## Old Meat Controls May Be Called Out

### Eleanor Roosevelt Picked to Handle UNRRA Position

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., March 28.—(AP)—A move to place Eleanor Roosevelt at the head of an international organization for handling the problems of political exiles and war-scattered refugees gathered here today among delegates from 48 nations attending UNRRA's council meeting.

There appeared little likelihood, however, that action on the proposition would come at this meeting. It seems probable it will wait the time when the problems of displaced persons were turned over to the United Nations.

But, in circles close to the delegates, it was reported that the question of offering the job to Mrs. Roosevelt, already had gone beyond the point of speculation.

If accepted, it would bring back into a working partnership—this time at an international level—the team of Fiorenzo H. LaGuardia and Mrs. Roosevelt which directed the United States program of civilian defense during the first part of the war.

LaGuardia, former mayor of New York, has been nominated director general of UNRRA to succeed Herbert Lehman.

Before him was a broad program of recommendations to member governments on raising food control— including rationing "where necessary"—together with a call for all-out production, aid to farmers and stringent conservation steps.

The new director will be under orders to contact UNRRA's members speedily; find out how much further they can go in their contributions toward forestalling famine, and then call UNRRA's delegates back into session.

Despite the strong recommendations on food controls, there existed among the delegates scant hope that the United States—UNRRA's chief supplier—would return to rationing. A United States spokesman observed that there was nothing mandatory about the recommendation.

Houston Is Winner Of Safety Contest  
AUSTIN, March 28.—(AP)—Houston, Galveston and Lubbock were announced as winners today in the 1945 traffic safety contest sponsored annually by the Texas safety association.

Houston, in the 100,000 and up population bracket, had a fatality rate of 13.52 per 100,000. Dallas was second with 14.25. San Antonio was third with 16.93; and Fort Worth was fourth with 21.34.

## Further Hearings Slated for Friday

NEW YORK, March 28.—(AP)—The United Nations Security Council was called into executive session today to discuss grave problems of procedure raised when Soviet Delegate Andrei Gromyko walked out on the council late yesterday after it refused to postpone consideration of the Iranian issue.

A Soviet spokesman indicated Gromyko would attend the session—scheduled for 3 p.m. (CST)—with the understanding that the council would not go into the merits of the Iranian dispute.

The spokesman's statement reinforced the general understanding that the Soviet delegate had not divorced himself from the council but was merely standing pat on his determination not to participate in any discussion of the Iranian case prior to April 10—a deadline he apparently fixed on instructions from Moscow.

Under the terms of the agreement announced by Chairman Qiao Tsi-tsen of China just before the council adjourned at 6:45 p.m. yesterday, apparently precluded until Friday any further open discussion of Iran's protests against prolonged occupation by Soviet troops of Iranian territory.

Under the terms of the agreement, the government would undertake to purchase a certain number of prefabricated houses from each builder who demanded assurance that there would be a market for his full production. The government, in turn, would act as sales agent.

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## New President Walter Reuther Announces Plans for UAW Union

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., March 28.—(AP)—Walter Reuther, newly-elected president of the CIO of United Auto workers, launched his big union toward new spheres of influence today.

Reuther defeated R. J. Thomas, president for seven years, for the leadership yesterday by the slim margin of 125 votes in a turbulent four-hour roll-call at the union convention, marked by fist-fighting and confusion. The official count was 4,445 to 4,320.

Reuther told a news conference after his election that he would work toward:  
1—Organizing farm equipment workers in a big way.  
2—Industry-wide collective bargaining in the automotive industry based on equal pay for equal work.

3—Bigger, stiffer and more unified union, developing responsibility in all plants so that workers would not strike unless authorized by the international union.  
4—A guaranteed annual wage for the workers.

5—Organizing the white-collar workers, engineers and technicians of the auto industry.  
He told the convention in a speech that he wanted to "take my place by the side of Philip Murray and help him carry part of the burden he has to carry as president of the CIO."

And he put industry on notice with these words:  
"Let the capitalists and the anti-labor forces realize that we disagree in the convention but when we leave here, we leave as a united organization to fight the common fight."

Many of these newcomers, OPA said yesterday in ordering another crackdown, are "fly-by-night operators with little or no experience in cattle buying."

The control order OPA is restoring is aimed at curbing so-called custom slaughtering—slaughtering on a free basis by packing houses for those who own livestock.

