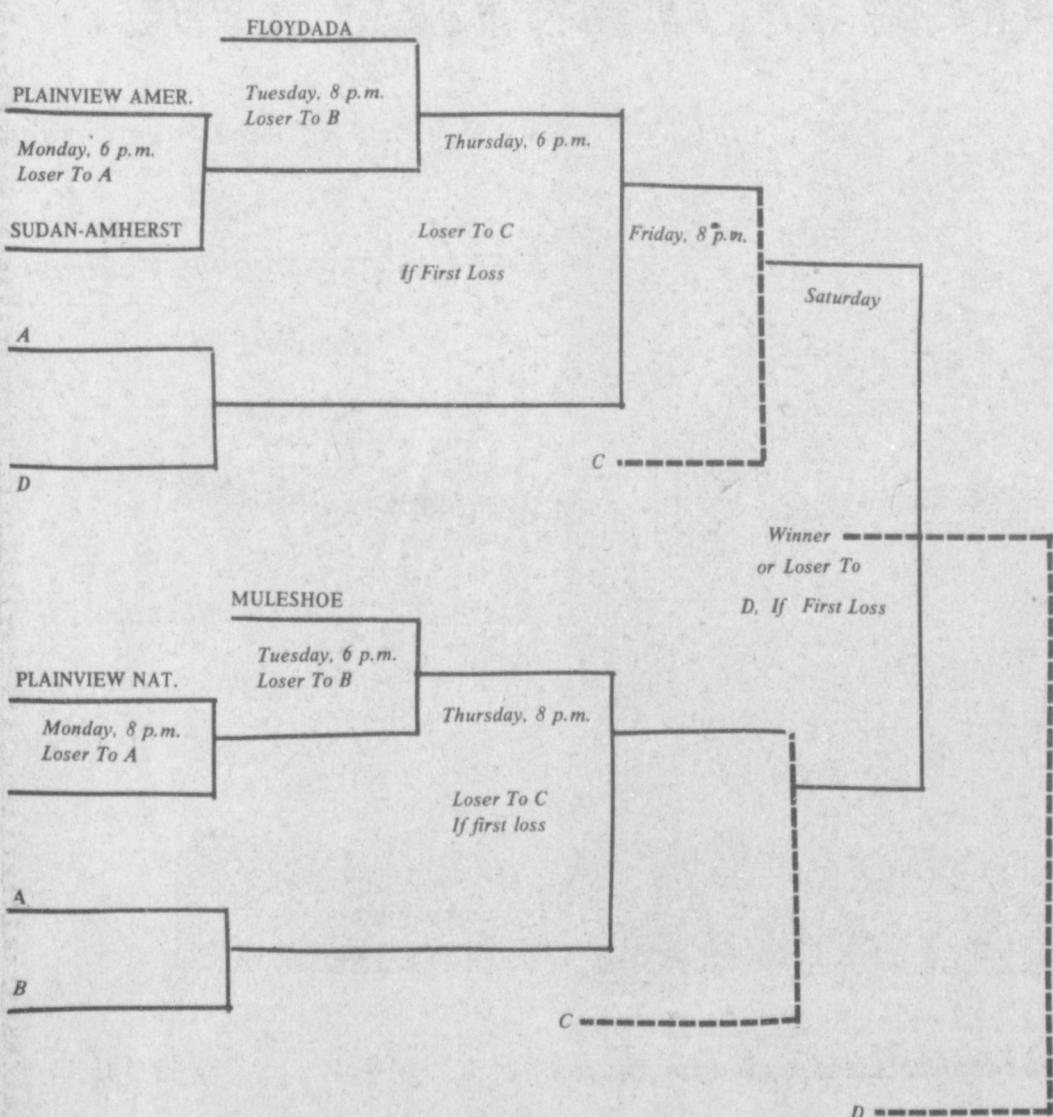

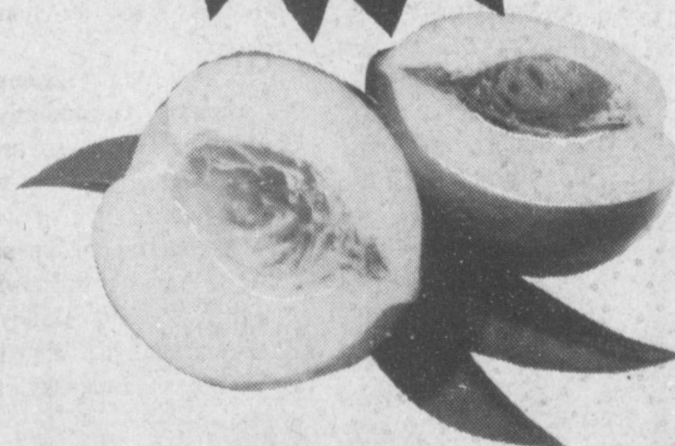

I use to practice with Bobby Grumbles, but then we would get to the tournament and not do any good" Helton gives Grumbles partial credit for his win "because he was the one who got me started pitching... and he gave me a lot of support during the tournament."

Helton, whose father taught him to pitch horse-shoes, says pitching mule shoes takes skill. "You take those champion horse shoe pitchers and they can't even throw a mule shoe," he stated.

The reason for this is apparent on sight. The horse shoe used in pitching weighs 2.5 pounds and is almost eight inches high, measures seven inches in diameter at its widest point and 3.5 inches in diameter at the opening. The mule shoe in comparison, weighs 11 oz., is 5.5 inches high, 3.5 inches in diameter at the widest point and 1.75 inches in diameter between the narrowest points.

"I pitch it like my father taught me to throw a horse shoe... but the shoes are lighter and smaller and you have to know how to throw them," explained Helton.

Some competitors are dedicated pitchers and have purchased their own "shoes" from the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. The Chamber buys the shoes from a local store by the keg and the 12 inch stakes are custom made.

The idea to have a mule shoe pitching contest developed out of the Chamber business activities committee in 1969. "We wanted to have something that exemplify our town, Muleshoe, and we could get some community interest," said Harvey Bass, who was the first chairman of the committee.

"We had thrown mule shoes before, said Bass, "but in that year it became nationally known. We called our champion the world champion because no one else has one (a tournament.)"

Although the annual tournament is open to anyone, the competitors are mostly local. "We want to get the word out that we have the championship so we will have out-of-town people," said John Gullely, Chamber manager, "but if we have more it may take a week to play."

where a minority is concentrated, the commission must see that 65 percent of the minority is not divided. If a division does occur, they must show a good reason for the decision.

The commissioners have been working on this project for several months and must submit all maps and materials to the Department of Justice for approval by November 30. These changes will be implemented before the 1982 election.

Williams also explained that the commissioner's court has "contracted with the Bailey County Appraisals Board for the re-evaluation, assessment, and collection of all state and county ad valorem taxes."

The change over all will take effect August 1 and will leave the commissioner's court involved only in the collection of delinquent taxes. The court is also entering into a contract with tax attorneys to start the collection of delinquent taxes.

After this transition, the basic function of the tax office will be the registration of motor vehicles, boats, trailers, and motor homes, the processing of vehicle titles and registration of voters. It is hoped that this transition will cut down on the number of persons required to operate the office.

Williams also spoke on the jail situation which has recently been updated to meet the Texas Commission of Jail Standards.

The jail has been partially remodeled and updated and new operational procedures have been installed. "We have new fire-proof mattresses and an intercom system has been installed," said Wil-
