TOO MUCH TO BEAR

The western democracies and Russia have long learned to endure and ignore Generalissimo Francisco Franco's tirades against "liberalism" and his praise of his own "perfect" state. But a Madrid broadcast, following the three-power invitation to democratic Spaniards to remove their dictator by peaceful means, took a new tack which is almost too much for stomach

It was not Great Britain or the United States, said the Madrid radio, which thwarted Hitler's plan to incorporate Spain into the axis and thus dominate the Mediterranean, North Africa and the Near East. No, it was Generalissimo Franco.

Such a statement, in the face of Franco's record and coming on the heels of publication of his affectionate correspondence with the axis dictators, is almost incredible. How can the Franco-controlled radio expect any reading and thinking American or Briton to believe it? How can it hope that American and British seamen will forget the times that German submarines, after attacks on Allied vessels, would surface in Spanish waters, run up the Spanish flag, and probably literally thumb their noses at the thwarted pursuers, who could not fire on a "neutral" flag.

HOTELS TALK POOR

American hotels, which have enjoyed a sellers' market for some time now, are getting worried. They fear that the muchpublicized room shortage in most cities, plus the enormous profits they are supposed to be making, will tempt everybody and his brother into the hotel business.

So the American Hotel association has issued an historical study of what happened after World War I, when similar conditions encouraged a boom in new hotels. When the depression hit, 81 percent of the nation's holsteries fell into the hands of receivers, and the Metropolitan Life Insurance company at one time found itself the owner of 138 hotels.

More discouraging to us, if we had been considering opening a hotel, is a graph purporting to show that from 1942 through 1944, when it took an order from President Roosevelt counter-signed by Winston Churchill to get a cot in a Turkish bath, the average American hotel's profit was only a trifle above 6 percent.

Proving A Point By Changing The Subject

One of the things that cause much confusion in our social problems is that those who defend a! paternalistic government invariably try to prove their contentions, by discussing another subject. They! prove something entirely different from the contention of those who believe in freedom, who believe, in a definite limited government and the inherent equal rights of each and every individual.

As an example, those advocating benevolent government contend that men should be helpful to each other; they should be charitable. kind and benevolent. They use this argument as proof that the government should take from one to give to another; that the government should try to educate the youth of the land. They imply that the man who is opposed to tax-supported schools is against education, is against charity.

They do not seem to understand or if they do they willingly change the subject, that the objection to tare-supported schools is not an objection to charity or an objection to education, but it is an objection to one man or group of men having a right to use the force of the state to make other; men comply with their idea of