Under the regulation, no beef or lamb carcasses are to be sold by anyone unless:  
1. The owner of livestock had animals slaughtered at the same plant prior to last December 29, the date the custom slaughter order was revoked, or  
2. The agriculture department has granted an exemption covering both the slaughterer and the owner of livestock.

Lobbying Probe Is Contemplated  
WASHINGTON, March 28.—(AP)—The lobbying investigation congress is contemplating took a turn today in the direction of government bureaus and democratic party officials.

House rules committee members, who tentatively approved the inquiry yesterday, told reporters privately that they were studying the widening the course of the proposed search for facts.

Eventually, they said, the investigation may encompass such officials as Robert E. Hannegan, postmaster general and chairman of the democratic national committee, as well as other administration leaders.

The inquiry, proposed originally by Rules Chairman Sabath (D-Ill.), would have been made by a special five-man committee. But the rules group, in approving it subject to house action, directed Sabath to amend his resolution before sending it to the floor.

The amendments would order the inquiry to be made by the rules committee and would broaden its scope to include not only "all groups, associations, committees, organizations, or combinations thereof" seeking to influence legislation, but also government agencies and officials.

The house requested \$60,000,000 in a ten-year period; the senate version \$75,000,000 over a five-year period.

## Soviet Held on Spy Charge Turns To Legal Advice

PORTLAND, Ore., March 28.—(AP)—A Soviet naval officer accused of espionage turned to legal advice here today as the country stirred under reports of spy activity.

Lt. Nicolai G. Redin, 29, arrested by the FBI Tuesday night on a warrant charging that he induced an unnamed person to give him data on the destroyer tender U.S.S. Yellowstone, had the aid of Russia's top west coast representative as he prepared for a decision on whether to accept or fight removal to Seattle for trial.

Redin spent his second night in jail under \$25,000 bail but Soviet Consul-General Michael S. Vavilov, who flew here from San Francisco, said he would post bail today unless Redin, member of the Soviet purchasing commission at Seattle, were released on his own recognizance.

A person close to the office of U. S. District Attorney Henry Hess said he believed Redin would be released.

## Pampa Base Will Sell Recreation Equipment Apr. 1

Officers in charge at the Pampa air field announced today that beginning April 1 recreational equipment at the base will be sold under a priority system and at a fixed cash price. The equipment includes furniture, pool tables, chairs and tables, Venetian blinds and mess equipment.

It will be sold under three priorities:  
1. From April 1 through the 5th, first priority will be given to federal, state and municipal tax-supporting agencies and educational institutions.  
2. Second priority will go to World War II veterans and veterans' organizations and local charitable organizations who may purchase items from April 6 to 11, exclusive of Sunday. Veterans must have discharge buttons in their possession.  
3. The general public and other organizations will be given the opportunity to purchase the remainder from April 12 to 17, exclusive of Sunday.

All sales, it was stated, will be made between 7:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. No persons will be admitted to the field prior to the date of the sale and then only those eligible to make purchases will be allowed.

## Reds Object To Testimony In War Trial

NUERNBERG, March 28.—(AP)—Joachim von Ribbentrop's former personal secretary attempted to testify before the international military tribunal today that she had seen the original of a secret treaty allegedly signed by Russia and Germany in 1939 for the partition of Poland and the Baltic states, but quick Soviet objections interrupted her.

The former German foreign minister's secretary, Margarete Blanz, barely had time to assert that such a treaty had been signed by Von Ribbentrop and Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov of Russia, when Soviet Prosecutor Gen. R. A. Rudenko waded in to object.

He declared the matter was irrelevant and that the witness was not competent to testify concerning the alleged treaty, thus posing one of the most delicate questions to be presented at the tribunal, since the war crimes trial opened here Thursday.

The tribunal immediately recessed to discuss the matter in private. Gen. Rudenko charged that attempts of attorneys for both Von Ribbentrop and Rudolf Hess to bring the reported secret pact into the trial were "purely provocative."

Alfred Seidl, counsel for Hess, jumped up with a declaration that he would do anything to prevent the alleged pact from being introduced into the trial.

He said the Russians had seized the original of the pact from their archives in Berlin and added:  
"I ask that the Soviet delegation be ordered to submit to the tribunal the original of that agreement."

Seidl said he was unable to understand whether the Soviet prosecution was denying the existence of the secret treaty and that if it was, Molotov be produced to testify.

