$1 / 2$ cup water
1 cup grated American cheese PREPARING THE FLUFFY WHITE RICE: To make 5 heapng cups of white, fluffy, per ectly cooked rice

1. Put $1-1 / 2$ cups uncooked rice, 3 cups of cold water and $1-1 / 2$ teaspoons of salt into a 2 quart saucepan and bring to
2. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover the saucepan with a lid. Do not remove lid nor stir rice while it is cooking.
3. Leave saucepan over this low heat for 14 minutes. Remove from the heat. The rice is now ready to use. Leave cover on 'till ready to use. For extra fluffy, tender, separate grains allow the rice to steam for an additional 10 minutes - with heat off, but without removing lid, keeping the extra cups of unused ready-cooked rice in the retrigerator in a covered container. Use this rice as needed in quick, delicious and inexpendishes, hot breads and desserts. METHOD: With a fork, break the tuna into small pieces. Add the onion, green pepper, hot rice
and Tabasco sauce. Rinse a custard cup with water. Pack about $3 / 4$ cup of the mixture into the custard cup. Unmold immediately into a shallow bakingserving dish or into individual baking-serving dishes. Make the rest of the mixture into timbales, moistening the cup with water before molding each timbale.
Mix together the mushroom soup and water. Pour over the dimbales in the baking-serving dish. Sprinkle the cheese over the timbales. Bake in a preheator until the cheese is browned This recipe makes 6 timbales.

## Motion Sickness

## Need Not Spoil Family Vacation

CHICAGO-You don't have to worry about that old vacation bugaboo, motion sickness, according to a Minneapolis doctor.
Under most circumstances, motion sickness can be warded off, and even when preventive measures fail, drugs are available to give relief, Dr. John E. Eichenlaub said.
Motion sickness results from, "too much nerve-tickling action" in the ear's labyrinth, the organ that helps a person keep his balance. Keeping the head steady reduces this action. The head can be steadied by leaning it against be steadied by leaning it agaition
a headrest, bracing it in posita with pillows or by focusing the with pillows or by fo
eyes on the horizon.

It is not wise, he said, to focus on rapidly passing objects, such as autos or telephone poles, since the background seems to "dip and plunge." The same thing happens when one reads or does fancy work. It's all right to read if you choose big type, and periodically look away. Crocheting and knitting should be done only if you can do it without looking, he said. The purpose is to screen out children with seeing faults and advise them to seeing fauits and advise themResults show that one out Results show that one out of
every five of the Kansas youngsters had some visual trouble seristers had some visual trouble seri-
ous enough to impair his school-
work-and the children in other parts of the country are undoubtedly fully as deficient. Specialists, teachers, mothers, and high school student volunteers cooperate in giving the 20 -minute tests.
Out of one group of 1,200 Kansas children screened, more than 300 revealed seeing troubles which had never been detected before. The ones which show up most frequently are nearsightedness, farsightedness, astigmatism, lack of depth perception, one-eyed seeing and glaucoma.

But this training, this ability to tell true from false is paying off in women's lives-this year 19,000 women will be saved from cancer who would have died a decade ago largely because they have learned to sift facts and do the right thing. The result is that for the first time on record, less women than men are dying of malignant tumors. Women just can't be fooled by household remedies, by pills or secret cures for cancer. More and more they are heeding the advice of the American Cancer Society and going for regular physical checkups.

## Total Construction Should Set New Records in 1957

Chicago-Construction will continue at a record pace this year, although there will be little change in the volume of residential building.

This is the opinion of John M. Neff, manager of the ceramics and minerals research department at Armour Research Foundation of Illinois Institute of Technology, Chicago.
He believes total construction will set a record in 1957, as it did last year, but that private home construction-which failed to live up to expectations last year-will not do much better in 1957.
"This latter point does not reflect a recession in the building industry as some people seem to think," Neff declared. "The building industry is holding its own in our growing economy, but not in the areas that were expected."
The volume of all types of construction last year totaled over $\$ 44$ billion, an increase of 3 per cent over 1955. Residential construction in 1956, however, was down 8 per cent from the previous year.
This does not indicate that the supply of housing is catching up to demand, Neff contended. But it does reflect, he said, a more cautious attitude on the part of peo ple who are house hunting.
"The public is standing off and giving more consideration to how they want to live 20 years from now," Neff declared. It is largely this thoughtful pause in making a decision, he said, that is responsible for the slowdown in private home construction.

## Human Body Reacts To Hunger, Pain

Los Angeles-What happens to your body when you are hungry or hurt?
Dr. Bernard Engel, University of California, Los Angeles, psychologist, has made a study of such "abnormal" conditions.
Subjects who fasted up to 24 hours showed a slight drop in blood pressure, a very slight rise in temperature, increased saliva flow, decreased respiration rate, and an increased incidence of stomach contractions.

Subjects who had their feet suddenly plunged into a bucket of ice water showed a marked increase in blood pressure and an increased heart rate. The blood

[^0]volume in their fingers also dropped, and a blocking of stomach contractions occurred. Anticipation of pain produced similar but not identical results.
In general, Dr. Engel said, the studies did not support earlier theories which had suggested that the body did not physiologically distinguish between hunger and pain.

NEW YORK - One of New York's outstanding optical firms recently had an urgent call from the State Department in Washington. A prominent member of the Department had had his bifocals swept into the Carribbean Sea by a wave while he was struggling with a big fish. The request was that a new pair of glasses be made and shipped by an afternoon plane that same day.
It was 11:30 a.m. when the call came. The manager of the optical firm, who had served this official for 25 years, knew his prescription was a complicated one. Nevertheless, he immediately asked a master technician to drop everything else and grind lenses. The grinding was done with unusual speed, the manager himself set the lens in a suitable frame and made meticulous adjustments. An airlines pilot grabbed them and raced to the

Med Students Liable For Military Duty
CHICAGO-Military service hands like a sword over the lives of students enrolled in the country's 76 approved four-year medical schools.
A recent survey by the American Medical Association disclosed that 81.5 per cent of all male students enrolled in medical schools during the 1955-56 academic year were subject to military liability. The number cited as liable for service makes no allowance for physical disabilities and other factors that would render an unknown percentage ineligible for service.