The alleged treaty first was mentioned by Dr. Friedrich Gust, former German ambassador to London.

## Some of Best Diplomacy Brains Backing Soviet

NEW YORK, March 28.—(AP)—Soviet Russia had some of the best brains in diplomacy whirling today. No one seemed able to say exactly why Andrei Gromyko walked out on the United Nations security council.

The so-called "diplomatic experts" who usually know the answers had no explanation for the Russian delegate's action. They were simply equally uncertain what the effect of his action would be on the new world peace organization.

Some thought this showdown with Russia was a good thing. Some wished to high heaven it could somehow have been avoided. A few wondered whether Russia's absence might virtually paralyze the council.

The immediate cause of the walk-out was obvious enough. Ambassador Gromyko had served notice that if Ambassador Hussein Ala of Iran was called by the council to say anything on his country's complaints against Russia, Gromyko would leave.

Why Moscow sent those instructions, what she hoped to gain by the action—these were questions without answers today.

Gromyko, the experts suggested, might have remained aloof from Hussein Ala simply by pushing his big chair back from the council table, folding his arms and declining to join the discussion.

Measuring the development against the cause of world peace—something that was a subject of speculation in legation hotel rooms all over town—American authorities came up with these conclusions:  
1. It was a calculated move that Iran be given opportunity to make a statement without delay. Secretary of State Byrnes had emphasized to the world his principle that no nation on the council could prevent any other nation from being heard.  
2. In challenging Russia's threat to walk out, however, the council majority at least temporarily witnessed the split among the big powers.  
3. The brightest spot in the situation as it shaped up was the statement of a Soviet spokesman

## Citizens Will Face Hospital Issue Saturday

Saturday, property owners will vote on whether they want a Gray county general hospital to be paid by a county \$550,000 bond issue.

Plans for the proposed hospital provide for 100 beds with private and semi-private rooms, general and isolation wards. It would be located somewhere in Pampa in whose vicinity 73 per cent of the taxable property is located.

Equipment would be of the most modern type available. Persons working with initial hospital plans in order to determine approximate cost, believe surplus army and navy hospital equipment may be purchased at lower cost.

The hospital would be air-conditioned, sound and fire proof, and would be managed by a board hired by the county commissioners court. A nurses training school would be connected with the hospital providing accredited graduate training.

Payment of the hospital would be by issuance of bonds not to exceed 20 years at not over 2½ per cent. The county commissioners would have the authority to sell the bonds at the best price possible.

Taxes for property owners would not exceed 13½ cents on a \$100 valuation.

Hospitalization for all persons requiring such during the past emergency years has not been possible. Due to the drainage of nurses to army and navy forces, local hospital personnel has had to increase normal working capacity many-fold.

There are two hospitals in Gray county, both in Pampa and both privately owned, which together provide 75 hospital beds.

Both the Worley and Pampa hospitals serve a county population of 23,911, providing one hospital bed for every 319 persons. Average for Texas is one bed for every 80 persons. Average absolute minimum as recommended by the United States Public Health Service is one bed for 222 persons.

In Texas during 1945 the average hospital bed was used by 11 persons a year. At the Worley hospital 46 persons used one hospital bed a year, according to patients admitted as reported by the AMA, Basinets and beds are in need of repairs.

The Worley hospital reported yesterday that there are five registered nurses on the staff with about eight undergraduate nurses on duty. There are approximately ten private duty nurses available to take care of patients at night hours.

The Pampa hospital reported three registered nurses on the staff and 14 floor nurses, of which 11 are undergraduates.

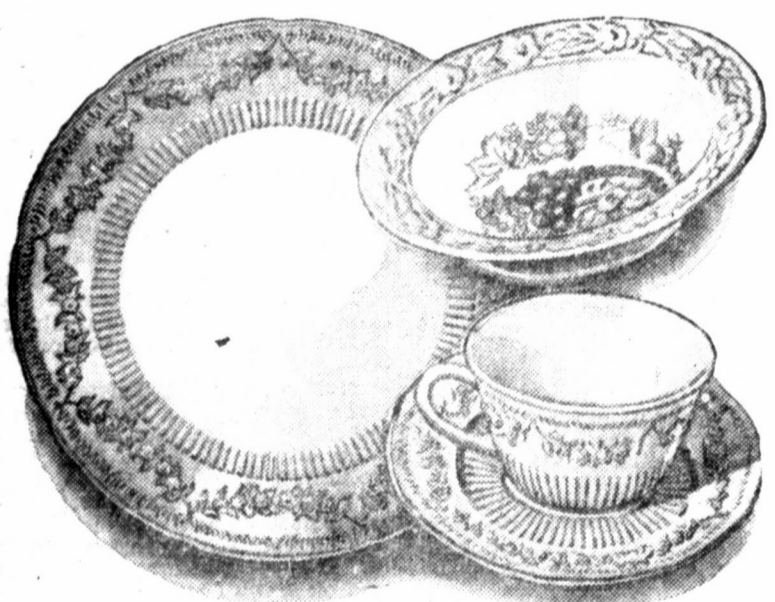

(2) The Iranian government should recognize internal autonomy for Azerbaijan, and the provincial premier becoming governor general, with the provincial ministries of foreign affairs and war abolished, with 30 percent of the provincial revenue paid to the Iranian central government and all correspondence with the central government conducted in the Persian language. (3) The Soviet government should abandon demands for an oil concession and an Iranian-Russian joint stock company should be set up with 51 percent of the shares held by the Soviet Union and 49 percent by Iran.

Hussein Ala said Premier Qavam rejected these demands and the Soviet officials withdrew them. Further efforts, the Iranian said, had not clarified the situation. Cromyko told the council: "For reasons which I explained clearly enough in our meeting yesterday and in today's meeting, Mr. Chairman, I, as representative of the Soviet Union, am not able to participate further in the discussions of the security council because my proposal has not been accepted by the council, and I therefore leave the meeting." There was only a slight interruption while the Soviet delegation strode solemnly out.

(Continued from page 1) and Russia would be represented at today's closed council meeting. It seemed certain the council would have another public session Friday at which time, with Gromyko expected to be absent, members would have a chance to question Hussein Ala on his statement yesterday that Iran wanted immediate action on its complaints against Russia. A close official opinion of the moment is that much will depend on the situation in Iran. If the Russian are still showing good faith in getting their troops out—which is the main issue—there is reason for council action may more or less collapse. If not, about the most extreme action the council could take would be to adopt a resolution recommending that Russian troops should be withdrawn at once—and leave the rest to public opinion and moral pressure. "That line of development was depending on whether the council decided that in Russia's absence it could still function. The United Nations charter simply makes no provision for a situation which one of the 11 members refuses to attend. On efforts to settle a dispute peacefully, a party to the dispute must refrain from voting under the charter. In this case it would appear, therefore, that the council could go along for the time without Russia—unless someone should prove that unless all the Big-Five nations were present it could not function at all.

(Continued from page one) can go ahead the immediate essentiality of his project, unless it is a house costing under \$10,000. So while the increase in factories, stores, hotels and similar structures will be only four per cent, the increase in houses will be about 65 per cent. Proposed new theatres, race tracks, night clubs and luxury dwellings will be held back. So will new factories, unless they will make needed products or supply needed jobs. The program depends on the success of the drives to increase the output of materials, and to recruit construction workers. Wyatt told it this way to a congressional committee: "The necessary expansion in home building can be accomplished only through a great expansion in total construction activity. "It cannot be accomplished through the x x x reduction of competing phases of construction." It works out roughly this way: The country's resources will stand about \$7,500,000,000 worth of new construction this year. And that is the total program goal. Without the new regulation only about \$1 would have gone for housing for every \$2 spent on other building. Now, the ratio is intended to be about dollar for dollar. CPA, whose major job is to protect reconversion, is in charge of the business of screening out the essential from the unessential, with the help of local citizens' committees in each city. "They might approve construction of a factory so that the finished factory will furnish employment," Wyatt testified on Capitol Hill recently. "If the American people are going to build 2,700,000 houses this year and next year, they will require community facilities, because many new communities will be built. "Streets are necessary, sewers are necessary and utility lines are necessary. Other facilities, including grocery stores, drug stores, hospital facilities and schools, will be approved where they are necessary, and they can go forward."

(Continued from page one) hospitals were crowded, local doctors report; it was not possible to hospitalize all who needed it and there was not a place to isolate persons with contagious diseases. The Worley hospital, with 45 beds, added more to their floors. At present, it is not always possible to hospitalize persons, nor provide the type of room they desire, particularly private rooms. Serious mental cases cannot be accommodated by local hospitals. Under present circumstances such cases are kept in the county jail until the county releases them, recommendations sending them to public institutions, or provides for their care. Charity cases would be taken care of by the hospital at a cost to the county at approximately the same rate as now, \$4,000 a year. During 1945 there were 574 births reported in Pampa and 120 deaths. These figures compared favorably with Texas county averages. County births and mortality rates are not available. Morbidity rates are likewise not available. Dr. Webb, county health officer, reports that but one doctor in the county sends weekly health reports to him, as required by the State Health department. The weekly reports are to check up on contagious diseases throughout Texas. None have been recorded for Gray county recently. Majority of persons requiring hospitalization in the county, as reported by several local doctors, are for pregnancy, heart and cancer diseases.

man ambassador to Moscow. An attempt to introduce this affidavit by Hess' defense was blocked by Gen. Rudenko pending its translation from German into Russian, French and English. Outside the courtroom, Seidl expressed bewilderment that such translations had not been completed. He said he submitted the seven-page document to the tribunal's translation staff three days ago. Before her motion of the secret treaty brought today's proceedings to a standstill, the 36-year-old Miss Blank, who was Von Ribbentrop's secretary from 1934 to the end of the war, had described her employer as an almost absent figure who "suffered psychologically" when as a result of frequent disagreements Adolf Hitler "refused for weeks to see him." Earlier, when Von Ribbentrop's counsel sought a five-minute recess before summoning the woman to the stand, the tribunal upheld an objection by Thomas J. Dodd, deputy U. S. prosecutor, to the effect that in the repeated delays "we are faced with almost a one-man filibuster." In addition to excessive tire wear, wheels that are out of line make for difficult driving.

A. basketball title, you find it hard to write about anything or anyone but Bob Kurland—You remember Bob when he first played in New York four years ago—A lanky, awkward seven-footer who galloped around the court with his shoulders bowed in an obvious effort to minimize his great height—He was only 17 then, lacking in coordination and skill and painfully embarrassed because of the publicity given his size—You remember him the next year as a "goal-tender," heavier, stronger, straighter, planting himself under the team's basket and leaping up to bat away the other team's shots—You remember him in last year's playoff game against DePaul when he was guarded by six-foot, nine-inch George Mikan, a polished old story. You remember how Bob faded and feinted until Mikan fouled out of the game after only twelve minutes and how Kurland went on to direct and lead his team to victory.

The Aggies, first team to win two N. C. A. A. cage titles, were the fourth Oklahoma team to win a national basketball crown this year—The Phillips "66" club of Bartlesville won its fourth straight A. A. U. championship—Langston university took the Negro national college title and Cushing, Okla., beat Tampa, Fla., for the National Negro high school championship.

## Aggies Are on Top in Percentage Rankings

NEW YORK, March 28.—(AP)—The Oklahoma Aggies topped all college basketball teams in the United States during the 1945 season, an Associated Press tabulation showed today.  
Based on a won-lost percentage, the compilation shows that big seven-foot Bob Kurland and his Cowboy teammates who beat North Carolina for the NCAA title Tuesday night, too the No. 1 spot with .939 on 31 victories against two defeats.  
Kentucky's Wildcats, winner of the National Invitation tournament at Madison Square Garden, finished in a tie with Yale for second place at .833. The Wildcats won 28 and lost two while the Eli finished their season in mid-February with 14 victories and one defeat.  
The Aggies' two defeats came at the hands of DePaul and Bowling Green. Kentucky lost to Temple and Notre Dame. Yale's one setback was administered by Harvard.  
Ranked fourth at .805 with a 19-2 mark is Kansas, twice defeated by the Aggies. West Virginia and Rhode Island state, both of whom pushed Kentucky to the utmost in the invitation tourney, rank fifth and sixth, respectively, at .800 and .775.  
Harvard at .870; New York university and Slippery Rock (Pa.) teachers, each at .664; the University of Indiana and Louisiana state, tied at .557; North Carolina at .553; Syracuse at .552 and Lafayette at .550 round out the teams with a percentage of .550 or better.

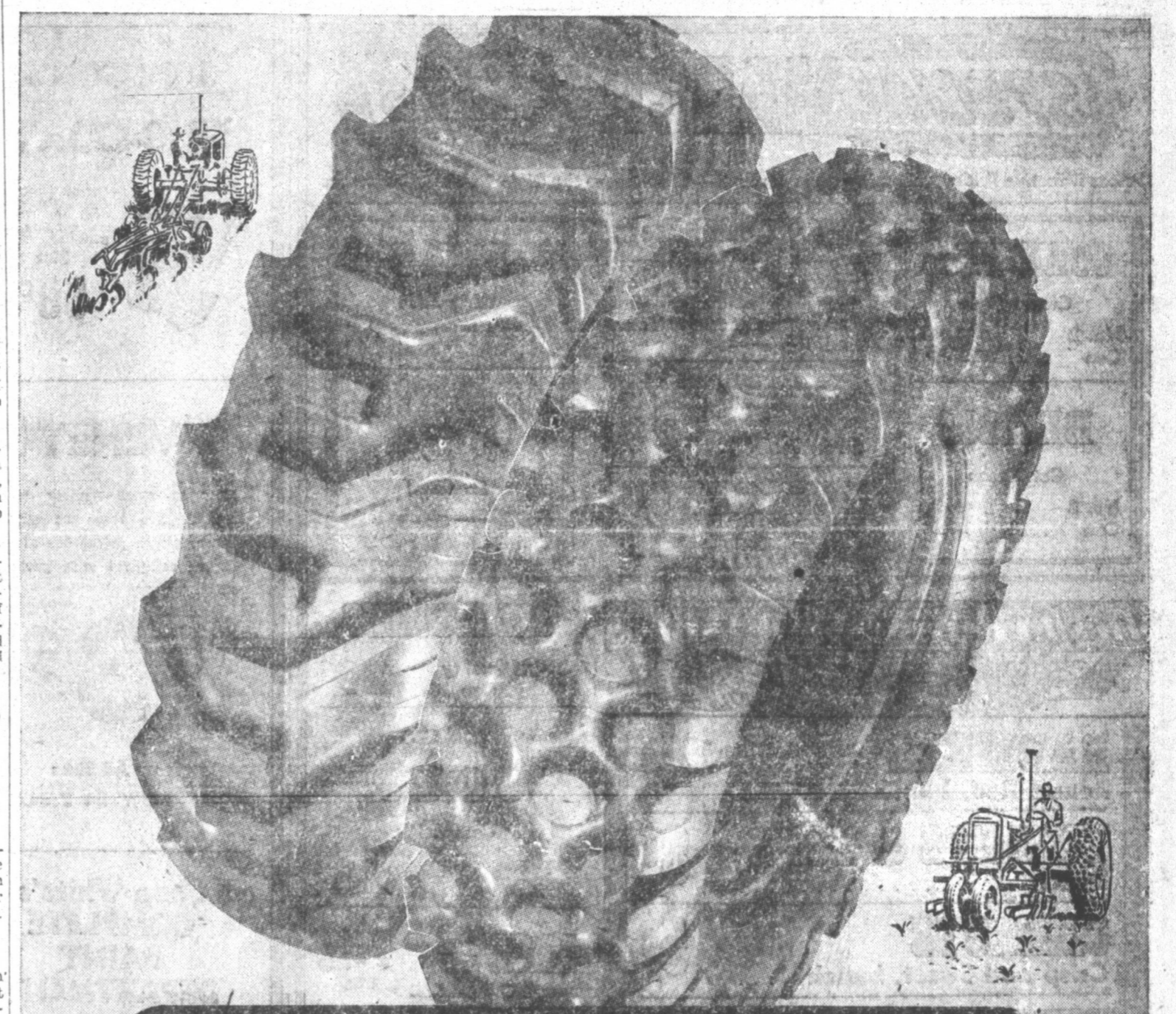

## Doolittle Heads Board Appointed To Study Caste

A very constructive move was made last week by Secretary of War Patterson when he appointed a six-man board of former servicemen to study the much criticized "military caste system."

Heading the board will be Lt. Gen. James H. Doolittle, of Tokio raid fame and subsequent distinguished service. On the board will be ex-GIs and officers as well. Former Technical Sgt. Jake Lindsey of Mississippi, the one-hundredth infantryman to win the Congressional Medal of Honor, will serve, along with Troy H. Middleton, comptroller of Louisiana state university, who as a lieutenant general commanded the 45th division in North Africa and Sicily. Other members include Robert Neville, New York

newspaperman and former lieutenant colonel, Adna H. Underhill of Proville, N. Y., who was a paratroop captain and Anglo veteran, and Merrill H. Frost of Hanover, N. H., a former air force sergeant badly wounded in Italy.

Secretary Patterson said the army investigation will look into the relations between officers and men both on and off duty, investigate provisions for their housing, clothing, and recreation facilities, living conditions and the promotion system. Enlisted men and officers in service at the present time will testify at the hearings which will start late this month. A large number of witnesses, including civilians who had close contact with service personnel, such as workers of the Red Cross, will be heard.

It is expected that the navy will announce the appointment of a similar board soon. Vice Admiral Louis E. Denfeld, chief of naval personnel, disclosed the make-up of the navy board has not yet been determined but stated that it would consist of reservists or former naval men.

Patterson in appointing the board said that in planning for a peacetime army any change in personnel policy should be made to achieve a citizen's army of the best type possible. "In the last few years, millions have served in the army who would not have done so had it not been for the war—and while the experience of the war is still fresh in our minds, the time is right to take stock and determine what changes

should be made in our practices." Another announcement made by the war department was that of 212 brigadier generals being reverted to the permanent status of colonels, which serves to give some idea of how secret has been our demobilization policy.

## Texans To Learn More About Fish

DENTON, March 28—North Texas State college biologists are laying the ground work which may someday bring vacation-minded America to Texas for winter fishing and Texas farmers to markets with their fish.

To increase fish production by furnishing farmers and fishermen with accurate data on problems of fish management, three staff members and a dozen or more student assistants have been probing the habits of Texas fish for the past 10 years in a series of studies that promise long-time benefits to the state.

Texas farmers bringing fish to the market as they now bring cotton, wheat, or livestock may be among the eventual results of the years of research in the college fishery.

The average farmer and rancher should in the future know how and what to stock his small individual pond; he will know whether the environment is right for the fish he wishes to grow, and if conditions are wrong, where he can obtain scientific advice or how to correct these conditions. Such is the goal of NTSC biological research.

## Mayor Wants Airfield For Airline Service

WASHINGTON, March 28.—(AP)—Mayor John C. Calhoun of Corsicana is conferring here with War Assets corporation officials in a move by the city to acquire the army primary training airfield which was operated there during the war by the Air Activities of Texas, Inc.

Calhoun said the city hopes eventually to operate the field for smaller planes flying regular schedules into other Texas cities. Texas Airlines, Inc., he said, are ready now to establish twice daily service into Corsicana as soon as the city can take over control of the airfield.

The barracks at the airfield will provide housing for at least 50 veterans and families if federal authorities will agree to the city proposal, he added.

## Undulant Fever Contacted by Handling Animals

AUSTIN, March 28—Undulant (Malta) fever is a disease which is transmitted to human beings by infected animals. Individuals may acquire the disease (1) as the result of direct contact with infected animals or (2) following the use of raw dairy products obtained from infected dairy cows. If the disease is due to contact with infected animals or their waste products, the germ

gains entrance to the human body through the skin, stated Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer.

Persons who live on farms are more subject to undulant fever than those who live in cities. On farms, the disease is more apt to affect men due to the fact that men come in contact with hogs and cows to a much greater extent than do farm women. Farmers have direct contact with animals during loading and unloading for market. The handling of infected cows or sows and of the young at time of birth represent hazardous types of contact. The danger of undulant fever may be reduced greatly by avoiding as much as possible all forms of direct con-

tact with animals which may be infected. The wearing of heavy gloves if contact is unavoidable should aid in protecting the skin against exposure.

Urban residents have little or no occasion to come in direct contact with infected animals. Undulant fever acquired in city or town is due, as a rule, to the use of milk, cream, and butter which lack certain safeguards. Prevention of undulant fever, whether due to contact with infected animals or to ingestion of contaminated dairy products, is dependent to a further extent, upon the eradication of contagious abortion from farm animals and careful pasteurization of dairy products.

## Science to Rescue—Reading in Bed O.K.

NEW YORK, March 28.—No longer will be the question of whether to put the light out or keep it on and read need to be a cause for dissension between married couples.

An arrangement described in the current issue of Electric Contracting makes it possible for each to have his own way.

It is a continuous metal reflector built in o the wall and extending

across the headboard of twin beds. A wide reflector provides ideal bed reading light. Wall switches control fluorescent lamps over each bed separately.
